## Dimmitt Man Jailed In Kidnapping

(From the Castro County News)  
Russell Lee Curry, a 31-year-old Dimmitt farm laborer remained in Castro County jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond at presstime on charges of aggravated kidnapping in connection with the abduction-shooting of a seven year old Dimmitt girl last Thursday. County Justice of the Peace Mary Jo Smith set Curry's bond Friday.

Curry was accused of kidnapping Diana Dominguez, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Dominguez of Dimmitt about 7:20 p.m. last Thursday as the child was walking to her home from her grandparents home with some other children.

County Sheriff Jack Cartwright reported that the girl was forced into the car, then driven about two miles south of Lazbuddie where she was shot in the upper abdomen with a 22 caliber pistol and pushed from the car on a county road. She was apparently left for dead at the scene.

The child managed to walk to the Terry Parham farm about a mile from the scene of the incident and Parham drove her to Muleshoe where she

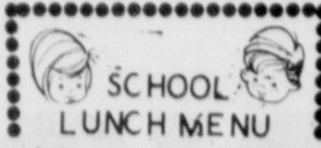
received emergency medical treatment before being transferred to Lubbock Methodist Hospital.

She was reported to be in fair condition at the hospital at presstime.

According to Cartwright, Curry was arrested late Friday afternoon when he went to South Elementary to pick up his children. "We are still investigating the incident and plan to talk to the other children who were walking with the child at the time of the abduction," said Cartwright. "I have no idea as to motive," he added.

The Parmer County sheriff's office is also continuing its investigation into the incident.

"Parents should remind their children not to get into cars with strangers," Cartwright pointed out. "A word of caution now may avert a tragedy later," he added.

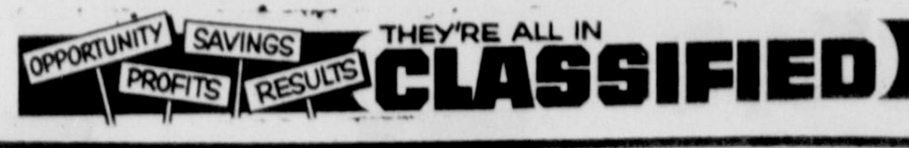

**IN SPITE OF SETBACKS**

**Friona Industries' Report Reflects Company Growth**

Friona Industries, Inc. today reported net income of \$1,173,761, or \$1.00 per share, on revenues of \$50.3 million for its 1974 fiscal year ended June 30.

This compared with net income of \$1,951,748, or \$1.95 per share, on revenues of \$41.4 million in the prior year.

The Company had about 17 per cent more average shares outstanding in fiscal 1974 as the result of its initial offering of common stock in October 1973.

"The Company's past fiscal year was characterized by some of the most abrupt and

disruptive changes that our industry has ever encountered," said Jack Carrothers, president.

"Our basic operating strengths and diversification helped the Company to cushion partially the severe shocks which caused major problems for the cattle industry," he explained.

"Revenues and operating income from four of our five primary lines of business showed improvement over last year," stated Carrothers. Manufactured feed, animal health supplies, custom cattle

feeding and grain all had higher revenues and operating income, he added.

A record tonnage of feed was produced at the Company's computer controlled milling facility in Friona. Manufactured feed accounted for 29 per cent of revenues and 42 per cent of operating income in fiscal 1974, compared with 21 per cent and 22 per cent, respectively, in the prior year.

Two new Hi-Pro Veterinary Supply stores were opened during the year, bringing the Company's total to nine stores in four states, and sales of animal health supplies were the best ever.

"Management expects that these two segments of our business will continue to grow in importance, both in revenues and net income," said Carrothers.

The Company's two cattle feedlots averaged in excess of 90 per cent of their 67,000-head capacity during the fiscal year.

"Custom cattle feeding revenues and operating income also climbed to record levels, as did our grain operations," he said.

"Company-owned cattle sales were primarily responsible for lower net income than in the previous year," said Carrothers. "This was particularly evident in the third and fourth quarters of our fiscal year when cattle prices continued to decline."

In fiscal 1974 the Company sold approximately 19,000 head of cattle for an average per head loss after inventory write-down but before interest and taxes of \$40.53 a head.

