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U. S. May Buy Grain From Farms

Italian Mistakes Are Tabbed As 'Errors'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army High Command Friday acknowledged "errors" in the Italian Theater command, but labeled as a "wholly erroneous picture" a Scripps-Howard columnist's charges of mistreatment of enlisted men and high-living by officers under Lt. Gen. John C. H. Lee.

Making public the results of an investigation touched off by writer Robert C. Ruark's charges, the Army released:

(1) A 12,000-word report from Maj. Gen. Ira T. Wyche, Army inspector general, who said he found only "minor discrepancies and irregularities." (2) A memorandum from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, and (3) a memorandum from Secretary of the Army Kenneth C. Royall approving Wyche's report.

In brief, Wyche's report was that the matters Ruark complained about were, when true, isolated instances. He said Ruark "took a few facts, half facts, rumors and untruths, which he accepted as facts, and molded them into articles that carry implications of gross maladministration of the theater by General Lee and his staff."

No Action Required

Eisenhower, commenting on the "errors" uncovered, singled out "undue pressure" by commanders on subordinates to join fraternal organizations, "unsatisfactory conditions in the disciplinary camp," and "neglectful conduct" occasionally by some officers in requiring chauffeurs to "wait unconscionably long hours to suit the social convenience of the officers."

Both Eisenhower and Royall agreed that no action is called for beyond what has been taken—calling the attention of the command to the findings by Wyche.

Eisenhower said the errors were the exception rather than the rule, and in no case could be traced to wrong intent on the part of the theater commander (Lee).

SOAGC WILL DRILL DEEP PROSPECTOR IN NE PECOS

Stanford Oil & Gas Company is to drill its No. 8-B University of Texas (Deep), as a 7,000-foot wildcat in the shallow Taylor-Link field of Northeast Pecos County. It will be 790 feet from north and 600 feet from east lines of section 13, block 18, University survey, and 25 miles west of Irbah. Drilling, with rotary, is slated to start at once.

There are six producers on the lease on which the deep prospector is located from the regular Taylor-Link pay at around 1,650 feet.

GULF GETS MORE OIL FROM CLEAR FORK AT GOLDSMITH

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 439-E Goldsmith, deep wildcat in the shallow Goldsmith field of Northwest Ector County, and 664 feet from north and 667 feet from west lines of section 15, block 44, TP survey, T-1-S, was at 5,520 feet in Clear Fork line, taking a driftestem test. This project took a test at 5,450-80 feet. An unestimated amount of gas showed in four minutes. Drilling fluid flowed at the top in 33 minutes. Oil started flowing in 42 minutes. In 60 minutes of flowing to tanks the well made 35.76 barrels of pipe-line oil.

The project flowed 57.84 barrels of oil in one hour and showed 1,307,000 cubic feet of gas per day, in a driftestem test at 5,398-5,450 feet.

This exploration was originally started to go to the Ellenburger. It will likely continue to that objective. It is about two miles north of same company's No. 437, Goldsmith, the nearest project which has shown for production from the Clear Fork.

Taft-Hartley Act Halts Port Strike

ALBANY, N. Y.—(AP)—Striking longshoremen at the Port of Albany Friday called off their 10-day strike in compliance with a court order, the first issued under the Taft-Hartley Act.

C. Testa, business agent for Local 1294, International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), announced that members of his union and those of Local 1643 had been directed by Joseph T. Ryan, association president, to return to work.

Testa said the men would return to their jobs Friday afternoon.

The order, issued by Federal Judge Stephen Brennan in New York late Thursday, directed the ILA to suspend its strike at the Port of Albany and the state barge canal.

Charles T. Douds, regional director for the National Labor Relations Board, said the ex parte proceedings, without hearings, were necessitated by the urgency of the situation. He said the strike had tied up shipments of grain and oil since September 23.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 6-A Robinson, Southeast Dawson County possible discovery from the Ellenburger, was making hole below 10,656 feet in line and chert. No driftestem test has been taken since the one at 10,604-627 feet where recovery was 130 feet of gas cut mud. The zone at 10,604-627 feet, developed 1.875 feet of clean 38-gravity oil during a two hour test on that interval. No formation water has been reported since the Ellenburger was entered at approximately 10,596 feet.

★ LATE NEWS FLASHES ★

JERUSALEM—(AP)—A general strike of Palestine Arabs, beginning at dawn in protest against the proposed partition of the Holy Land, paralyzed all Arab sections Friday and sent hundreds of thousands pouring into mosques for prayer.

THE HAGUE—(AP)—The Netherlands Government announced Friday Queen Wilhelmina would temporarily lay down her royal power in the near future for reasons of health and Crown Princess Juliana would act as princess regent.

