



COMMISSIONERS will tackle the subject of the law enforcement center again on Monday at their regular meeting.

It will be interesting to see what the low bidder and the architect have come up with since the last meeting, which found the low bid some \$112,000 above the preliminary cost estimate for the center.

It will also be interesting to see if some residents of this precinct may not be on hand, indicating their interest in county funds and how they are spent.

WHAT IS LOW in sulphur, so inexpensive that American families throw out five pounds of it every day, and is so abundant that it could supply all of the electric lighting needs of the U.S. in the future?

The answer...household garbage. If the utility companies can figure out a way to use it as a source of power, it could provide five per cent of all the electricity produced in the U.S. and solve one of our biggest environmental headaches—what to do with all that trash.

Union Electric Co. of St. Louis, Mo. plans to invest \$70 million in trash collection centers, boiler conversion, separation and shredding equipment and hauling vehicles for garbage fuel.

By 1977, all of the garbage from the city of St. Louis and six surrounding counties, 7,500 tons per day, will be burned in Union Electric boilers to generate electricity under a mixture of 20 per cent trash and 80 per cent coal.

This will save Union Electric one million tons of coal a year and get rid of a massive trash problem for St. Louis and the surrounding area. The fuel savings to Union Electric are estimated at \$10 million a year and these savings will increase as the price of coal rises in the future.

IT TOOK two years and \$3.3 million to prove the feasibility of the St. Louis project. It is all the more impressive in that the project is sponsored by an investor-owned utility.

Since a 20%-80% garbage and coal fuel mixture has been used successfully, a project is now underway to get the fuel mixture up to a 50-50 ratio in plants specifically designed for garbage fuel.

It's quite an accomplishment to discover that garbage, which costs huge sums of money to dispose of, may have a valuable and worthwhile use to benefit man.

IT'S THE TRAVELING time of year, and the National Safety Council points out that accidents are the leading cause of death among all persons aged one to 38.

Among persons of all ages, accidents are the fourth leading cause of death, exceeded only by heart diseases, cancer and stroke.

A total of 116,000 persons died from accidents in 1973; almost half of which [55,600] were in motor-vehicle accidents. Another 24,500 died in non-motor vehicle and non-work accidents in public places, which includes recreational accidents.

The moral is—be careful when you set out on your trip this summer. Your family, and everyone else, wants you to get back home just like you left.

## Young Cyclist Eyes World Mark, 10,000 Miles Solo

Friona was rest stop on Tuesday for a 17-year-old youth who's going after a new world's record.

Doug Freedline, a native of Pennsylvania, is headed on a cross-country AND BACK trip from his homestate to California, and then back again.

If and when he finishes his trip, he plans to lay claim to the world's record for solo bicycling.

"The record for companion riding is around the world. But the record for solo riding is less than 10,000 miles," Freedline told the Friona Star reporter Tuesday during his brief rest stop.

The young cyclist left home on May 23. He plans to be in San Francisco within three weeks, and to be back in Indiana, Pa. by October 1.

He averages between 75 and 100 miles per day, and has very little mechanical trouble. He says he carries a complete tool kit to repair whatever might go wrong with his bike.

"If it broke half in two, I've got the stuff to fix it so that I could get to a bike shop."

The cross-country traveler said he uses "flatproof tires" on

his bike, and can attest to their worth. He said he hasn't had a single flat tire since he embarked on his trip.

Although he won't be 18 for another week, Freedline is an experienced camper, and carries full camping gear including a tent and bedroll.

"My camping equipment got a good workout week before last, as I was in the vicinity of the tornadoes in Arkansas. But I didn't lose a thing, and didn't even get wet," he said.

The bike-hiker says he tries to rest every 10 miles or so, and during these rest stops he drinks about a quart of water.

He isn't endowed with unlimited funds, so he's making the trip as economically as possible. He says he expects the entire trip to cost around \$1,000, most of which will be for food.

He's also a bargain shopper. The youth was wearing a good quality long-sleeve shirt which he had managed to pick up at a bargain counter for 88 cents.

"I'd pedal an extra five miles to find a free place to camp," he quipped.

One thing about it, the bike enthusiast has found a way to combat the fuel shortage, or high cost of gas.

