Texas No. 1-X State In NW Martin Gets Ellenburger Oil

Indications of the discovery of an Ellenburger oil field in Northwest Martin County have been developed at The Texas Company No. 1-X State.

That prospector, located 11 miles north of the Mabey shallow field, and 600 feet from north and 1,900 feet from east lines of section 17, block 7, University survey, and one half a mile east of the Andrews County line recovered 4,004 feet of 47.8-gravity oil during a three and one-half hour drillstem test at 13,112-331 feet.

There was a good show of gas for a part of the period. In addition to the clean oil recovered there was 270 feet of drilling mud in the tester when the drill pipe was all reeled.

SE Garza Venture To Test Deeper

Callahan & Harrison of Abilene are deepening their No. 1 W. G. Williams, wildcat in Southeast Garza County two and three-fourths miles east of the northward-San Andres pool to 5,500 feet.

Deep Zone Flows Gas In Crockett

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Clayton, Southeast Crockett County wildcat, nine miles southeast of Ozona, and 1,320 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 12, block GH, GC&SF survey, flowed dry gas at the rate of 13,125,000 cubic feet per day from perforated section in the Ellenburger at 8,580-8,610 feet, after that interval had been treated with 4,000 gallons of acid.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Lightcap Land Company, Central-East Chaves County wildcat discovery, 35 miles northeast of Roswell, was flowing at the rate of 22 barrels of 52.4-gravity oil per hour, naturally from perforated section at 7,960-76 feet in the top of the Devonian.

Southerners Smash FEPC Bill

Tax Framing Pane Adopts Further Cuts

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee Friday voted to cut the taxes on the coal industry by \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 a year.

It was a further move away from the recommendations of President Truman. The President has urged that business taxes be increased, if changed at all, to make up for prospective losses in government revenue from cuts in excise taxes on such things as telephone and telegraph bills and travel tickets.

While the committee was going ahead with its bill-writing, an indirect question was raised by Senator George (D-Ga.) as to the final enactment of any tax cuts at all in this Congress session.

George did not put in on that basis, but he said in an interview that Congress must remain in session until the end of August if it is to complete action on tax legislation.

It is highly doubtful that the members of Congress will be willing to do that. Most are anxious to wind up this session in order to spend time on reelection campaigns.

George's views have particular importance because he is chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, which handles tax legislation.

On coal, the House group's decision was to increase the depletion allowances from five per cent of gross income to 10 per cent.

President Truman has said in effect he will veto any tax bill if he thinks it cuts revenue too much.

The House committee has paid scant attention to that in working on its bill.

Thursday, it courted a tax bill veto by Republican filibuster. The proposal would add \$200,000,000 additional taxes on oil, gas, sulphur and non-metallic minerals operations.

It refused to reduce depletion allowances for these interests and, instead, approved new depletion exemptions for major products.

Earlier it had turned down a \$400,000,000 increase in taxes on inheritances and large gifts, also proposed by the President.

That left larger tax collections from corporations as the only major source of revenue by which Truman proposed to offset cuts in excises—on such things as furs, jewelry, handbags, toilet preparations, travel tickets, communications, etc.

The President proposed a \$500,000,000 boost in corporation taxes by raising the corporation income tax rate from 38 per cent to 42 per cent.

The committee has not acted on this proposal.

Allies To Lighten Austrian Controls

LONDON—(AP)—The Big Three Friday announced there is no hope in the immediate future for Russian agreement to an Austrian independence treaty.

At the same time U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson declared that the North Atlantic Treaty has been "a positive influence for peace beyond the North Atlantic area."

Acheson issued a statement before boarding the liner Britannic at Liverpool for the return trip from the historic North Atlantic Treaty foreign ministers' meetings here.

The U. S. secretary, reviewing the achievements in Big Three and 12-nation talks of the last 10 days, called for "hard and constant work and the closest kind of cooperation in all the fields of national and international life."

Acheson said the North Atlantic Council had provided "means for perfecting the common defense as a deterrent to aggression in order that peace may be more secure."

The treaty already, he said, has made its influence felt over a wide area, particularly in encouraging developments in Greece, Iran and Turkey, areas of high security.

"It is a matter of simple arithmetic that at least two years would be required for our present aircraft industry to rebuild our present Air Force and to enable it to continue combat action."

A-Bomb "Towering Reality" He said the A-bomb is not a bad dream but a "towering reality," enabling one airplane to inflict more damage than a hundred airplanes could inflict before.

Great industrial centers like Detroit, he said, can be destroyed within a few hours after an atomic attack is launched unless they are strongly and skillfully defended.

It is far easier to deliver an atomic bomb Vandenberg added, than to prevent its delivery, once the bomb carrier is on its way.

He called anti-aircraft guns and fighter planes "last ditch" defenses against atomic bombers, saying that purchase of enough of them to cover all avenues of approach is an extremely expensive procedure.

Captive Airmen Arrive

LONG BEACH, CALIF.—(AP)—Two U. S. airmen held captive 18 months in Communist China received a tumultuous welcome as they arrived home Friday.

