WASHINGTON --- (AP) The National Production Authority Thursday banned hoarding of 55 scarce materials essential to defense

and civilian production. The order makes it illegal for businessmen, consumers or householders to accumulate these products in excess of the "reasonable demands." It also specifically prohibits acquiring the products for resale at prices in excess of prevailing market prices-a provision

aimed at "black marketing." The 55 items include cement, softwood lumber and plywood, paper and paperboard, cast iron soil pipe, and a long list of metals and chemicals.

Any violation of the order is punishable by up to \$10,000 fine and a year's imprisonment.

The anti-hoarding decree extends and re-enforces an earlier NPA inventory control order which applied only to business and industry and covered only 26 materials.

(AP)-Battered by waves of Communist-led Vietminh attackers, French forces Thursday withdrew from two outposts of their shrinking North Indochina frontier salient. It looked like the first phase of the power. long expected Vietminh general offensive.

After a hard-fought battle, the outnumbered French garrison at Binhlieu, 35 miles southwest of

Moncay, withdrew and joined a relief column. During the battle the relief column itself had briefly reoccupied the post. Most of the garrison escaped, a communique reported.

At the same time, French troops pulled back several miles on the extreme western flank of the salient. They abandoned the outpost at Chauson, 10 miles northwest of the key French position at Tienyen.

The renewed attacks by the Communist-led Nationalists on the frontier salient coincided with other Vietminh drives north of Hanoi. A French military spokesman said these attacks were stopped, but he admitted the first phase of the big

French Give 19Communist Up Outposts Divisions Set For Big Push

TOKYO-(AP)-United Nations forces manning the 150-mile defense line across Korea's midsection braced Thursday against the expected flood of massed Red man-

General MacArthur predicted that more than 19 Red divisions-up to 190,000 men-would rush against his tightened new lines in the next two weeks.

The UN commander said Communist China has mobilized its "war effort on a

national scale."

In his war summary, Mac-Arthur said the last known location of the 19 divisions, which compose the Chinese Communist Fourth Field Army, placed them in a position to hit the Eighth Army sometime between January 1 and 10. He said there were six Chinese corps in the area and that limited attacks in lesser strength of one or more armies (corps) could be launched at any time, but a coordinated attack could be expected by the tenth of next month.

"The character of a major mili tary effort by the Chinese Communist government, though initially masked under the treacherous ruse of a "volunteer participation," is only too apparent in the deplo ment of all elements of the Third and Fourth Field Armies, which represent two out of the five field armies constituting the entire military structure of China." the communique said.



All the companies have changed heir corporate forms since April, 1939, when the suit started.





There were three phases of the withdrawal. General Almond said the corps entered phase one December 15. That day the First Marine Division completed loading on the ships. At that time, the defensive arc extended roughly \$,000 yards

from the beach. Hamhung, which had been the

corps command post location, was evacuated. Yonpo airfield was vacated by the First Marine Air Wing on December 15 also, but still was included in the defense perimeter because it was needed to carry out supplies and troops.

The ROK (Republic of Korea) Third Division sailed south directly from Songjin. The rest of the ROK troops were cleared from Hungnam

On December 20, the defense perimeter was reduced to phase two proportions with a two-divisionfront-the Third Division on the left flank and the Seventh on the right. Yonpo Airfield was used to ship out troops and supplies until December 18. In an eight-day period ending December 18, smaller troop units totaling 2,500 men and several tons of supplies were sent out of

The U.S. Seventh Division was on board ship by December 22 as the Third Division took the defense line set for phase three.
