

### NEW RECORD SET

# \$60,387 For Kids, \$11,820 For Barn

The auction sale at the 26th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show grossed a record \$60,387.33, it was revealed this week by the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show Association, sponsors of

The total eclipsed the former record of \$52,846.53 established last year by \$7,541. The increase amounted to a gain of 14 per cent over the 1973 sale.

In addition to the above sale figures, a total of \$11,820.86 was contributed by buyers toward the county showbarn fund. This means that stock show supporters spent a total of \$72,208.19 last Saturday

afternoon at the sale. The show and sale were conducted for the first time in the new county showbarn/community center in Friona, so perhaps the more comfortable conditions were more conducive to bidding than the old facilities were.

Animals brought far and away the best prices than they ever had before at the sale. Animals "down the list" sold for as much or more than champion animals had in the past,

### ANIMALS DONATED

Several animals were donated by the exhibitors to be sold and the proceeds were turned over to the showbarn fund. One steer, donated by the Kaltwassers of Oklahoma Lane was auctioned off three times for a total of \$3,200, bringing at

least \$1,000 each time. In addition, a lamb donated by one of the county FFA chapters was sold eight times for approximately \$2,500. Each of the four FFA chapters in the county donated animals which were sold to raise money for the showbarn fund.

The Grand Champion steer, owned by Jacquelyn Langford of Farwell, sold for a premium price of \$1.05 per pound, to Cattle Town Feed Yard of Summerfield.

The reserve champion, a 1004-pound Angus owned by Garvin Thorn of Friona, sold for 90 cents per pound to Hub

Other steers sold for 35 cents to \$1.10 per pound.

The grand champion barrow, a Duroc owned by Charleson Steinbock of Lazbuddie, sold for \$1.70 per pound to the Joe Tarter Duroc Farm.

The reserve champion barrow, a crossbreed owned by Stan Treider of Lazbuddie, was bought by Hi-Pro Feeds for

\$1.10 per pound. Other barrows brought from 80 cents to \$4.20 per pound.

Top price paid for a lamb was \$5.50 per pound for the champion fine wool lamb owned by Duane Mitchell of Bovina. The lamb was bought by Bovina The lambs also all sold for

good prices, going from \$1.20 per pound for the lowest to \$4.00 for the highest, outside of the other lamb mentioned.

"We certainly appreciate the interest of these buyers, and for those who donated the animals back to the showbarn. It was a great show and sale, and we appreciate everyone who contributed toward the success of the annual affair," said a representative of the Parmer County Jr. Livestock

Strickland bombed the net from the free throw line, and Cleveland forced his way inside for a layup against his 6-5 opponent, and Friona had a 22-13 lead with 3:39 left before

The Tigers, who were about to face extinction, rallied to trim the halftime margin to four points, 25-21.

The Chieftains caught the Tigers taking a cat nap at the start of the third period, and quickly bolted to a 12-point lead.

Cleveland scored a layup, and a pair of free throws to make the margin 29-21. Two baskets by Strickland, one of which was on a goal-tending call, ran the margin to 33-21 as the Chieftains

held Frenship scoreless in the first 3:27 of the second half. DePanion and Dave Booher (number 10), rallied the Tigers back to within three points at 37-34 with 23 seconds left in the quarter, but Cleveland's jump shot at the 10-second mark kept

Friona ahead by five, 39-34. The Tigers showed signs of faltering as the final quarter began, but the Chieftains had re-fueled during their pit stop. Cleveland, Strickland and Parsons all scored baskets, as Friona regained an 11-point lead at 45-34.

Then, in rapid-fire succession, Cleveland sank a free shot, Stricklend his long jump shot and Lewellen hit the bottom of the basket and suddenly Frienz had a 15-point lead, 50-35 with 5:16 left to play.

The rest was just for the record, as Frenship discovered it was open season on Tigers. Friona maintained its 15-point bulge up to the final buzzer, which sounded with the team in front,

### TWO CHIEFS ALL-REGIONAL

Two members of the Chieftain team were named to the all-regional tournament team. They were Strickland, who scored 20 points in each game, and Cleveland, who scored 33 points for the two games, and added 29 rebounds.