Marine M Sgt. Elmer C. Bender, 27, of Cincinnati and Navy Chief Electrician's Mate William C. Smith, 32, of Long Beach, who indicated they admitted a Red charge of spying in order to be released, landed at nearby Los Alamitos Naval Air Station in a special Marine plane.

The two men looked trim as they stepped down from the plane and touched their feet on American soil.

Mrs. Ruby Smith, 32, who hadn't seen her husband for 22 months, was waiting eagerly as the plane slid to a stop. There was an emotional moment when Smith descended the stairs and they went into a silent embrace. Neither spoke.

Smith was carrying in his hand two yellow teddy bears, for his sons, Michael, three, and Patrick, 17 months, who were with their mother and dressed in their Sunday best.

It was Smith's first meeting with Patrick, who was born while he was a prisoner of the Chinese Communists.

The returned captives said they were treated better "than we possibly could have expected" during their long period of detention by the Communists.

But they wouldn't say yes or no to a press conference when asked if they had signed confessions that they were American spies.

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Motion To Limit Talk Falls Short

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate Friday virtually killed the Fair Employment Practices (FEPC) Bill for session by refusing to block filibustering by Southern opponents.

The test came on an attempt to choke off debate on motion to bring before the Senate for consideration a key measure of President Truman's civil rights program.

A cloture (debate limiting) petition fell short by 11 votes of getting the required 64 for adoption. A roll call showed 52 "Yes" and "No" votes.

It was a victory for Southern Democrats and dealt a blow to chances of getting action on any of the President's rights program at this session.

The Southern triumph had anticipated, but Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois said in advance another attempt to force creation of the FEPC bill would make, possibly next week.

His principal hope was to up additional votes from senators who were absent. An absent vote, in effect, voted against cloture (debate-limitation) motion.

First Showdown Since 1946 The vote was the first tryout of the Senate's new rule, adopted July, 1946, when senators rejected a petition to close debate on anti-poll tax bill.

A similar anti-poll tax bill brought up in the Republican Congress, but died when the Senate failed to reach a vote on a cloture petition in August, 1948. No vote was taken on FEPC in 80th Congress.

Winnipeg Gets More Rain; RCAF Planes To Aid In Evacuation

WINNIPEG, MANITOBA—(AP)—Rain fell again Friday, but it was logged Winnipeg, already dreading any kind of the Red River inching up toward the point where a disaster would have to be declared.

Some 10,500 homes in Winnipeg and neighboring St. Boniface are already inundated, Mayor Gary Couper estimated, and 5,000 more are threatened seriously.

General Evacuation If the river rises another two feet general evacuation will be ordered.

At that point, water would spread across the twin city of St. Boniface on the Red River's east bank and swirl across Winnipeg's business district, which so far has escaped except for basement flooding.

In an effort to relieve the pressure on strained levees, workers hacked through the night digging 300-foot hole in a railway embankment through which raging water were diverted from endangered suburbs.

At RCAF transport planes are on 12-hour stand-by orders to be in possible evacuation. Hundreds of railway cars are nearby to move on in a matter of hours more than two-thirds of the metropolitan's 350,000 normal population. The other third already has pulled out.

Crime Probers Plan Two-Pronged Attack

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senate crime investigators Friday made plans for a two-pronged attack on the underworld, aimed at ferreting out any signs of either income tax evasion or links with political groups.

Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn.) of the Senate's Special Crime Investigating Committee disclosed both projects while talking to reporters.

He said the committee has decided to throw the main spotlight on "the alleged concentration of property, money and wealth in the hands of organized criminal elements."

Along that line, Kefauver said, the group may ask President Truman for an executive order permitting the senators to check the income tax files of suspected criminals.

Kefauver said the investigation into how the underworld piles up its wealth also will deal with organized crime's "connections with governing bodies."

"That means its connections with politics," a reporter asked.

"Yes," Kefauver replied.

At least a dozen undercover agents will be sent into the field "very soon," Kefauver said, to begin working with city and state crime commissions, and with federal and state law enforcement agencies.

Truman To Sound Armed Forces Day Keynote Saturday

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman will sound the keynote for observance of Armed Forces Day throughout the nation Saturday.

With Secretary of Defense Johnson, the President speaks Friday night at a banquet of military men in the Statler Hotel here—a session expected to stress the theme of national strength through unity.

Saturday's nationwide observance of Armed Forces Day will be the first of its kind. Heretofore the Army, Navy and Air Forces have sponsored separate "days" of their own.

The change reflects unification of the three services under the Defense Department.

To Pass In Review Crack units of all the armed forces will pass in review before the President, Johnson and other national leaders in a mammoth military parade in the capital Saturday morning.

Eight big B-36 intercontinental bombers from Fort Worth will mark the day by taking different routes across the country, one passing over each of the 48 state capitals and more than 250 cities and military installations.

The Navy will display ships of many types in the principal ports along the coasts and the Great Lakes. These ships, like shore installations of the Army, the Navy, the Air Force and the Marine Corps, will observe "open house" for the public.

An American spokesman said the Austrian decisions reached by Acheson, British Foreign Secretary Bevin and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman were not to be considered a substitute for a final independence treaty.

Acheson in large measure was responsible for the approval Thursday by the foreign ministers of the 12 North Atlantic Pact countries of new measures to repel both military and economic threats to the West.

