



Requirement Changed In DPS Driving Test

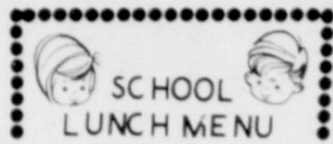
A new procedure has just been enacted by the Department of Public Safety in regards to advancement in grade to a higher class of license (Operator to Commercial or Operator to Chauffeur).

In the past, an applicant was permitted to drive almost any type of commercial vehicle on the road test with the license examiner. Now they are required to take the road test in a Commercial vehicle which has a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity exceeding 2,000 pounds or 1 ton.

This excludes all vehicles in the pickup or panel class. It can be designed to carry either persons or property so long as it meets the size requirement. The examiner prefers an applicant to bring the type vehicle in for the road test which he expects to drive.

A few points of interest for all to know and remember are: 1. Any size truck or bus may be driven with an operator's license so long as that vehicle is unladen; 2. Rental trucks up to 2 ton capacity may also be driven up to 10 days with an operator's license, to move one's own personal property or office equipment.

The Friona Driver's License office is open Monday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 a.m. to 12 and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. The driving tests are conducted on Wednesdays only.

Friona Flashbacks

... from the files of the Friona Star

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 29, 1929

Judge J.C. Temple of Farwell was a business visitor in Friona on Monday, and favored the Star with a short visit. The judge expressed himself strongly in favor of a county agent for the county, and says he will back a move to accomplish such a result.

W.F. Perry, who was appointed census taker for the Friona School District, finished that job on Tuesday. He found the exact number of scholastics to be 353, a decrease of six from last year's count.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 31, 1939

As announced in last week's issue of the Star, the organization of the Friona Retail Merchants Credit Association has now become a reality. Mr. H.W. Matthews has been in charge of preliminary work. Primary purpose of the organization is to provide more convenient and satisfactory credit facilities to those who wish to avail themselves of it.

Superintendent W.L. Edelman was elected to a second term at a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 24, 1944

Carl C. Maurer, owner and manager of the Friona airport, stated Monday that CAA Inspector Frank Cazzier of Amarillo Saturday completed the designation of the Friona Airport, to be known as "Ira Bengert" Field. Maurer stated that the airport is now open to public use, and a large central hangar is to be built as soon as it is possible to secure necessary materials.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 25, 1949

A temporary cement plant has been located south of the Santa Fe track, which will make cement for the proposed new bins for Friona Wheat Growers.

Champions of Friona's amateur night show last Friday were a square dance team composed of Don Reeve, Sallie Osborn, Dudley Bainum, Phyllis Treider, Don Lewis, Sue Cranfill, Danny Mac Bainum and Doris Jean McFarland. The young group won out over another group, which was known as "The Hungry Five."

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 25, 1954

With some 37 per cent of the local telephone subscribers having returned their questionnaires regarding rate increases to enable extended area service between rural co-op phone users and Friona connections, the edge is slightly against the raise proposition. Final results will not be known until every telephone connection is polled.

15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 26, 1959

Bill and Carolyn Ramey assumed the managership of Sherman's Cafe on West Highway 60 last weekend, replacing Harrison and Irene Gee.

10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 26, 1964

Rex Wells of Friona exhibited the grand champion steer in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Theresa Seaton of Lazbuddie had the grand champion barrow, a Hampshire. Charlotte Seaton exhibited the reserve champion.

5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 28, 1969

Funeral services for E.C. Seaney, 61, were conducted Wednesday in Morton. Seaney, who had owned the Pak-A-Sak 7-11 grocery since last September, was found shot at the store on Monday, with a .22 calibre rifle lying nearby. He died at Parmer County Community Hospital early Tuesday morning.

TO SAVE YOU TIME AND MONEY

HOW TO SAVE ON MEAT Don't just beef about bullish meat prices. Follow these suggestions from home economists at Whirlpool Corporation to avoid paying an arm and a leg for every side of beef you buy.

Buy quality. Make sure you're buying meat that's nearly all meat, not fat, bones and gristle that will only go to waste. The Better Business Bureau believes that trim loss ranges between about 25 and 33 per cent of total weight.

