OUR REMARKS recently concerning the proposed new county law enforcement center were interpreted in some sectors as a plot to promote the removal of the court house from Farwell to Friona.

Now that they've thought it up, perhaps it wouldn't be such a bad idea!

HOWEVER, as the defense attorneys point out, there are other "extenuating" circumstances to consider.

For example, we understand that the sheriff's office closes at 5 p.m. each day and on weekends.

Because of this setup, and the mileage differential between Friona and the county seat, Friona's police department ends up handling numbers of cases—often keeping prisoners overnight—that in reality belong to the county.

Some people in this part of the county have become accustomed to calling the Friona Police Department for all matters of law enforcement—inside the city or not.

It is hard for some folks to differentiate between the city and county, especially when time is of the essence. The main difference, as we see it, is who pays the bills.

We say that if Friona is going to maintain the only 24-hour police-dispatched law enforcement office in the county—open on a seven day a week basis—WHY NOT BUILD THE LAW ENFORCEMENT CENTER IN FRIONA?

ABSDUR? Seems like we just heard a group of commissioners and a county judge remark that this sounds preposterous.

Maybe it does, but it also seems absurd to us to spend \$337,000 on a grandiose law enforcement center that will only be open from 9 to 5, five days a week.

Maybe they could run a legal notice in Parmer County's newspapers, asking the criminals to please commit their unlawful acts during business hours, and definitely not on weekends.

Otherwise, do we have any assurance that the situation will be any different after the commissioners have spent the sizeable amount adding to the court house?

We have a full city block of Friona, right across the street from the Friona Police Department, that the law enforcement center would fit nicely onto.

With this proximity, and utilizing Friona's 24-hour dispatching service, we would feel more like we were getting a LAW ENFORCEMENT CENTER, than the way it's being proposed.

IT'S ALWAYS a hard job to pry any money out of the county for any project that has Friona, Bovina, or Lazbuddie ties.

Commissioners say, "Why if we did that for one, the others would expect the same thing." That's right. We believe that all sections of the county should receive their full return on tax money spent.

While the three sections mentioned above have to have a federal case to attract any county support, did you realize that—

The City of Farwell has no Police Department, no Chief of Police, no patrolman!

That's right. County tax money, paid by residents of Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie, in addition to Farwell, provide police protection, by way of the sheriff and his deputy, to Farwell residents.

Yes, the county provides a continual subsidy to the city of Farwell.

LAW ENFORCEMENT is a full-time business. We would urge commissioners Lewellen, Jefferson, Treider and Atchley to consider these points, before they make a \$300,000 mistake.

As citizens and constituents of these men, your communication to them is the only way you'll have a vote in the matter. It's important that you do so—and without delay.

Services Held Here For Drowning Victim

Funeral services were held here Wednesday morning for Rollando Castaneda, 16, a drowning victim Sunday afternoon at the Friona Municipal swimming pool.

Young Castaneda was pulled from the bottom of the pool about 4 p.m. Sunday afternoon, after which all efforts to revive him failed. Life guards at the pool administered artificial respiration, while the ambulance was summoned.

When the ambulance arrived, its hand-operated respiratory machine was tried, without response. Castaneda was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

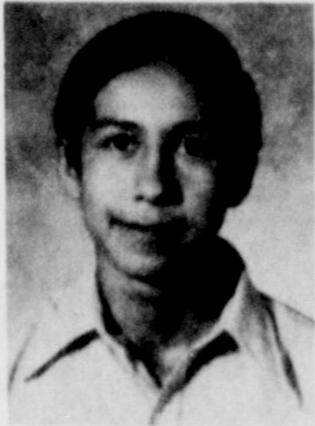
Pool officials said the municipal pool was "extremely crowded" at the time of the accident. Attendants would not speculate as to how the accident occurred. Apparently Castaneda dove into the deep end of the pool and failed to surface. He was the first drowning victim in the history of the pool.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Jose Diaz of Amarillo. The autopsy revealed "asphyxia secondary drowning."