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Lucky Number

Upton Population Figure Is 5,288

MCCAMEY—Tentative figures released by census officials this week give Upton County a population of 5,288 persons.

The count in McCamey showed 3,104; Rankin, 1,132, and the remainder of the county, 1,052.

Rankin, county seat, registered the largest gain with an increase of 586 persons, which more than doubled its 1940 count of 546. McCamey showed a gain of 514 persons over its 1940 figure.

Seventy-five per cent of the rural figure is estimated to be in the immediate McCamey area, including the Bendum field camps and the outlying ranch areas account for the remainder.

The Chamber of Commerce also will have a supply of tickets for sale.

A ticket booth will be in operation in the Scharbauer Hotel lobby before and during the rodeo. J. T. Baker is general chairman of the Ticket Committee.

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Reorganization Plans Still Face Senate Gauntlet

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman's battered reorganization program Friday faced new tests in the Senate, where five of his plans to make changes in federal agencies have died in recent days.

The latest victim was the Agriculture Department plan, which was rejected by voice vote Thursday without a word being said in its defense.

But two other proposals affecting the Commerce and Labor Departments survived tests in the House.

The House action apparently assures that the labor plan will be carried out, since no opposition was sighted in the Senate. But the Commerce plan still must survive a Senate vote. After Tuesday midnight, it will be too late for Congress to block it.

## Truman Support Boosts Proposed Coal-Steel Pool

WASHINGTON—President Truman's enthusiastic endorsement gave powerful new emphasis Friday to a French proposal for pooling French and German steel and coal production.

But these issues were not the cause of the strike. The question how pensions were to be set up and administered was what touched off the walkout.

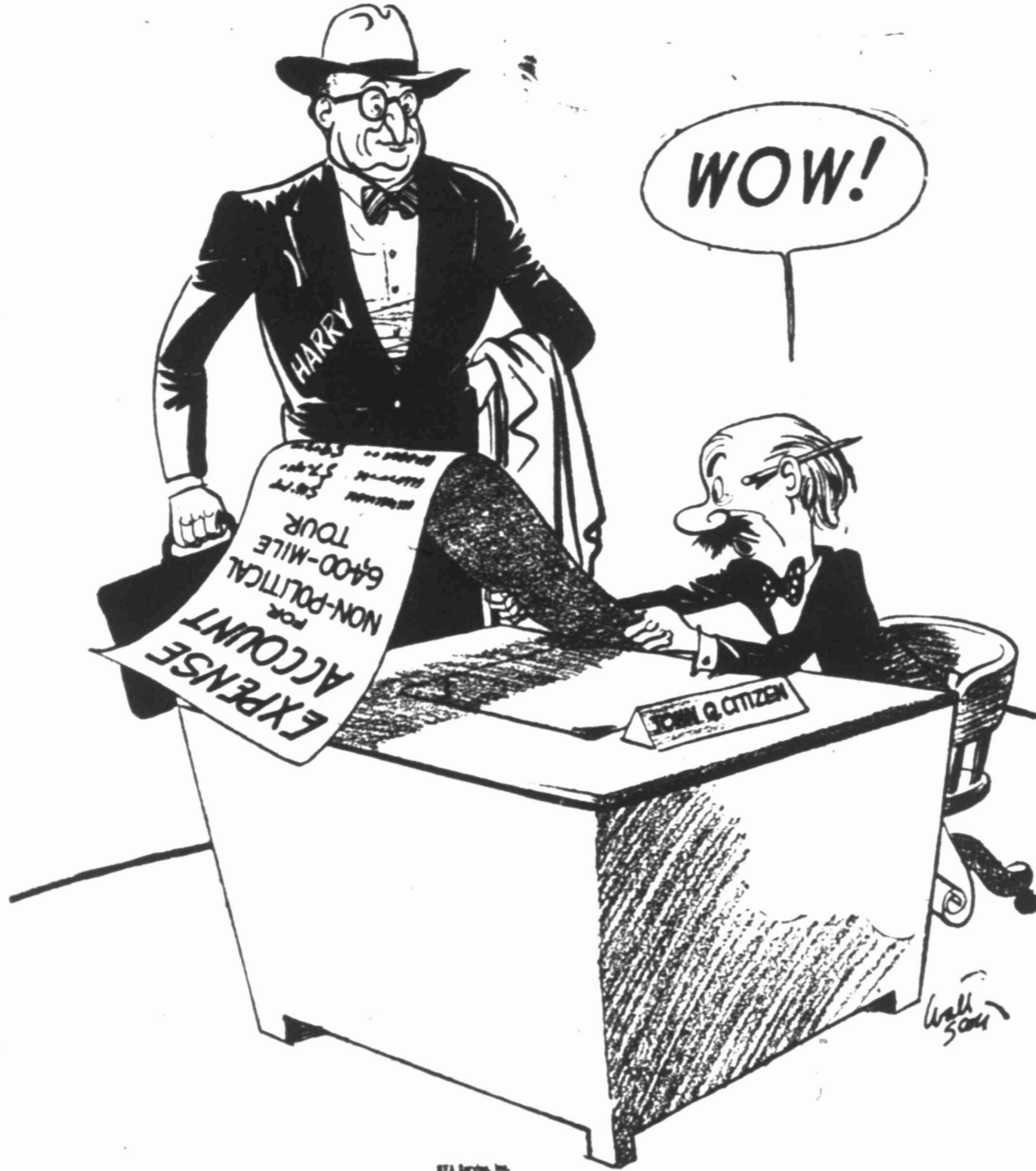

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By OSWALD JACOBY Written for NEA Service "I really thought I was going to make that hand," mourned Hard Luck Joe. "All I needed was to find that miserable queen of hearts on my right instead of on my left."