Buy in quantity. Stock up on sale items, especially family favorites. Plan at least two meals ahead when you shop and buy enough meat when prices are low so that it can last for several meals. A big bit of beef can be divided and sectioned for stew, sliced for sandwiches, and subsequently frozen for later use. Or, cook more of one dish than your family can eat at one meal, and freeze the rest, to save yourself some time too.

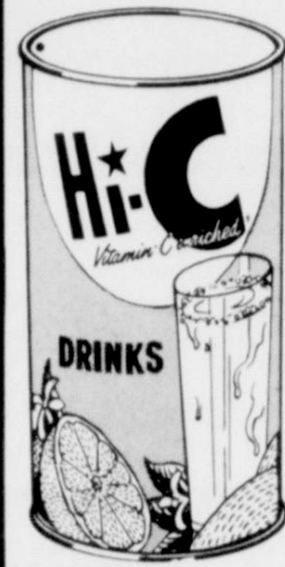
Store it carefully. Airtight packaging is the secret of success in freezing foods. Containers and wrappings should be moisture proof and sealed securely to keep natural juices in and air out. Defrosting can be less of a sticky situation if you place two layers of freezer paper between each layer of meat. Date and label every package as you put it into your freezer then use the oldest package first. Don't hoard your frozen food... the greater the turnover, the smaller per package operating cost. The American Meat Institute recommends maximum storage of beef from six to eight months and fresh pork, veal or ground beef three to four months.

This sort of smart shopping and proper planning should help you put your own freeze on meat prices!

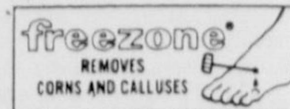

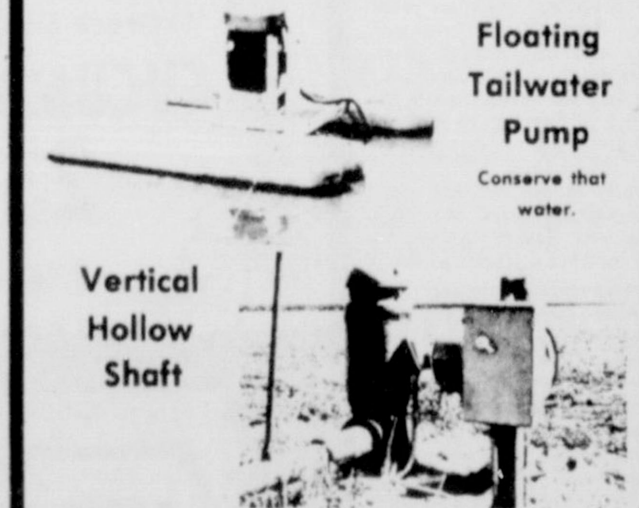

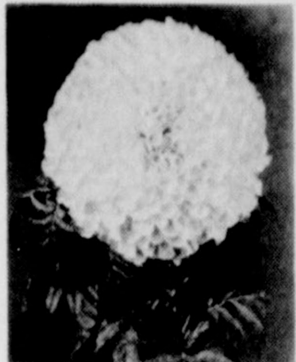

SS Benefits To Increase

"Monthly Social Security benefits will be increased in two steps, starting with checks which will be delivered April 3," Mr. William Ent, field representative of Clovis stated recently.

