Fire Destroys KCRS Studios

Radio Station KCRS studios in the Scharbauer Hotel burned Saturday afternoon in a raging blaze which for an hour defied the Midland Fire Department and kept hundreds of spectators watching tensely.

Officials of the station said its interior and equipment were a "complete loss." While accurate appraisals of the destruction would require several days, they estimated the damage at approximately \$35,000.

Sabotage Reported

Texas Rangers Saturday were sent to South Texas at the instruction of Gov. Beauford H. Jester to halt reported sabotage and property destruction in five oil areas.

This brought to 10 the number of rangers now operating in Nueces, San Patricio, Jim Wells, Brooks and Duval Counties, where Jester said sabotage had been re-

Two rangers were first sent when he received reports of a strike and mass picketing, the governor

"Subsequently there have been acts of sabotage on some leases where they were not patrolling," he reported.

"I have instructed Joe Fletcher, acting director of the Department of Public Safety, to get enough rangers down there to stop sabotage and destruction of property on wells and well equipment.

The Russian resolution, a copy of one overwhelmingly rejected by the Security Council, blamed Greece for border unrest, demanded withdrawal of foreign troops and foreign military personnel from Greece, and asked the Assembly to create a commission to supervise economic aid to Greece, an apparent reference to the Truman Aid

The American proposal accuses Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia of supporting guerrilla warfare against the Greek government and calls for establishment of a special committee to investigate disturb-

Commission To Study Mexican Labor Problem

AUSTIN-AP-The Good Neighbor Commission was handed the job of studying charges, of discrimination against Mexican citizens. doing contract labor in Texas.

Gov. Beauford H. Jester tossed the matter into the commission's lap after Interior Secretary Hector Perez Martinez of Mexico ordered the movement of contract laborers to Texas halted.

Jester said the Mexican Government's charges of discrimination against braceros (contract farmworkers) in the rate of pay, as compared to that of Anglo-American workers might be true in isolated places."

He did not think the condition was general.

The governor said he has urged an early October meeting of the Good Neighbor Commission to consider all angles of the Latin-American discrimination problem.

Martinez said minimum pay rates in Texas were 25 to 30 cents an hour. Mexican workers had been contracted in California for 65 cents an hour and contracts are toing drawn up for work in Arizona. Colorado, Arkansas and New Mexico at \$2.50 to \$3 per 100, he adcod.







among government officials concerned with the future of Germany that, unless something "miraculous" happens, existing East-West differences over German and Austrian peace settlements will crystillize into a break after the Foreign Ministers Council. The foreign ministers are ex-

pected to meet in London November 25 for what British leaders believe will be their "last chance" to write jointly agreed German and Austrian peace treaties.

The rich, coal-producing Saar Basin is now part of the French Zone of Germany. Its incorporation would bring to France an industrial and mining region of 726 square miles, with a population of almost . 1,000,000. With coal as its basic industry, the Saar also turns out millions of tons of steel and iron each year, as well as cerantics, glass and certain chemicals.



ship Texas historical shrine project, say they are awaiting word from the Lone Star state as to-when the ship can be delivered. She is now tied up at Hawkins Point, in Chesapeake Bay near Baltimore,

> It is proposed that the Texas be berthed in the Houston ship channel, within the shadow of the San Jacinto Monument. There she would be open for guided tours so that Texans from Dalhart to Brownsville, El Paso to Texarkana, could inspect the gallant 33-yearold warship.

Rated as an "OBB" by the Navy because she is obsolete compared to seas, the ship that climaxed a long service record in a furious exchange of gunfire with German shore installations during the Normandy invasion. She came out of that battle with her bridge shattered but still going strong, then helped finish off the Japanese in the Pacific.

Cost Estimates High

The idea of making the battleship a Texas shrine has met enthusiastic approval-but the catch is the question of money.

Estimates on the cost of dredgng a slip in which she can be permanently berthed run as high as \$175,000. A lesser problem is that of annual maintenance costs. ranging variously from \$18,000 to \$50,000. Admission fees at 10 cents to 25 cents should pay for painting and for personnel to handle af-

The Texas Legislature failed to provide the money. Gov. Beauford Jester named a commission, headed by Lloyd Gregory of Houston, to study means of raising cash.

A state-wide campaign among chool children to toss pennies, dimes, and quarters into the fund. already launched by school youngsters in the Gulf Coast section, has been proposed.

Manned By Standby Crew

Meanwhile, the federal government is out considerable expense while waiting for Texans to act. Now manned by a standby crew of three officers and 96 men, the ship is to be taken to the Norfolk, Va., Navy Yard and readied for her final role. The costs-approximately \$100,000, which Uncle Sam will put up as his share in the undertaking-will cover work such as repainting and sealing off of certain lower deck sections to keep

down maintenance costs. The Navy wants to time the trip from Baltimore to Norfolk so that as soon as the work is done there she can immediately be towed to Texas. The towing has to be done in other than the hurricane season because of the difficulties that could arise if severe weather were encountered enroute.