MANILA—(AP)—A typhoon designated by the U. S. Weather Bureau as "Pauline" was reported 500 miles east of Luzon Friday and moving toward the northern tip of the island with winds of 55 miles per hour.

ROME—(AP)—A general strike throughout Rome Province, called for Friday by the Chamber of Labor in support of peasants' demands for distribution of uncultivated farmlands, appeared to have been averted by last minute talks between labor and government.

Russia Renews Attacks

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Russia renewed her attacks on the United States Friday with a charge by Dmitri Manuilsky, foreign minister of the Soviet Ukraine, that the American government was trying to throw a smoke-screen to cover "intervention" in Greece.

The shaggy-haired Ukrainian, who has delivered some of Russia's main speeches on the Balkan dispute, made his charges before the 57-nation Political Committee of the General Assembly in a 53-minute speech.

He kept on the line laid down Thursday by Albania and Bulgaria—two of Russia's Balkan satellites. They said the United States and Britain were primarily responsible for the Balkan troubles, and not Greece's northern neighbors.

Centers Major Fight

Manuilsky figured in the Balkan dispute a year ago by filing a complaint with the Security Council demanding immediate withdrawal of British troops from Greece. At that time he flew to New York with two suitcases full of documents and took part personally in 10 long council sessions.

This week Manuilsky was the center of another major fight—the continuing deadlock between the Ukraine and India in the contest for the Security Council seat which Poland will vacate December 31. Manuilsky probably would represent the Ukraine on the Council if the Ukraine defeats India when the Assembly attempts to end the impasse sometime next week in plenary sessions at Flushing Meadow Park, New York.

Big Four To Take Whack At Colonies

LONDON—(AP)—Big Four deputies assembled in London Friday to take another whack at settling the future of the Italian Colonies in Africa—which Benito Mussolini was reported to call the "New Roman Empire."

Italy renounced sovereignty over Cyrenaica and Tripolitania in North Africa, and Eritrea and Italian Somaliland in East Africa under the peace treaty which became effective September 15. Neither the Paris Peace Conference nor the Big Four foreign ministers, however, were able to agree on final disposition of those colonies.

Britain, France, Russia and the United States have until Sept. 15, 1948, to settle the issue. If they fail, the problem, by the terms of the peace treaty, falls into the lap of the United Nations. In the meantime, Britain is acting as temporary trustee.

Beside these four colonies, comprising 1,100,000 square miles and 3,000,000 inhabitants, Italy lost the Dodecanese Islands to Greece and Ethiopia got back her own independence.

Competent British government informants expressed belief that the new strategic factors emerging from Britain's decisions to withdraw from a dominant position in the Middle East, coupled with U. S.-Russian rivalry in the Mediterranean, undoubtedly would guide the trend of the discussions.

Oil also was expected to be a major factor.

"The Middle East is known to be the source of 75 per cent of the world's oil reserves outside the U. S. and Soviet spheres," said one informant close to the British War Office, "and has, accordingly, become the testing ground for Soviet-American diplomatic policies."

Auto Blast Kills Political Figure

ETOWAH, TENN.—(AP)—T. B. Ivins, McMinn County political figure was killed and his six-year-old grandson, Danny Ivins, was injured Friday when their automobile was blown up.

They were taken to a hospital at Athens, and Ivins died there.

Ivins was tried several months ago on charges of slaying Charles Dunn, member of a well-known Etowah family. The case ended in a mistrial.

Athens, County Seat of McMinn County, was the scene of a battle of bullets and ballots in a local primary election in August, 1946, in which a slate of non-partisan GI's overthrew a long-entrenched Democratic political machine.

Ivins was a former McMinn County Sheriff, and was in office during the now-outcast political regime.

Deputy Sheriff Otto Kennedy said the explosion could have been caused by dynamite or a bomb. "We don't know what it was, but it blew part of the car up on top of the roof."

In Athens, Police Chief Robert Harrill said the case was out of his jurisdiction but "I got the report that Ivins just turned on the switch, stepped on the starter and the car blew up—apparently it was dynamite."

Russians Barred From Proving Ground Show

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army said Friday that Russian military attaches were not invited to an ordnance demonstration at the Aberdeen, Md., proving grounds Thursday because American attaches have been barred from similar showings in Russia.

The Aberdeen demonstration is staged annually by the Army Ordnance Association to show new weapons in operation.

Military attaches of other foreign powers attended the demonstration along with more than 2,500 United States industrialists, Army, Navy and Air Force officers, and newsmen.

But Soviet military attaches and newsmen, who were invited a year ago, were missing.

Bond Election Here Saturday

Whether the City of Midland will issue \$1,385,000 worth of bonds for civic improvements will be determined Saturday by qualified voters in a special election in the City-County Auditorium. The election was called by the City Council at a meeting September 9.