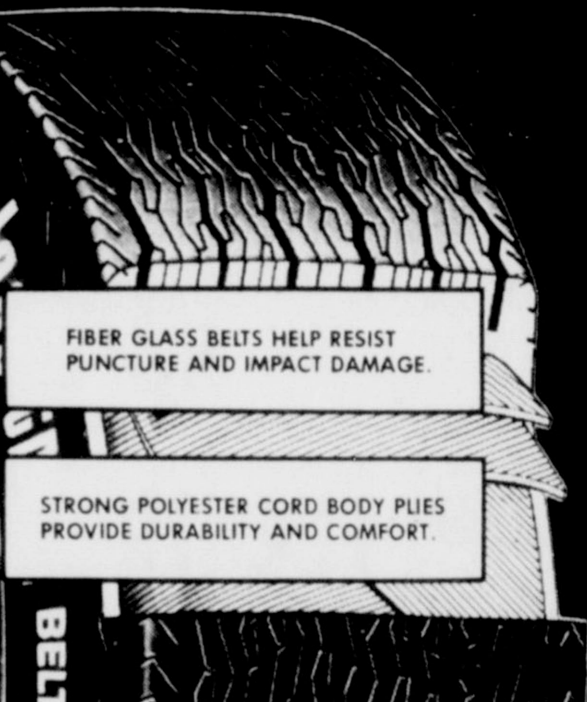
The overall increase will amount to 11 percent for most beneficiaries. Seven percent of that will be included in the April 3 checks and the other four percent will be included in the July 3 checks.

"People getting Social Security don't have to do anything to get the higher payment," Mr. Ent stressed. "The increase will be added to the checks automatically."

The amount of yearly earnings subject to Social Security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200 for 1974. People earning over \$10,800 will pay more in deductions this year, but they also can expect higher Social Security benefits in the future as a result.

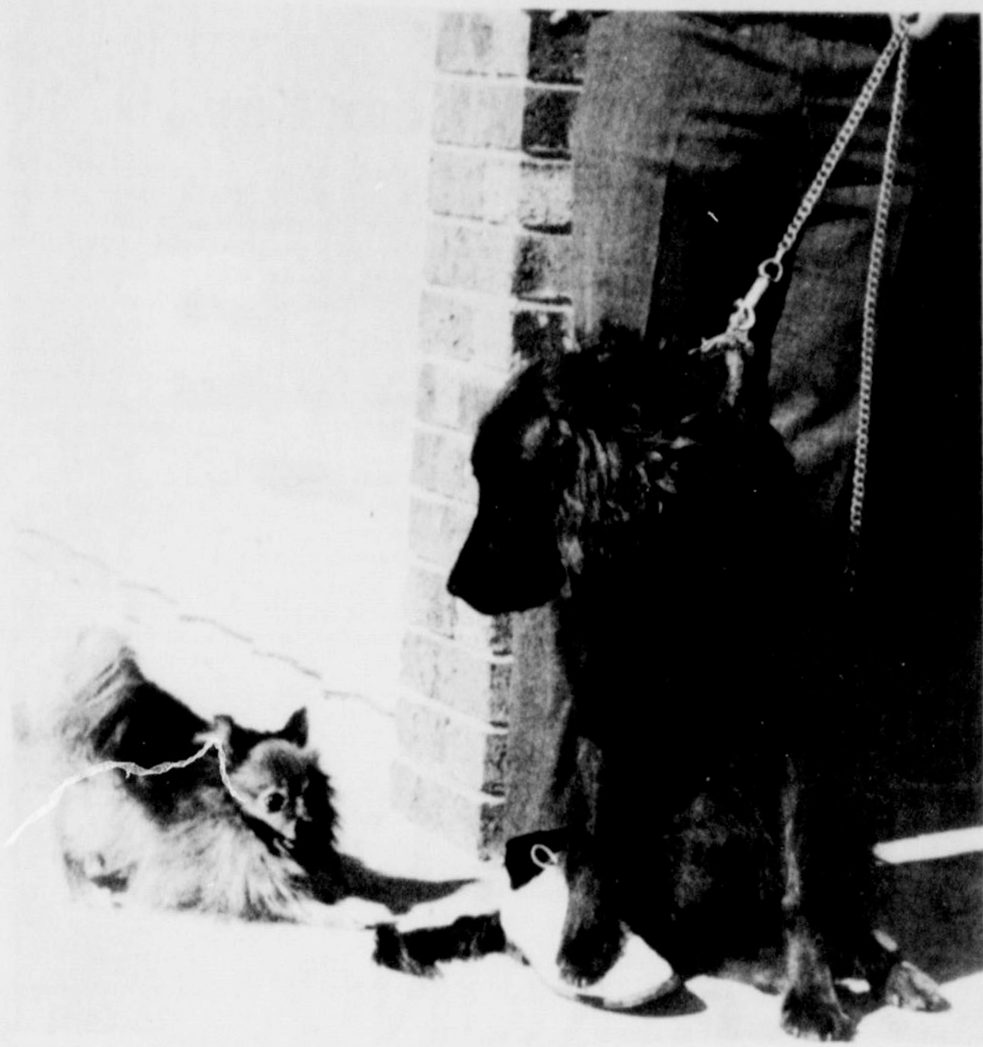
Porter, Jr., Petersburg; Ray Robertson, Dimmitt. Widener serves as Plainview PCA's official delegate.

