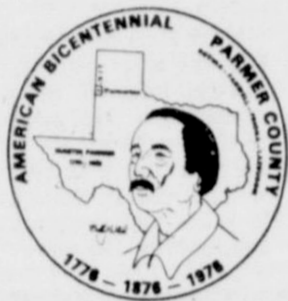

Candidates Are Shy As Deadline Nears

THE ANNOUNCEMENT last week by MBPXL Corporation of its proposed \$7 million expansion program at its Friona plant should prove to be a real bonus for the Friona area.

Those who remember the Friona area ten years ago when the packing plant was first being built will no doubt recall that the area experienced quite a boom during and immediately after the giant beef packing plant opened.

By doubling its present work force, MBPXL will be giving the Friona area the same impact as a completely new industry that would employ 350 people.

And, 350 people means that many prospective families for the immediate area.

It does not take too much of an expert to note that Friona will not be equipped to handle this type of influx of population. Hence, it behooves local leaders to do all within their power to secure additional housing.

With the proposed plant addition slated to be completed sometime early in 1978, that gives the area roughly a year to come up with answers to the housing problem.

Ten years ago, with the advent of Missouri Beef Packers, at least three apartment projects were launched, and they provided the city with an additional 88 housing units.

Even with these extra living units, Friona has never been "long" on available rent spaces in recent years, so it appears that more units will be necessary pending the completion of the expansion by MBPXL.

The addition of 350 jobs at the packing plant means the possibility of adding around 1,000 people to our community's population.

What small community wouldn't jump at the chance to add up to 1,000 residents?

With the filing deadline less than a week away, five local offices which expire in April were three names shy of a quorum.

In fact, the Friona City Council, with three seats expiring, still did not have a candidate at 5 p.m. Thursday. Filing deadline for both the city and school races will be 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 2.

The Friona school board, with two positions expiring, has two candidates for that election.

Places on the city council which are expiring this year are currently held by Glenn E. Reeve, Sr., Patrick Pace and Martha Bates, none of whom have filed for re-election.

Holdover members of the council

are Jerry Loflin, B.K. Buske and Mayor R.L. Fleming.

Those filing for the school board places are Jerry London and incumbent Jerry Hinkle. David Grimsley is the other board member whose term is expiring.

Holdover members of the school board are George Frye, Wesley Barnett, Ronald Smiley, Teddy Fangman and Floyd S. Reeve.

Those wishing to file for a spot on the city council may do so at City Hall. Prospective members of the school board may take out a petition in Superintendent Tom Jarboe's office.

The election will be held jointly on Saturday, April 2 at the Friona Fire Station.

Bidders Set New Mark For Show

Once again, buyers at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show paid a record amount in premiums for the young showmen, as a conclusion to the 1977 show.

Auction totals for the 1977 show came to \$74,500, it was announced this week. That was an increase of \$6,000 over the totals from 1976, which had been the former record.

A total of 144 animals were sold at auction on Saturday afternoon. Another 221 animals were sold to the floor buyers. Pro Auction Service of Friona, and B&B Auction of Bovina donated their services to the show.

Show officials were pleased, and somewhat surprised, at the new record being set, in light of the fact that due to a change in procedures this year, there were 14 less steers sold at auction than were sold at the 1976 show. Show promoters were expecting that this would pull the sale totals down.

However, the prices paid for the animals by the bidders this year came to a fine average.

The average price paid for steers in the 1977 show was 77 cents per pound. This was up from 66.8 cents in 1976. The average price for

barrows was \$1.69, compared to \$1.55 per pound in 1976. The average price paid for sheep was \$2.63 per pound, compared to \$2.15 a year ago.

The buyers at the county show paid a total of \$48,712 in premiums. The difference was made up by floor buyers in each division.

MBPXL bought the steers at a floor price of \$38.00 per hundred. Woodrow Wright of Bovina bought the barrows at a floor price of 38 cents per pound. King Feed Yard of Muleshoe bought the lambs at \$48.50.

Bidding was spirited in several instances. The most paid for a barrow was \$5.25 per pound, by Gary Cook Oil Company in buying an animal belonging to Holly Tatum. In another instance, Black Farm Supply paid \$3.30 per pound for a barrow belonging to Park Weatherly.

One buyer, Ethridge-Spring Agency, was successful bidder on one of the prize steers, and then donated the animal to Prairie Acres Nursing Home.

Talent Show Slated For March 5

The second annual Talent Show, sponsored by the Friona Kiwanis Club, will be held Saturday, March 5, at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center.

Every resident of the area with a talent act is encouraged to enter.

"We are inviting everyone to come and enjoy a fine evening of family entertainment. It is rated G for Good," says Carl White, spokesman for the Kiwanis Club.

A rehearsal for those involved in the talent will be held on Friday, March 4 at 7 p.m.

Proceeds from the talent contest will be put back into the community in some form to help where needed, White said.

Damage Results From High Wind

The Friona area has been buffeted by a steady diet of wind for most of the past week.

Tuesday, February 22 brought the worst wind and dust storm of the year. In fact, many weather observers felt it was the worst dust storm for the Friona area in many, many years.

The day started out still that day, with a cloud bank in the west. But before noon the wind had begun to gust, and picked up dust as it did so.

By midafternoon, the velocity had increased, and along with it, the amount of dust. Finally, by late afternoon, the amount of dust in the air had reached a point that made visibility virtually zero, making driving extremely hazardous.