Six separate items are included in the election and voters will ballot on each proposal.

The lone voting place in the auditorium will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Citizens, in order to vote, must be qualified voters who have rendered property for taxation, and who reside within the city limits. Poll tax receipts or exemption certificates are required.

Boyd Laughlin is the presiding judge of the election, and Gerald Fitzgerald and Irby Dyer are assistants.

Ten ballots were cast in absentee voting which ended Tuesday. The six items, and amounts, included in the election are: (1) water system improvements—\$750,000; (2) sewer system extensions and additions to disposal plant—\$200,000; (3) drainage program in East Midland—\$30,000; (4) enlargement of city hall and fire station and police station and jail—\$80,000; (5) development of park and playground facilities, including new playgrounds, improvements to Pagoda Swimming Pool, and installation of municipal golf course—\$125,000; (6) streets, street markers and paving—\$200,000.

New Fires Reported In East Texas Area

CONROE—(AP)—Twenty to 30 new forest fires were reported in a new section of the East Texas wooded area as the remainder of scores of fires in this area were believed to be burning out.

A forest service official said the new fires were in Polk County. He added that eight or 10 fires of incendiary origin were set Thursday in Montgomery and Northern Harris County, but they were brought under control in a short time.

Plan Proposed To Halt Price Rises

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Friday disclosed that the Agriculture Department is considering purchases of grain direct from farmers.

This by-passing of the grain exchanges would be aimed to curb the inflationary upswing of wheat and corn prices and minimize speculation resulting from the European Aid Program.

Anderson told this possible step after a Cabinet meeting at the White House which was reported to have been concerned largely with possible effects of the European Aid Program on prices.

He told reporters the government would "prefer to continue buying through the normal channels of grain trade."

"If we can continue to do so (without prices getting out of hand), we will not have to adopt the farm acquisition plan," he said.

The Agriculture Department will have to buy the 570,000,000 bushels of grain which President Truman has set as a goal for shipments to Europe and other shortage areas this crop year. This figure is 100,000,000 bushels more than now appears in sight.

It is with the aim of making this extra 100,000,000 bushels available that Truman has launched his food saving program.

Like 1946 Programs

Anderson said that direct buying from farmers—if ordered—might follow last year's Commodity Credit Corporation buying program, adopted when growers apparently were withholding wheat from market in anticipation of higher prices or in an effort to hold down income tax payments.

Anderson did not mention another feature of the 1946 program under which a 30-cents a bushel premium was paid on wheat bought from farmers.

The Cabinet meeting was monopolized by the new economic survey presented by Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, chairman of President Truman's Council of Economic Advisers.

May Cut Beer, Whisky

Nourse told reporters it predicts this country can meet Europe's food and dollar needs without runaway inflation.

The nation's brewers and distillers will get a "talking-to" Saturday about using less grain, for beer and whisky, it was learned, and the restaurant and packhouse industries have already been holding behind-scenes conferences with members of Truman's Citizens' Food Committee.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson and Charles Luckman, the \$300,000-a-year soap manufacturer who heads the food conservation drive, arranged to meet with the distillers' and brewers' representatives.

U. N. Faces Holy Land Police Job

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Diplomatic authorities said Friday that the United Nations appeared to have but slight chance of working out a settlement for the Jewish-Arab conflict over Palestine which would be acceptable to both sides and avert all danger of a shooting showdown in the Holy Land.

The outcome most generally expected here is that some solution will be proposed which will be agreeable to one side and the other and that the United Nations will have to take responsibility for enforcing it with some sort of international policing arrangement. That presumably would mean contributions of armed forces by member nations for that specific purpose.

The Jewish Agency for Palestine told a United Nations special committee Thursday that it was prepared to accept "in sadness and most reluctantly" partition of the Holy Land if that was the only way to obtain establishment of a Jewish national home.

Partitions

Partition, meaning creation of separate Jewish and Arab states, previously had been recommended by a majority of a UN investigation commission. But earlier this week, before the Jewish Agency's position was made known officially, Arab spokesmen had informed the UN that such a settlement was unacceptable and that the Arabs would fight against it. They demanded instead the establishment of Palestine as an independent Arab state.

The Palestine Committee was due to continue its debate on the problem Friday. The General Assembly's Political Committee likewise was scheduled to press its arguments on the Greek crisis, and the Security Council was slated for consideration of the continuing troubles in Indonesia.

Former Texan Given Life Imprisonment

LAS VEGAS, NEV.—(AP)—Clifford D. Helm, formerly a Dallas (Texas) gambling figure, was convicted Thursday on a first degree murder charge and sentenced to life imprisonment in state prison.

Helm, former guard in a Las Vegas Casino, was accused of shooting to death Frank Ferroni, also a gambling club employe last April 25.