A resident of the Friona area most of his life, Rollando had started to school here as a first grader, then after a two-year absence, returned and had attended local schools for the past five years.

He lived with his family in the Black community.

The youth had been honored at the high school awards assembly at the end of school for having a 90 and above

average—one of only ten members of the freshman class to earn this award. He was interested in football, track and art.

School officials remembered Rollando as a serious student, "quiet, shy and one who minded his own business." He had missed only three days of school the past term—far above the average attendance record.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday at St. Teresa's Catholic Church. Father John Coppinger, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were J.O. Guerra, Noe Guerra, David Ortiz, Tony Reyes, Victor Ortiz and Edward Castillo.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emelio Castaneda; four sisters, Elva Larra de Dumas, Yolanda, Hilda and Sally Castaneda, all of the home, and three brothers, Ramero, Emelio and Pedro, all of Friona.

REDUCTION SOUGHT

Law Center Bids Top Estimate By \$112,000

Bids were opened Monday by Parmer County Commissioners on the proposed new Law Enforcement Center addition to the Parmer County Court House, and the low bid was \$112,774 more than the original cost estimate the court had been given.

Due to the bid amounts being so much greater than expected, the court authorized Warren Pendleton, architect, to get with the low bidder and see if there were ways of shaving the bid amount, or possibly submitting a bid with an alternative that would come within the scope of the cost estimate.

John C. Cornell, Inc. of Clovis was low bidder on the base bid for the project. Cornell's bid amounted to \$337,774.00. Pendleton's estimate earlier this year, based on past year's costs, had been \$225,000.

"It looks like we'll have to have a pretty drastic change from the bid figure. It's running better than \$100,000 more than

the estimate," remarked commissioner Tom Lewellen of Precinct 1.

County Judge Archie Tarter remarked that the commissioners had expected the bids to exceed the cost estimate, but that they had not thought they would be quite as high as those submitted.

"The bid amounts are somewhat surprising, and a bit discouraging," remarked Pendleton, following the bid opening.

He plans to visit with the Cornell company, and report back to the commissioners at their next regular meeting June 24, unless a special meeting is deemed necessary.

One suggestion by the architect was to change the proposed refrigerated air system for the new jail to evaporative coolers.

Other bidders and their bids on the project included W.R. Bauske & Co., Clovis, \$347,759.00; and Cottle Construction Co., Clovis, \$358,540.

July 4th, Maize Days Are Board Meet Topics

Discussion on the July 4th and Maize Days celebration highlighted an otherwise routine meeting of the Friona Chamber of Commerce's board

of directors Tuesday morning at Earl's Parmer House Restaurant.

The chamber is to secure a speaker for the July 4 program. The possibility of having a band play prior to the fireworks display was discussed.

The Business Activities Committee of the Chamber [BAC] has events planned which will be tentatively staged between the hours of 2 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. at the showbarn. A talent show will highlight the BAC's portion of the celebration.

On the Maize Days discussion, it was mentioned that one of the local civic clubs might want to sponsor a motorcycle race. Also discussed was the possibility of charging for the annual barbecue, rather than making it free as it always has been. No action was taken on the subject.

The Chamber's membership drive was reported. Hollis Horton was cited for his work in signing up 11 new members. Current membership in the Chamber of Commerce is 136, the most in recent years.

The Big Farmer, Inc., a magazine published in Frankfort, Ill., contacted the Chamber about Friona's Beef Industry, and how the Chamber of Commerce promotes the industry. Information is being sent to the magazine, which plans to publish an article on the local area's industry.

Two other bidders had been expected to participate in the bid opening, both from Portales, N.M., but they declined to submit their bids.

Each of the three submitting bids submitted a base bid, plus eight alternates, omitting various facilities or finishing touches to the proposed center.