An eight-car pileup was reported near Vega on Interstate 40, with some serious injuries reported.

In the local area, some damage was reported from the strong wind. A mobile home belonging to Glen Salyer overturned east of Friona. The trailer house was flipped completely over onto its top. Salyer was preparing to build a house at the location, and was to live in the trailer while completing the house. It appeared that the trailer was a total loss. Luckily, no one was in it when the wind flipped it over.

Other damage was also noted, such as bent antennas, broken windows, broken utility poles, etc.

To inform members of the present situation on several key issues facing the Cooperative, a Management Report will be presented.

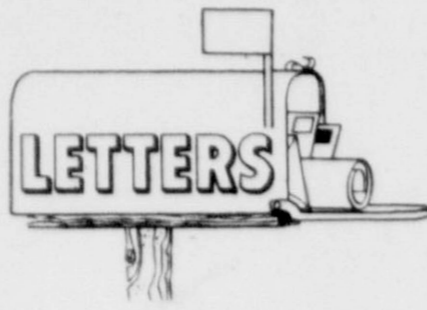

Reduced Cash Flow Hurts Rural Areas

Reduced cash flows of farmers and ranchers have adversely affected agricultural credit conditions in the northern High Plains of Texas, according to a survey of area agribankers by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Results of the January 1 survey show repayment of loans has slowed, renewals are up sharply, and the availability of funds to meet current loan requests has been reduced.

Cash flows from the marketing of farm products decreased during the 1976 crop year largely because of low wheat and grain sorghum prices. Earnings from cattle feeding operations were depressed by low slaughter cattle prices and high costs of grain. Because of favorable prices, however, incomes of soybean growers improved slightly.

According to 95 per cent of the bankers, the financial condition of farmers is not as strong as a year ago. And 74 per cent indicated the position of cattlemen has weakened. One banker heavily involved with agricultural lending reported his customers are "financially weaker than in many years."

Lower farm incomes have caused year-to-year deterioration in several key indicators of agricultural credit

conditions, say Carl G. Anderson and Alan M. Young, agricultural economists for the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

—Where 25 per cent of the respondents said loan repayments

were slower than usual last year, this year 83 per cent did.

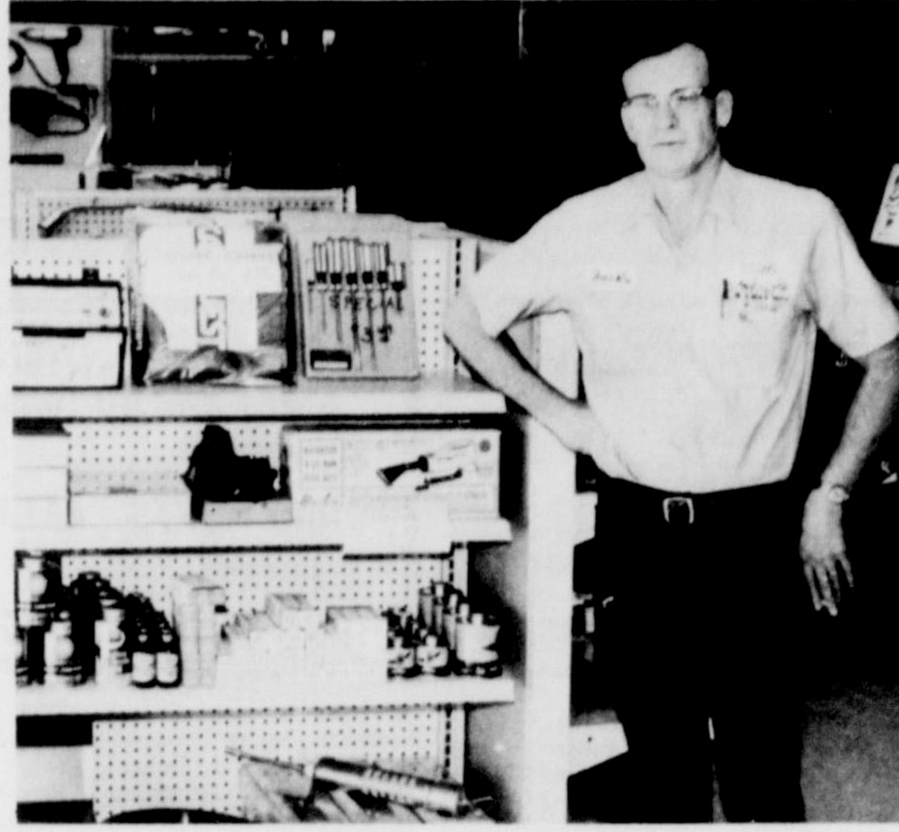
—Where last year no bankers surveyed reported the availability of funds was less than usual, this year 37 per cent did.

—Where last year 15 per cent said collateral requirements were more strict than usual, this year 42 per cent did.

A third of the bankers surveyed said they are not looking for new customers. The demand for operating loans is already quite strong, pressured by higher operating costs and large crops being withheld from the market in hopes of higher prices. Demand for feeder cattle loans has declined and fewer loans are being made for machinery purchases.

Interest rates have decreased for operating loans and feeder cattle loans, but they have risen somewhat for longer-term loans. Average rates reported were 9.58 per cent for feeder cattle loans, 9.43 per cent for farm operating loans, 9.92 per cent for intermediate-term loans (1 to 7 years), and 9.39 per cent for farm real estate loans.