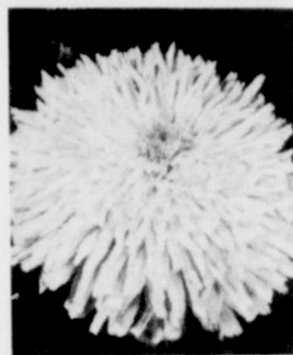

Crim's Predictions: A Dry Year For 1974

It may come as no great surprise to weather observers that J.W. (Indian) Crim sees a dry year in prospects for 1974. Making his annual weather reading last Friday morning, at a bonfire at the Crim home place near Lazbuddie, the Parmer County weather prophet found it hard to see anything optimistic in the signs.
 "We had a peculiar wind. It was different from any we had seen in a number of years," Crim said of the conditions of the wind at sunrise on March 22.

He indicated that the signs call for a lot of clouds during 1974, but not much moisture. Clouds will tend to drift across the area, he said, which isn't a very favorable sign.
 Crim predicted that the area would have little hail during the coming year, due to the steady straight wind that was blowing at sunrise.
 It was a southwest wind that whipped the smoke at sunrise for Crim's annual prediction, and that's the worst kind, as far as the readings go.
 A northeast wind is supposed

to foretell a bumper crop. A north wind is good, and a northeast wind is "fair."
 Crim has been making the annual weather reading at his place near Lazbuddie for over 50 years. He learned the process from his father, who had observed the Indians making the annual observation. That's where he got his nickname.
 A number of people anxiously await Crim's predictions each year, and he was sorry not to be able to give them any better news for 1974 than the "signs" foretold.

