

EL PASO - (AP) - Mexican mounted troops Tuesday were to ride into the sandhills and mountains near Caseta, Mexico, seeking a mysterious flaming object which residents claimed soared over the town Sunday to explode in billows of smoke ten miles away.

Brig. Gen. Enrique Diaz Gonzales commandant of the Juarez garrison, Monday night sent a request to Maj. Gen. John L. Homer, commanding general of Fort Bliss at El Paso, that U.S. military reconnaisance planes assist in the search for "the object."

The Mexican general suggested that the planes drop flares and otherwise guide the horse troops to any crater sighted

General Gonzales led a search party in the range of mountains beyond Caseta, Colonia Reforma Latin-American and Carver and Guadalupe Monday. The search party took along metal-locating instruments similar to mine detectors, but failed to locate the site of the reported explosion Four Persons See 'It'

For several weeks the special congressional election in I thigh and Bucks Counties, Pennsylvania, was touted as a preview of the 1948 race. The principal reason was that the Taft-Hardey Law was the central issue of the campaign. Another reason was that industrial Lehigh County and rural Bucks were a small but representative cross-section of the American scene.

Interesting sidelights on the campaign were the united AFL, CIO and independent union support of the Democratic candidate, and the fact that the Republican candidate, speaker of the State Assembly, had steered Pennsylvania's version of a Taft-Hartley Bill through the legis-

It or until the organized rank-and-file feel the effects of this law in their jobs or wages or personal freedom, it is doubtful that they will all jump through the hoop at their leaders' command. If and when they do feel those effects, they will express their feelings at the polls without millions of dollars' worth of urging.

As a footnote to the Pennsylvania election, we might suggest that maybe the Taft-Hartley Law won't be the big issue of the 1948 campaign, after all. And we'll bet that if Storch had been able to present a reasonablesounding solution to the high-price problem, he'd have won by a bigger landslide than Lichtenwalter did.



Army Fliers Enter 'Eye' Of Hurricane

HAMILTON, BERMUDA-(P)-Two members of the U.S. Army Air Porces told how they piloted a B-17 to the "eye" of the hurricane as it roared off the Florida Coast

The pilots-1st. Lt. George Koug-

ias of Stephenville, Texas, and 1st. Lt. Charles B. Jones of New Bedford, Mass,-carried out hazardous mission for the 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron "We carried on the nightmare journey for three hours, taking pressures and feeling our way into the center of the hurricane," Kougias related soon after greeting his wife and infant daughter, Patricia Ann, who awaited him. "Suddenly, after hours of blackness and an almost uncontrollable plane, we broke into the 'eye' with brilliant

sunshine beeting down on us: Buck 140-Mile Wind "The contrast was unbelievable. The sky was deep blue and the sea, 500 feet below us, was a peaceful green, absolutely calm, contrasting with the white fury of a few minutes before."

Jones' wife and young daughter, Darlene, were also on hand for the greeting. The wives had had no word from their husbands for five

After spending 20 minutes inside the 'eye,' Kougias said, he and his co-pilot had to battle their way out again.

"Hurricane winds of 140 miles an hour were beating against the aircraft and more than once it seemed as though the B-17 could not stand up against the terrific strain," he

When they finally reached Tampa, he added, they found eight bolts had been ripped from the plane where the wing joins the fuselage.







tucky, a leader among states in the battle against cancer, is now getting | Deputy Shot Down ready to chase the nation's Public Killer No. 2 with the world's first mobile X-ray bus for cancer diag-

Officially known as "Cancer Mobile," the bus already has toured the capital cities of the southeastern states and went to Miami so state officials could see it at the regional conference of the American Cancer Society before it comes back here to go to work.

In collaboration with the State Health Department, the Cancer Society will keep the X-ray bus moving around the states in areas where hospital and other medical facilities are inadequate.

Early detection is the key to cancer cure. Kentucky has recognized this by taking the lead over all other states in its cancer control program. Already it has a network of 16 cancer detection and treatment clinics. The bus is designed to provide an extension service to these and other hospital facilities.

The state's doctors are solidly behind the program. The society atready is besieged with requests from communities to have the bus visit them. Louisville Junior Leaguers, who sponsored the bus, have voluneered to travel with it and assist in taking case histories and handling

The anti-cancer bus resembles in appearance the TB detection buses already in use, but it has a motordriven tilt table and a special holder so that 14 by 17-inch chest films can be taken in upright position. The X-ray tube has a large focal spot to permit the almost continuous use involved in mobile detection

Oklahoma was the first state to have a mobile cancer detection unit, but it does not have X-ray facili-