The downturn in farm income is not reflected in the land market. Bankers believed the price of "good" farmland widely represented in the area increased around 9 to 11 per cent in 1976, and ranchland values increased one per cent. More than a fifth of the bankers foresaw a slowdown in the appreciation of land values in the months ahead.

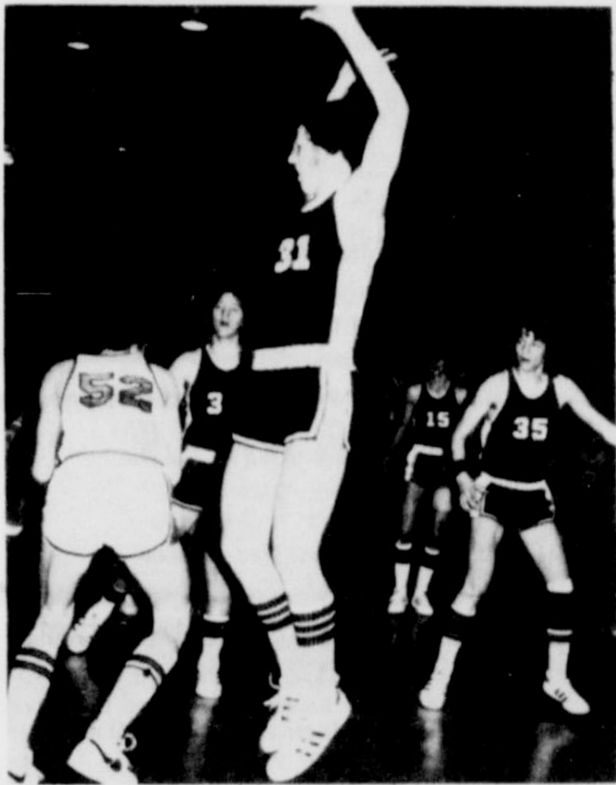

Policy Indicates Faith In Cotton Growers

The legislative policy adopted January 18 by the Board of Directors of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. indicates much improved confidence among High Plains cotton producers in their ability to produce and sell cotton at a profit with a minimum of assistance from government farm programs.

Evidence of this is seen in the board's agreement to "favor a long-range government cotton pro-

gram which follows a market-oriented philosophy..."

The strongest indication came in the policy section which deals with the Commodity Credit Corporation loan program. The directors overwhelmingly voted to work for a CCC loan that will, among other things, "continue to base the loan price on average market prices."

Discussion revealed that the board favors a loan price high enough to give protection against total price disaster and be useful as a marketing tool, but not so high as to encourage cotton production in foreign countries and in less efficient cotton growing areas of the U.S.

There is a feeling in some quarters that the cotton loan price should be at or near the cost of production. But throughout the PCG discussion fear was expressed that such a loan would lead to surplus production in the U.S. and abroad, low prices and an almost certain return to government restrictions on cotton production.

This fear more than any other factor led to the directors' decision that loan prices in future programs, as now, should be directly connected to market prices.

My Big Brother

He was always there when I needed to do something I couldn't quite manage by myself or when I just needed someone to talk to. With his help I could do just about anything. He taught me things like how to dig a hole with a shovel and how to climb a tree, drive a nail and saw a board. He could build camp fires better 'n anybody. He was a marksman with a B.B. gun and he could make the biggest chips fly from the trunk of a tree with the hatchet Dad gave us one Christmas.

He taught me how to drive a car and got me my first date. He showed me how to tie a tie and helped me learn how to whistle. When I was afraid of the dark he would tell me there was "Nothin' to be scared of," and though he may have been afraid many times he never let on like it. Once when we were bare-footed he carried me through a sticker patch pretending the stickers weren't hurting him.

I remember his patience, dependability, understanding, his help and the things he taught me to do,

like riding a bike, building frog houses and baiting a hook. I remember wearing his hand-me-down clothes and the fact that he didn't mind my tagging along when he was with his friends.

Oh, we would fight each other occasionally and he would usually beat me up but if anybody else started picking on me he would tear into them no matter how big they were.

We had a pet squirrel once that went around on my brother's shoulder or would ride inside the bib of his overalls looking out over the top. That squirrel even slept in the bed with my brother, curled up beside his pillow.

I begged him several times to let the squirrel sleep with me and finally he said, "O.K., but be careful." Sometime during the night I must have rolled over on the little thing 'cause the next morning it was dead. The body was cold but somehow I just knew my big brother could bring it to life. I handed it to him and, though I hardly ever saw my brother cry, he did then. The

thing I remember most about it was the terrible shame I felt and the fear that he would be mad at me. He just said, "You didn't mean to, we'll find another one that'll be just as good." We never did though.

My fondest memories are of the long walks we used to take through the fields and pastures on moonlit nights. We would just walk and talk when the only sounds to be heard seemed a million miles away. We would talk about eternal things, deep stuff I mean, and about things we wanted to do someday, places we wanted to go, what we wanted to be. We talked about our dreams and about what or who God really is and if we had three wishes what would the first two be.

He's gone on to be with the Lord now but he left behind something very precious to me — memories, memories of what he meant to my life, the things he did with me and the things he did for me. He was the kind of brother every little brother should have. I'll see him again someday and we'll talk over these old times but for now I will happily remember him as, MY BIG BROTHER.