A. B. Cole, Sr., Gets First Tax Receipt

A. B. Cole, Sr., was the first Midland County taxpayer to remit his 1947 taxes and receive a receipt from the collector's office reported.

Although several Midlanders had mailed checks to the office before 1947 collections began Wednesday morning, Cole was first to pay over the counter and get a receipt.

The office announced Friday that tax statements are being mailed as rapidly as the staff can get them out, and that all statements will be in the mails within a few days.

Cholera Epidemic Takes 49 Additional Lives

CAIRO—(AP)—Fatalities resulting from the Egyptian cholera epidemic, now in its second week, soared to 215 Friday as the Health Ministry reported 49 additional deaths.

The ministry said 76 new cases were discovered Thursday, bringing to 977 the total reported to date.

tral Andrews County, four miles east of the Fullerton field, and about 12 miles north and west of the town of Andrews, was drilling ahead below 9,840 feet. It will be continued a short distance and a drillstem test will be taken.
In a drillstem test at 9,800-40 feet, open for one hour, there was a small blow of air for the first three minutes, and it then died.
Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil or gas.
A three hot - drillstem test at 9,750-9,800 feet, flowed out the 2,500 foot water blanket in one hour and 16 minutes. Oil flow at the top in one hour and 32 minutes. It tested to tanks for one hour and flowed 55 barrels of oil.
This wildcat discovery entered the Devonian at 9,425 feet. The first 125 feet of the zone had scattered streaks of saturation. The next 250 feet—down to 9,800 feet—was almost all solid saturation, informed observers report.
This well is 660 feet from north and 1,380 feet from east lines of section 25, block 13, University survey.

Just Barely Enough
Manager Bucky Harris guessed wrong Thursday in Bobo Newsom, whose demise came suddenly during a six-run Dodger spurt in the second inning. They scored four on Bobo and two more on reliever Vic Raschi before he could get them out. A single run in the third off towering Karl Drews and another pair in the fourth at the expense of Spud Chandler, who was wild after a long period of inactivity, gave Joe Hatten nine runs to work on—just barely enough.

Even before the Brooks pushed their total to nine in the fourth, the Yanks had rocked the speedy lefty for four runs, two each in the third and fourth. After Joe DiMaggio rode a towering two-run homer into the upper stand seats in left center field, Hatten soon was on his way. Ralph Branca, who pitched four perfect innings in the opener before he blew up, was waved in from the bullpen.

Three hours and five minutes of play—a record—were required before 33,098 fans learned that Casey's right arm had been raised in victory by decision of the scorer. The defeat was Newsom's, without argument. Eight patches were used and a total of 26 hits rattled off the walls.

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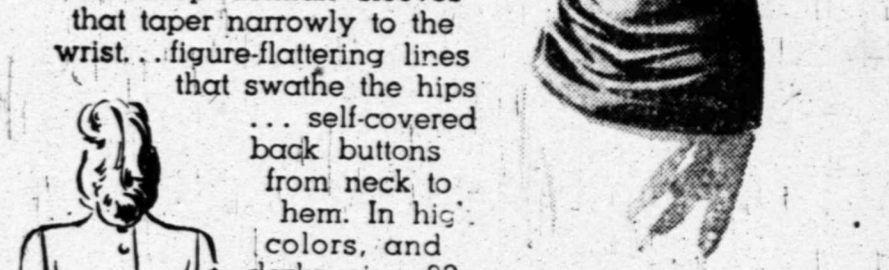

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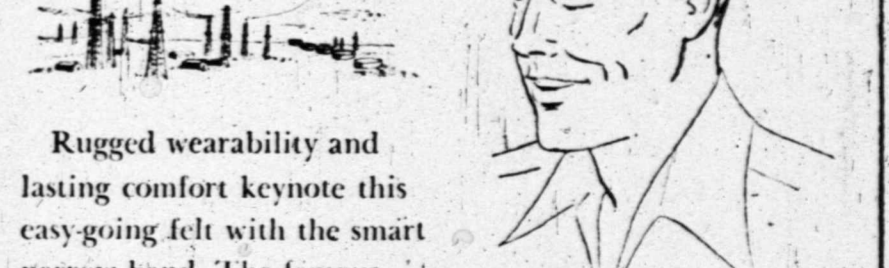

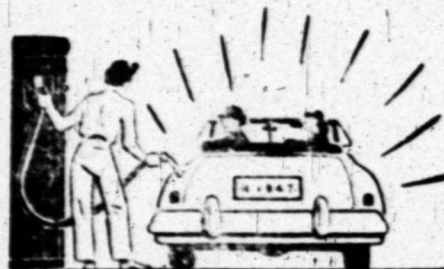