# Law Center Subject Due Again Monday

Parmer County Commissioners will reconsider the subject of the new Law Enforcement Center addition to the Court House at its regular meeting Monday at Farwell.

At the last session of the court, bids were opened for the proposed center, but the low bid was some \$112,000 over the estimated cost of the facility, which had been pegged at \$225,000.

The architect, Warren Pendleton of Clovis, was authorized by the commissioners at the meeting last week to consult with John C. Cornell of Clovis, the low bidder, and see if there are means of shaving the bid downward.

It is not known how much the bid might be reduced, nor what routes might be taken in attempting to reduce the cost of the county facility.

Commissioners had proposed to pay the entire cost of the new law-jail facility out of the County's Revenue Sharing Receipts. However, the county's revenue money amounts to \$225,000, with some \$25,000 received each quarter, if the funds continue as they have been received for the past year. Cornell's base bid on the law enforcement center was \$337,774.00.

Included in the facility are new offices for the county sheriff and his deputy; jail cells for both males, females, juveniles and mentally disturbed prisoners; and a compartment for the

jailer.

The sheriff's department has been pushing for the facility, pointing out that the present county jail has been condemned and ruled unfit for prisoners.

According to the bid specifications, commissioners have 30 days from the day of the bid opening (June 10), to either accept or reject the original bids.

Mark is the first Friona person to hold a state position in the Fireman's organization. He will hold this office for a year and will attend the state convention in Houston next June to relinquish his title.

**AN EDITORIAL**

**Arson Cases Become Serious Problem Here**

*A farm chemical office mysteriously burns. Investigators find where two barrels of oil had been emptied in the garage portion of the building.*

*A farmer loses several hundred tons of baled hay which apparently was set fire. The Friona Fire Department quenches the fire. But the very next night another fire destroys the rest of the farmer's hay.*

*An old pickup is driven under the Santa Fe railway bridge, parked and set fire.*

*An abandoned farm house burns. A load of diesel on a truck near the house is completely drained onto the ground.*

These are just a few examples of definite cases of arson which have occurred in the Friona area during the past few months. The list could go on and on.

Friona law officers say they can't explain why the sudden rash of arson crimes. Neither do they know for sure whether the crimes are being committed by the same group.

(Four persons were arrested last month and charged with arson in connection with one of the country fires. They were released on \$2,000 bond).

*Officers point out that conviction of a charge of arson carries a penalty of a \$10,000 fine, or two to 20 years in jail, or both.*

In the case of the Ag-Chem Farm Supply office near Hub, which burned early on the morning of May 26, the loss will run \$20,000 or more.

Besides the farm chemical office, an 18-foot camper trailer belonging to Dale Westbrook was destroyed by the fire. Westbrook also lost several personal items.

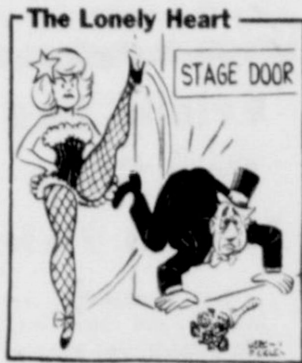
The strange part about the Ag-Chem fire was that the building was looted first, and then burned. Several items, such as an electric guitar, a mandolin, a clock radio, a telephone, a plaque, a guitar amplifier, desk calculator and wall clock, were removed from the building. These items were found later, however. They had been discarded. Some were in a ditch a few miles from the building. The guitar, mandolin and calculator were found later in a wheat field.

*Indiscriminate looting and arson is a serious crime. We wonder if there might be those with information on any of these cases that might help law officials piece out the evidence.*

*Destruction of property must be stopped. Our laws enabling conviction of such charges need to be strengthened. Anyone having suggestions on the matter is invited to call the officials.*