Texas Must Decide Soon

A Navy official said that the department hopes to have definite word from the Texas commission within the next 30 days as to when Texas can accept the ship. The department has suggested that it be towed down in January and tied up at a temporary berth until the San Jacinto Battleground mooring is ready. In any event, it was added, it should be delivered to Texas prior to next June

Launched in 1914, the Texas is 73 feet long; at the water line she is 565 feet. Her beam is 106 feet and one inch, so that she barely squeezes' through the 110-feet-wide locks of the Panama Canal. Her draft is 32 feet, three inches; displacement 34,000 tons, and speed

Texas Lawmakers Visiting Europe Report Many Interesting Sidelights

WASHINGTON-AP-Letters of Rep. Bob Poage of Waco give an excellent and informal presentation of what traveling lawmakers see when they go abroad. Currently traveling in Europe



Red Lantern On Freedom Train

In the play, "State of the Union," a political boss remarks that it applause won elections, William Jennings Biyan would have had three terms. Well, Henry A. Wal lace gets a lot of applause, too, and he probably won't yet even one term. But he can't be ignored.

According to a recent poll, there are several million Americans who would Note for him if they had the chance. A third party is shaping up, and Wallace is its boy. Evidently the millions of Wallace fans have an idea of what kind of president he would make, though the idea might be a trifle vague. Walface has a way of changing opinions between speeches which is a little confusing. He also is inclined to ignore obvious factors when they interfere with his political train of thought of the moment.

Still, there are a few constant elements in the Wal-Henry in the White House from material found in his Madison Square Garden speech, and try to imagine how our government might be run in the unlikely event that the picture came to life.

Our foreign policy would be drastically altered, and we would cease to resist Soviet expansion. Wallace say: communism and capitalism can live side by side. In that view he differs from Stalin, who keeps warning his people

of the inevitable war with the forces of world capitalism. We would cease resisting Communist infiltration and expansion in the United States. Wallace has declared war on the Red baiters and Russia haters, and he's dead set against the loyalty tests for government workers.

The Marshall Plan, if it were in operation, would be rebuilt or scrapped. Wallace carefully avoided mention of the dominion's 2.974.000 square from his Broken Hill Base, New erty ranging from \$16 for a proping the plan in his latest speech. But he said that the big miles. financial interests are shaping our foreign policy-"unde. the present administration, Wall Street is all set to cur the world." And the Marshall Plan is perhaps the mos important element of that policy.

Wallace objects to Secretaries Forrestal Snyder and Harriman; McCloy, head of the World Bank and many others-not on their record as public servant: so much as on their connection with Wall Street or big

We should escape both depression and war. Wallace says that depression is part of the policy of both majo: parties, and that "war-with-Russia hysteria" is a propa ganda weapon of reactionary capitalism. Yet he has created a little hysteria himself by implying repeatedly that war is inevitable unless his views are adopted.

There is one item, however, on which Wallace leaves most of us in the dark. He has never explained how, under his get-soft-with-Russia plan, we could avoid winding up as just another satellite of Moscow in a communistic world.

Timber From Alaska May Boost Output Of U.S. Newsprint

WASHINGTON-(A)-Bids for a second block of Alaskan timber totalling 1,500,000,000 cubic feet will be called for by the United States Forest Service.

It is the second such bid requested recently. The Service says the timber offered is enough to operate a \$35,000,000 pulp mill for ou years.

Frank Heinzleman, a regional forester-of Alaska, said bids would be opened for the sale of timber for the first mill, near Petersburg, Alaska, on October 1. First Step In Plan

The second advertisement which was published September 15 called for bids to be opened December 15 for the same amount of timber near Ketchikan.

The sale of the Petersburg tract will be the first step in the Forest Service's plan to establish six huge pulp mills in the territory. each of which can turn out 525 tens of pulp a day.

The successful bidders can make pulp and ship it to the United States or make newsprint for shipment here.

The Forest Service does not tell the mills what kind of paper they must make, but with the newsprint shortage its officials say they believe that newsprint will be

Directed By Forest Service Congressional hearings on the legislation permitting the sale of the timber developed the fact tnat Alaskan newsprint mills will find a ready market for their product on the West Coast and elsewhere in this country. Congress approved despite opposition from Indian tribes of southeast

It was almost a month after Jajan's surrender before Lord Mountbatten could send allied troops to Java. This gave the Japs ample pportunity to turn over arms to their Quislings and help them get ontrol over the Republican setup.

