So, enough of my bragging. We Frionans will, I agree with what I have been saying.

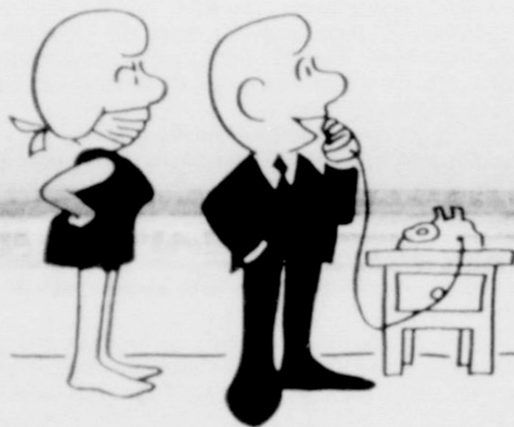
Now I would like to proclaim some of our greatness elsewhere. I think we will have done so at Regional this weekend and I hope we will be able to do so at the State Playoffs....

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 1, 1929

Charley Gonce of Bovina took first place; J.W. Ford of Friona second and Bud Queen of Rhea third in the old fiddlers' contest held at the school auditorium Wednesday night. The large room was filled with spectators. The winner will enter the Tri-State contest at Amarillo March 7.

W.H. Warren, Friona's leading mule buyer, shipped 50 head of good mules to parties in Fort Worth on Monday.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 2, 1934

Coach Bill Stevens, who was serving his fourth term as coach at Friona High School, resigned his position this week for a similar position at Levelland.

The basketball game scheduled here last Friday between the Friona Squaws and Farwell girls, was called off due to disagreeable weather. The two teams, winners in the county tournament, were playing a best two of three game series. The Squaws had won the first game, played at Farwell.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 3, 1939

Business concerns will give prizes away during the annual livestock show this weekend, valued at around \$100. Persons visiting the show will need to register at some place of business, prior to 2 p.m. on Saturday. At that time, a drawing will be held to see who the winner of merchandise will be.

30 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 25, 1944

Joyce Ann Miller, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller, was a guest singer on the Army Air Base broadcast over Station KGNC last Thursday. Joyce was a hit at the recent bond rally, at which she also sang "Marezy Doats" and the Army Air Corps song.

Uncle John White's "Sons in Service" letter column included letters from Gilbert Schueler, Robert Collier, George F. (Frank) Baker, Harley Bulls and Duke M. Baker.

20 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 25, 1954

Well-drilling and irrigation has become big business in the area. Since April of last year, some 323 permits have been issued for drilling of wells.

Lt. Bill Sheehan, who has been serving as legal counsel for the Wm. Beaumont Army Hospital in El Paso, has announced his candidacy for the position of County Attorney. He will be released from active duty in late May.

15 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 26, 1959

Dr. Paul Spring and Mrs. Eva Miller were named "Man and Woman of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet Tuesday night. Bill Nichols was installed as president of the chamber for 1959.

The USDA's announcement Wednesday that the 1959 price support on feed grains will be drastically reduced has been met with repercussions in the Farmer County area. Grain sorghum was supported at \$1.83 per hundredweight in 1958, and the support price for 1959 has been announced at \$1.52. This drop could cost farmers in this county alone from \$2.5 to \$3 million.

10 YEARS AGO—FEBRUARY 27, 1964

Baker Duggins and Mrs. V.J. Zeman were honored as "Man and Woman of the Year" by the Friona Chamber of Commerce at its annual banquet on Monday.