Joe was half right. If the queen of hearts had been favorably located he would have made his contract. However, we shall come back to this point later on.

Bridge hand diagram showing cards in North and South hands. North: ♠ K J 10, ♥ 7 3, ♦ K J 10 9 8, ♣ A Q 6. South: ♠ 9 3, ♥ A 10 9 8, ♦ 4, ♣ A 8 3. Dealer is South.

South led diamonds East was bound to take the ace and cash the rest of the hearts. The contract was therefore set one trick.

The opening lead of the deuce of hearts indicated that West had led either from a four-card holding in hearts, or from three to the queen.

Assuming that West held either four hearts or three to the queen, South should have played the King of hearts at the second trick.

At the third trick, South would lead a diamond, knocking out East's ace. East would now have to lead a heart to his partner's queen.

Use of the helicopter offers certain advantages for an invasion landing. Ships bearing the force could be landed 70 to 100 miles away from the objective.

Marines May Have Situation Well In Hand With Helicopters

NORFOLK NAVAL BASE—While Army, Navy and Air Force have been conducting their big "Portrex" and "Swarmer" maneuvers to test airborne and paratroop invasion landings, the Marine Corps has been experimenting with helicopter tri-phibious landings at the Quantico, Va., Marine base.

Under the joint chiefs of staff agreement at Key West, paratroop operations were reserved for the Air Force. The Marine Corps had some paratroop forces during World War II, but had not found their use of great advantage.

Possible use of an atomic bomb against an amphibious landing force had made World War II techniques obsolete anyway. Great concentrations of landing forces, such as were employed throughout the Pacific war or even at Normandy, would be out of the question if the defending force had atomic weapons.

Three possibilities are being considered. One is to use submarine transports. While possibly effective in deep water, they would be of limited use in securing ordinary beach-heads.

A second possibility is to use assault troop carrier seaplanes or amphibious aircraft. The operation would involve flying to the objective, landing on the water, taxiing to the beach and unloading troops and equipment for the invasion.

The Navy already has transport submarines and troop-carrying aircraft with which these two techniques are being studied. An item in the new military funds bill now before Congress will, if passed, provide an appropriation for additional assault seaplanes for the further development of airborne invasions.

The third possibility—and the one which seems to intrigue the Marine Corps tacticians the most—is to use helicopters. The Marine Corps school has been using them in experimental takeoffs from baby flatops, with landings in the Quantico base maneuver areas.

Today's helicopters are, of course, relatively slow. They would be easy to spot and shoot down.

### Speaker Says Public Housing Is Threat To Private Enterprise

Vincent Ogletree of Houston, representative of the Texas Retail Housing Association, Thursday night told more than 20 Midland area lumber dealers and civic leaders that public housing is a threat to private enterprise.

Lumbermen and civic leaders from Midland, Odessa and Kermit attended the dinner meeting which was held in the private dining room of Hotel Scharbauer.

Public housing has failed and has been refused at every place where a popular vote has been taken, Ogletree said. Dallas, Abilene, Lubbock and Amarillo are among Texas cities which have voted refusal of public housing, he added.

"This socialized housing will not do the job for two reasons," Ogletree said. "It will not eliminate slums, and it does not house the underprivileged."

Only persons who are eligible for the public housing are those with steady employment, and a good credit rating, he said. Tenants are supposed to have a salary not exceeding \$1500 per month but in 1949 a total of 41,784 families were living in public housing who were ineligible because of a high income.

No Midland Request

Midland, Ogletree pointed out, has not asked for public housing, although Texas leads the nation in requests for it.

"If your city is approached by public housing it would be wise to look the gift horse in the mouth," he said.

A city which asks for 100 units will lose thousands of dollars in taxes and will not find a solution to slum clearance, he said. The government allows up to \$15,000 for each unit, making a total of \$1,500,000 for 100 units.

"Public housing advisors say it is a gift of the government, but it will cost the city hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Ogletree pointed out other Texas cities which have requested and received public housing. Many of them already have lost valuable taxes and have gone in debt as a result of the "gift of the government."

Taxpayers must furnish sidewalks, streets, schools, police and fire protection for every tax-free public housing unit, he pointed out.

Cecil Snodgrass, manager of the A & L Housing and Lumber Company in Midland, was in charge of the program and introduced the speaker.

Among the special guests attending the meeting were W. H. Oswalt, Midland city manager; Harlan Howell, vice president of Midland's Real Estate Board; John Butler, vice president and cashier of the First National Bank here, and Bill Hutchison of the Midland National Bank.

### Railroads Brand New Strike Threat Drive For Prestige

CHICAGO—(AP)—The threatened strike Tuesday of APL switchmen against 10 railroads, the Western Association of Railway said Friday, "is wholly unjustified."

