

Magnolia Discovers New Devonian Oil **Pool In C-E Chaves**

Magnolia Petroleum Company has discovered a new oil field in Central-East Chaves County, New Mexico, at its No. 1 Lightcap Land Company, 35 miles northeast of Roswell.

This wildcat flowed 146 barrels of 52-gravity oil in two hours and 15 minutes, naturally from pay in the top of the Devonian lime at 7,940-78 feet. There was no formation water. Gas-oil ratio was 1,527-1. The flow was in excess of one barrel per minute, or at the rate of approximately 1,450 barrels per