One of the largest alternates, which was termed "Alternate number 8" called for the deletion of equipment in the men's cell rooms. This would have reduced the low bid by \$50,184. However, it was pointed out by one spectator in the courtroom that this was the main reason for needing an improved jail.

The commissioners planned to pay for the proposed law enforcement center entirely with Revenue Sharing Funds, but the current balance in the Revenue funds amounted to \$200,000, with approximately \$25,000 received by the county each quarter from the federal government.

Building Permit Totals Running Ahead Of '73

Five building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of May, for construction valued at an estimated \$135,150.

This is very close to being the largest monthly total for the year, as January's total was very similar but larger by \$350.00, at \$135,500.

The May permits included a new residence estimated at \$75,000; an addition to the Mexican Baptist Mission at \$60,000; and two storage sheds making up the balance of \$150,000.

Through the first five months of 1974, construction permits have been issued by the city totaling \$377,650.

The figures show an 88 per cent increase over the first five months of 1973, which stood at \$200,300 in building permits.

Other monthly records released by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland showed only one new water service added.

A total of 40,083,400 gallons of water were used by city residents, an average of 1,293,013 per day. The dry weather accounted for the good increase from the previous month.

School Has Good Coat Collection

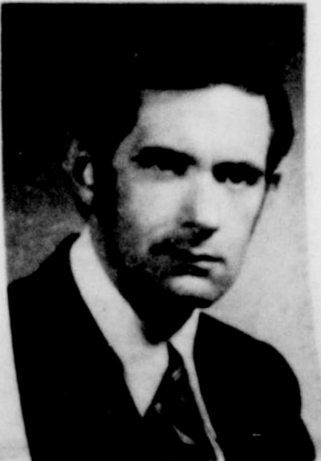
Tom Jarboe called the Star office the past week to announce that the junior high school office has quite a collection of coats, sweaters and other clothing items which have been left at school during the term.

Dr. W. Neil Record, a native of Plainview, will serve as interim pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church, it was announced this week.

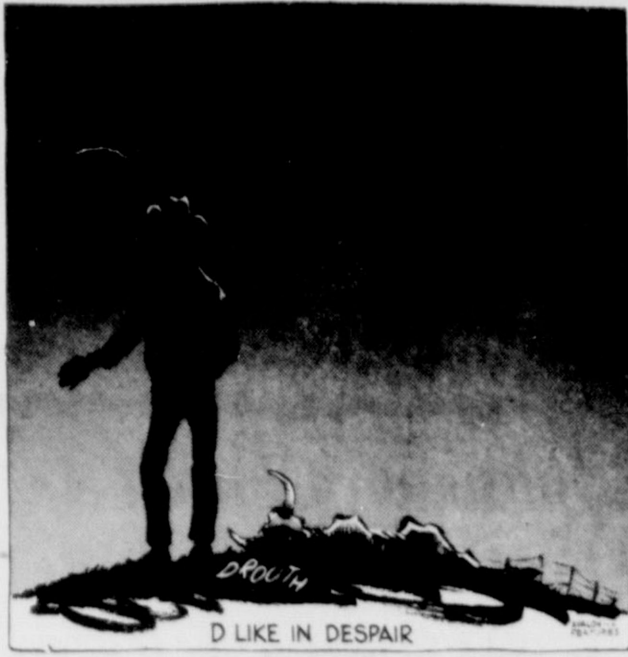
The church extended the call for Dr. Record to serve in the capacity following last Sunday's service.

TDA Enforces Spraying Laws

State laws pertaining to the use of 2, 4-D, a hormone herbicide commonly used to control weeds in grain sorghum, will be enforced in Farmer County this year as in 1973, according to a spokesman of the Texas Department of Agriculture in Plainview.

No herbicide application permits will be issued in the county during the growing season of susceptible crops until the area has been inspected and approved by a Texas Department of Agriculture inspector, according to information received here. An inspector will be stationed in

the county to carry out the intent of the Texas law.