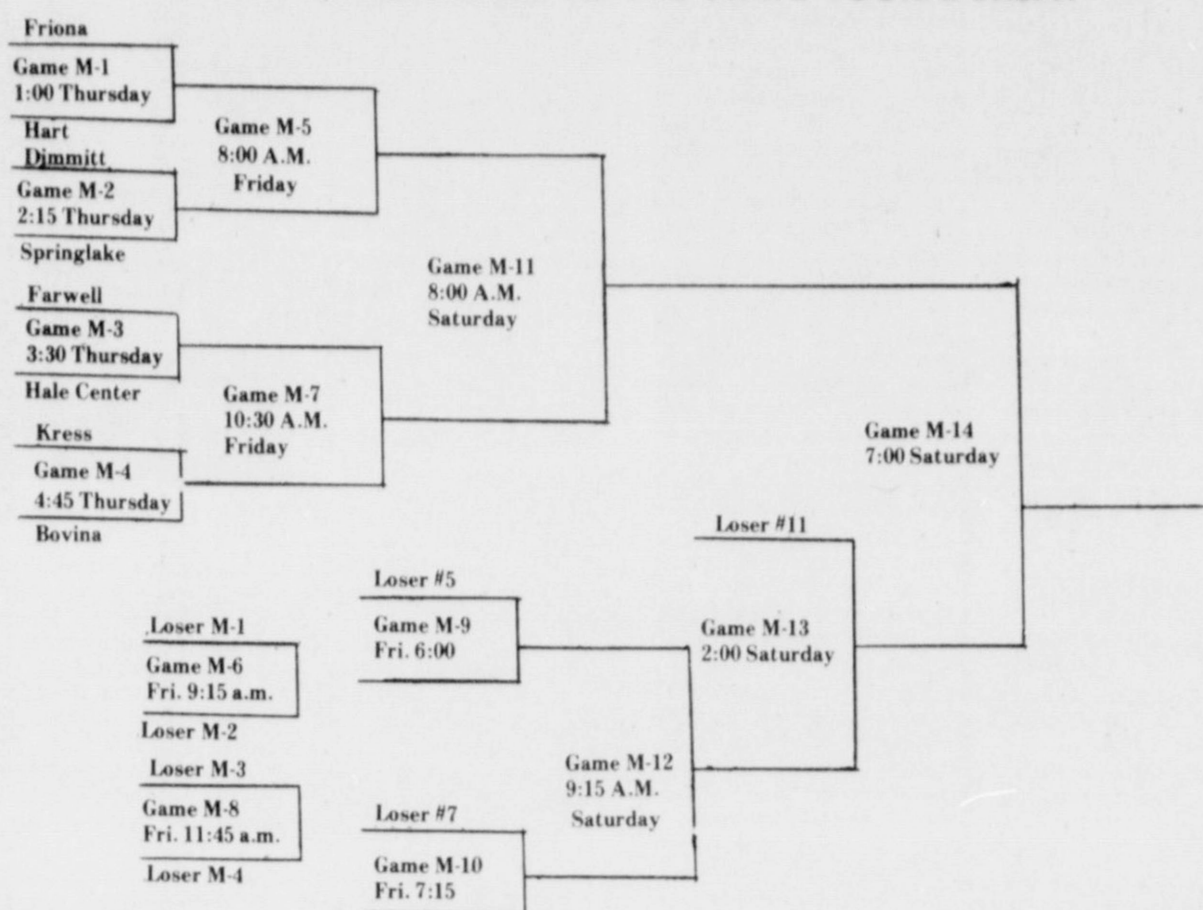

National FHA Week To Be Observed

Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945 as an incorporated, nonprofit organization supported by membership dues. There are two types of chapters. FHA chapters place major emphasis on consumer education, homemaking and family life education combined with exploration of jobs and careers. HERO chapters, taking the name from home economics related occupations, place major emphasis on preparation for jobs and careers with recognition that workers also fill multiple roles as homemakers and community leaders.

Nationwide in membership and effort, Future Homemakers of America is co-sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education through the Division of Vocational and Technical Education and The American Home Economics Association. National Headquarters are located in Washington, D.C.

High school home economics teachers, members of the state home economics education staff and leading home economists serve as advisors to chapter, state and national youth officers, giving guidance and counseling to the program.

The annual state meeting of the Texas Association will be April 25-26 in the Convention Center, Dallas. More than 5,000 members and advisors are expected to attend.

The theme of the meeting is "Today's Concern—Tomorrow's IMPACT." Programs are planned to provide delegates further information and ideas about implementation of the new IMPACT program of work, which was first introduced last July at the National Meeting of Future Homemakers of America in Dallas.

Keynote speaker for the meeting will be Roger Staubach, Dallas Cowboy quarterback and popular youth speaker. Other highlights include an address by Vonda Van Dyke, former Miss America and popular entertainer, presentation of Honorary Membership to non-members who have contributed their time and effort to the organization and a breakfast

honoring members who are to be recognized at the meeting for their outstanding achievements in FHA.

The Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America will observe National FHA-HERO FHA Week, Sunday, March 31 through Saturday, April 6. Using the theme "Impact '74" the 68,000 Texas members will join some half-a-million young men and women across the country in demonstrating projects that are challenging, stimulating, and of real value to youth in preparation for future responsibilities.

"We have a new approach to program planning, Annette Reznik, State President, from Friona, pointed out. Working with our "Program Action Impact" kit is exciting. "Impact" was developed by youth and introduced to chapters this year by state and area officers. We analyze member concerns and then develop what we call 'in-depth' projects that are related to our home economics classroom study. Most people have no idea of what is taught in home economics classes today. They think of home economics as cooking and sewing and of Future Homemakers of America as just another 'fun and games' club.

