Colonel Robinson Risner, the senior ranking officer in Hanoi POW Camp for eight years, will speak in the Friona Junior High Auditorium at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, May 16.

At the present time, Colonel Risner is commander of the 832nd Air Division, headquartered at Cannon Air Force

A native of Arkansas, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps in April, 1943 and after attending flight training at Williams Air Force Base. Arizona, was awarded his wings and commissioned as a

second lieutenant in 1944. Col. Risner flew more than

100 combat missions over North Korea and was the 28th jet ace during the Korean War. Then in 1964 he was assigned as squadron commander of the 67th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Kadena, Okinawa, where he flew the F-105 Thunderchief. He was shot down over North Vietnam in April, 1965 and was rescued. He was returned to duty and was shot down and captured in September, 1965.

While held prisoner in Hanoi, Col. Risner served first as the senior ranking officer and later as Vice Commander of the 4th Allied POW Wing. He was

Industries' 3rd Quarter Report Told

The third quarter report by Friona Industries was released by the company last week, and was impressive, in light of unfavorable conditions in the cattle business.

Revenues of \$39.7 million and net income of \$1.43 million or \$1.26 per share, was reported for the first nine months of the company's fiscal year.

This compared with \$31.6 million in sales and net income of \$1.55 million, or \$1.56 per share for the same nine months of the prior year.

Third quarter revenues ending March 31 were \$14.2 million, and net income of \$96,695, or eight cents per share, compared with sales of \$10.7 million and net income of \$588,916 or 59 cents per share in the same quarter of 1973.

Friona Industries had 25 per cent more average shares outstanding in this year's third quarter as the result of its initial offering of common stock in October of 1973.

Operations of Hi-Pro Feeds, and the company's eight veterinary supply stores were running considerably ahead of the previous year.

"We feel that in recent months the cattle feeding industry as a whole has been involved in the worst cost/price squeeze in its history," said Jack Carrothers, chairman of the board for Friona Industries.





Oil Shortage May Cause Shutdowns

Irrigation wells and pumps in drought-stricken West Texas may soon be forced to close down because of a shortage of lubricating oils, State Repre-Bill Clayton [D-Springlake] warned recent-

Clayton, who recently led a large number of his colleagues in the Texas Legislature to petition the Federal Energy Office for a reassessment of the F.E.O. lub oil priority, stated that while he has been assured that a new priority is being written for agricultural use of lube oil products, the priority change probably will not go into effect until June 1. Clayton cautioned that many areas of the state will be completely out of lubricating oil before the new priority gives them any relief.

To help avoid the possible shutdown of these essential irrigation wells, Representative Clayton reported that he is encouraging all dealers and distributors who are running out of lube oil to contact the Texas Railroad Commission's fuel allocation division in Austin to find out if any additional lubricants may be

available in their particular case. The Austin number of this department is 512/475-5491. In addition, Rep. Clayton urged all persons with such problems to contact his Austin office at 512/475-3400.

After conferring with several energy officials and lube oil distributors last week, Rep. Clayton left for Atlanta to meet with the Southern Legislative Conference, of which he is an Executive board member. At this meeting of legislators from across the southern states, Rep. Clayton pushed for solutions which would bring quicker responses to the problems of energy crisis.

One solution which Rep. Clayton suggested that met with a good response was a proposal that the states push for authority to be allowed to handle their own fuel allocation programs. Many of those in attendance agreed with Rep. Clayton that such a program would work better than the federal allocation program because of the fact that the states will have a better knowledge of their own energy problems and needs.



Earnings Told For Gifford-Hill Co.

DALLAS-Gifford-Hill Company, Inc., reported a 48 per cent increase in earnings on a 34 per cent rise in sales and revenues for the quarter ending March 31.

Both earnings and revenues were the highest first quarter figures in history for the diversified construction materials firm.

John R. Hill, Jr., president and chief executive officer, said the firm earned \$2,492,000, or \$0.59 per share, during 1974's first quarter, up 48 per cent from earnings of \$1,683,000, or \$0.39 per share, for the first quarter of 1973.

Sales and revenues totaled \$49,000,000 for 1974's first quarter, up 34 per cent over the \$36,537,000 sales and revenues total for the comparable quarter a year ago.

The average number of common shares outstanding amounted to 4,206,000, compared with 4,222,000 a year

Mr. Hill said that while most of the company's operations registered sales increases over the year ago period, particular strength was noted for the Agricultural and Industrial Products Division and the Concrete Products Division which overcame declining profits in ready-mix concrete aggregates.

"A booming farm economy is causing heavy demand for Gifford-Hill agricultural irrigation products," Mr. Hill said. "And a continuing high rate of construction activity and generally favorable weather conditions throughout our marketing area have kept demand for concrete products at a high level.

Rats Could Present Problem. States County Health Officer

Dr. Paul Spring, Parmer County Health Officer, warned this week that rats in Parmer County could be carrying plague, typhus or other diseases transmissible to hu-

"The State Health Department feels that Parmer County has a real problem, since Eastern New Mexico and Texas counties around us have been found to have plague carried by wild rodents. If it is true of our rats, then we will have a severe problem," Dr. Spring said.

The county health officer advised everyone in the county to make a sincere effort to rid their places of rats.

Dr. Spring's remarks came as a result of a report from the State Department of Health concerning an investigation of a reported roden infestation by County Agricultural Agent Mack Heald.

