





Regan said the reclamation officials reiterated they would recognize the Texas community property laws, so that a husband and wife each could hold 160 acres.

# **Vew Red** Proposals

Two new Russian proposals, one on Berlin and one on ie long-delayed Austrian peace treaty, show very neatly ow hard it is to negotiate seriously with the Soviet Union.

On Austria, Moscow wants any pact to be preceded y Allied troop withdrawal from Trieste, former Italian ort slated to be a free territory. This is demanded as evience of good faith that "under one pretext or another ustria shall not also be transformed into an Anglo-Ameriin war base."

Never before, in all the years an Austrian treaty has een hanging fire, has Russia dragged Trieste into it. Now suddenly becomes a critical point on which the whole sue pivots.

As for Berlin, the Soviet Union has accepted the idea citywide elections but has laid down seven specific contions which must be met before the balloting can begin.

It isn't necessary to examine the full list. The Rusans want all occupying powers to remove their forces om Berlin. They call for abolition of the so-called occuation statute under which the western nations govern their ontrol zones of the city. They ask that "democratic" ganizations be given freedom of activity in those zones

The tricks in these proposals are pretty obvious. If issian troops left Berlin, they'd still be on the outskirts the city in the Soviet-controlled eastern portion of Gerany. But withdrawing Allied soldiers would have to pull ack more than 100 miles to the main western area of the

# Girl Slashed Fatally With Butcher Knife; Suspect Is Arrested

CHICAGO -(AP)- Police reported that a man told them he grabbed a butcher knife, "went out looking for a girl" and fatally slashed a 16-year-old high school junior re-turning home from a church social program Saturday.

Andrew W. Aitken, Chicago's chief of detectives, said Reymond Jenko, 19, on probation for burglary, made an oral statement that he slew the girl.

The victim, Patricia Swartz, a pretty brunette, was slashed, beaten and stabbed at the rear doorstep of her South Side home. She screamed and put up a terrific struggle. But when her father, William,

Edward, 15, rushed outside they found her unconscious and stabbed nine times. Her assailant was gone. Aitken said Jenko gave this version orally: He obtained a butcher knife at his home, stuck it in his belt and went out looking for a girl—any
