Twenty-three years ago the tax story of Henry Suburban first appeared in a Tax Foundation, Inc. publication. Periodically, requests have been made to update this popular feature. Herewith, the tax story of Henry's son.

"Henry Suburban, Jr., awakes on a dark gray morning in the bedroom of his \$30,000 house (annual property tax, \$700). He turns on the light (monthly electric bill, \$20; taxes over \$1).

Before Henry leaves for work he checks his wallet to make sure he has enough money for a new pair of tires (price \$52; tax, \$8.30). He sees that his driver's license (\$8) will soon need renewal. As he goes out he reminds his wife to get a license for the dog (\$2). He jumps into his car (\$3,000 cost; plus taxes, \$370), and remembers he has to buy gasoline (37 cents per gallon, including tax of 13 cents) before he reaches the



Benefits To Be Increased

The second part of a two-step increase in monthly social

security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to William Ent, social security field representative in Clovis, N.M.

A seven per cent increase was included in checks beginning in April. Since the total increase over the amounts received before April is no more than 11-per cent of which seven-per cent has already been applied, the amount of the increase to appear in the July 3 checks will be slightly less than four-per cent of the benefits received on May 3 and June 3.

"The increase will enhance the financial security of over 1,035 Parmer County residents, Ent said. "People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically."

For 1974 the amount of yearly earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.85 per cent each on covered earnings, and the rate for self-employed people drops to 7.9 per cent.

Native grass pastures in the northern half of the county are still as brown as they were after frost last fall. There has not been enough rainfall to green up even careless weeds or Johnson grass.

Irrigation water management is very necessary right now because our crops are using maximum amounts of water. Good management is needed to apply an adequate amount of water on each crop at the right time. Tail water systems are proving their worth during this peak water use season. Some producers would not be able to keep up with their irrigation without tailwater pits.


The seminar will be held May 8-10, 1975.



International Harvester Has Meeting In Amarillo

U.S. farm income will level off "at a good high level," an International Harvester Co. executive predicted recently in

And crop prices should remain strong "at a slightly lower level" that will benefit livestock feeders "who are having a rough time right now," J.P. (Pat) Kaine, president of the IH's Agricultural/Industrial Equipment Division, told 400 IH dealers and customers at a meeting at Villa Inn.

Twenty-one Friona men attended the meeting. They were: Dub Anthony, Raymond Schueler, A.L. Black, Deon Awtrey, Clarence Martin, Martin. Jerry Lawrence Brownd, Robert Neelley, Darrel Simpson and Harry

Also, Bert Williams, Clarence Monroe, Gary Brown, Dale Cary, D.L. Carmichael, Leon Ware, Bill Carthel, Jerry Cass, Andy Hurst, Travis Graves and Ron Cain

"We see a continuing and increasing demand for U.S. meat both here and abroad," Kaine said as he expressed optimism about the future of the U.S. agricultural economy because of population growth, particularly overseas where millions of new customers will have increasing purchasing

This year, he said, International Harvester is producing 15 to 20 per cent more finished machines and 50 per cent more service parts than last year, but is still faced with "serious shortages" of both.

To help alleviate the situation, Kaine said, his company has recalled IH people from retirement to expedite parts from suppliers, is buying at premium prices to keep assembly lines going, is restricting exports to only 1.8 per cent of total production, and is increasing capital expenditures for expanded production. He cited a \$14 million investment, announced just last week, which would increase Farmall tractor production by one-third.

The U.S. will export \$20 billion worth of agricultural products this year, nearly 20% of the nation's total exports, Kaine said, and "that's going to buy us a lot of petroleum and other products we must import to sustain our high standard of

Commenting on foreign tractors being sold in the U.S., Kaine said his company has never sought import restrictions as protection against foreign competition.

"If we can't build a better machine and provide better service to the U.S. farmer than they can, we don't deserve your

business," he declared. Despite the fact that







Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U.S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Mrs. Mabry. "For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

GSPA Leader Decries Milo

Crop Outlook

"High Plains crops have been well seasoned this year-peppered with hail, salted with isolated floods and baked to a crisp by the driest year in recent history. They lack the important topping of anhydrous ammonia," said Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board in Lubbock, Texas.

"To make matters worse," he continued, "area crops are being sampled by grub worms and spider mites, with midge and greenbugs standing by awaiting their turn."

Harp painted a dismal picture of crop conditions in an area that normally produces 25 percent of the nation's grain sorghum. He said that much of the dryland area has not yet been planted and is now crowding the planting deadline.

Harp said, "Unless crop conditions improve throughout the entire area, even irrigated crops will produce far below their normal averages."

"With fertilizer prices up 300% over the same time last have been better off by far to never have planted a row in 1974," stated A.W. Anthony, Jr. of Friona, a GSPA official.



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
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