"This strike threat," the association said in a statement, "is a reckless drive for prestige—an attempt by one small union to out-smart and outdo a big rival union."

The railway government intervention could avert the scheduled walkout—set for 6 a. m. (local time) against the 10 Midwest and Western lines. Although no word came from the White House in Washington after the strike call Wednesday night, the National Railway Mediation Board was expected to be called in an attempt to settle the wage-hour dispute.

### Two Fliers Escape In Jet Plane Crash

WEST CHESTER, Pa.—(AP)—An Air Force jet crashed and exploded Thursday night after the pilot and his passenger had parachuted to safety in a heavy rainstorm.

The pilot, Maj. Richard H. Burner, 31, of Phoenix, escaped without injury. His passenger, Second Lt. C. H. Criscivene, 23, sustained a cut lip.

The two-seater jet training plane crashed near Lionville, Pa., about seven miles from where the two fliers came to earth. The wreckage was scattered over a mile area of farming country.

**Shock Treatments Often Are Used To Help Insanity Victims**

By EDWIN P. JORDAN, M. D.

Dementia praecox is a form of insanity and it is with this subject that the first question today deals.

Q—What are the symptoms of dementia praecox? Would X-rays be helpful in diagnosing the condition? Are shock treatments helpful?

A—The symptoms vary but include disorderliness and particularly what is called a split personality. X-rays are not helpful in diagnosis. Shock treatments are frequently extremely helpful.

Q—Is there a cure of chronic mastoid trouble?

A—Mastoiditis is less common today than formerly, thanks to penicillin and similar preparations. Chronic mastoid trouble does exist, however, and often does not respond to such drugs. The treatment consists in an operation which allows the pus in the mastoid cells to drain out.

Q—Please comment on the effects of removing the gall bladder at the age of 56.

A—A person who has had the gall bladder removed may have to follow a fairly careful diet for some time. Otherwise, there usually are no after-effects of any importance.

Q—Could you tell me if a little warm olive oil dropped in the ear would loosen the wax?

A—It probably would but that may not be the best way to get the wax out. Washing with a special ear syringe commonly is preferred.

Q—Which is more harmful, a pipe or a cigarette?

A—A pipe smoker gets nicotine and more carbon monoxide than a cigarette smoker because combustion is less complete. It would be more harmful than smoking although actually it is little scientific evidence on either side of this argument.

Q—Can syphilis be cured in years?

A—The answer to this depends how extensively the disease is attacked. In many instances treatment is so effective that further complications or relapse of the disease develop, although some do not like to speak of a "cure."

Q—Is there anything wrong when a person has a temperature low normal almost all the time?

A—Ordinarily not. Many have mouth temperatures which are low and which is considered to be normal and suffer no ill effects therefrom.

Q—I am 71 years old and high blood pressure. Am I permitted to drink alcoholic beverages?

A—It depends on what the doctor says. Some doctors permit patients with high blood pressure to drink moderate amounts of alcohol.

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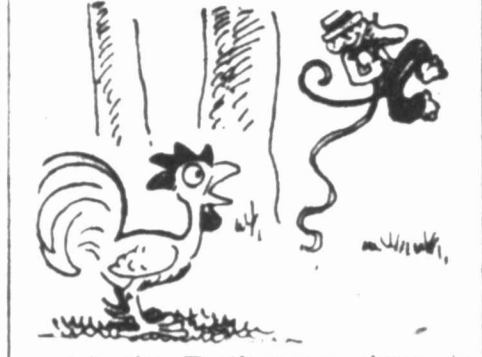
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# DADDY RINGTAIL

