per hundred pounds for their milk, it was reported. Although the retail price for the locally-produced milk has not risen, Tennessee Dairies milk being transported here from Dallas went up a cent a quart this week. Groceries Thursday quoted it at 23 or 24 cents a quart as compared with 21 or 22 cent's for locally-produced milk.

Rising cost of feed and other production expenses were cited as reasons for the increase in prices being paid producers.

Britain's Labor Government Has Narrow Escape

LONDON - (A) - Britain's Labor government averted defeat by less than 30 votes on two occasions in the House of Commons Thursday-the narrowest margins it has had since the party came to power in August, 1945.

By a count of 184 to 160, the Labor majority approved a hotly argued motion to end debate on the controversial government proposal to abolish the slim basic gasoline ration now alloted to British motorists. The Conservative opposition greeted the vote with shouts of 'gag" and "resign, resign."

A few moments later the House defeated, 187 to 160, an opposition motion to annul the government order wiping out the basic gasoline ration.

Follow Churchill Defeat The closeness of the votes was due

partly to Labor abstentions and to the hour-the ballot came in the early hours of the morning after a night sitting—which reduced attendance generally. The Labor Party has 394 seats and the Conservatives 190. These votes followed by only a

lew hours Winston Churchill's fourth unsuccessful effort to throw the Labor Party out of office by adverse parliamentary ballot. The House defeated his attempt Wednesday night. 384 to 201. His previous attempts failed, 381 to 197 in 1945: 374 to 198 last April; and 251 to 148 last August.





POINT BARROW, ALASKA-NEA)-Giant "cats"-some of the biggest tractors ever built-are erawling slowly across the frozen tundra here this winter, hauling loads of precious supplies.

Social Adequacy Of Deaf Gauged

With Word Test

ST. LOUIS -(A)- To help the deaf, a word test at Washington-University Medical School measures the "SA" of hearing.

SA in this case means social adequacy-whether a person can hear enough words and different syllaoles to be able to get along in normal conversations The word test was designed to

find an accurate measurement of normal hearing ablities at different intensities of everyday speech, said Dr. Theodore Walsh, professor of otolaryngology. Measures Improvement

This standard then can be used

to measure just what impourment the hard-of-hearing persons may have, and what improvement is achieved through hearing aids or by operations. The test takes about an hour.

The patient is put in a soundproofed room at the Central Institute for the Deaf, an affiliate of the medical school. Through earphones he hears selected lists of words from a recording. These usual tests is not more than 35 or words cover all sounds used in spoken English.

The patient has to repeat what threshold is-how low words have to to do."







Six weeks are required to mount a fish or any type or size and make it ready to

be shipped back to the fisherman. Some of the fish shipped to Pfluger come in dry ice. Pish traveling a great distance by air, boat or railroad are already skinned. Only the hide, tail, head and fins are sent. Pfluger pointed to a 1,000-pound

tuna caught off Miami "If the man who caught this wanted to dispose of it, he'd make a good penny," he explained. "Tuna is always salable. The big canneries have men on the lookout for such fish. But this man wants this one as a souvenir. It represents his biggest catch. When our laboratory is finished with it and it is mounted, it will weigh no more than 70 pounds." Processing Is Thorough

All dimensions of a fish arriving at the laboratory are recorded. When only the skin arrives it is dipped in a solution to make the hide flexible. It is then wrapped around a metal form and measured.

.Cnce the true outline of the fish is determined, the skin is degreased, the process removing all oil. The hide is dried and preserved. When the fish is about to be mounted, the

The next step is placing the fish on a plastic mould. It is drawn tight and secure. The mould, of course, remains in the finished mounting. Eyes, teeth and fins are The fish is lacquered, sprayed with a silver base of aluminum, closing all the pores. It starts to assume all its natural beauty. Mounts For Famous Fishers

In the paint shop Pfluger gives the fish the appearances of having been freshly pulled from the water. It takes him about five minutes to paint a sailfish. He uses a dozen or more colors. Given a day to dry, the fish gets a coat of synthetic varnish. A wire wall fastener is hooked into the mould, and it is ready to be shipped.

Pfluger is amused at a lot of people believing that mounted fish are stuffed with sawdust or something. If there are rips in the skin they are repaired by wood fiber and cov-

Pfluger has mounted fish for the famous-Herbert Hoover, Rex Beach, Jane Froman, Bill Dickey, Gary Cooper and many more. Could Pfluger give one an idea where to catch big ones?

"Deep sea fishermen go to Nova Scotia, Cuba and Chile. They catch really big, game-fighting fish there, although there are many huge catches made in our own waters. "There is one thing to always remember in fishing. Have a tight line," said Al Pfluger, the man who never lost a fish once it was hooked







The Paris Report of the 16-nation Committee of European Economic Cooperation admits there will be a four-year shortage of 12,000,000 short tons of ingots and semi-finished steel.

This assumes that Europe will be able to import all the coke it needs, plus 15,000,000 tons of rich iron ore, 8,000,000 tons of scrap and 3,000,000 tons of manganese. There is no assurance this can be done. The U.S. is now exporting steel to Europe at the rate of 1,500,000 tons a year. This is about half of the 3,000,000 tons required.

The U.S. may be able to supply all the coking coal that's needed. There is, however, a U.S. shortage of cokes and scrap. Before the war, this country had great surpluses of scrap which were shipped all over the world -Japan as well as Europe. It's no longer here. Scraft collection drives may have to be reinstituted, as in wartime. As shown by Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug's new report on national resources and aid to Europe, U. S. domestic steel consumption is now at peacetime peak. Steel production is running at 97 per cent of rated capacity, but still can't produce enough for home needs.

:No More Air Races ?

It has been suggested that the Cleveland air races be abandoned as a spectacle whose dangers to participants and spectators alike outweigh its usefulness. This year's experience make the suggestion worth considering

There were four crackups in one event at the recent Cleveland races. One flier was killed and another badly injured. A third barely missed crashing into a field crowded with spectators. It was only good fortune that some of the disabled craft did not land in the grandstand.

The conventional, reciprocating-engine racing planes were souped-up models of surplus military aircraft, so their performance proved nothing new. There may be a better excuse for the jet-plane competition and the crosscontinent races. But the mad races and stunting over a populated area and a field filled with 50,000 spectators offer an increasing annual hazard which might sensibly be dispensed with.

Who's Got It ?

Farm incomes are up 11 per cent over 1946, says the Department of Agriculture, but costs are up 16 per cent. The financial statements of many corporations show increases in similar proportion. Millions of workers are getting higher wages than they did last year. But most have found that their living costs have exceeded their pay

Somebody's getting that difference between higher incomes and higher costs, but who? Not the farmers, say government researchers. Not the corporations, say the accountants. Not the workers, say the statisticians. Not the great majority of any of them, certainly.

All of which is turning that handy phrase, "the inflationary spiral," into a painfully clear, three-dimensional picture.

She was one of the founders of the Cincinnati League of Women The Motherly Voters and was its first president. She was the first woman to serve as a director of the Community Chest and is or has been a member of virtually every Cincinnati social agency.

Friends believe that Taft may never have gone to the Senate if Martha had not campaigned for him so vigorously in 1938.

They had despaired of his going to Washington because of his dry and solemn approach. But Martha supplied the punch. She visited 85 counties. She made speech after speech. And she got along so well that a Cleveland paper headlined the Tast victory: Bob and Martha Taft Elected to The Senate."


Smelly Seals Are Given Speedy Entry




