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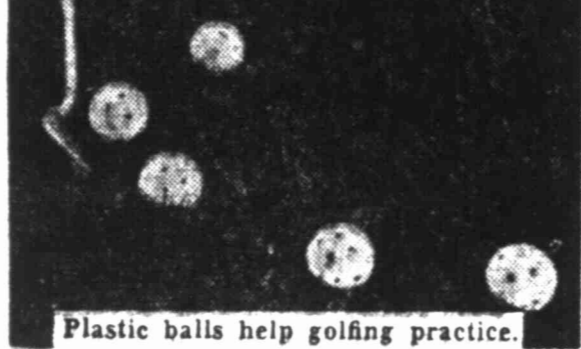

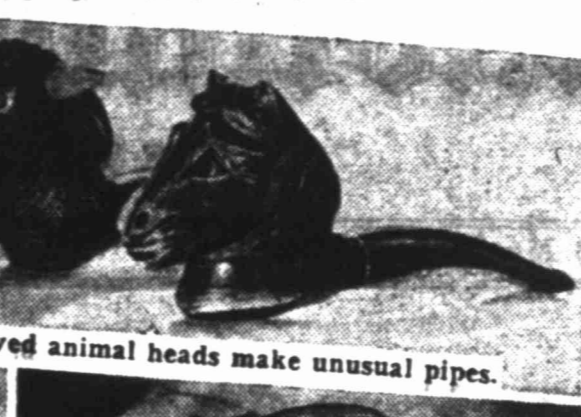

★ THE DOCTOR SAYS ★ Early Treatment Of Varicose Veins Helps Avoid Ulcers

The veins which carry the blood from the feet and legs back toward the heart are equipped with small valves which keep the blood from flowing backward. If it were not for these valves, the blood would press hard on the walls of these veins merely because of the long column which would have to be raised against the force of gravity.

Unfortunately, during the middle and later years of life, these valves tend to break down, the pressure of blood against the walls of the veins increases, and the veins become more conspicuous. This leads to a condition known as "varicose veins."

Varicose veins are near the surface because the deeper veins get more support from the muscle and other tissues around them, which helps to prevent their enlargement and swelling.

Varicose veins slow the circulation. This frequently results in breaking down of the skin and surrounding tissue with the formation of large ulcers, which are annoying, unsightly, and rather difficult to cure. Ulcers, however, do not as a rule occur until the varicose veins have been present for a long time.

There are several ways of treating varicose veins and ulcers and in recent years many of these have had a good deal of success. The use of elastic bandages which support the widened and enlarged varicose veins is, of course, an old remedy and helpful in many cases.

Elastic bandages are also often used—at least for a while—after other forms of treatment. Varicose veins sometimes are removed by surgery, but this may require a long cut and result in an undesirable scar. The

use of injections for varicose veins has proved of value in some cases. This treatment closes the opening of the varicose vein entirely so that the blood must flow through some other vein which is either normal or lies deeper in the tissue.

There are enough veins in the legs so that this does not seriously hurt the circulation. However, at present the use of surgery seems to be increasing and injections decreasing.

Ward Off Ulcers The best treatment for ulcers is to prevent them by treating varicose veins before they have had a chance to develop ulcers. Once ulcers have developed, treatment is aimed at curing the underlying cause—namely, the varicose veins and assisting the ulcer to heal.

Many methods are used. Most of them involve some kind of pressure dressing. Some success has been reported also from the use of dressings consisting of a paste made from red blood cells.

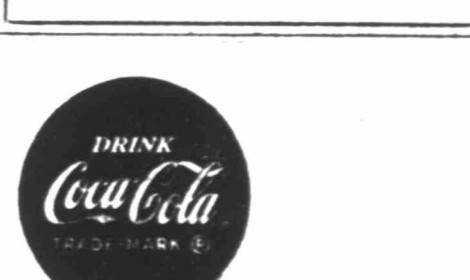
The choice of treatment, however, depends on the size of the ulcer, how long it has existed, where it is, and other factors which only the physician in charge is in a position to judge.