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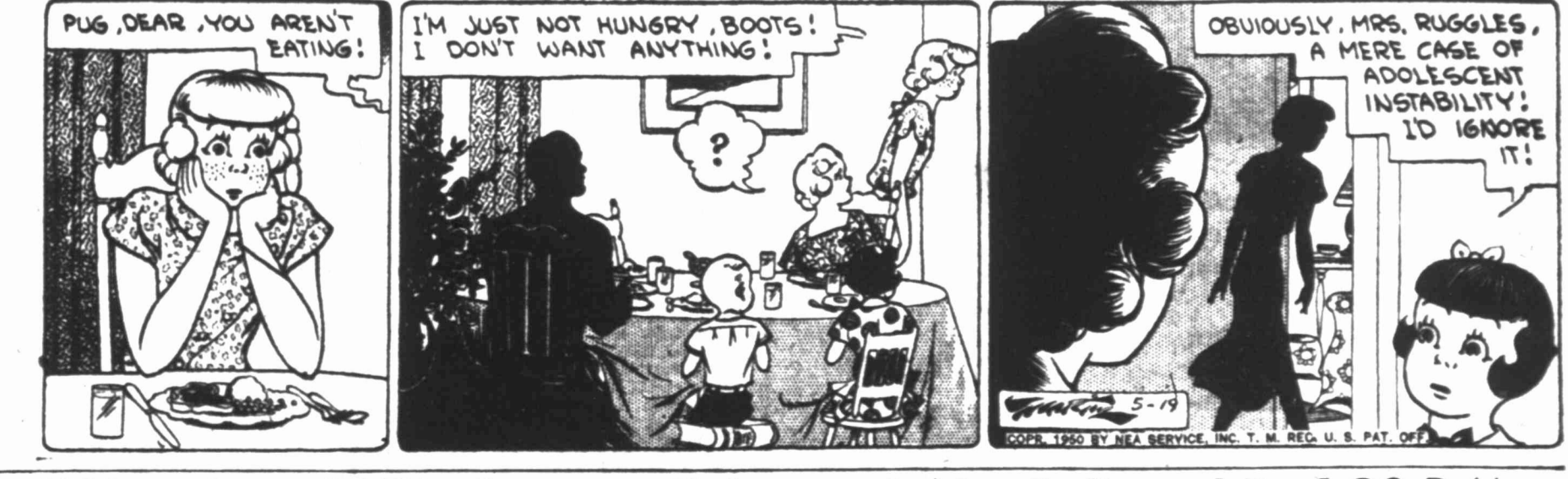
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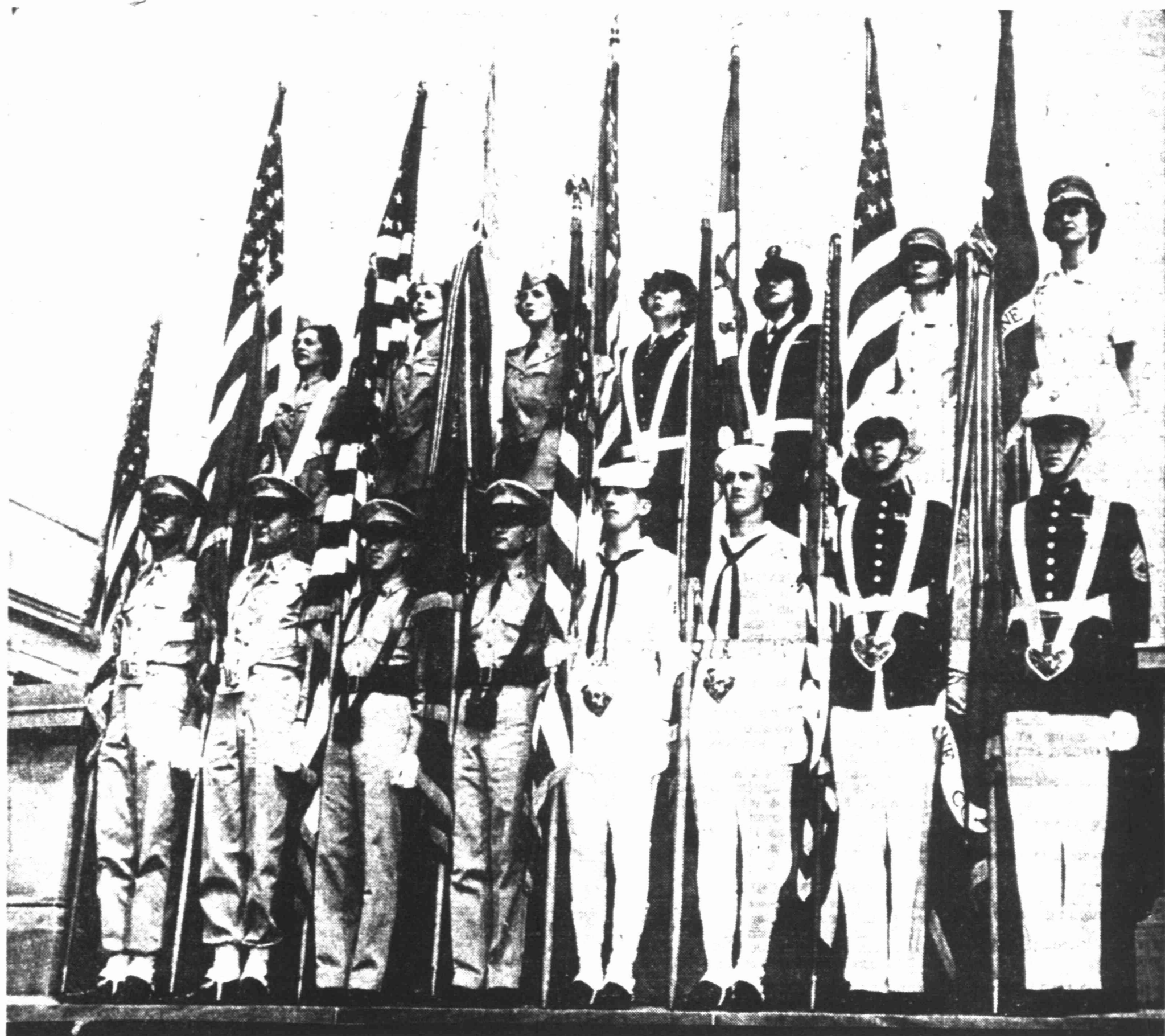