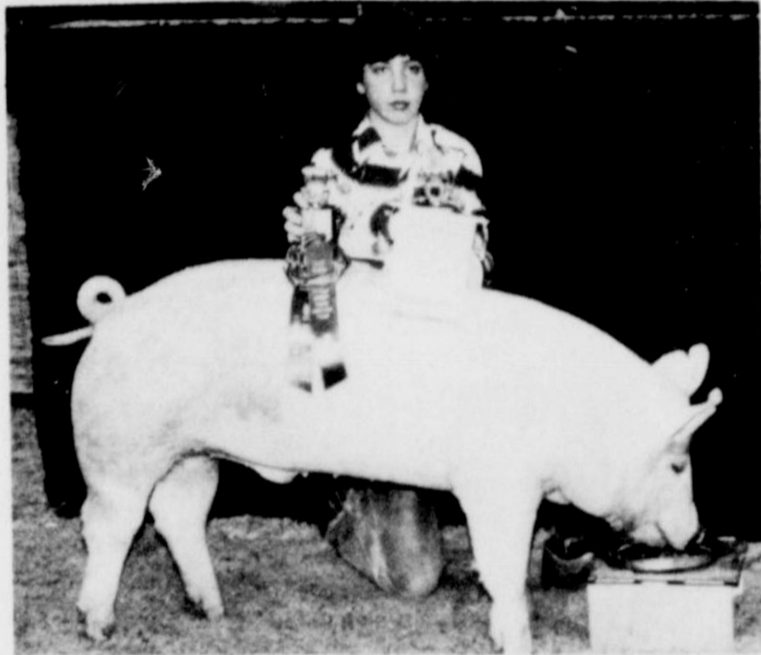

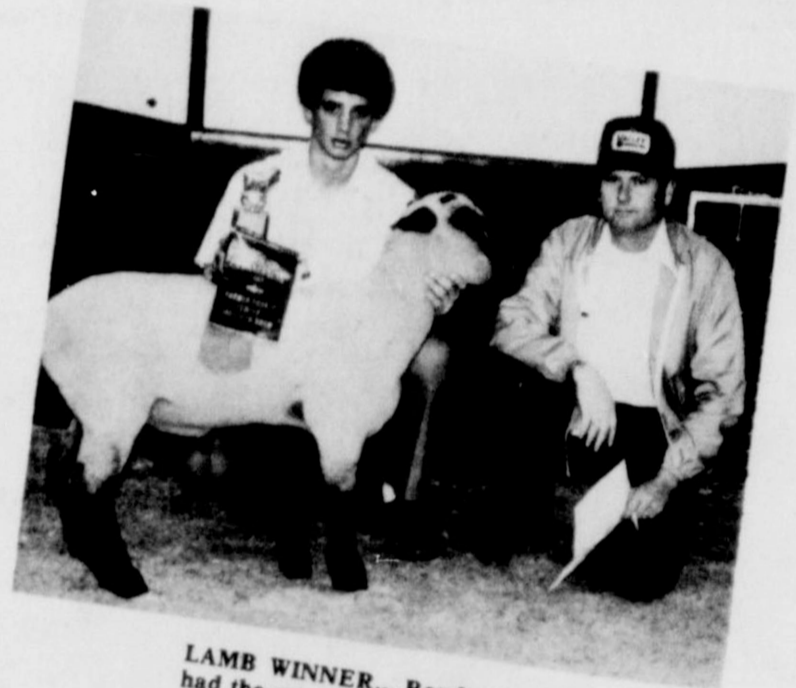

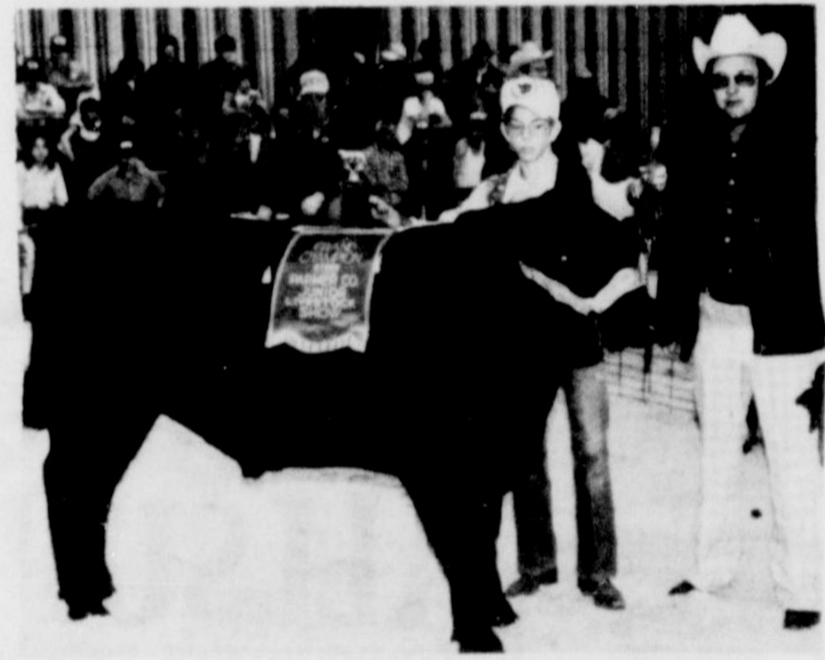

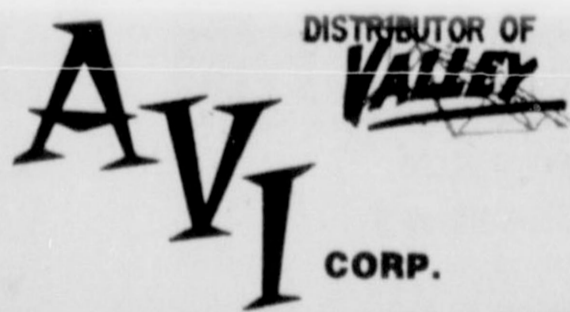

30th Annual Junior Show Is Termed Successful

The 30th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show was proclaimed a tremendous success following a three-day run here last week.