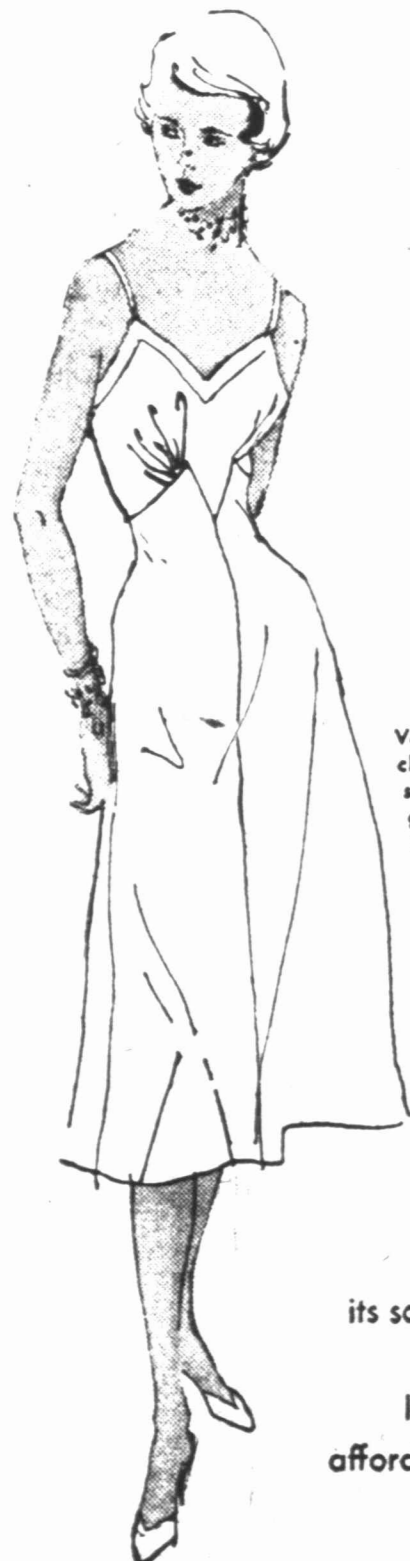

TEEN TALK

Father's Day is a good time for father and son to get acquainted. Some organizations promote this in father and son outings, functions which usually are looked forward to with as much eagerness on Dad's part as Junior's.

It just so happens that there are not enough of these little father-son get-togethers throughout the year. Sometimes the modern father is so bogged down with his social and business interests that he doesn't have time for his son. Very often it is sonny boy who has too many social engagements to spend time with father—and discourages father's interest.

Cool Feeling
Over a period of years, the relationship between father and son has cooled to the point where mother often must accept full responsibility for her male offspring. In days gone by it was as much Dad's job as Mother's to assure moral and social betterments of his son.

Many boys write and complain that Dad is just the man who slumps into an easy chair at night, reads his papers until bedtime and then, policeman-fashion, leaves orders to curtail the activities of the youth of the family. Why doesn't Dad discuss these problems instead of just making ultimatums, they ask?

There was a day when father-son companionship ran high. When father went fishing or horseback riding with his son, invited him along on "for men only" picnics, baseball and football excursions. Today, he frequently leaves Junior to his own devices and then wonders why he is "girl crazy," "moody," inattentive to his studies and aloof to his parents.

All of this boils down to the type of men young women of today must cope with. Some of them are completely selfish, because they haven't learned the meaning of companionship. Therefore it often is left to the girls to do the courting, wooing and even the proposing. Whereas marriage used to be a partnership on a 50-50 basis the man now thinks if he is the wage earner he fills the major share of responsibility.

Take Responsibility
Unless Dad can impress upon his son that he, himself, assumes family responsibility, and that the same thing is expected of Junior when he begins to rear a family, how else will Junior get the point? Women enjoy being sheltered, loved and babied by men. But if men continue to heap responsibility upon them, don't be surprised if the next generation of women rival the Amazons of yore for leadership and strength. If what we want is to make women stronger and men weaker, we're getting closer to it every day, to hear the girls talk.

