
Wolfcamp Opener In Howard To Complete



ocial Security Law Revision

It's pretty widely accepted in Washington that broaded social security will be one of the chief accomplishents of the current session of Congress. The Senate Fince Committee's approval of higher, more extensive olde benefits increases that likelihood. The House already s passed a bill for that purpose.

The Senate committee version would raise payments out 90 per cent, while the House measure lifts them an erage of 70 per cent. The Senate proposal also would lay longer the increase in payroll taxes deemed necesry to cover the heavier burden. But after 1959 the hedule of tax boosts would be the same in both bills.


The payroll tax would be levied on the first \$3,000 of individual's income under the Senate plan. That's the esent law. But the House would impose the tax on the :st \$3.600.

Does the second employer thereafter take out your cial security tax only on the remaining \$200 needed to ake up the \$3,000 total? He does not. Under the law, must take the tax out on the first \$3,000 you earn demonstrations. om him.

In the end, you wind up paying the tax on \$5,800 that ear. But the law leaves you a remedy. You can fill out vo forms, send them off to the Internal Revenue Bureau id claim a refund on the tax paid on the extra \$2,800. In me, you presumably get your money back.

Inasmuch as Americans are a highly mobile people ho do a lot of moving about from job to job, this situaon must be very common. The Revenue Bureau must cocess a tremendous file of claims based on social security so much, they could have surprised ver-payments.

You can well imagine the paper work involved in Uncle Sam Pays necking the records, evaluating the claims, preparing the fund checks, and so on. Was there ever a better exnple of wasteful effort in government? Is there no one the Revenue Bureau who can add \$2,800 and \$200 to et \$3,000?

The amount of pain, irriation and local discomfort caused by enlargement of the prostate varies from person to person. There is also some danger of the development of kidney trouble because of the back pressure from the urine

Sometimes-and often without apparent warning-a man with an enlarged prostate suddenly may find that he is not able to urinate at all Under such circumstances the bladder must be drained through a tube called a catheter, which is passed into the bladder (or in some other manner). The symptoms of acute inability to urinate can be relieved in this way but only temporarily.

The complications of an enlargement of the prostate gland can be serious. Those who have symptoms should not neglect them until serious harm to the kidneys or the

bladder itself has been done.


Toastmasters Hold Organization Dinner

Marine M/Sgt. Elmer C. Bender of Cincinnati and Navy Chief Electrician's Mate William C. Smith of Long Beach, Calif., arrived Tuesday night from the Orient.

Greeted by Rear Adm. John E. Gingrich, civilians and servicemen, Smith and Bender were taken from the plane which brought them from Hong Kong to a hospital. Navy doctors said both needed rest and vitamins.

Before they talk to newsmen Wednesday afternoon, Navy Intelligence officers were to process them. Smith and Bender were captured Oct. 19, 1948, when their small observation plane was forced down near Tsingtao, China, then an American Naval base.

Efforts by United States authorities to free them proved fruitless. Finally on May 3, the Communists told them a revolution was brewing in the United States and freed them