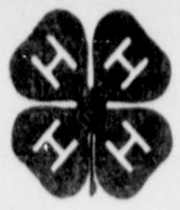

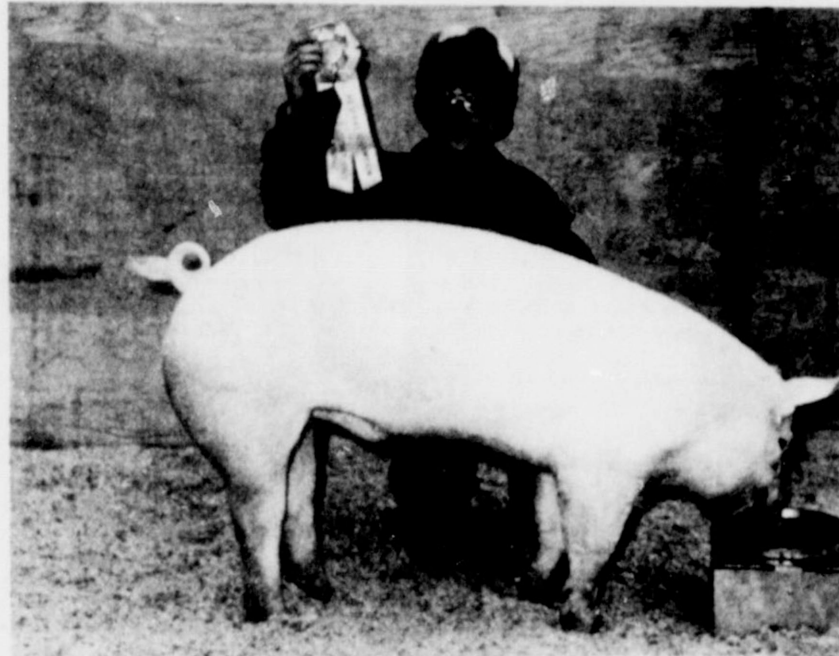


Of Winning Grand Champion Honors In The Barrow Division

David Williams Makes Dean's Honor Roll

TO WELLS

New Service Lines To Be Installed

A number of pending requests for natural gas service to additional irrigation wells in a portion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's West Texas System known as the "triangle" area will be approved in the near future, according to an announcement made by K. Bert (Tex) Watson, president of the company.

The new farm program has resulted in a very large increase in acreage being planted in the area and in a large number of requests for service to additional irrigation wells. Pioneer has been holding these requests for approval because the natural gas transmission lines serving the area are operating at maximum capacity.

The problem, according to Watson, was a "bottleneck" in the transmission line serving the area between Amherst and Sudan. The present 8-inch pipeline will be paralleled by a 10-inch pipeline and, when completed, will increase peak delivery capacity to the "triangle" area. It was pointed out that there will still be some localized areas where the capacity of the lateral pipeline or the customer-owned group line is insufficient for additional gas service to irrigation wells.

This increased capacity will permit approval of the pending requests for more than 100 wells, tailwater pumps, lake

pumps and sprinkler booster pumps in the area which includes the western half of Lamb County and the portions of Bailey, Parmer and Deaf Smith counties served by Pioneer.

Applicants with requests pending will be notified within the next few days that they may begin preparing for connection; however, actual service to the new wells will not begin until the new construction is complete and in operation. Construction is presently planned to commence on the Amherst-Sudan pipeline in early March and is anticipated to be completed in early April.

Watson added that the expansion of the Amherst-Sudan line is one of a number of improvements to Pioneer's transmission and distribution system made during the past 18 months to meet the growing demands for gas service in the company's service area. Additional gathering pipelines to new gas supplies and the addition of 68 miles of 16-inch pipeline between Odessa and Tahoka are under construction or planned for the spring of 1974.