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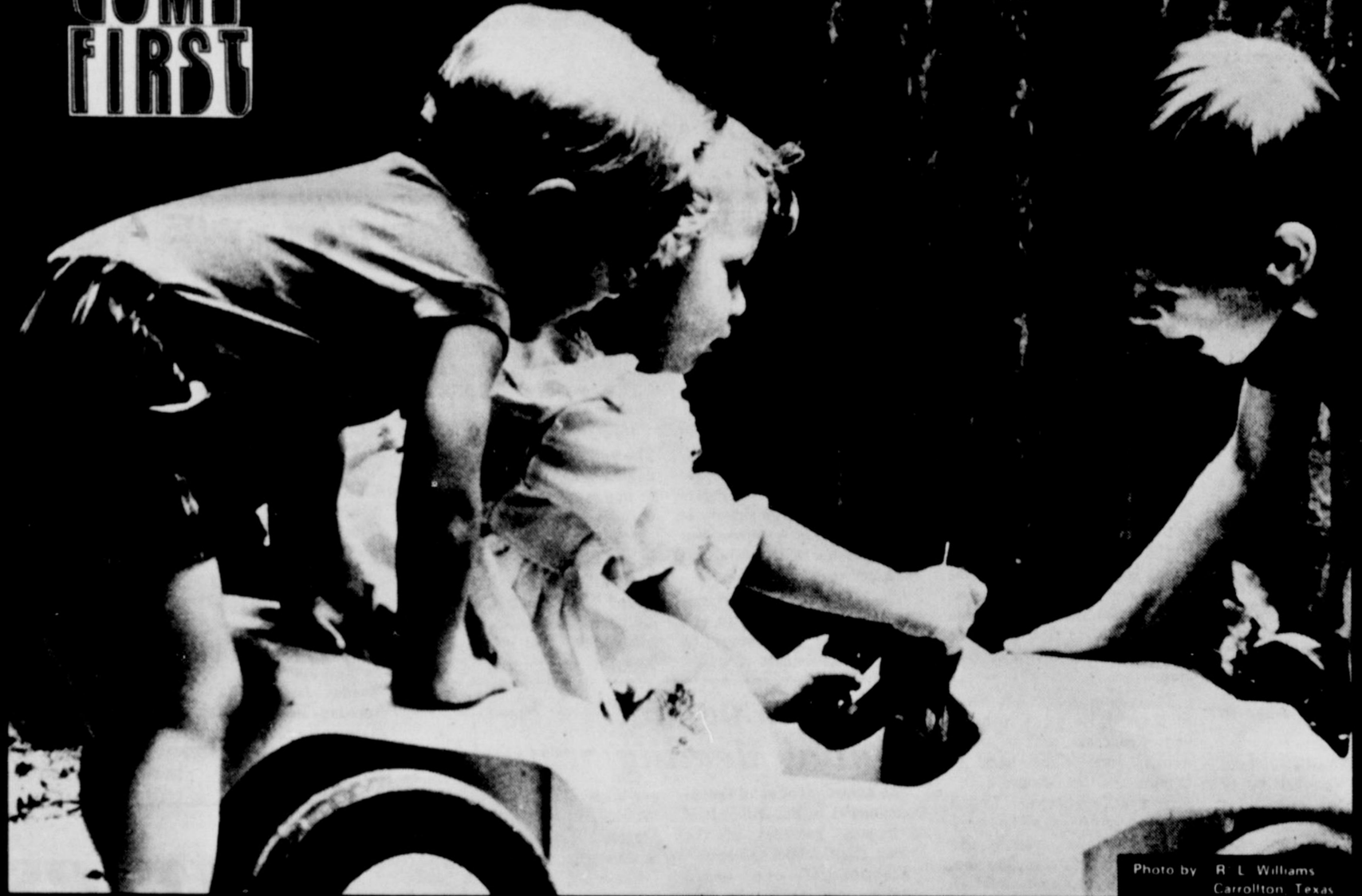

## 45 YEARS AGO-JUNE 28, 1929

A contract was let and ground broken this week for another business building for Friona this week. J.W. Parr will build a 75 x 90 foot building at the corner of Fifth and Euclid, just west of the Friona State Bank building, to house Friona Motor Company, which will handle the Ford agency for Parmer County.

## 40 YEARS AGO-JUNE 22, 1934

An American Legion Post has been organized at Friona. A charter list of 26 names was formally recognized last Thursday when District Commander Bob Lindsay of Borger presented the charter and approved Friona Post as affiliated with the state and national Legion.

## 35 YEARS AGO-JUNE 30, 1939

Another cafe was opened to the public patronage on Thursday of last week by O.G. Turner in one of the rooms in his business building on Main Street just south of the F.L. Spring grocery store.

## 30 YEARS AGO-JUNE 30, 1944

By the death of Mrs. John Gishler, which occurred June 24, Friona loses another of its pioneer citizens, she having located here with her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. D.H. Meade, in February of 1910.