Many young people never think of going to their parents with problems. In a booklet entitled "How to Solve Your Problems," Robert Seashore and A. C. Van Dusen of the Psychology Department of Northwest University suggest that often young people feel their parents won't understand or be sympathetic. Most parents, they assure, are eager to have you come to them with problems. By talking this over, you might find the difficulty cleared up sooner than you'd hoped.

Others Help
Other persons who can help are school counselors, teachers, clergymen, family doctors and sympathetic adults.

Sometimes you can solve a problem yourself by thinking it out clearly, suggests the booklet.

If, for instance, you need a part-time work experience in order to find out more about the job fields in which you are interested, list the obstacles that stand in the way of your solving the problem. Then list your assets, possible solutions to the problem, and the result of the solutions.

Choose the solution that is best for you (not for your best friend).

Drew Pearson says: Washington rivals Europe in police-state methods; Republican senators eavesdrop on confidential conversations; Senator Cain displays recuperative powers.
WASHINGTON — A sensational report on wire-tapping in the nation's capital now is in the hands of the Justice Department, but for some strange reason so far has been suppressed.
The report, prepared by the metropolitan police, indicates that Washington, D. C., has been going in for some police-state methods ever so opposing in Europe. Two of the worst offenders are leading Republican senators, Owen Brewster of Maine and Homer Ferguson of Michigan.

Questions and Answers

Q—What is the legend of St. Patrick and the sun?
A—St. Patrick died some time in the 5th century. Legend states that over the saint's body a great light was held for 12 days and nights. During the wake, some accounts say the sun did not set. Still other accounts say the sun did not set for a whole year after St. Patrick's death.

A—In general, most of the moisture goes into the ground, though it may later evaporate and go back into the air. Only a small percentage of the water, in a heavy rain, will go back into the air directly, by evaporation from rain drops.
Q—With what important event do we associate the name of George W. Goethals?
A—The building of the Panama Canal. He was the engineer.
Q—Who wrote the Pomp and Circumstance March?
A—It was written in 1902 by Sir Edward Elgar, and is played in England during great and solemn occasions, such as the inauguration of a king or queen.
Q—In which southern city is there a replica of the Parthenon in Athens?
A—Nashville, Tennessee, has the only full sized replica of the Parthenon in Athens, the masterpiece of Greek architecture.

Well, Whata You Know, Red Zone Is 'Democratic'

BERLIN—(AP)—The word "Russian" has recently acquired a new synonym here. It is "democratic." Signs have been erected proclaiming the Russian sector of Berlin as the "democratic sector." Russian-controlled newspapers have adopted the idea. Also, the Russian-controlled radio refers to this as the "democratic radio." This is opposed to the American, British and French sectors of the city, which are designated, individually and collectively, as the "gangster sectors" or the "terror sectors." Those freshly-painted "democratic" signs were up on the borders between the Russian and American sectors of the city only a few days before they were attacked and defaced. Night-time operators knocked down some of them. On others they crossed out the word "democratic" and substituted "oppressed."

Must Be Mad, Runs Away From \$4,000

CHARLEROI, BELGIUM—(AP)—A Charleroi exchange agent has been searching for a young boy for seven years to give him \$4,000. In 1943 the agent was holding the prize money for a wartime "Winter Aid" raffle. A boy about 12 presented himself at the agent's office with the winner number and demanded the money. Thinking him a bit young to walk out with 200,000 francs in his pocket, the agent told him to return with his father or mother. The youngster returned two days later without his parents, but still determined to pick up the cash. Suddenly he turned and ran out of the office and hasn't been seen or heard of since in spite of advertising and police searches in schools.