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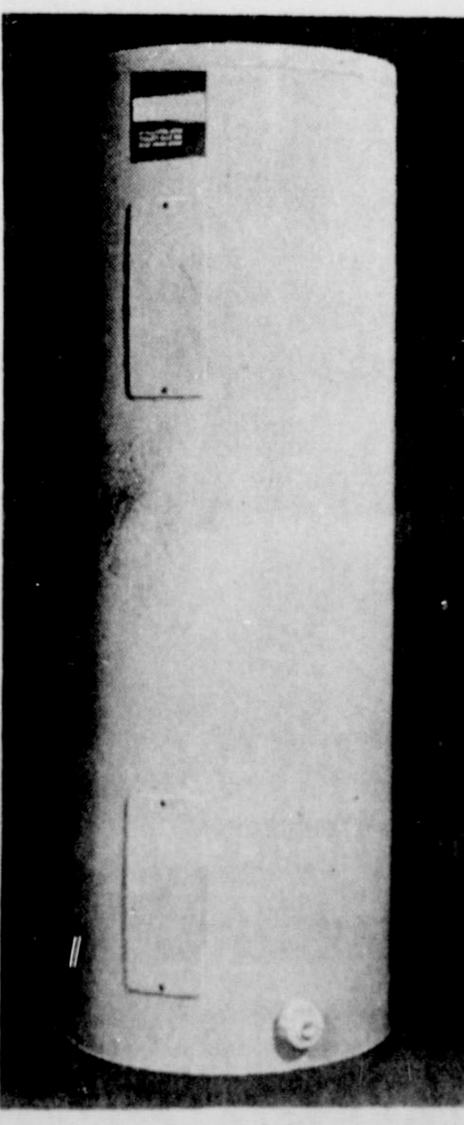
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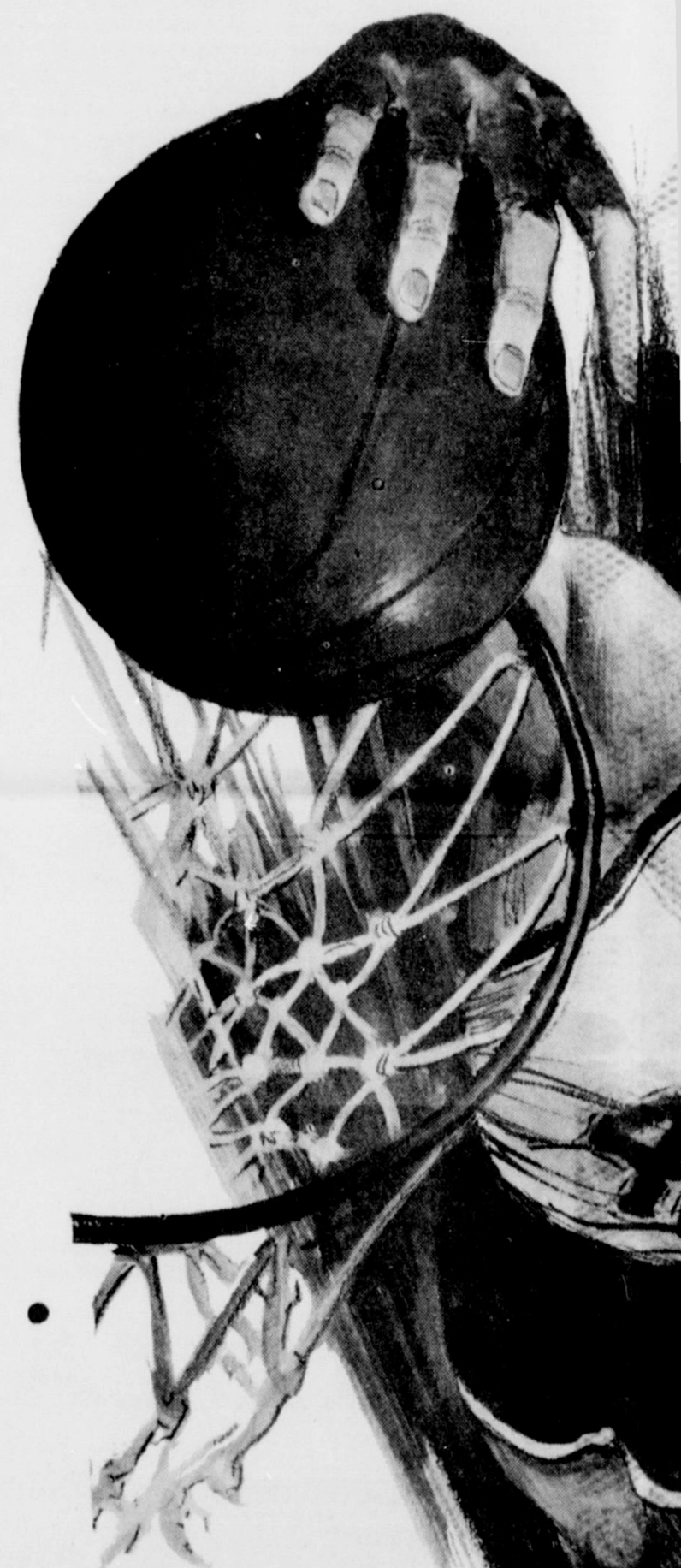

Several individuals, schools and organizations in the state of Texas were recipients of the 1973 Awards of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge.

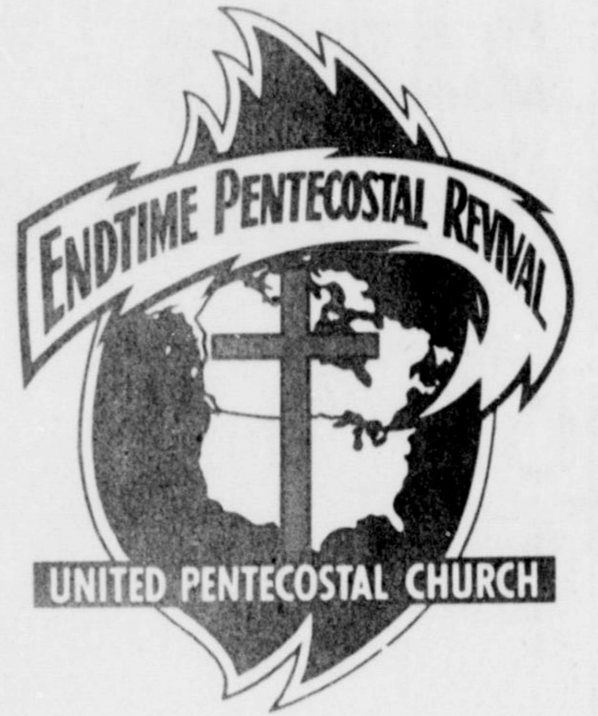
Friona's Grade School received the "Honor Certificate Award" in the School Category.