With a record number of animals (394), and blessed with excellent weather for the three-day run, the event drew standing-room crowds for the judging on Friday, and then had a nice crowd at the auction sale on Saturday, when excellent premiums were paid to the young showmen.

The Lazbuddie community saw its fantastic streak of 18 consecutive years in winning the barrow championship broken, but came back for two other championships, including the first sheep title to be awarded in 18 years.

David Lust, 4-H Club member from Lazbuddie, showed his 1125-pound Angus to the championship of the steer show, and then sold the animal for \$1.40 per pound to Foster Fertilizer in the auction sale. It was the first time for an Angus

steer to win grand champion honors since 1965.

Danny Powell of Lazbuddie guided his 1094-pound Angus to the reserve champion honors. His animal brought 80 cents per pound from Lazbuddie Farm Supply in the sale.

In the barrow show, Brent Green of Farwell broke the Lazbuddie string by showing his 231-pound Duroc to grand champion. The Farwell championship club paid Green \$2.70 per pound for his prize pig.

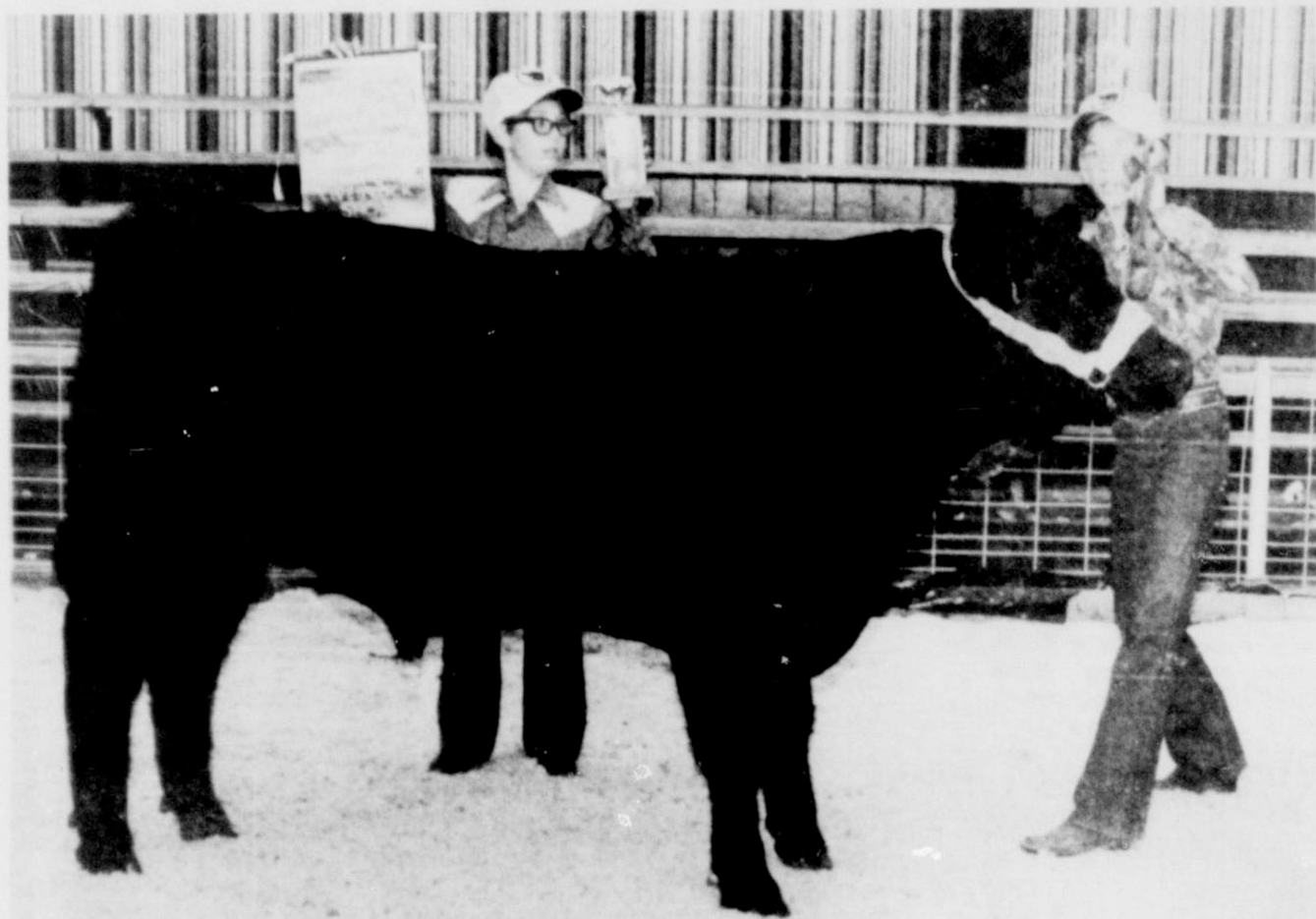
Lazbuddie, usually top-heavy in the judging for grand champion, had only one of the five champions being judged for top honors, but that one entry, a crossbreed showed by Mickey Powell, took reserve champion honors. It sold for \$1.70 on sale day to North Lazbuddie Gin.