Damage to cotton crops from spraying activities near the Texas-New Mexico state lines the past several years has caused much concern to area farmers and cut yields of cotton in particular.

Officials from the Texas and New Mexico Departments of Agriculture met in Las Cruces, N.M., in January of last year and agreed that each state would take the necessary steps to correct the situation and remain within the laws of the individual states.

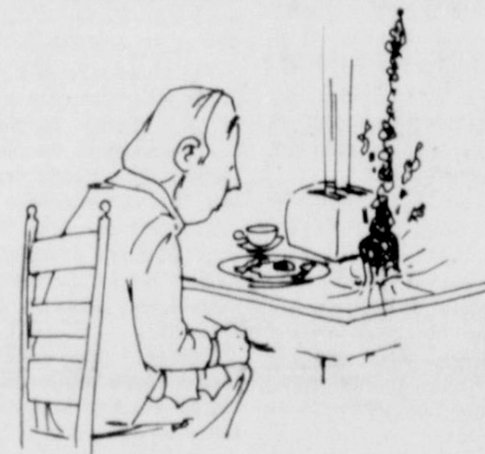

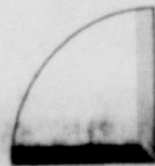

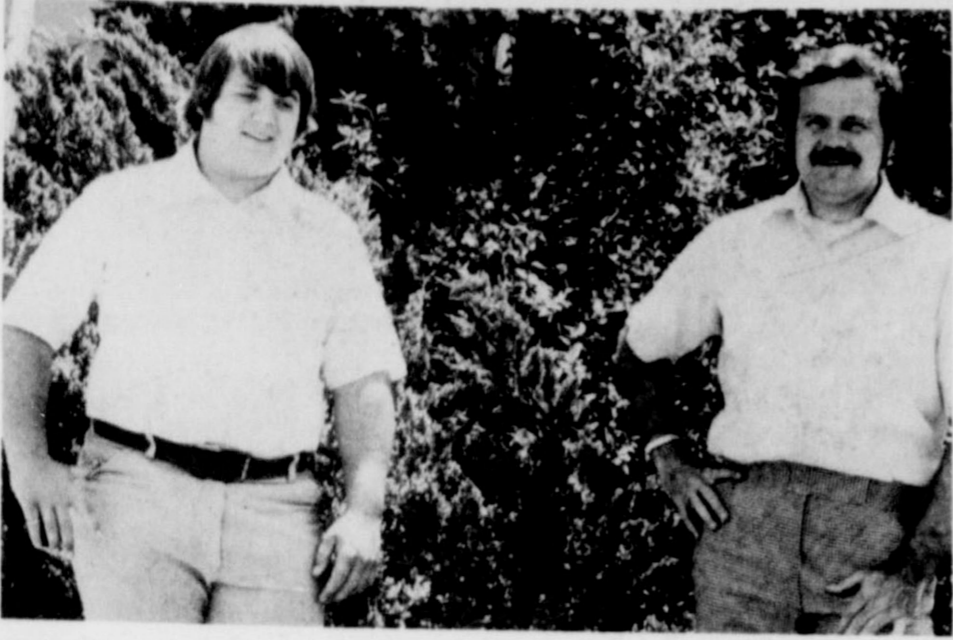

Bike Laws To Be Enforced In Texas

All traffic laws apply to bicyclists. Bikes should be ridden as near the right hand side of the right traffic lane as practicable.

No bikes shall be used to carry more persons than it is designed and equipped for.

A permanent and regular seat must be attached.

No other object such as sled, skates or coaster may be attached to a bicycle or other vehicle.

No package, bundle, or article may be carried which prevents the driver from keeping at least one hand on the bicycle.

Every bicycle when in use at night must be equipped with a

white light visible at least 500 feet to the front and a red reflector or light on rear visible from 50 to 300 feet; and

Every bicycle shall be equipped with brakes which will enable operator to make braked wheels skid on dry, level, clean pavement.