## 25 YEARS AGO-JUNE 17, 1949

Bruce Parr, living east of Friona, in the Black Community, brought in the first load of 1949 wheat to the Friona Wheat Growers elevator Wednesday. About five minutes after Parr brought in the first load, J.G. McFarland arrived with the second load of new wheat.

## 20 YEARS AGO-JUNE 24, 1954

The building fund drive for Parmer County Community Hospital stood at \$17,253 as of Monday, with another \$10,000 pledged, making the drive for \$50,000 at a little past the halfway mark.

## 15 YEARS AGO-JUNE 24, 1959

Water research, recharge and future plans of the High Plains Underground Water District were outlined by Bill Broadhurst of the Water District at the Friday night meeting of the Rhea Farm Bureau. Broadhurst told members that "we have plenty of water now, but the future generations are looking to us to save some for them."

# SWCD Report

When you think soil conservation you generally think farmers and ranchers.

Leon Grissom, chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District says, "Taint necessarily so." Soil conservation includes city people with their erosion and soils problems.

Just recently M.C. Osborn was considering a site for a home. He contacted the local SCS and was given information about the soil on which he was going to build. He found that the soil type would effect the type of foundation he would need.

He also found out that galvanized pipe would corrode rapidly and that properly laid plastic pipe would be better. He also found that septic tanks had particular problems, too.

"It is not only the farmer or rancher that we can assist now," said Grissom, "but about anyone having soil problems or questions." He suggested seeing the SCS in Friona.

This year more strain is put on farmers in Parmer County than ever before. The challenge is to produce more. The temptation is to try to stretch irrigation water further and farm more acres. This sometimes means bringing additional land under cultivation. If this land has severe limitations, erosion and management problems can arise. The Soil Conservation Service offers these recommendations to everyone in the farming business:

1. Farm all land under a conservation plan.
  2. Plant the right crops on the right soil.
  3. Use effective soil and water conservation techniques.
  4. Consider some form of minimum tillage or no-till.
  5. Keep steep land or other areas highly susceptible to wind or water erosion covered by grass or hay.
- If you are farming and run into problems, such as erosion or irrigation-water management, contact the Soil Conservation Service--the trouble shooters.

## Bond Sales Noted Here For County

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$6,144 in Parmer County were reported recently by County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring. Sales for the four-month period totaled \$31,454 for 31% of the 1974 sales goal of \$100,000.00.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$19,212,748 while year-to-date sales totaled \$80,456,814 with 34% of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million goal achieved.

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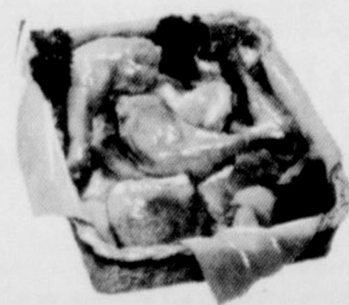

## Campbell Attends Special Courses

Mr. Lee A. Campbell of 409 West 9th, Friona is among the 210 vocational-industrial teachers participating in special teacher certification courses at Southwest Texas State University this summer. The program opened June 3 and will run through July 9.

Mr. Campbell has taught general mechanical skills at Friona Independent School District for one year. Southwest Texas is the fourth university in Texas to offer the vocational-industrial certification courses, required by the Texas Education Agency.

Upon meeting one of the initial entry requirements, a prospective Texas vocational teacher may enter the field with an emergency teaching certificate good for one year. At the end of the year, he must attend classes during summer school at one of the four approved colleges and complete three certification courses,

after which he may be issued another emergency certificate.

The following summer, he will take three more courses. After teaching two years and having completed all six of the special courses and a three-hour government course, he is granted a provisional certificate by the agency.

This summer, 13 visiting instructors and two SWTSU instructors are teaching eight sections each of the three required courses.

