Screen Writer Is Held In Contempt

WASHINGTON-(P)-The House Un-American Activities Committee Monday voted John Howard Lawson. screen writer, in contempt for refusing to tell whether he is or ever was a Communist.

Robert E. Stripling, committee investigator, said that because the present hearings on Communist activities in Hollywood are being conducted by a subcommittee, the action will have to be submitted later to a meeting of the full committee.

If the contempt citation is voted by the full commit-

*tee, a statement of its action lis filed with the speaker of the House, who can turn the matter over directly to the United States attorney for prosecution before a jury.

The law calls for a fine of \$100 to \$1,000 and imprisonment of one month to a year in jail for anyone found guilty.



Decline And Fall

For an hour John L. Lewis harangued the American Federation of Labor convention in San Francisco with one of his typically pompous, theatrical performances. He denounced and sneered at his fellow AFL executives. But the chief target of his wrath was the Taft-Hartley Law, to which he again attributed all the vicious, treacherous purposes that have never shown up in practice.

When he had finished the delegates arose and, in a moment, succeeded in doing what the Taft-Hartley Law was intended to do. They deflated the soaring ambitions of a power-hul gry, egocentric labor leader whose selfishness and irresponsibility had so greatly abused the rights won by organized labor.

Specifically, the convention abolished the offices of 13 national vice presidents, one of which was held by Lewis.' They did this because the United Mine Workers president had refused to sign the non-Communist affidavit required by the Taft-Hartley Law. They also removed him from another office-in advance. For Lewis had warned them that if they abolished the vice presidencies, he would not accept a place on the substitute executive, council.

Rabies More Prevalent In Winter Than Summer, Rables, contrary to popular belief. is more prevalent in Winter than in

hot-weather months, Dr. F. E. Sadler, director of the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit, said Monday.

He quoted State Health Department records showing that of all animals brains submitted for examination by the department's laboratory in January, 1947, 33 per cent tested positive for rables, while in July only 18 per cent were positive. Dogs suspected of having rabies should not be killed immediately, but should be confined for 10 days for observation to see if the disease develops, the doctor said. If the dog sickens and dies during the period, the head should be packed in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination.

Officers of the health unit here will assist in observing such suspected animals and in sending heads in for laboratory tests.





First of all let us study the bidding of today's hand. Some players; might pass the South hand. However, most tournament players will open the bidding, with



one spade. When North bids two diamonds. South will bid two spades, and North then will take the hand to four spades. If South does pass on the first

round and North opens up the bidding with one diamond, South should bid two spades, not one, in order to tell his partner that he practically had an opening bid. Four spades is the normal contract to arrive at, even though it can be defeated.