The team's defensive play came in for its share of the credit for the regional championship. In two games, the team outrebounded their opponents, 91-60, and that played a big part in the drive for the title.

By pushing their season record to 27 wins, six losses, the Chieftains have added to their mark of most wins in a season.

So, enough of my bragging. We Frionans will sure agree with what I have been saying.





# **New Service Lines** To Be Installed

requests for natural gas service to additional irrigation wells in a portion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's West Texas of Bailey, Parmer and Deaf System known as the "triangle" area will be approved in the near future, according to an announcement made by K. Bert (Tex) Watson, president of the

The new farm program has resulted in a very large increase in acreage being planted in the area and in a large number of requests for service to additional irrigation wells. Pioneer has been holding these requests for approval because the natural gas transmission lines serving the area are operating at maximum capacity.

The problem, according to Watson, was a "bottleneck" in the transmission line serving the area between Amherst and Sudan. The present 8-inch pipeline will be paralleled by a 10-inch pipeline and, when completed, will increase peak delivery capacity to the "triangle" area. It was pointed out that there will still be some localized areas where the capacity of the lateral pipeline or the customer-owned group line is insufficient for additional gas service to irrigation wells.

This increased capacity will permit approval of the pending requests for more than 100 wells, tailwater pumps, lake

pumps in the area which includes the western half of Lamb County and the portions Smith counties served by

Applicants with requests pending will be notified within the next few days that they may begin preparing for connection; however, actual service to the new wells will not begin until the new construction is complete and in operation. Construction is presently planned to commence on the Amherst-Sudan pipeline in early March and is anticipated to be completed in

Watson added that the expansion of the Amherst-Sudan line is one of a number of improvements to Pioneer's transmission and distribution system made during the past 18 months to meet the growing demands for gas service in the company's service area. Additional gathering pipelines to new gas supplies and the addition of 68 miles of 16-inch pipeline between Odessa and Tahoka are under construction or planned for the spring of

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



# **FHS Tops Bobcats** In Regional, 65-48

to the finals of Region I's class AA tournament with a 65-48 win over playoff veteran Childress Friday afternoon at Lubbock Coliseum.

Paced by the shooting of junior guard Gene Strickland, the Chiefs opened up a 22-point lead midway through the third quarter, and coasted to their 26th season win, and second playoff victory of the season.

The win was the second of the year for Friona over Childress. The Chieftains rolled past the Bobcats, 80-63 in the Amarillo tournament in December. Ironically, Friday's win was by the same margin as Friona's earlier win.

Childress led only momentarily, while the Chieftains were getting untracked.

Bobcat Floyd Nickerson dropped in a free throw four seconds into the game off Strickland's foul, and Mark Keys hit a jump shot from the key a minute later for a 3-0

But Strickland hit a jumper from the side to open Friona's scoring with 5:48 left in the quarter, and 30 seconds later he drove the baseline for a layup shot, and Friona was ahead, 4-3-a lead they were not to relinguish.

Dale Cleveland made a pair of free throws at 4:54 for a 6-3 lead, and Childress cut the margin to one, 6-5 when Nickerson made a turning jump

However, in the last three minutes of the quarter, Strickland scored on a layup and a jump shot, Kent Patterson made good on a tip-in and a layup and Bobby Lewellen scored his first basket on a jumper, as Friona took a 16-10 lead at the buzzer.

Dale Parsons hit his first field goal 1:30 into the second quarter, and Lewellen and

Patterson hit a layup, Parsons a jump shot from the corner and Strickland a similar shot as Friona upped its lead to 33-18. But Childress' Nickerson scored just ahead of the buzzer to trim the halftime lead to

The Bobcats got a pair of free throws by Mark Keys to open the second half, to trim the lead to 33-22, but then hit a cold streak that lasted exactly five minutes of clock time, and this scoring drought cost the Bobcats the game.

Cleveland tipped in Parsons' miss; Strickland followed up his own missed shot, and Parsons canned two free throws as the Friona fans wildly cheered the 42-22 lead after three minutes.

Reserve Bill Fallwell's reverse layin brought a 22-point lead as Friona and Childress doubled at 44-22. Then with 3:18 left in the quarter, Strickland's layin gave the Chieftains their longest lead at

Nickerson (#33) finally made three-point play for the Bobcats at 2:48, but that only cut the margin to 46-25, and the handwriting was on the wall for Childress.