Roland Dove of the State Department of Health reported that although it was possible to bring about a reduction in rodent populations through poisoning campaigns, such reductions are temporary at best because of the rats' rapid reproduction rate.

"It has been estimated that a given permanent control can only be achieved by altering the environment in such a manner as to render it incapable of supporting large numbers of rats," Dove stated.

The following recommendations were given as ways of controlling the rat population:

1. All rubbish and debris such as sacks, cartons, crates, cans, tall weeds, etc., which may afford rodent shelter should be properly disposed of. Materials which cannot be discarded such as lumber, building materials, etc., should be placed on racks approximately 18 inches above the ground or stored in rat-proof buildings or containers.

2. All loose or spilled grain should be collected daily and either discarded or placed in rodent-proof containers.

3. Sacked food should be placed on pallets preferably 12 18 inches off the floor and at least 6 inches from walls to facilitate cleaning.

4. All potential sources of water for rats should be eliminated if possible. Puddles should be drained or filled, leaking pipes and/or dripping faucets should be repaired, and livestock watering devices should be modified where possible in a manner that will prevent rodents from obtaining water from them.

5. A professional pest con trol operator should be engaged to dust rodent burrows with a suitable insecticide for the control of fleas and other rodent ectoparasites and to conduct rodent-killing programs where necessary. To insure that such pest control operators are qualified and to comply with the provisions of the Texas Structural Pest Control Act, Article 135b-6,

V.T.C.S., only pest control operators possessing a license from the Structural Pest Control Board should be employed for this work.

With reference to Item No. 5, Mr. Charlie Chapman, Executive Director, Structural Pest Control Board, advises us that his office has no record of a Southwestern Pest Control Company from New Mexico being licensed to operate in Texas.

In accordance with your request, follow-up inspections will be made in the Farwell area in the latter part of May or the early part of June. If we can be of assistance prior to that time, please let us know







Colonel Risner's book, "The Passing of the Night," is also available. Both men were held in the same prison and each mentions the other in his book.

Rutledge parachuted into the hands of the North Vietnamese when his fighter plane exploded under heavy antiaircraft fire. For seven years he and his wife Phyllis faced the loneliness of separation and the misery of not knowing what might

The captain explicitly recounts his experiences in enemy hands from the moment of his capture by a vengeful group of North Vietnamese villagers to the moment of his release. He describes the repulsive conditions of the prisons where he was held. including the notorious "Hanoi

He shares with the reader the things which helped him to munication systems among the prisoners, clever mental exercises and pasttimes, deep allegience to the United States, and a renewed faith in God.

Phyllis Rutledge shares her experiences in five years of

mental anguish not knowing whether her husband was dead or alive; and two years of constant waiting for his return. During this time she coped with the added responsibility and pressure of raising a family and making decisions on her own. She also faced alone the death of her mother and the tragic diving accident which left their teen-age son completely paralyzed. The family emerges with more religious faith than they had known they had.



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

Black Resigns Water, Inc. Spot Due To Governor's Appointment

A.L. Black, Friona, appointed to a six-year term on the Texas Water Development Board in March, has resigned as president and a director-atlarge of Water, Inc.

George W. McCleskey, Water, Inc.'s first vice president, has taken over the reins of the organization.

Black's resignation was accepted "with reluctance" by the Executive Committee at a March 22 meeting in Lubbook. At the meeting, Black said that he felt his continuing in an official capacity with Water, Inc., might interfere with his effectiveness on the state agency board.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe announced in early March that he was appointing Black to replace Marvin Shurbet, Petersburg, whose term expired Dec. 31, 1973.

Shurbet, a Water, Inc., advisory director, had served

on the Water Development Board since it was created. He was a past chairman of the board and was serving as vice chairman when his term expired. Shurbet consistently voted strong support for a water import program for the High Plains.

Black, who was appointed to a six-year term, was one of the organizers of Water, Inc., in 1967 and has served on its beard of directors continuously since that time.

He served as first vice president for two years, then was elevated to president at the Annual Membership Meeting in Feb., 1973. He was re-elected to the top post in Feb., 1974.

McCleskey, under provisions of Water, Inc., Bylaws, fills the void left with Black's resignation. He is an attorney, a partner in the Lubbock law firm of Nelson, McCleskey,

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

ASCS To Organize Farm Fuel Network

"Parmer County farmers who have been unable to find fuel for agricultural production through regular channels may contact this office, " said Prentice Mills, County Executive Director of the Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"ASCS and the Federal Energy Office (FEO) will operate a triple-decker back-up system for farmers with fuel problems which cannot be resolved through procedures already available.

"The first back-up solves problems quickly and simply. When a farmer comes to the office and reports that his distributor cannot supply fuel, ASCS will attempt to locate a fuel source," Mills added.

"We will use the second

back-up only when we cannot locate fuel locally," Mills continued. "In back-up two, ASCS will contact either the State Energy Office or the Regional FEO in Dallas. The determination of which office will be contacted is dependent upon the type of problem and where it can best be resolved. The office contacted will then aid in obtaining the necessary fuel for agricultural production.

"The third back-up phase provides quick communications with FEO through the National Office," said Mills. In certain serious situations the county office will call the National FEO in Washington, D.C. From there, the information is forwarded to the Regional FEO by the opening of business the next day. The Regional FEO has the responsibility to resolve the farm fuel problem.