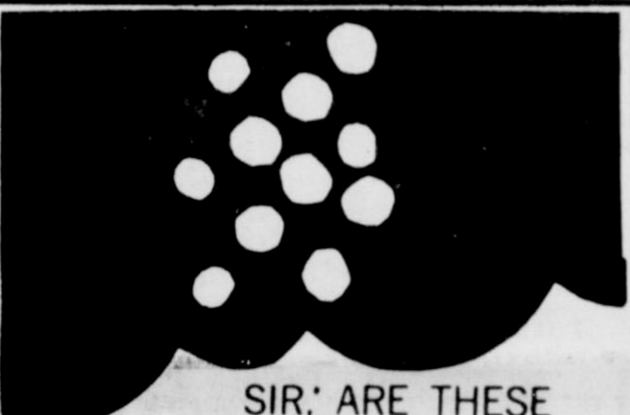

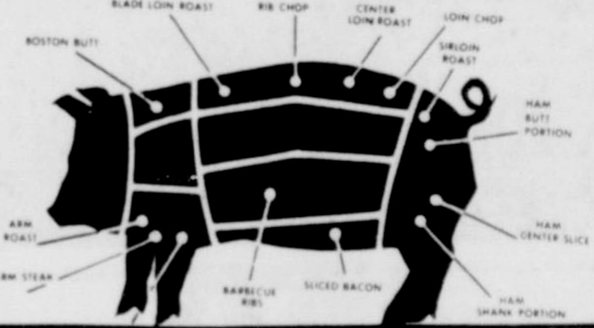

At Home In Parmer County

UP-TO-DATE home interiors accent with wallpaper. Dating back to ancient times, wallpaper popularity has fluctuated in recent years.

Today's wallpaper, however, offers great diversity and challenges for creative imaginations with its broad ranges of color, pattern and texture.

Wallpaper isn't limited to walls. Innovative homemakers use it on screens, furnishings and other decorative accessories. Also, with proper use, wallpaper improves problem areas.

For example, it can "clear" a spacious-looking room, or make a large, empty space seem more cozy.

Wallpaper also can separate or coordinate areas where other means prove impractical.

In addition, it easily covers or camouflages wall surface defects and blemishes.

On the "minus side," after two or three layers of wallpaper are applied to a surface, they must be removed

before applying a new finish. Although time-consuming for an amateur, this process is relatively simple for persons using professional equipment.

When decorating with wallpaper, consumers should understand several terms involving maintenance methods.

"Non-washable" coverings may be printed with water-soluble dyes. As a result, water may damage their designs.

Washable coverings, on the other hand, can withstand gentle blotting with a damp cloth to remove surface dust.

Scrubable finishes resist spots and stains and can be washed with soap and water.

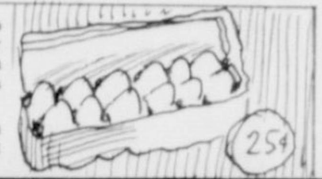
Plastic-finished papers, are scrubable and extra-durable when backed with fabric.

Two other terms concern application methods. Prepared paper can be simply moistened and applied to a wall.

A wallpaper labeled "stripable" can be stripped from a wall and re-applied to another surface.