Third quarter score was 49-29, as the Chieftains had an even 20-point edge.

Reserve Dave Clark, playing with stitches in his forehead, came in to score a pair of quick baskets as the Chieftains regained their 22-point edge at

The rest of the final quarter was a nightmare of fouls and turnovers, as officials blew the whistle 12 times

Before the game ended, Friona was to lose four players by fouls-Patterson, Strickland, Cleveland and Clay Bandy. Patterson had four fouls by halftime.

Childress lost two players on Cleveland each sacked up a pair fouls, and had two others with of free throws as Friona four fouls when the game

It wasn't a masterpiece for the Chieftains, who hit only 34.3 per cent of their field goal shots, compared to 46 per cent in their bi-district win over

The team did manage to improve at the free throw line, making 15 of 27, still below average for a playoff team at

But the team won the game on the backboards. Led by big forward Dale Cleveland, who sucked in 15 missed shots in spite of spending considerable time on the bench due to fouls,

Friona remarkably controlled the backboards, 57-28, more than doubling the Bobcats in that department.

Childress had been in the basketball playoffs for the 20th time since the present multi-classifications went into effect, and fourth time in five

It's only the second trip past the district level for the Chieftains in that same length of time, and fourth overall.

Friday's semi-final game brought a long-awaited regional win. Friona fans enjoyed every

## Record Is Given For Playoffs

It may have been a "long dry spell" for boys basketball at Friona High School, but there are residents of the area who surely can recall some former days of glory on the hardwoods for the Friona Chieftains.

Back in the early 1930s, Milton [Buff] Morris, who now is connected with the Opportunity Plan at West Texas State University, coached the Chiefs to several "county" championships under the old playoff setup, and at least one district title, in 1936.

The 1937 team's record isn't known, but in 1938, with Jack Davis at the coaching spot, the Chiefs went 23-6 for the season. Three of the season losses were to Lazbuddie, which cost Friona the county championship.

Starring for the team's of 1936 through 1938 was Price Brookfield, whose brother Floyd still resides in Friona.

Brookfield went on to be a star player for the West Texas State College Buffaloes, and played on a team that barnstormed across the country and was billed as the "World's Tallest Team."

As far as former playoff results, we can find only three other times besides this year that Friona Chieftain teams advanced past the district level.

In 1936, the team participated in a regional tournament at Canyon. In the first round, the team lost to Pampa, 41-20. They rebounded in the double-elimination event to beat Abernathy, 38-26, but fell again to Pampa, 33-32 to drop

In 1945, the district champion team went to a regional tournament at Lubbock, but lost to Spade in their first and only game.

Twenty years later, under the present set-up, the Chieftains of James Anglin, who finished 22-5, won district but fell in their bi-district game to Denver City, 81-66.

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

# Darla Rhodes Is Top Squaw Scorer

Senior Darla Rhodes led the Friona Squaws in scoring, according to the final statistics released this week by Coach F.G. Crofford.

Miss Rhodes scored 674 points for a fine 23.2 points-per-game scoring average for the season. Her point total is the most since Cindy Ingram led the team with 742 points in 1966-67. However, Cindy's team played three more games than did the 1973-74 Squaws.

Runnerup in the scoring department was Terri Patterson, with 416 points and a 13.6 average. Two other players had impressive totals. Kay Cochran scored 312 points for 10.8, and Terri Fallwell scored 164 points

Leading field goal shooter was Kay Cochran, who made 128 out of 218 attempts, or 58.7 per cent. Second was Miss Patterson, with 52.5 per cent on 145 of 276 attempts. Miss Rhodes was close behind with 49.5 per cent (273 of 551)

In the free throw department, Miss Cochran again was the pace-setter, with 56 out of 73 attempts, a good 76.7 per cent. Next came Misses Patterson [126/186, 67.7] and Rhodes [47/109, 43.1]

On defense, Tena Day was the leading rebounder, with 103 rebounds. Teresa Ingram had the most steals, 25. Miss Day also had the most fouls, 165.

Miss Patterson led the forward rebounding with 53, and also had the most fouls on that end of the court, 90.

As a team, the Squaws' average of 58.3 points per game

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
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