During National FHA-HERO Week we want to impress on people that Future Homemakers of America, as a part of home economics education, provides opportunities for us to learn, to know, to care and to do the things that help prepare us for future living."

Chief Track Team Bids For District

Having already set a number of records on the athletic field this school year, the Friona Chieftains will be out to add another rare trophy to the school's trophy case on Saturday, March 30 at Olton, when they bid for the District 3-AA championship in track and field.

The Chieftains have had a relatively short track season thus far, getting a late start after their basketball season was extended two weeks when the team won regional and went to the state finals the following week.

In three meets to date, the Chiefs have brought home the first place trophy each time. Coach Larry Dyess' thineclads won their division title at Abernathy in their first outing by racking up 151 points.

In a two-division meet at Hereford, Friona scored 90 points to win their division over ten other schools.

Then last week at Farwell, the Chiefs rolled to their third meet title with six first places and 136 meet points.

Expected to battle Friona head and head for the district crown on Saturday at Olton will be Dimmitt, which likewise has

won three meets this spring. The two schools have not locked horns on the same track as yet, so Saturday's meet will tell the tale.

Preliminaries will be held at 9:30 a.m. Saturday. Finals get underway at 2 p.m.

At stake in the meet will be qualifying places for the regional track and field meet. The top two placers in each event will qualify for the regional meet at Lubbock.

"I really think we can win it," says Coach Dyess. "I think it will take 140 points to win the meet. Dimmitt is the team we'll have to beat, but I think we have more depth than they have," he said.

Dyess said that Friona should be favored to win the mile, where Dale Parsons is defending district champion; high jump, where Dale Cleveland and David Clark have been consistent winners; mile relay, and 880, where Ronnie McLellan has been improving all year.

In the 220-yard dash, Ted King has run a faster time than every district sprinter except for Dimmitt's Robert Mayberry. He will have a fight on his

hands, but should qualify for regional.

Dyess said he thought Mitchell Wiseman or Davy Carthel should qualify for regional in the discus event, even though Littlefield has some talented men in the shot and discus.

Last week at Farwell, Carthel won the discus and Wiseman was second.

Dimmitt's strong point seems to be Mayberry, who probably will win both the 100 and 220. The Bobcat speedster also anchors the Dimmitt sprint relay team. Past that, Dimmitt has a hurdler that has done well, but hasn't exhibited the overall depth that Friona has.

Morton, Olton and Littlefield have not scored high in meets to date, although Olton will give the Chieftains a battle in the mile relay, where they edged Friona by an eyelash at Hereford.