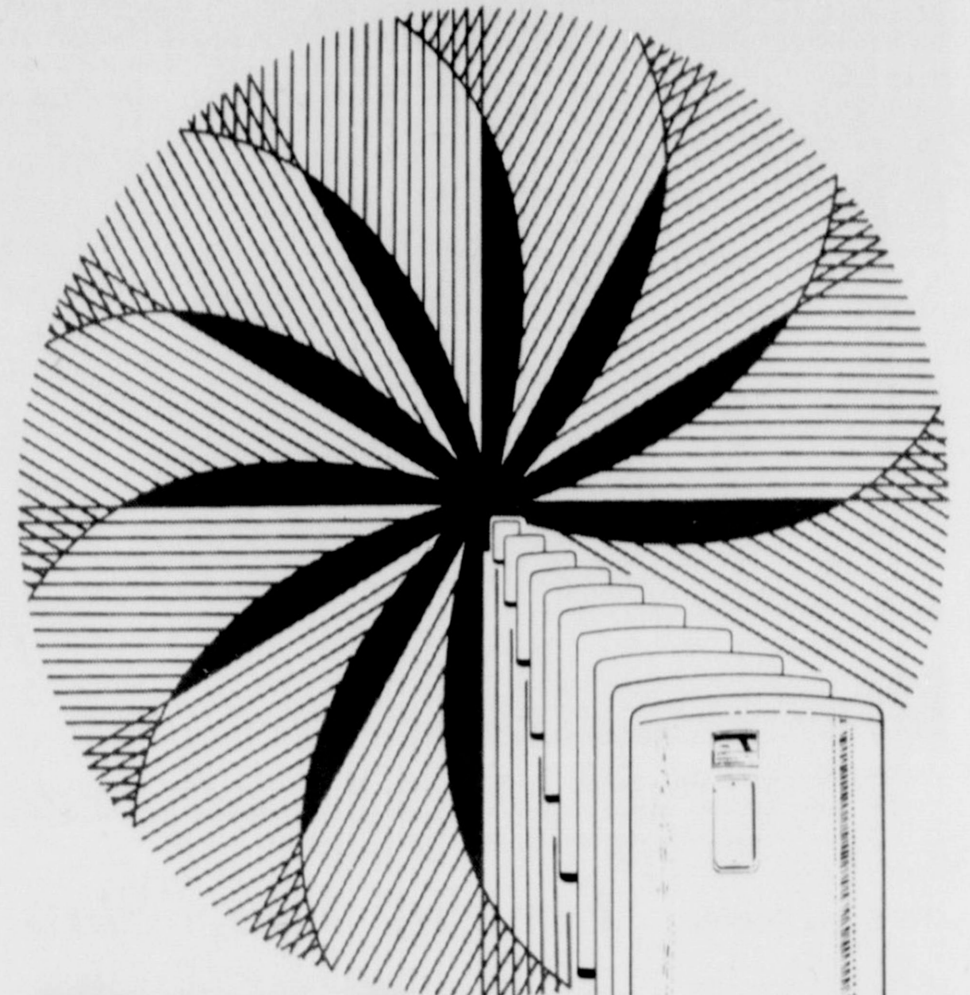

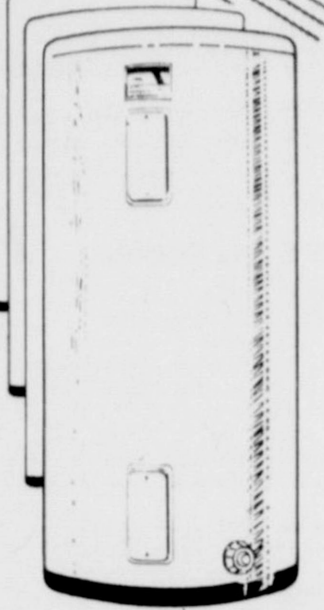

Juan Fuentes and Ruiz were Friona's leading hitters. Fuentes had a pair of singles and a double.

With two outs, shortstop Chacho Arce threw wild to first on a grounder, and then first baseman Delgado let a grounder get through, to set up the winning rally.

The Friona team will go to Portales this week to meet the Paissanos (Road Runners), and then will host the Dimmitt team here the following Sunday afternoon.

The loss was only the second for Friona, leaving the mark at 10-2.

After 12 games, Arce is the team's leading hitter, with 17 hits in 37 at bats, .459. Ismael Iglesias is next with 20 out of 47 (.425). Raymond Delgado is third with 19 out of 46 (.413).

Next comes Roland Delgado, with 11 out of 29 (.378). Lupe Ruiz has 16 for 44 (.363). Frank Castillo has nine out of 26 (.345), and David Davilla has 10 out of 30 (.333).