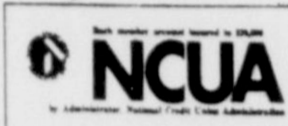

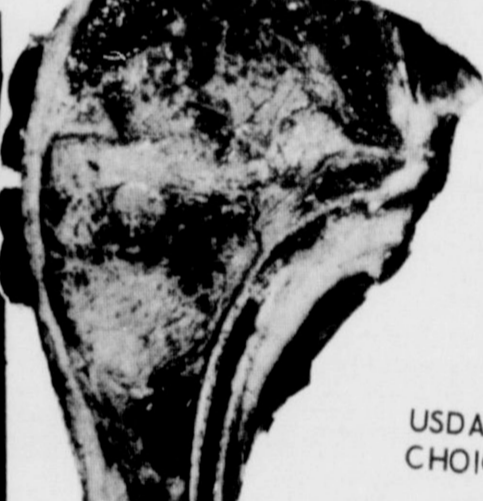

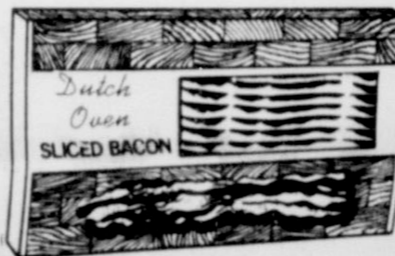

However, the board felt that changing the schedule would involve a number of problems. In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Janet Hand, who taught elementary physical education last year.

Mrs. Ted (Glenda Sue) Procter was employed as a first grade teacher.

Alfred Lemons, Jr. was employed as assistant coach in high school. Lemons comes to Friona from Whiteface, where he has been head basketball

coach the past three years.

He will fill the vacancy created when Larry Dyess was named head basketball coach, succeeding Ray DeBord.

The board approved a \$7,000 budget for the school bands for 1974-75. This is an increase from the budget of \$5,000 of the past several years.

The board voted to hold its annual board of equalization meeting on Saturday, July 13, at the board meeting room. Members appointed to the board other than the school board members were Clyde Goodwine, Charlie Mercer and Cordie Potts, D.C. Herring and W.M. Massie were named as alternates.

Superintendent Alton Farr reported that the school cafeteria should have a balance of around \$3,000 after receiving the state reimbursement check. This is somewhat better than usual, and first time for the department to finish in the black, Farr said.

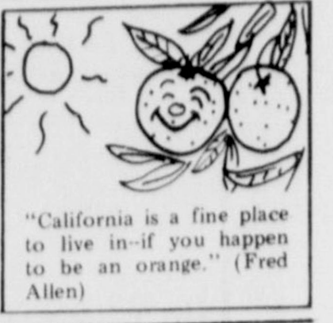
Farr also gave the activity and school budget reports.

Scientists Conduct Research

The Agricultural Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has appointed two research scientists to a multidiscipline Federal-State research team working on hard red winter wheat at Oklahoma State University.

The scientists are Dr. Francis J. Gough, a small grain pathologist who is expert in the area of wheat diseases, and Dr. Owen W. Merkle, expert wheat breeder who will conduct research in the area of wheat varietal improvement for the hard red winter wheat growing areas of Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, New Mexico and Colorado. They will join the research team on August 1.

The multidiscipline research team of Federal and State scientists will then consist of scientists who are experts in cytogenetics, entomology, pathology, wheat breeding and quality.

Assignment of these two additional scientists to the team will permit the Agricultural Research Service and the State Agricultural Experiment Stations to broaden the basic germplasm base and to reduce the genetic vulnerability of this important crop.

A pre-construction meeting for the Highway 214 project has been scheduled for Monday, June 24, at the Friona City Hall, beginning at 10 a.m.

The purpose of the meeting is to promote safety to the traveling public and construction personnel and to discuss the project's plans, specifications and the contractor's plan and schedule of operations.

Rhea E. Bradley, supervising resident engineer, called the meeting, and stressed that all interested citizens are invited to attend the meeting.

project, which includes an overpass just south of Friona, was awarded the latter part of May to Boswell and Crafton, and Austin Bridge Co.

Representatives of the contractors have been in Friona, making preliminary arrangements to begin the project.

A subcontractor from Lubbock was in town last week, making arrangements with the city for water to use for the footings for the overpass.

Construction was expected to begin within 30 days of the contract announcement, which would mean around July 1. The work will take 350 working days, according to preliminary estimates.

Besides the overpass, Highway 214 will be widened from Friona to Hub, and from Clay's Corner to the Bailey County line. It was hoped that the 10-mile gap, from Hub to Clay's Corner, might be included while contractors are on the job, but this part has not been approved as yet.