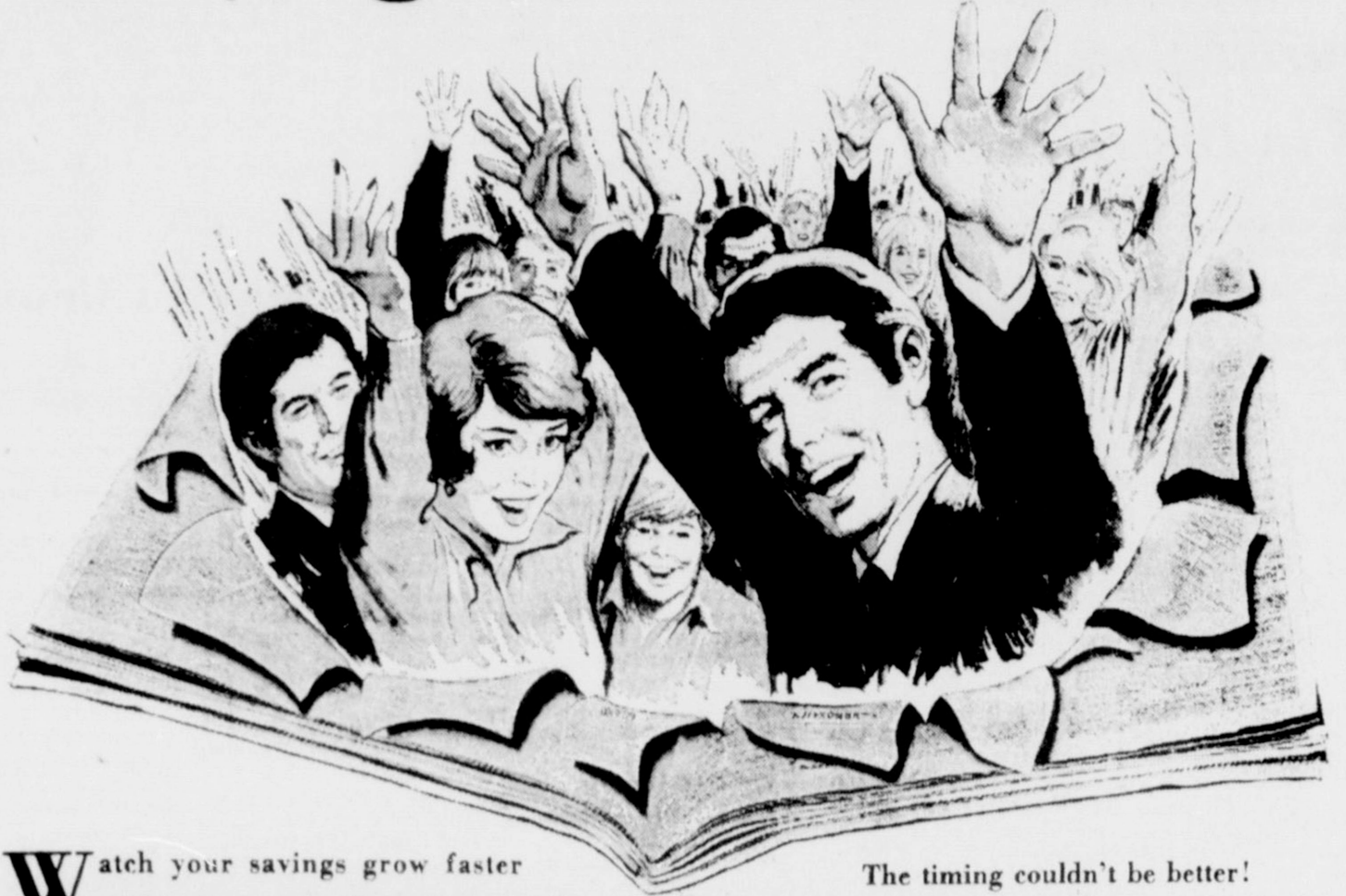

Chiefs Grab Title In Farwell Relays

The Friona Chieftain track team was "three for three" after winning the Twin Cities Relays last Saturday at Farwell.

Proving their mettle in the bitter cold temperatures, the team came up with six first places out of the 14 events, their most wins this season, and scored points in every event except the open 440. Friona rolled up 136 points in winning the 11-team meet.

Winning events for the first time this spring were Kenny Stowers in the shot put with a 42.9 effort; Davy Carthel in the discus with a toss of 131.6; and Dale Cleveland in the 120-yard high hurdles with a 17.0 effort.

Actually, Cleveland had a first place previously this year, but it was in the high jump rather than the hurdles. This was the first hurdles win for the Chieftains this season.

Also winning was Dale Parsons, who is undefeated in the mile run so far. Dale ran a 4:58.4 on the cold track. Dave Clark also sacked up the high jump for the second straight week with a leap of 5.10.

Second places were won by

Roy Rector in the high hurdles; Mitchell Wiseman in the discus; Cleveland in the high jump (tie) and the mile relay foursome.

The Chiefs swept first and second in the high hurdles, discus and high jump. They were first and third in the mile run, where Danny Allen continues to improve each week.

The Farwell team won both hurdles races, and took first in the 440 and 880 to make the meet close going into the last two events.

But when the Chieftains got 16 points in the mile run, and another 16 in the mile relay, that gave them the meet title by 31 points, 136-105 over the host Steers.

The meet was held in 25-degree weather, with a slight wind that brought the chill factor down near zero for much of the day.

It was the second time in three meets for freezing weather to prevail for the tracksters.

The meet also was the last for the Chiefs prior to Saturday's District 3-AA meet at Olton.
