SE Lynn Wildcat **Develops** Shows In **Pennsylvanian Lime**

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. Garza Cattle Company, Southeast Lynn County wildcat, 14 miles east of O'Donnell, and 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of the southeast quarter of section 431, block 9, EL&RR survey logged some porosity and oil stain in a Pennsylvanian lime between 8,430 feet and the present total depth of 8,440 feet.

Operator is now taking a drillstem test at 8,430-40 feet. The lime section which is carrying the shows of possible petroleum production was topped at 8,426 feet. Elevation is 2,920 feet.

That gives this lime top a datum of minus 5,506 feet. The age of the lime has not been officially determined

Midland bank deposits, registering a gain of \$1,481,-199.97 since Dec. 31, 1949, skyrocketed to an all-time high of \$37,720,573.09 at the close of business Monday, officials of The First National Bank and The Midland National mostly were from Stuyvesant High Bank reported Thursday in response to a national bank call by the comptroller of the currency. Deposits at the City Hall from scores of other end of the year totaled \$36,239,373.12.

The combined bank deposits show a gain of \$7,744,-

775.47 over those of April 11, 1949, when deposits amounted to \$29,975,797.62.

Loans and discounts of the two financial institutions also were up \$1,160,902.75 since Dec. 31, 1949, and \$2,233,423.15 since April 11, 1949. Combined loans totaled \$8.-879.427.53, as compared with \$7,718,-521.78 four months ago, and \$6,646,-004.38 a year ago.



It's regrettable there is so little we can do at this stage to combat victorious communism in China.

In our government's view, the Chinese Nationalists now operating from Formosa do not offer reasonable hope of becoming an effective rallying force for resistance against the Reds. And we have no way of telling when such a force will develop.

Meantime, it isn't easy to decide how to deal with Red China and the millions of Chinese under the Communist yoke. Some say we should recognize the regime of Mao Tze-tung and try to do business with it, on the chance we might wean him away from Russia and create another Tito.

But recognition is a tough issue unlikely to be settled for some time. It would be most useful to the free nations' cause if some positive step could be taken promptly. We need to begin filling the vacuum left by the collapse of our China policy.

One proposal currently being studied is that we move in somehow to aid the millions of Chinese who are starving in one of the Orient's worst famines. Some estimates are



The upsurge in religion finds some more statistical support in data on church contributions. From 1940 to 1947 gifts for all purposes increased 100 per cent. This year they'll probably total a record of \$1,500,000,000. On a per person basis contributions jumped 73 per cent from 1940 to 1947.

The churches part in its own success story is manifold. It's trying to make basic religious services more meaningful. Church prayers are more down-to-earth. Sermons dwell increasingly on the things really troubling the average man.

Preachers are doing a better job. They're getting more money, too, according to the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America. But figures are skimpy.

Back in 1940 about 90 per cent of the clergy, including part-time pastors, drew less than \$2,500 a year. Only 1.2 per cent had salaries of \$5,000 or more. Some churchmen think many have now doubled their 1940 income.





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

So Ellen Church was hired by United Airlines as the world's first airline stewardess. Air transportation was very different 20 years ago; it was not streamlined. The planes were chiefly single - engined, although some were lumbering slow tri-motors. Most of the passengers flew on emergency trips only, to save time. The planes went through, not over or around, weather.

Ellen Church, and the seven stewardesses she selected to pioneer with her, heated large pots of coffee, helped mechanics start balky engines, and slept on the floors of numerous small weather stations whenever the planes were grounded by reports of storms ahead.

Miss Church had her first brush with a pilot on her second flight from Chevenne to Salt Lake City One of her passengers suddenly became ill. Miss Church asked the pilot to land at Rock Springs, and to radio ahead for a doctor. The pilot refused to delay the mail over what he felt was a simple case of indigestion. Miss Church assured him that it was acute appendicitis and that unless he landed she couldn't be responsible. The pilot landed the plane at

Rock Springs, where a doctor and ambulance were waiting. An emergency operation saved the passenger's life and the pilot changed his mind about the "sky girls." From the original eight sky girls,

the idea has spread until there are 7,000 stewardesses serving on air carriers all over the world. United alone has 675 stewardesses who handle five times as many passengers on each plane as did the first girls. "I'll bet the girls flying the airlines today don't have as much fun as we did," Ellen Church says 'We'd get stuck at whistle stops in the Great Salt Lake area of Utah all the time. I'd be embarrassed when I had to take passengers over to the nearest railroad station for their meals. The railroad clerks always found it hilariously funny." Ellen Church entered the Army Nurse Corps in 1942, served on evacuation squadrons in Africa and England, and later was on the Normandy beachhead shuttle to England. She wears the air medal under her air nurses' wings. At the end of the war she left flying and is now director of nurses at Sherman Hospital, Elgin, Ill.

- 2. Representing that the preparation of food in aluminum utensils causes the formation of poisons;