"The situation in Indonesia was not engineered by the Communists," said Dr. Van Mook. "Indonesia is not fertile for communism. But the Communists have taken clever advantage of what the Japs started. They have concentrated on townspeople and plantation workers, who had no incomes during the occupa-

Communists At Work "For example, they have induced he Republican leaders to put laborers in charge of the plantations. These have quantities of rubber, tea. etc., either left over from before the occupation or produced while the Japs were there, and never shipped. There also is a certain amount of machinery and equip-

"The laborers are permitted to seil this-though they are producing little or nothing-for money. Then the Communists tell them: 'See, this is nationalization. You're livng easily, doing almost no work, you can readily see what com-munism does for the common peo-

"Naturally, they think it's fine. They don't realize that such a thing can last only until accumu-





It was probably just an uncanny accident, but pioneers who named Texas: towns for European and eastern cities have them placed on the map just about like they are

For instance, says the Tyler Telegraph: Athens, Texas, is south of Paris, Texas; Palestine, Texas, is southeast of Athens; and Italy, Texas, is west of Athens. Thats the way they are abroad.

New York, Texas, is southwest of Boston, Texas, and Washington, Texas, is south of New York. And across an imaginary Atlantic (on the Texas map) London (new or old) is East of New York.

Few Seem Misplaced The Telegraph admits that it's a little hard to explain what Canton is doing between Athens and Paris, or how Pittsburgh landed between Boston and New York, or why Carthage is east of Athens intead of southwest.

The mail continues to bring in explanations of how Texas towns were named and why: C. P. Melton of Mercedes says

Arp. Texas, was named for a newspaper editor-Bill Arp of the Atlanta Constitution. He's one of the few newsmen honored in Texas by having a town named for him. Melton said Arp was both es-tablished and named by his father

after a previous name-Strawberry -had been turned down by the postoffice department because there were so many others named Strawberry. Named For Many People

Iraan was named for Ira G. Yates and his wife Ann, on whose land the town is built, says Mrs. Mae Sammons of Midland. (Incidentally there is a town named for Mrs. Sammons' husband-Sammons, Texas, near Mission.)

Pecos (pronounced Pay'-Coes, as every good Texan knows) was named for a Spanish explorer. Post, Texas, was named for C.

W. Post, noted cereal manufacturer. San Perlita was named for the wife of one of the founders of Willacy County. Her name was Pearl. Another valley town named after a woman is Elsa. Another is Donna, writes Mrs. R. C. Rodriguez Water Into House of McAllen.

Many Texans Rank High In U. S. Navy

By TEX EASLEY WASHINGTON-(A)-The U. S. Navy is a lot more than a fleet of ships out on the high seas.

Thousands of persons, some civilian, are busy at desks in buildings scattered about Washington, working on matters from highly secret tactical maneuvers to the problem of getting grits to the galley of an LST in the Pacific.

Among Navy Department personnel are scores of Texans, many of whom were decorated for heroism during the war.

Starting at the top, there is Texas' own Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, serving as Chief of Naval Cperations.

Two other Texans currently on duty in the Navy Department here also hold flag rank. One is Rear Admiral Albert G. Noble. Preston, who recently became the first Texan in many years to serve as Chief of Naval Crdnance. The other is Rear Admiral Ralph S. Riggs, born in Paris, now in Amarillo. He is a member of the Navy Genera

Another pair of Texans who are admirals have been about headquarters lately in connection with their retirement. They are Vice Admiral W. R. Munroe, Waco, who has been commandant of the Tenth Naval District with headquarters at San Juan, Puerto Rico, and Rear Admiral Spencer S. Lewis, Calvert, Ranking Texans Now Total 10 Incidentally, the wartime peak of

admiral on active duty has now dropped to 10. Rear Admiral E. M. Pace, also a native of Calvert, is with the Bureau of Aeronautics, stationed in

There are several naval captains with brilliant war records currently

Capt. Frank E. Shoup, Jr., of Dallas, a Naval Academy graduate of the class of 1923, is in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations. He was at Pearl Harbor during the Japanese attack, and commanded several ships during the war.

From Mineola comes Capt. Harvey P. Burden, presently with the Aeronautical Board. He is one of the so-called "most junior admirals," since his Naval Acadenmy class of 1930 is the most recent from which individuals have been elevated to the rank of admiral

Two brothers from Normangee hold the rank of captain, and each tries to outstrip the other in proving the excellence of his own branch of the Naval service. One is Capt. Doyle G. Donaho, who is with the armament Division of the Bureau of Aeronautics.

His brother Capt. Glynn R. Donaho, holds three Navy Crosses and two Silver Stars for gallantry as a submarine commander. On one of his forays his boat sank four Japanese merchantmen with only six torpedoes.

Lieut. Commander Herschel Schooley, former public relations officer and journalism instructor at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, is with the Navy's press

Lieut. Owen Hunsaker, Dallas, who holds degrees from North Texas State Teachers College at Denton and Southern Methodist University, entered the Navy as an enlisted man and now is assigned to the public information branch. Another Texan, Lt. J. M. Stacy, El Paso, handled the publicity in connection with the recent speedrecord flights of the Navy-Marine

A civilian employe in charge of athletic training program arrangements for the Navy is Mack Saxon, former coach at Texas College of Mines in El Paso. He served as a lieutenant commander during the




