Indications of the discovery of an Ellenburger oil field in Northwess Martin County have been developed at The Texas Company No. 1-X State.

That prospector, located 11 miles ntroh of the Mabee shallow field. and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 17, block 7, University survey, and one half a mile east of the Andrews County line recovered 4,004 feet of 47.8-gravity oil during a three and one-half hour drillstem test at 13,-112-331 feet.





Costly, Wasteful Strike

The 100-day Chrysler strike was the second longest d costliest in the history of the motor industry. Only 3 113-day General Motors' walkout of 1945-46 exeded it.

Altogether this recent stoppage cost the Chrysler Corration, its workers, dealers and suppliers (including their iployes) an estimated \$1,383,720,880. The 89,000 irvsler hands lost a little less than \$1,000 each in wages.

If one accepted the union's claim that contract benes gained amount to 10 cents per hour for each worker, it ould take five years to make up the lost pay.

Any strike, of course, is economically wasteful. That's cognized on all sides. But the strike nevertheless is acpted as a legitimate labor weapon, a last resort, in dealgs with management.

In other words, we Americans say that, regardless of wastefulness, the strike must be allowed as labor's congest protest against unsatisfactory working conditions.

Yet, because a strike is so costly, we the public likely e to be critical of any walkout which might have been erted or possibly shortened.

DALLAS-(P)-Reorganization of the Texmass Petroleum Company of Dallas into Texas Consolidated Oils. Inc., has been completed.