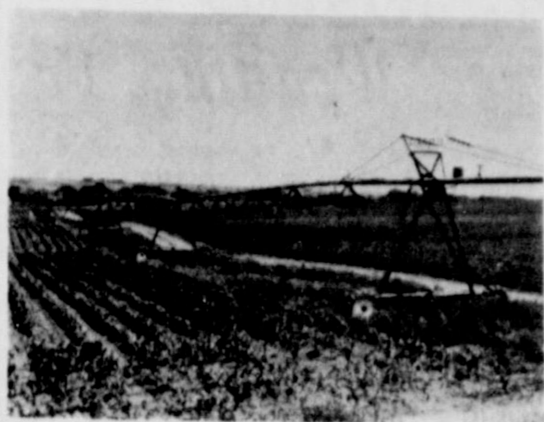

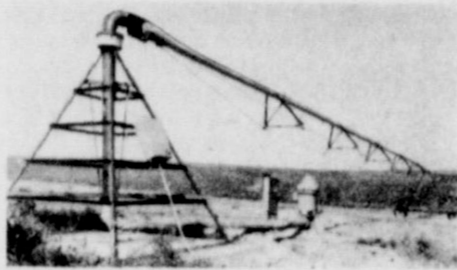

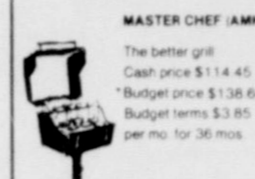

Refreshments of pineapple punch, white cake and mixed nuts were served to those attending.

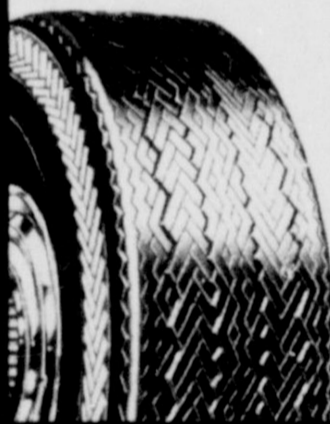
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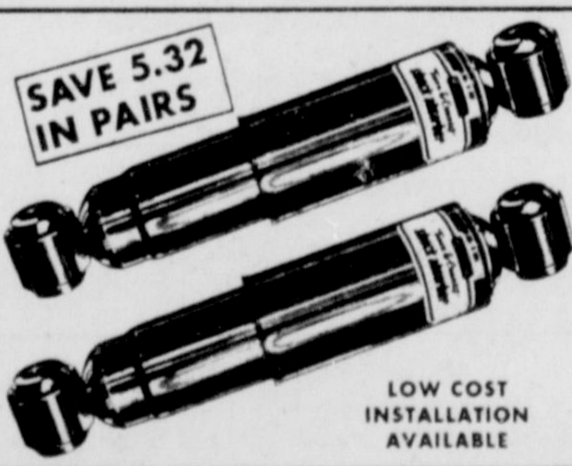
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Co-op Members Receive News Of Record Year

"This has been one of the best years in the history of the cooperative," stated Ronald D. Smiley, Friona Wheat Growers manager.

The current dividend amounts to .1935 per bushel, the highest ratio in the organization's history. This computes to .3224 per hundred weight.

Total assets, as reflected by the statement of condition for the cooperative, amounted to \$3,062,810.52.

Berney Gowens, CPA, presented the audit report on the cooperative's fiscal year which ended April 30, 1974.

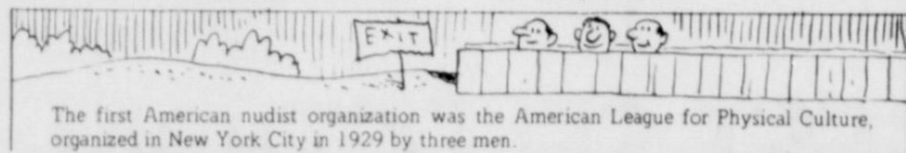
