





# Ill-Advised Proposal

The House never has been too imaginative in measuring the possible psychological effects of its actions in a world torn between freedom and communism.

In the past it has tried to include aid for Spain in the general European Recovery Program, even though it was quite apparent the move would arouse deep resentment among several friendly nations.

And with Republicans usually in the vanguard, it repeatedly has sought to slice wholesale chunks out of recovery funds at times when Europe's economic health was far from assured.

This year a new twist has been tried. The House Foreign Affairs Committee has approved a plan by Rep. John Vorys, Ohio Republican, to strike \$1,000,000,000 in cash from proposed ECA funds and substitute an equal amount of surplus farm commodities drawn from stocks piling up in government storehouses.

It might be that ECA could put to good use a lot of our surplus products. There's a question, however, whether ECA officials could not perhaps buy what they need more cheaply in the open market than from the government. Furthermore, ECA ought to have as much flexibility as possible in its buying operations: Restrictions of the sort suggested by Vorys are no help.

The worst of it, however, is that any provision committing ECA firmly to use of American surpluses would play right into the hands of Russian propagandists. From the start they have been saying that ECA was not really a recovery plan but simply a cloak for the dumping of U.S. it's difficult even for congressmen ques will so small a force be able goods abroad

Should the Vorys proposal be adopted by Congress, we would be hard put to prove that the Russians were not hitting the nail on the head. If this plan had a great deal else to recommend it, there might be good sense in ignoring the propaganda blasts that would ensue. But plainly it does not.

Fortunately for the United States, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has approved new ECA funds without any such hampering clauses. And Chairman Connally of the committee has forecast ultimate rejection of the Vorys plan by Congress, even though it has a good chance of getting through the House.

The country has been lucky that none of the really damaging House proposals offered up to now have been enacted into law. It may not always be so lucky.

No one expects wisdom from all 435 members of the House. But surely there are enough wise heads in that body to make it conscious of the fact that Congress today is the world's most important legislative agency and that for it by Congress. its acts have great pratical and moral impact around the world.

# Traffic Jam

To anyone who may think the big cities permanently are solving their traffic problems by construction of multilaned expressways, a few statistics from officials in the New York area will serve as a corrective.

Authorities announced that traffic on parkways in Westchester County on the city's northern border increased for release-Johnson explained 15 per cent last year. They added that it can be expected to rise 10 per cent a year for the next five years at least.

By 1955, they predicted, these routes virtually will be impassable on peak traffic days. Some of them are that way for short periods with the present volume.

In solving the traffic problem in such large centers as New York, we are plainly back to scratch. The average motorist can't be blamed if he clamors impatiently to hear what the engineer's next dream is to be.





east Asia. This vast area from Korea to Afghanistan now is considered more explosive than the Balkans ever were. Actual war between India and Pakistan still is a possibility, and both governments are overburdened by military budgets.

The anti-Communist campaigns in Korea and Viet Nam (Indo-China) are already hot war. Burma has had continual revolts. Thailand (Siam), though comparatively rich and successfully independent, is pinched between Burma and Viet Nam. If either of these countries goes Communist, Thailand would have to follow the lead, yielding as she yielded to the Japanese in the last war. On the edges of these critical areas

are somewhat more promising conditions in Japan, the Philippines and Indonesia. But the trouble spots on the mainland hold off trade and recovery in the island countries around them: Fortunately, there is only one country that has a bad food situation-India. If there were general food shortages, the unrest would be all the greater.

Weakness Apparent Politically, all these countries save Japan and Thailand are emerging from the protection of western powers-Britain, France, The Netherlands and the United States. The new governments are weak and short on leadership. That makes them lean towards dictatorial methods. It will be a long time before they may be regarded as democracies in the western sense.

In their new nationalism and independence there is a great distrust their former colonial masters. This carries over into a distrust of the United States everywhere save Southern Korea, Japan, the Philippines and Indonesta. ### Fare Boosted For Commuting Animals

NEW YORK -(A)- Transportation costs have gone up for everybody-including camels and elephants commuting on the Weehawken Ferry. This ruling was announced by the Interstate Commerce Commission recently.

Officials of the West Shore Ferry Line which traverses the Hudson River between Weehawken, N. J. and New York City could rememe in recent years when an uncrated animal crossed in one of their boats. That was about 12 years ago when a man was exhibiting an elephant in New York. He commuted every morning with the animal and returned every night. This continued for two weeks but neither the man nor the elephant has been seen on the Wee-