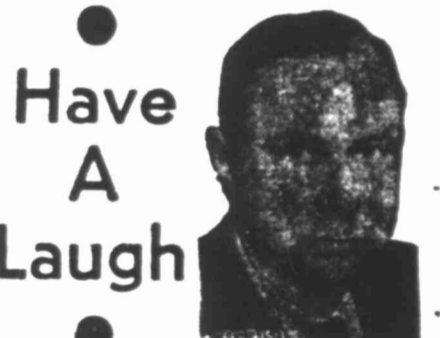

The reason is that South is in danger only if an opponent holds many as four trumps. If East has four spades to the jack-nine, nothing can be done; the slam is doomed. If West has four to the jack, however, East will have to discard on the second round of trumps. This will reveal the situation, and South can pick up West's trumps by leading back to dummy's queen-ten.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

Cuts In Post Office Service Will Remain, Say Officials

WASHINGTON—Post office officials say that U. S. citizens had better resign themselves to having the postman ring only once a day from now on because they think the new cuts in service are here to stay. That is, unless Congress forces Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson to cancel his economy order.
Furthermore, they say, taxpayers had better stop taking for granted all the services which the post office has been furnishing at cut-rate prices for these many years. They think that maybe the time has come for some brand new rules on how Uncle Sam would play post office with the population.
The problem of the post office running in the red steadily has been getting worse. This year the postal deficit is expected to set an all-time high of \$454,000,000. That's about one-tenth of the total federal deficit for this year. And that's why everybody who has anything to do with it thinks the time has arrived to do something in the direction of black ink.

End Of Pact With Mexico To Hike Duty On Venezuelan Oil

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Collapse of the U. S.-Mexican trade agreement—expected later this week—automatically will boost U. S. import duties on much of Venezuela's oil sold to this country.

Opinions differ as to what this will mean to Venezuela's economy, but all agree it probably will hurt Venezuela more than Mexico.

The increase in duties may not become effective until six months after the U. S.-Mexican trade treaty is ended. And, as one official said, "many things can happen during that time."

Monopoly Charged Louisiana Newspaper

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Attorney General McGrath Wednesday announced he has filed a civil antitrust suit against the Times-Picayune Publishing Company of New Orleans, charging monopolistic practices.

He said the suit, filed in the U. S. District Court at New Orleans, accuses the company and four of its officers and employees "with combining and conspiring to restrain and monopolize commerce in newspapers, in the dissemination of news and advertising, and in supplies, and with entering into unlawful contracts with advertisers."

Mysterious Cloud Blankets Pacific

HONOLULU —(AP)—A vast cloud of mysterious origin blanketed 1-200,000 square miles of the Pacific U. S. Weather Bureau Meteorologist R. H. Simpson said Tuesday it might last a day or week.

At Wake Island, 2,000 miles west of Hawaii, the cloud rose to 16,000 feet. At Hawaii, near the eastern limit, it had a 7,000-foot ceiling.

What caused it? Maybe windblown African desert sands, said Simpson. Or an explosive eruption down around New Guinea. Or—an atomic explosion.

"A concentration of ions in the air could result in such a condition," Simpson explained. Ions are electrified particles jarred loose when an atom is split.

The Eniwetok Proving Grounds, where new atomic tests are expected this summer, lie about 600 miles southwest of Wake.

Violence Punctuates Six-Day Milk Strike

PITTSBURGH —(AP)—Sixty-eight struck milk companies carried their appeal for arbitration to the public Wednesday amid new violence in the six-day-old dairy workers strike which has shut off almost all deliveries in a seven-county area.

The Greater Pittsburgh Milk Dealers Association inserted ads in strike-area newspapers which listed the issues and urged the AFL Dairy Workers union to accept arbitration.

Negotiations are at a standstill. Union and company met for ten minutes Tuesday night, then recessed. The union is asking a shorter work day and pay improvements.

A carload of pickets escaped police after hurling a beer bottle into a second plate glass window of a dairy barn in suburban Knoxville. In Westmoreland County, in southwestern Pennsylvania, 14 milk strike pickets have been arrested. They are charged with contempt of a court order banning interference with dairy operations.

State police patrols now appear to be keeping pickets orderly throughout the affected counties of Allegheny, Beaver, Washington, Fayette, Butler, Lawrence and Greene.

