Grain sorghum and corn stubble is practically an ideal home for them. They get the benefit of the stalks for cover and waste grain for food.

Burning crop stubble is the most harmful thing that can be practiced for pheasants. The flame kills birds, damages eggs, and destroves the only habitat the surving birds have.