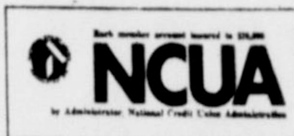

Funeral services are pending at Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona.

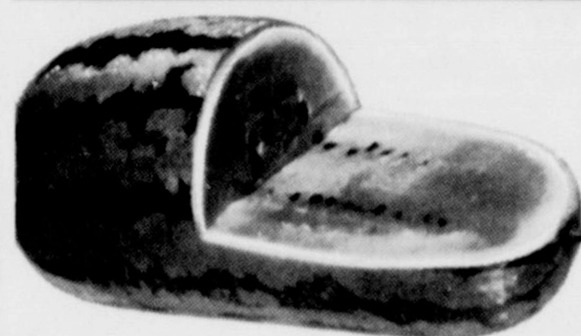

It was reported that the group was particularly impressed with Nyland. Hardgrove gave quotes from the Dallas lineman's speech, as follows:

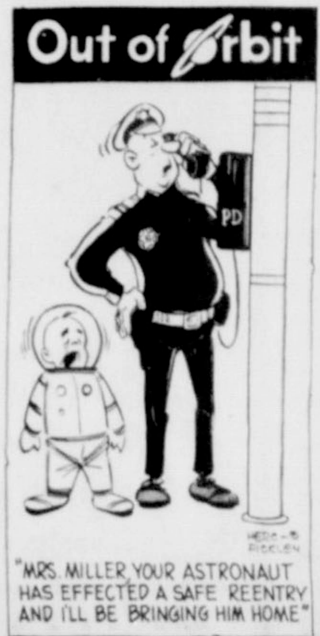
"I have played in two Super Bowls; I've been All-Pro several times, and have made a world of money. But I never knew what happiness was until I accepted Christ as my saviour

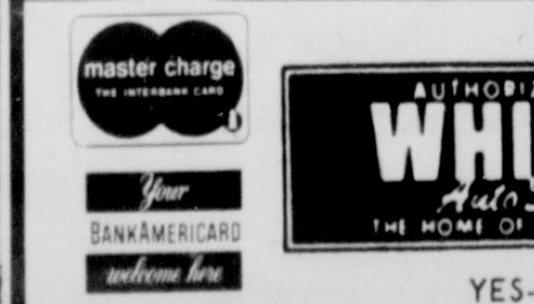

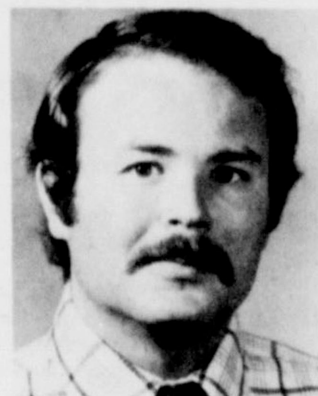
## M. Wooley Earns

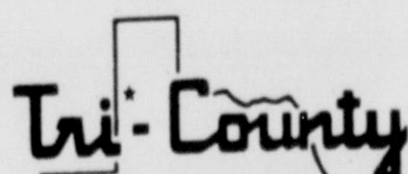

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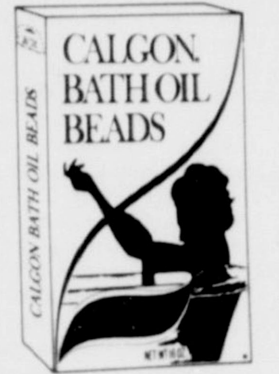