During the fourth quarter the Company sustained a net deficit of \$260,667, or 21 cents per share, on revenues of \$10.6 million as the result of depressed cattle prices. This compared with net income of \$394,647, or 39 cents per share, on revenues of \$9.8 million in the fourth quarter of last year.

He explained that the total beef supply/demand/price cycle has been interrupted in the past year by the price freeze and price controls, high grain exports, a trucker's strike, high grain prices, unlimited beef imports, high interest costs and other inflationary and unstable economic conditions for the industry.

"Fewer cattle are in the nation's feedlots each month, a trend that has been going on for more than a year," said Carrothers. "This reflects the fact that cattle feeders cannot continue to operate at a loss on each head they market."

"In the coming months two factors will become more evident: There will be less quality beef available for market, thus a lesser average consumption of choice beef, or the average family will eat a lower quality beef, an alternative with which I believe most people will not be satisfied," concluded Carrothers.

**Cycle-Car Accident Leaves Two Killed**

Two persons were killed as the result of a crash involving an automobile and two motorcycles 1.1 miles east of Farwell on U.S. Highway 84 early last Sunday morning.

Killed were William Lafayette Davis, 15, of Snyder, who was on one of the motorcycles, and Alfredo Macias Cardona, about 30, a passenger in the car.

Passengers on the other cycle, David Alvin Davis, 19, and his wife Delores, 16, both sustained broken left legs. Officers said the car, driven by Victor Manuel Arzola, 24, of Muleshoe, swerved across the two east-bound lanes, across the median on the divided highway, and hit the two cycles.

The first cycle hit the car's

left side, and the second hit the passenger side.

The car, with the driver and passenger, were located several miles from the scene of the accident, near Lariat, about an hour later. A motorist took Cardona to the hospital at Muleshoe, where he was dead on arrival.

The Davises were enroute to Tucumcari, N.M., to visit Mrs. Davis' parents. Officers said the youth who was killed was riding a 100 cc Suzuki.

David Davis and his wife were hospitalized in Clovis. The driver of the car, Arzola, has been charged with involuntary manslaughter, and failure to stop and render aid, felony charges, with \$20,000 bond on each charge. He was jailed at the county jail in Farwell.

# '74 Wheat Projections Down Again

AUSTIN--Current USDA figures reveal that Texas wheat production is expected to decline 39.2 million bushels, down from a record 98.6 million bushels in 1973 to 59.4 million, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.  
Most of the decrease is due to the failure of dryland wheat in the Texas High Plains. Growth has been slow because of drought conditions throughout the area. High Plains farmers are being paid from \$3.93 to \$4.10 a bushel for wheat.

## Directors Veto Rate Increase

Telephone rates of customers of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc., were reviewed at a meeting Wednesday of last week of the directors of the organization, according to Vernon Inmon, general manager of the cooperative, which is based in Hereford.  
Inmon said the review was undertaken due to the continuing rise in costs of both labor, material and operations experienced locally and nationwide.

"In an effort to fight inflation, the board voted unanimously not to increase base rates at this time," said Inmon. "The directors feel strongly that it is necessary for everyone to attempt to stem the tide of inflation, although they agreed that another review would be necessary in approximately six months," he commented.

The telephone cooperative serves customers in Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and Bailey counties.

# Leaders Given For Friona Baseballers

Ismael Iglesias, Manuel Quintana and Juan Fuentes were honored this week by the received trophies for their Friona Six Packs for leading efforts. The team in three separate

Iglesias, who underwent an appendectomy toward the latter part of the season, was the batting champ with a sparkling .385 average, with 37 hits in 96 times at bat.

Quintana received a trophy for the pitching department, with an equally sparkling 19-1 mound record for the year. Quintana was a virtual "iron

After having their last regular game of the season rained out, in which Quintana was to shoot for his 20th mound victory of the season, Castillo said this week there was a possibility the team might match a game against a Tulia nine for Sunday, Sept. 15. The Tulia team has an outstanding 19-2 record, with losses only to San Angelo and Big Spring. The two have not played this season, and with Friona's 26-4 record, this could be a good game if it can be worked out.