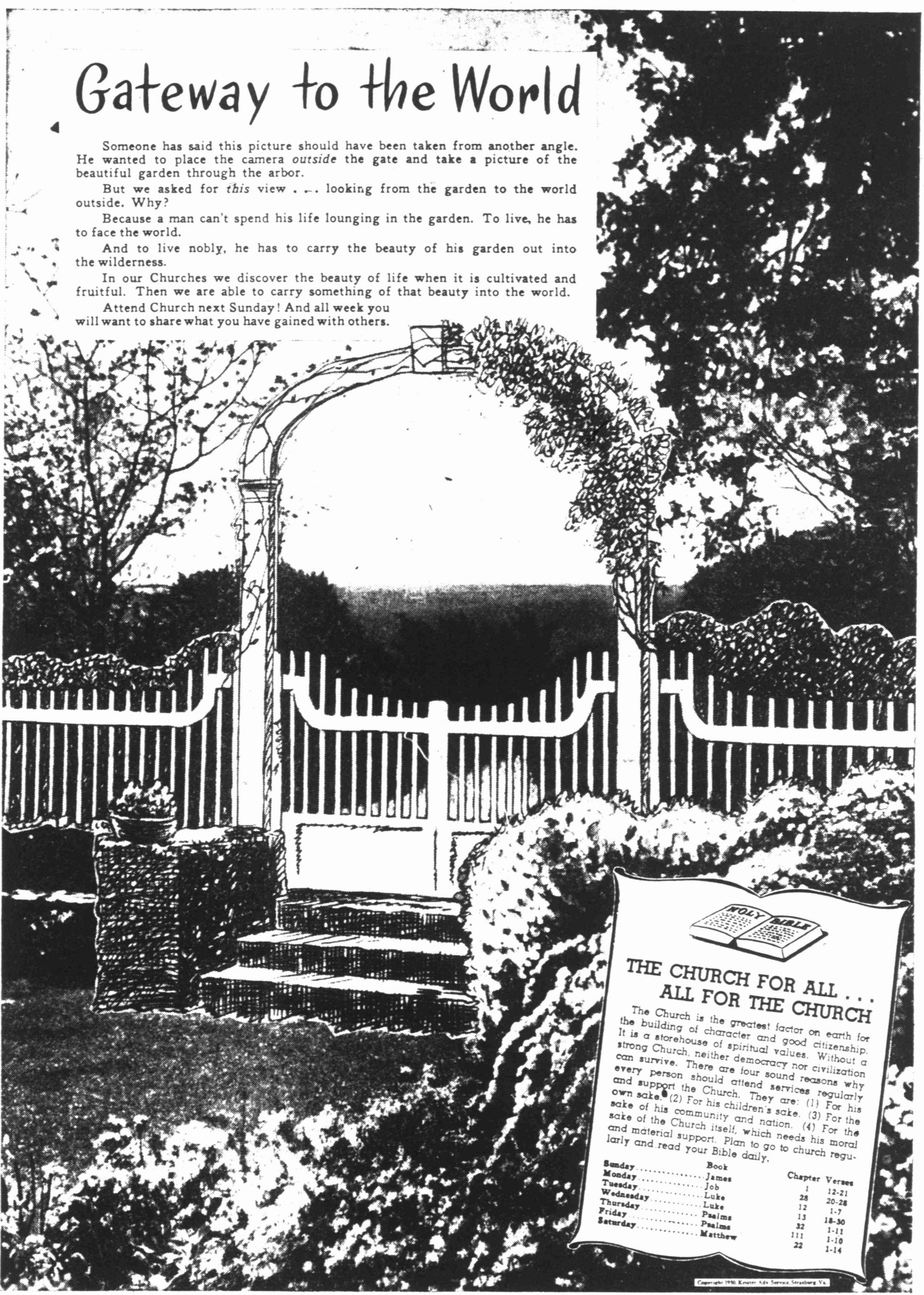

Central-Northwest Scurry County wildcat, eight miles northwest of the town of Snyder, was flowing on different sized chokes to test and clean out before taking potential test and completing.

This well is one mile west and the same distance north of the nearest completed producers from the Canyon reef on the northwest side of the Kelley-Canyon field. It is producing from open hole between 6,775 feet and the total depth at 6,936 feet. That zone had been treated with 4,000 gallons of acid.

On latest reports the well had flowed at the rate of 25 barrels of oil per hour through a one-quarter-inch choke; 40 barrels per hour through a three-eighths-inch choke and 58 barrels per hour through a one-half-inch choke.

Location is 467 feet from south and east lines of the southwest quarter of section 336, block 97, H&TC survey.

**Ellenburger Tester Due C-E Schleicher**

E. M. Wahlenmaier and Morgan, Aikman & Company, of San Angelo No. 1 J. F. Webster is to be a 5,200-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Central-East Schleicher County.

The prospector will be 660 feet from north and west lines of section 5, block 8, TW&NG survey. The project is on a farm owned by Southern Minerals Corporation. It is reported that Skelly Oil Company and Sinclair Oil & Gas Company, along with Southern Minerals, are supporting the wildcat.

The location is seven and one-half miles northeast of Fort McKavett, four miles west of the Menard County line and 16 miles northeast of the Page-Strawn field. Operations are to start at once.

**Wildcat Slated For C-E Runnels**

George Baumgart Company of San Angelo, No. 1 Mrs. Lena Clayton is to be a 4,000-foot wildcat in Central-East Runnels County.