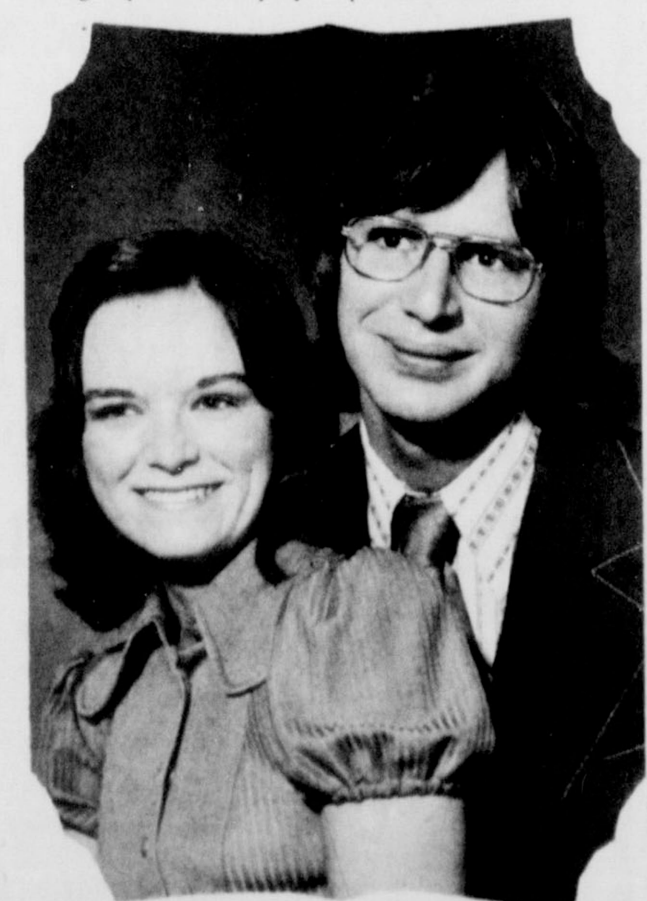

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## Act Not Renewed, Leaders Voice Concern

Leaders of the nation's beet sugar processing industry have assessed the future in light of action by the U.S. House of Representatives which failed recently to renew the Sugar Act under which the American sugar industry has operated since 1937.

The industry's general reaction was voiced by Holly Sugar Corporation President John B. Bunker who declared that the beet sugar industry had "consistently supported a federal sugar program over the years and did, indeed, support the extension of such a program as proposed by the legislation which was defeated yesterday."

Bunker said that there is a strong belief that for the short term, the industry will operate at capacity irrespective of whether or not there is a Sugar Act. The present act expires December 31, 1974.

According to Bunker, the beet crop currently in the ground will make growers eligible for conditional payments and growers will be subject to other provisions of the act through the harvest of their 1974 crop.

Bunker said, however, that it is in the long term interest of consumers to have some system of supply management for sugar. "Before we had a federal sugar program, supply and price were up and down like a yo-yo," he said.

Bunker pointed out that since the difference between over-supply and under-supply in the world is so thin, sugar is an

extremely volatile commodity.

"The price can double or triple in a relatively short time span and then just as suddenly drop like a rock," he said.

He pointed out that history has shown that as soon as supply catches up with demand around the world, the price of sugar drops dramatically.

"A supply management program insulates consumers from such volatility," the sugar executive said. He further stated that sugar is now in tight supply around the world. He also said that 80-90% of the world's sugar is under management programs.

The domestic beet sugar industry's capacity at today's consumption levels can take care of approximately 30 to 35% of this country's total consumption.

"American farmers will be quick to recognize the need and opportunity for increased American production with all of the restrictions and other impingements of the sugar program now removed," he declared.

"However, companies might be hesitant to commit heavy capital for expansion without some assurance that added production would not find itself competing with sugar produced in foreign areas where wages are below those received by sugar workers in this country," Bunker said.

He reiterated that a supply management system would be in the long range interest of consumers by inducing growers to make further commitments for increased production.

## Arctic Pipeline Adds To Economy

The Arctic Gas pipeline from Alaska's Prudhoe Bay and Canada's Mackenzie Delta to the "Southern Forty-Eight" will result in thousands of new jobs in the U.S. and a several billion dollar boost to the American economy, delegates to the Western Conference of Public Service Commissions were told recently.

The Arctic Gas representatives noted that the 2600-mile Arctic Gas pipeline would be the largest construction project in the history of private enterprise, but also emphasized that several billions more are planned to be spent on three companion facilities to take the gas from the U.S./Canadian border to American consumers.

Speaking to the group were Vernon L. Horte, President of Canadian Arctic Gas Pipeline Limited, and William W. Brackett, Vice President and General Counsel of Alaskan Arctic Gas Pipeline Company, and Canadian Arctic Gas Pipeline Limited.

The Arctic Gas representatives described to the Commissioners expressions of support for the project by Canadian authorities and said that the Arctic Gas pipeline was just as valuable to Canada as to America.



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
