## Lynn Gets First **Commercial Well**

Lynn County's first commercial oil well, Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Garza Cattle Company, has been officially completed as the discovery well for a new field.

This well was finished for an official Railroad Commission potential test guage of 244.61 barrels of 42.2 gravity oil. The potential test was flowing through 24/64th inch tubing choke from pay at 8,615-30 feet in the top of a Pennsylvanian lime. Gas-(il ratio was 767-1. The pay section had been washed with 250 gallons of acid. No formation water was developed.

The new producer is in the southeast corner of the county and is 14 miles east of O'Donnell, It is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of the southeast guarter of section 431, block 9, EL&RR sur-

Top of the pay is at 8,615 feet. Elevation is 2,920 feet.

## SW Dickens Slated For Deep Wildcat

Placid Oil Company has scheduled an 8,100-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Southwest Dickens County, three

miles southwest of Spur. Placid No. 1 S. W. Hughes and others will be 660 feet from south and west lines of section 185, block 1. H&GN survey.

According to recent maps on Dickens County area, Union Oil Company owns the block on which the No. 1 Hughes is to be drilled. It is presumed Placid is drilling







Paul Hoffman, foreign aid chief, predicts the Russian ommunist empire will collapse "quite suddenly" within r lifetime.

He sees two factors as decisive: the death of Premier alin, which he expects to touch off a wild scramble for wer; and the breaking away of most Russian satellite untries from Moscow.

Hoffman believes these satellites are developing danrous rigidity in their economic structures. All appears 100th on the surface, he says, because political brutality eps it that way. But underneath, tensions are mounting.

The anticipated turbulence accompanying a change in e Russian dictatorship probably will allow those tenons to burst into the open, says Hoffman.

What he forecasts certainly is a marked possibility. et it wouldn't be wise for the free world to count on anying so joyful as a Russian empire collapse unless and itil it happens.


The Soviet mission has been restricted to its office-living quarters in retaliation for a Soviet crackdown on movements of American licers attached to Soviet headquarters in East Germany.





on a three-man Senate race after a hot campaign that has revolved around the issues of communism, Fair Employment Practices Commission (FEPC) proposals and the 'planned state.

Senator Frank P. Graham, friend of the President who is described by his backers as an outstanding Southern liberal, is seeking the party senatorial nomination in a race that may show how the wind is blowing nationally in some issues. Graham is opposed by Willis

Smith, Raleigh lawyer and former president of the American Bar Association, and former Senator Robert R. Reynolds. Aiming his campaign at Graham.

Smith has stressed the communism. FEPC and "planned state" issues. He has said Graham let his name be used by left-wing groups which later were marked on subversive Mighty May Days at Dunlap's . . .


