

George VI opened a new session of Parliament Tuesday, and in a speech written by his Socialist ministers called for nationalization of the British gas industry and for a curb on the powers of the ancient House of Lords. He gave top priority, however, to economic recovery.

Both houses sat together in the Lords' Chamber for the ceremony tarting the legislative year under the Labor Government.



According to Midland men who knew him well, Bob won top money in calf ropings while his broken leg was still in a cast. He'd rope a calf and climb off his horse, waiting while the trained mount dragged the calf to him. **Horse Bought Here**

Once, when he found doctors in a hospital were preparing to amputate his injured leg, he dressed and left the hospital, driving across the country through Winter storms to return to his native Southwest. His famous horse, Powderhorn, was purchased in Midland from Billy Bryant. John Dublin recal's that Bob drove here in an open-topped truck, although the weather was freezing, jumped the pony into the bed of the truck, and drove back to Roswell. - He seemed to scorn protection from harsh weather and liked to feel the hottest wind of Summer or the coldest of sleetladen northers beating against his range-toughened face.

He was contemptuous of finery or expensive equipment. His ancient black hat and ordinary cowboy clothing were his year-round

dress. He claimed a good roper didn't need fancy equipment, and could use a grapevine if necessary. During the war he had a good supply of genuine manila rope, a precious commodity, but he carried it in his trailer with his horses, where it was always covered with dust and muck.

Preferred Bedroll

Frequently, at rodeos here, he would slide his saddle and bridle from his pony and leave his equipment lying in the dirt until he was ready to use it next morning. Sometimes he would buy a watermelon and eat it all instead of coming to town for his meals, and his modest bedroll-was preferred to any hotel room. He could eat twice as much

of the showplaces of the Southwest, according to those who have visited him there, and he enjoyed showing visitors his collection of rodeo trophies and other items he had gathered during his years of roping and riding.



as Chancellor Robert Hutchins put it, "the United States will hold-its world leadership in science and industry only as long as it maintains its leadership in the knowledge of the atom.

Atomic science already can do such things as trace the circulation of the blood by means of radioactive sodium atoms; trace a plant's absorption of fertilizer by radioactive nitrogen: "watch" the movements of impurities inside a piece of steel with the help of radioactive carbon.

But atomic science is also considering such questions as these: Why do metals, pliable in their pure state, become brittle when strengthening alloys are introduced? Why will metals stand a constant strain better than vibration?

Atomic science is seeking the cause and cure of cancer with new weapons. It is even daring to ask the secret of life itself.

The answer to these questions could work an amazing difference in human existence by saving time and money. opening new industries, altering present structures and designs, conquering fatal diseases and prolonging healthy, useful life.

At the University of Chicago these answers are being sought without recourse to public funds or, as noted above, without sufficient funds from any source at present. The program expects help from industries which might benefit from its research, and from philanthropists who believe in its purposes. And some help is already forthcoming

DALLAS-(AP)-The University of Texas is mauling opponents at the rate of 357 yards per game in Southwest Conference football as the Longhorns set a dizzy offensive pace through the campaign's halfway mark.

Statistics released Tuesday by James H. Stewart, executive secretary, show the Longhorns have galloped and passed for 1787 yards in five games with 1168 of it on the ground. Of the 619 yards passing, Bobby Layne has contributed 527 on 29 completions in 44 attempts. Layne, is more than 200 yards ahead of the next passer, Stan Hollmig of Texas A&M, who has connected 25 times in 64 tries for 304 yards. Jack Price of Baylor is third with 20 completions for 236. Doak Walker, Southern Methodist's great running back, leads in ball-carrying with 339 yards on 57 tries. Clyde Scott of Arkansas is second with 295 on 61, and George Walmsley of Rice is third with 279 on 40.

In punting, Ed Green of Southern Methodist is tops with an average of 41.4 on 14 boots. Tom Landry of Texas is second with 40.0 on 17, and Hollmig is third with 38.9 on 35