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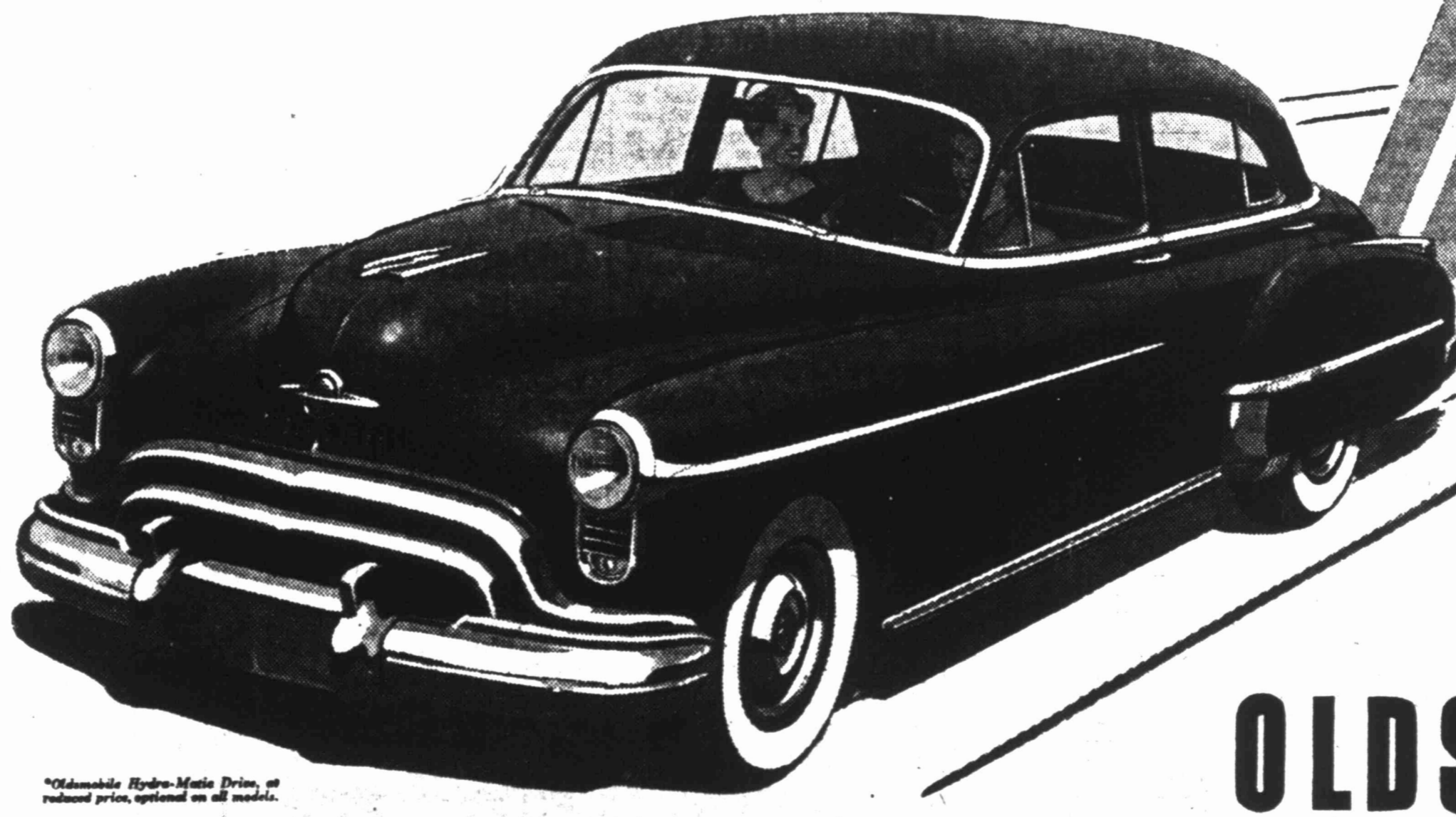