Friona showmen did themselves proud by having two breed champions in the barrow show, one by Joel Hight (Chester White) and one by Mark Petchinsky (Poland). Farwell had two and Lazbuddie one.

The sheep show, which judged a grand champion for the first time since 1959, saw Lazbuddie capture the top two spots. Randy Smith took top honors with his champion Medium Wool entry. AVI of Muleshoe bought the lamb for \$2.25 per pound. Mike Windham had the reserve champion lamb, which was bought by Treider Electric at \$2.00 per pound.

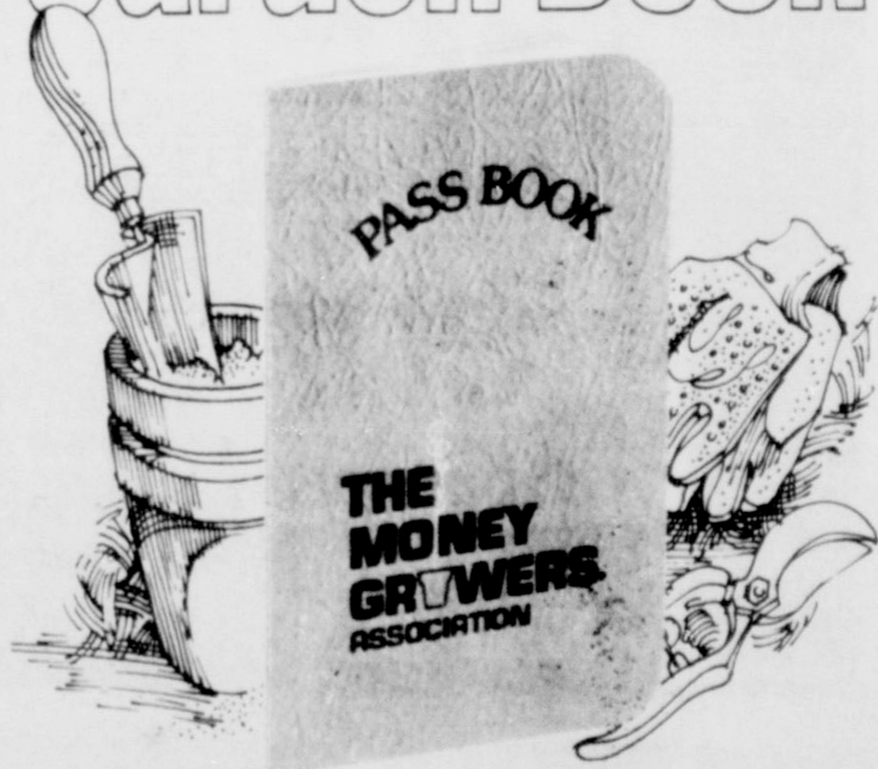

Sheri Noah gained the finals in prose reading.

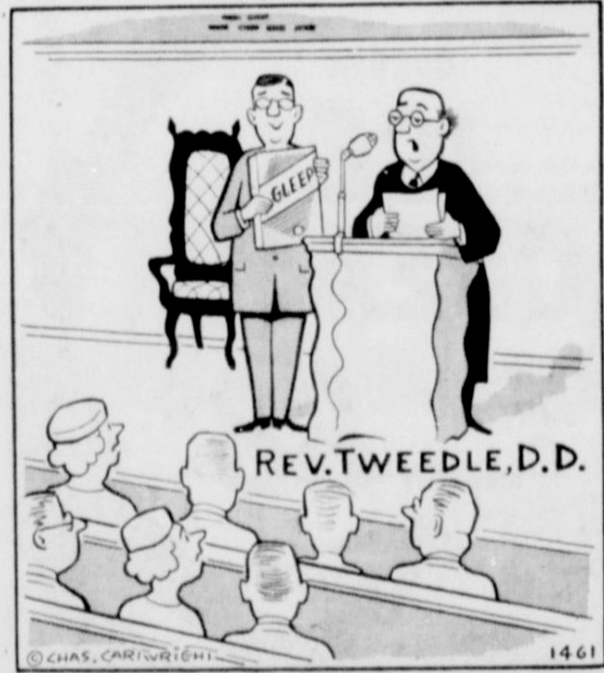
Joy Morton, team coach, said "In the preliminary rounds, several of our entrants had two good rounds and one mediocre round."

