At the controls of the tractor will be Lieut. Harry E. Rieseberg, a California daredevil deep-sea diver. Texans To Observe 100th Birthday Of Ice-Making In U.S.

Ever hear of Dr. John Gorrie? It isn't surprising if you haven't. Unless you're from Florida the chances are pretty slim—and even if you are from Florida, the odds are against your knowing what Dr. Gorrie did to make him any different from any other small town

In Apalachicola, Fla., where Dr. Gorrie practiced, there is a statue in his memory, among other community reminders. In Jacksonville there is a junior high school named after him, and in Washington, D.

C., there is another statue. Strangely enough, it isn't Dr. Gorrie's medical accomplishments that these various monuments comnemorate.

First Ice-Maker John Gorrie, M. D., invented merica's first ice-making machine. In 1850, just 100 years ago. Dr. Gorrie perfected his machine. He wasn't thinking of the preservation of food, or the making of ice cream, or any, save one, of the thousands of uses to which ice is put today. His sole purpose as he worked on his crude apparatus was to make ice available at all times for the treatment of patients suffering

Dr. Gorrie accomplished his aimand unintentionally made a contribution to American living far greater than that of most of the famous doctors reverently remembered for their medical discoveries.

Certainly someone else soon would

have developed an ice-making machine of some kind if Dr. Gorrie hadn't done so; but he did do it, and as a result was responsible for the beginning of an industry which affects every human life every hour of every day, year in and year out. The total production of Dr. Gorrie's ice machine during 1850 was probably less than 150 pounds. Today, more than 7,000 ice manufacturing plants throughout the nation produce more than 50,000,000 tons of ice each year. In Texas alone there are some 600 ice plants em-

ploying more than 7,500 persons.

Technical Advances In the hundred years since Dr. Gorrie's machine produced the first American-made ice, the technical advances in ice manufacturing have been constant. Early to recognize the advantages of cooperative effort, ice manufacturers pooled their knowledge and their research dollars-and the result is one of the





"Then out of the dark thunderclouds, a rope-like funnel cloud reaches toward the earth, spinning counter-clockwise. The funnel varies greatly in appearance. Often it is thin. In other case it has the appearance of a gigantic elephant trunk, and occasionally it is the shape of a solid funnel.

"People in open country can view the approach of the storm and should move at a right angle to its path. Persons caught in the open country without time to escape should lie flat in the nearest de-