Location is 1,980 feet from south and 1,320 feet from west lines of section 260, A. A. Millican survey. That puts it 10 miles east of Ballinger. Drilling will begin in the near future.

**Reef Yields Water In E-C Fisher Area**

Olson Drilling Company No. 1 J. A. Young, East-Central Fisher County wildcat, two and one-half miles east of Royston, and 330 feet from south and east lines of the west half section 5, block R. W. E. Richardson survey, found salt water in a drillstem test at 5,275-5,325 feet.

The tool was open one hour and 25 minutes. Recovery was 1,620 feet of salty sulphur water. There were no shows of oil or gas. The exploration is bottomed at 5,525 feet in lime and sand and is waiting on orders.

It topped the reef at 5,275 feet on an elevation of 1,818 feet.

**Two Outside Sites Staked In Cogdell**

Two outside locations have been staked on the Kent County side of the Cogdell Canyon pool, which straddles the Scurry-Kent County line.

On the west edge of production and a one-location northeast offset to the Feldman No. 1 Fuller, recently completed extension, Humble Oil & Refining Company will drill its No. 4 Leroy Spires. Drillsite will be 467 feet from west and 550 feet from south lines of section 717, block 97, H&TC survey, and 17 miles north of Snyder.

Chapman & McFarlin No. 11 D. M. Cogdell will be a one-location east stepout from production. It will be 2,052 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 715, block 97, H&TC survey, and 16 miles north of Snyder.

Slated depth for both ventures is approximately 7,000 feet.

**Location Staked In New Kent Pool**

Nelson Bunker Hunt trust estate No. 3 Mary Couis Burnett trust estate, (TCU), is to be a new exploration to the Canyon reef line in the Hunt-Young area of West-Central Kent County, seven and one-half miles northwest of Claremont.

The drillsite is 660 feet from east and 1,880 feet from south lines of section 3, D. R. Stout survey. It is to drill to around 7,000 feet to explore the Canyon reef, starting at once.

It is one-half miles south of the same operator No. 1 Burnett trust estate, (TCU), which has shown flow production, and is now shut-in waiting on storage, to take potential test and complete.

**Kelley-Snyder Pool To Get Five Tests**

Pan American Production Company will begin operations in the immediate future on five Canyon explorations in the Kelley-Snyder field in Central Scurry County.

Three of the proposed ventures will be on the C. E. McCormick lease in section 254, block 97, H&TC survey, and approximately six and one-half miles northwest of Snyder.

No. 6 McCormick will be 1,670 feet from east and 467 feet north lines of the section; No. 7 McCormick will be 1,870 feet from east and 2,867 feet from south lines of the section; and No. 8 McCormick will be 1,670 feet from east and 1,667 feet from south lines of the section.

Pan American No. 3-B J. T. Biggs is slated six miles west of Snyder and 1,295 feet from north and 718 feet from west lines of section 205, block 97, H&TC survey.

Pan American No. 3 Gertrude Adams will be 467 feet from south and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 211, block 97, H&TC survey, and six and one-half miles west of Snyder.

The application to abandon was filed at the Railroad Commission of Texas.

**Reorganization Of Texmass Petroleum Company Completed**

DALLAS — Reorganization of the Texmass Petroleum Company of Dallas into Texas Consolidated Oils, Inc., has been completed.

The action climaxed several months of controversy during which Senator J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas and his Senate Banking subcommittee criticized the RFC for approving a \$15,100,000 loan to Texmass.

The oil firm got \$13,000,000 of the loan Thursday. It will be used to pay off indebtedness against properties acquired by the firm from five different oil companies.

Of the \$2,100,000 of loan money still to come, \$600,000 will be used in the next few days to pay unsecured Texmass creditors and \$1,500,000 is earmarked for rehabilitation of oil wells and for drilling new wells in proven areas.

The RFC is lending \$10,100,000 of the total loan. The remainder is split among two insurance companies and about 20 banks, business firms and private individuals.

A. W. Kincaid, president of the Fourth National Bank of Wichita, Kan., was elected president of Texas Consolidated Oils and chairman of the board.

The reorganization brought together the producing oil properties of Petroleum Reserve Corporation of Dallas, Swiss Oil Company of Dallas, Midway Oil Company, Inc., National Cooperative Refining Company, and the Smith Miller partnership.

At the present time TCO owns 473 oil wells, 73 gas wells and two compression plants. It values its assets at \$44,500,000.

The new loan clears Texmass properties of all other indebtedness and places liens against the properties in the hands of the RFC and the private lenders.

**Operator Changed On Stonewall Test**

The location is in the southeast corner of the northwest quarter of section 42, block 6, H&TC survey. It is slated to dig to 7,000 feet to test the Ellenburger. Drilling is scheduled to begin by June 15.

The project will be 15 miles north and slightly east of Aspermont, and two miles east of Barnsdall. Oil Company and the Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 Calloway, deep dry hole which had some interesting shows, but no possibilities of commercial production.

The 1,300-pound animal leaped out of a pen at the stockyards, thundered across a cemetery, scattered workmen in a clay tile plant, broke two lassos thrown on him, then fell over on exhaustion while playing tug-of-war with a winch truck.