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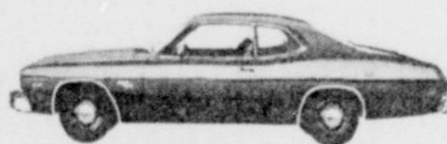
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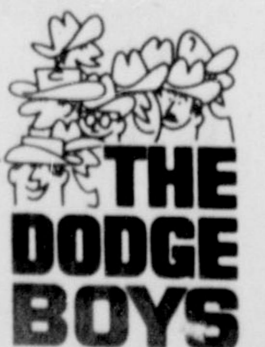

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BIG CHIEFTAIN WIN

FHS Tops Bobcats In Regional, 65-48

Friona's Chieftains advanced to the finals of Region I's class AA tournament with a 65-48 win over playoff veteran Childress Friday afternoon at Lubbock Coliseum.

Paced by the shooting of junior guard Gene Strickland, the Chiefs opened up a 22-point lead midway through the third quarter, and coasted to their 26th season win, and second playoff victory of the season.

The win was the second of the year for Friona over Childress. The Chieftains rolled past the Bobcats, 80-63 in the Amarillo tournament in December. Ironically, Friday's win was by the same margin as Friona's earlier win.

Childress led only momentarily, while the Chieftains were getting untracked.

Bobcat Floyd Nickerson dropped in a free throw four seconds into the game off Strickland's foul, and Mark Keys hit a jump shot from the key a minute later for a 3-0 Childress lead.

But Strickland hit a jumper from the side to open Friona's scoring with 5:48 left in the quarter, and 30 seconds later he drove the baseline for a layup shot, and Friona was ahead, 4-3—a lead they were not to relinquish.

Dale Cleveland made a pair of free throws at 4:54 for a 6-3 lead, and Childress cut the margin to one, 6-5 when Nickerson made a turning jump shot.

However, in the last three minutes of the quarter, Strickland scored on a layup and a jump shot, Kent Patterson made good on a tip-in and a layup and Bobby Lewellen scored his first basket on a jumper, as Friona took a 16-10 lead at the buzzer.

Dale Parsons hit his first field goal 1:30 into the second quarter, and Lewellen and Cleveland each sacked up a pair of free throws as Friona

grabbed an 11-point lead, 23-12.

Patterson hit a layup, Parsons a jump shot from the corner and Strickland a similar shot as Friona upped its lead to 33-18. But Childress' Nickerson scored just ahead of the buzzer to trim the halftime lead to 33-20.

The Bobcats got a pair of free throws by Mark Keys to open the second half, to trim the lead to 33-22, but then hit a cold streak that lasted exactly five minutes of clock time, and this scoring drought cost the Bobcats the game.

Cleveland tipped in Parsons' miss; Strickland followed up his own missed shot, and Parsons canned two free throws as the Friona fans wildly cheered the 42-22 lead after three minutes.

Reserve Bill Fallwell's reverse layin brought a 22-point lead as Friona and Childress doubled at 44-22. Then with 3:18 left in the quarter, Strickland's layin gave the Chieftains their longest lead at 46-22.

Nickerson (#33) finally made a three-point play for the Bobcats at 2:48, but that only cut the margin to 46-25, and the handwriting was on the wall for Childress.

Third quarter score was 49-29, as the Chieftains had an even 20-point edge.

Reserve Dave Clark, playing with stitches in his forehead, came in to score a pair of quick baskets as the Chieftains regained their 22-point edge at 53-31.

The rest of the final quarter was a nightmare of fouls and turnovers, as officials blew the whistle 12 times.

Before the game ended, Friona was to lose four players by fouls—Patterson, Strickland, Cleveland and Clay Bandy. Patterson had four fouls by halftime.