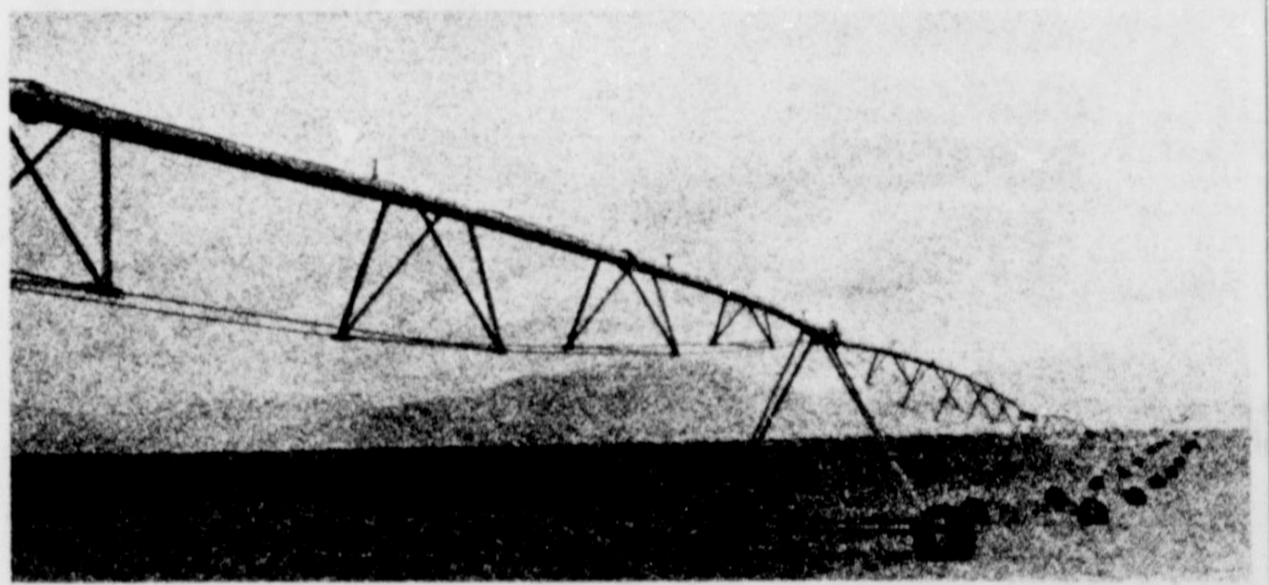

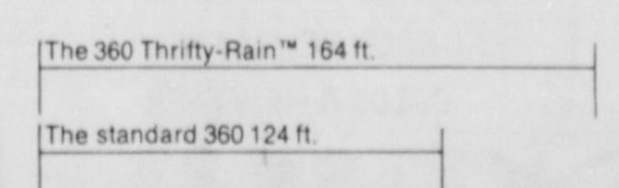

Library Report

"Oil--A Guide to the Total Energy Jungle" by Philip Windsor is available at Friona Public Library.

Here is a brief history of oil, of the great oil companies, their connections with their governments and their continuing, if diminishing importance.

Here are answers to such vital questions as: why a complex OPEC country like Iran might want maximum oil production and the highest possible rate of price increase while a smaller and simpler one like Saudi Arabia might want to keep its oil in the ground and ask more moderate prices; what effect the price of oil may have on world economic stability and the capabilities of Western technology; how oil is now setting back if not destroying the Green Revolution in new and developing countries; why it is sensible to develop oil fields off Scotland and Alaska, and elsewhere, even though the wellhead cost per barrel is astronomically higher than in Saudi Arabia.

These matters are not separate. In the end more concerned with international relations than with oil itself or economics, this book points out that the solution must be political on a multi-national scale and requires foresight and forbearance of a kind uncommon in history.