Childress lost two players on fouls, and had two others with four fouls when the game

ended. It wasn't a masterpiece for the Chieftains, who hit only 34.3 per cent of their field goal shots, compared to 46 per cent in their bi-district win over Lockney.

The team did manage to improve at the free throw line, making 15 of 27, still below average for a playoff team at 55.5 per cent.

But the team won the game on the backboards. Led by big forward Dale Cleveland, who sucked in 15 missed shots in spite of spending considerable time on the bench due to fouls,

Friona remarkably controlled the backboards, 57-28, more than doubling the Bobcats in that department.

Childress had been in the basketball playoffs for the 20th time since the present multi-classifications went into effect, and fourth time in five years.

It's only the second trip past the district level for the Chieftains in that same length of time, and fourth overall.

Friday's semi-final game brought a long-awaited regional win. Friona fans enjoyed every minute of it.

Record Is Given For Playoffs

It may have been a "long dry spell" for boys basketball at Friona High School, but there are residents of the area who surely can recall some former days of glory on the hardwoods for the Friona Chieftains.

Back in the early 1930s, Milton [Buff] Morris, who now is connected with the Opportunity Plan at West Texas State University, coached the Chiefs to several "county" championships under the old playoff setup, and at least one district title, in 1936.

The 1937 team's record isn't known, but in 1938, with Jack Davis at the coaching spot, the Chiefs went 23-6 for the season. Three of the season losses were to Lazbuddie, which cost Friona the county championship.

Starring for the team's of 1936 through 1938 was Price Brookfield, whose brother Floyd still resides in Friona.

Brookfield went on to be a star player for the West Texas State College Buffaloes, and played on a team that barnstormed across the country and was billed as the "World's Tallest Team."

As far as former playoff results, we can find only three other times besides this year that Friona Chieftain teams advanced past the district level.

In 1936, the team participated in a regional tournament at Canyon. In the first round, the team lost to Pampa, 41-20. They rebounded in the double-elimination event to beat Abernathy, 38-26, but fell again to Pampa, 33-32 to drop out.

In 1945, the district champion team went to a regional tournament at Lubbock, but lost to Spade in their first and only game.

Twenty years later, under the present set-up, the Chieftains of James Anglin, who finished 22-5, won district but fell in their bi-district game to Denver City, 81-66.

STATISTICS GIVEN

Darla Rhodes Is Top Squaw Scorer

Senior Darla Rhodes led the Friona Squaws in scoring, according to the final statistics released this week by Coach F.G. Crofford.

Miss Rhodes scored 674 points for a fine 23.2 points-per-game scoring average for the season. Her point total is the most since Cindy Ingram led the team with 742 points in 1966-67. However, Cindy's team played three more games than did the 1973-74 Squaws.

Runnerup in the scoring department was Terri Patterson, with 416 points and a 13.6 average. Two other players had impressive totals. Kay Cochran scored 312 points for 10.8, and Terri Fallwell scored 164 points for 10.7.

Leading field goal shooter was Kay Cochran, who made 128 out of 218 attempts, or 58.7 per cent. Second was Miss Patterson, with 52.5 per cent on 145 of 276 attempts. Miss Rhodes was close behind with 49.5 per cent (273 of 551).

In the free throw department, Miss Cochran again was the pace-setter, with 56 out of 73 attempts, a good 76.7 per cent. Next came Misses Patterson (126/186, 67.7) and Rhodes (47/109, 43.1).

On defense, Tena Day was the leading rebounder, with 103 rebounds. Teresa Ingram had the most steals, 25. Miss Day also had the most fouls, 165. Miss Patterson led the forward rebounding with 53, and also had the most fouls on that end of the court, 90.

As a team, the Squaws' average of 58.3 points per game

was second only to last year's team, which was the highest-scoring Squaw team in history.

The team equaled the one-game scoring mark with 89 points against Littlefield in their final game, tying the mark set against Kress last season.

With a 20-9 season record, the Squaws accomplished the 20-win mark for the fourth straight year and fifth year out of six.

It was the second year in a row for Miss Rhodes to win the scoring title. In three years of varsity play, she scored 1376 points, and gained a place on the Squaws' all-time scoring list. She had scored 494 points to lead the team in scoring as a junior, and began with 208 points as a sophomore.

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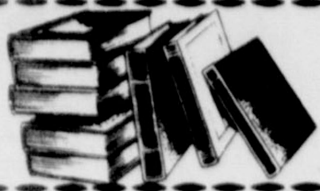
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LIBRARY CORNER

Jeffrey has two brothers, Glen, 13, Mike 11, and two sisters, Carrie, 9 and Jo, 7 years old.

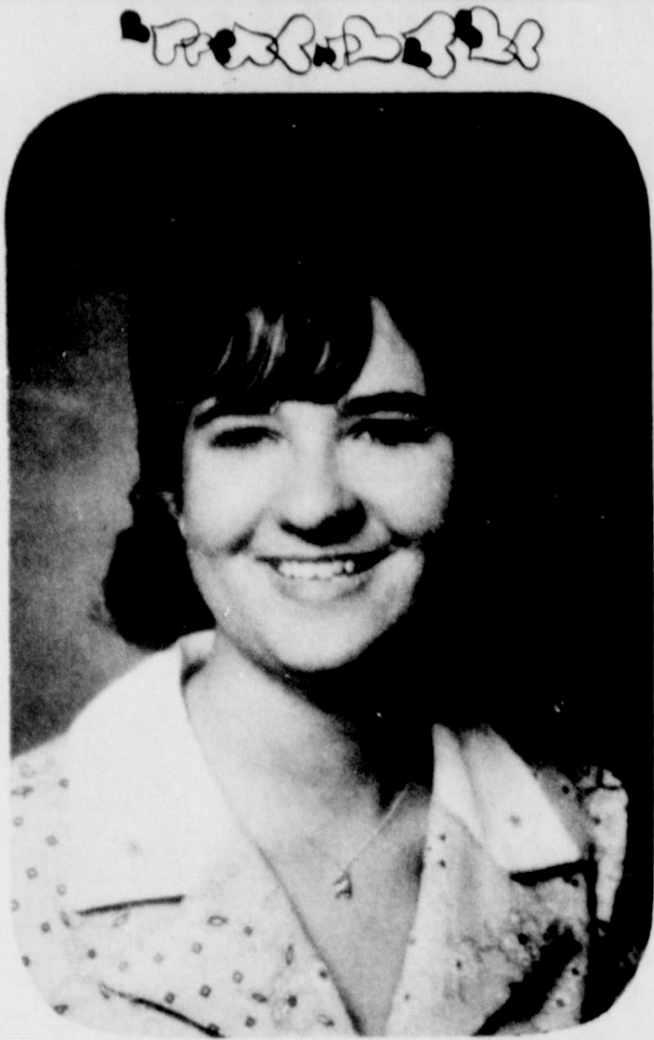

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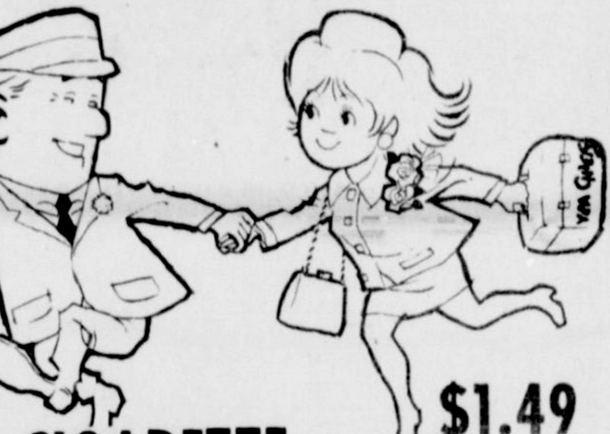

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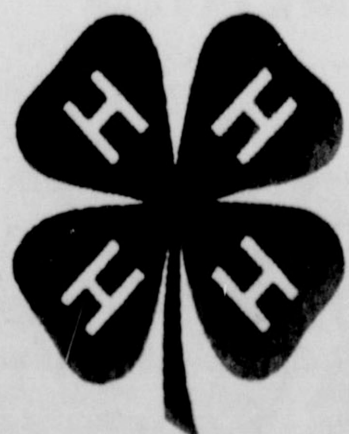

A local talent, Carl Evans, is starring in the presentation of the musical "Oklahoma," which is being presented in Lubbock.

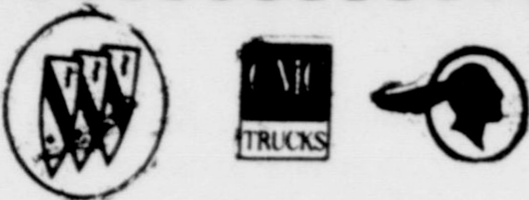
Evans is a dancer in the musical, with his main part being the "Dream Scene."