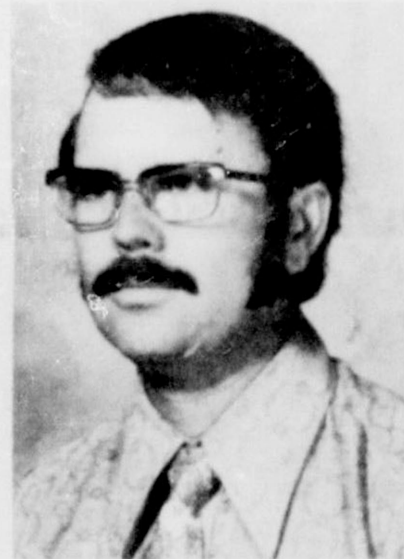
Former Resident Gets Recognition

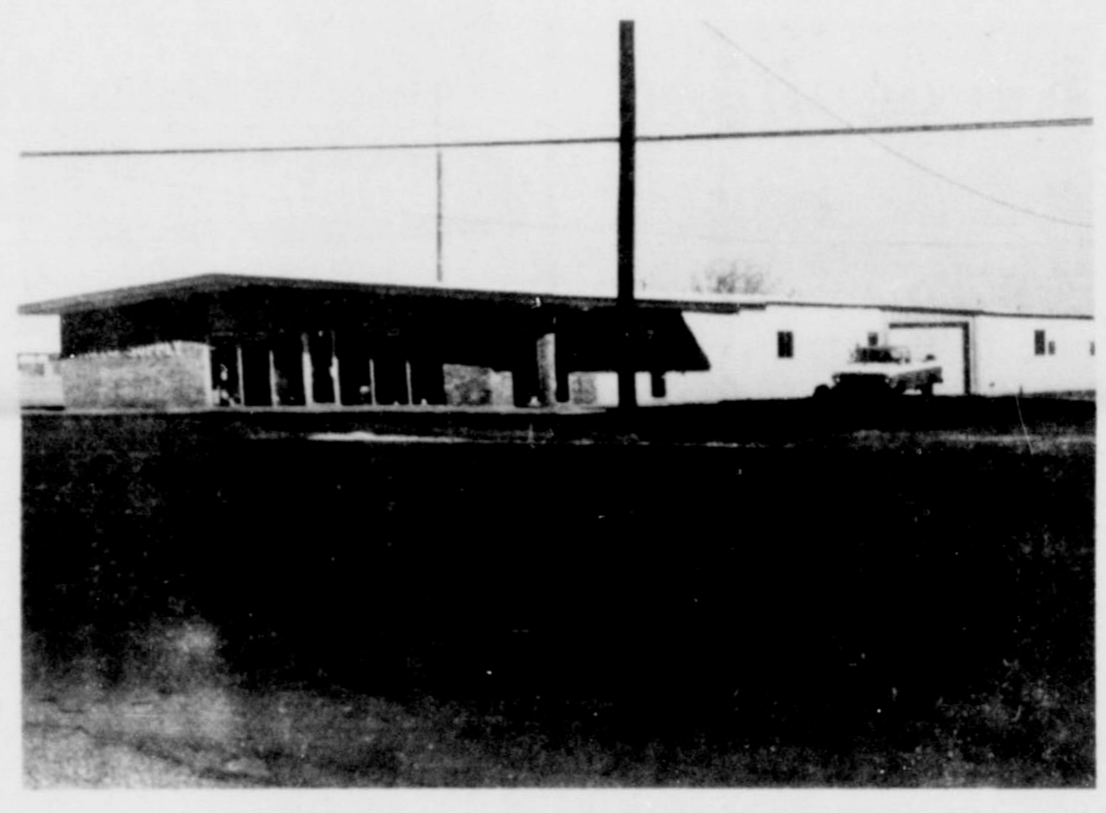

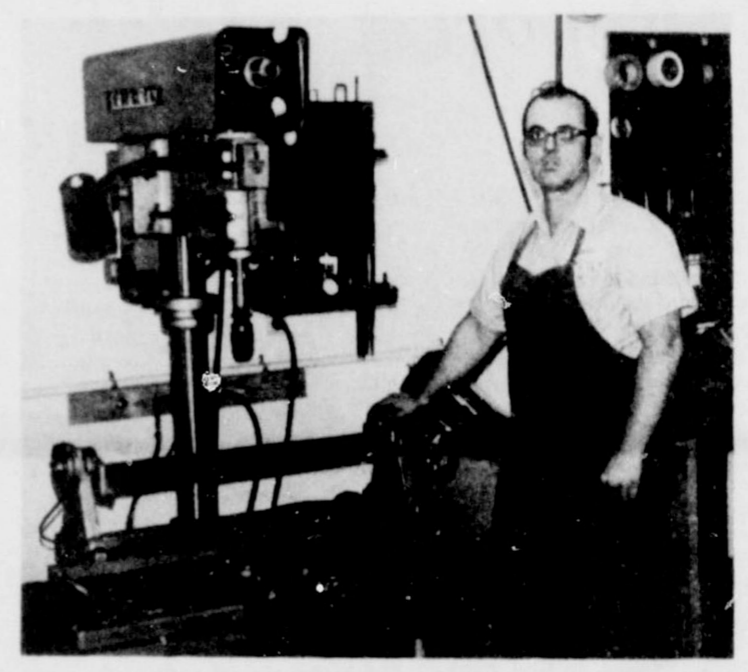

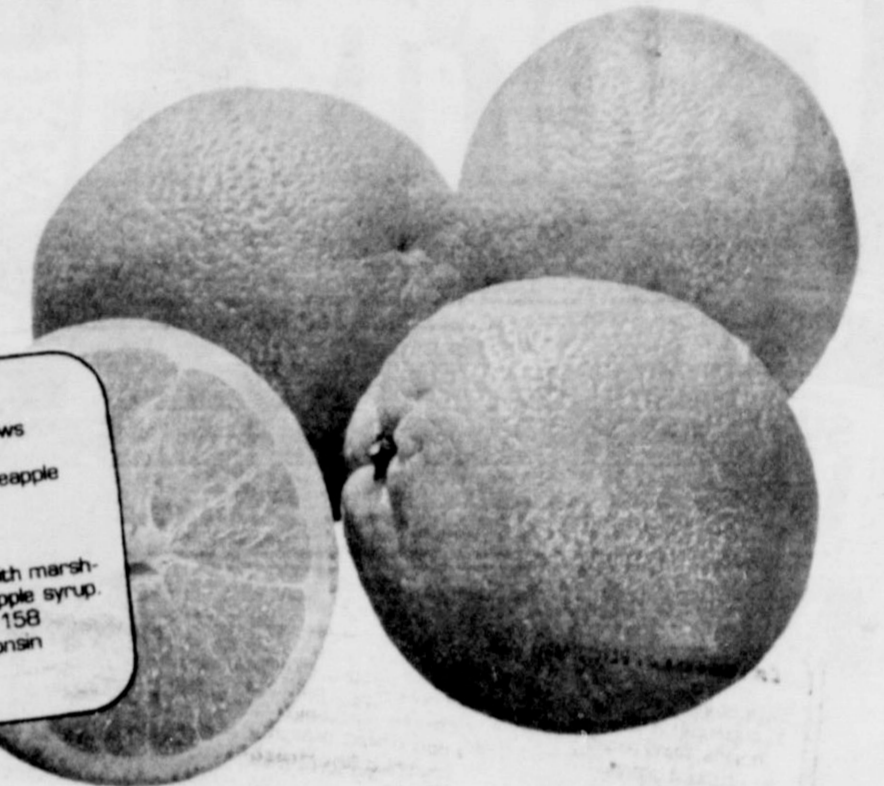
