IF WE BELIEVED all of the mail we received in our mailbox this Monday, then within the next few months, we may be independently wealthy, and be "fixed for life" by the winning of big cash prizes or property.

As soon as this happens, we may never have to resort to such a mundane method of making a living as publishing a newspaper.

Yes, it's the "lucky number sweepstakes," and they are back again in 1977.

If you were average, you received anywhere from two to four different mailings during the past week, each one virtually assuring you of some sort of financial reward if you'll only send in your lucky numbers to be entered in one of the various contests.

Along with the numbers comes the opportunity to subscribe to any number of well-known magazines, or join a book-a-month club, and it is strongly hinted that if you subscribe, your chances of winning may be greatly enhanced.

Of course, you can still enter the lottery—without subscribing—the law says the companies can't actually attach a requirement that you buy something in order to be eligible to win a prize.

But, most of the people who go in for the sweepstakes events are going to buy the magazines, or books, or whatever. And then they are stuck with these purchases for the duration of the subscription.

"You may have already won \$15,000 cash or \$100 a month for life or your own backyard swimming pool," stated one of the pieces of mail we received this week.

What always puzzled this writer was—if we have already won one of these fabulous prizes, then why should we have to subscribe to "Field & Stream," or "Newsweek," or one of the 100 other magazines that are available through the promotion. Why don't they just go ahead and send us our prize???

In recent years, the give-aways have been enhanced by the use of computers which allow each mailing to be personalized through the use of the solicited party's name and address, right on the "form letter."

It's impressive to see your name typed in a blank that hints that you might be first in line for the next \$125,000 check. After all, you reason—if they have your name, address and zip code, you might be one of the lucky ones.

It doesn't take much of a mathematician to figure out that if hundreds of thousands of folks are gullible in these things, as many of us have been from time to time, then the real "winner" in the deal turns out to be the publishing houses, who are actually using the promotion just to add to their subscription lists.

We don't doubt that the advertised prizes are actually given away. We assume that for every list of prizes offered, there eventually will be a corresponding list of winners. Nor do we accuse the contest sponsors of awarding the prizes only to those who also order the subscriptions. For all we know, the prize winners come from an honest drawing, regardless of whether or not you make a purchase.

But we also don't doubt that the publishers add a large number of customers to their lists through the promotions. Some will even stay on as regular subscribers for awhile.

If we could sell a few hundred thousand subscriptions to the Star then we could also afford to give away \$400,000 in prizes. Yep, we could even give away two new homes valued at \$125,000 or the cash

The Friona Invitational Speech tournament is scheduled for Saturday, January 8.

Some 20 schools were expected to be represented, bringing in the neighborhood of 400 students to take part in the competition.

Contests were to be held in debate, informative and persuasive speaking, poetry interpretation and prose reading.

Building Totals Show Modest Gain

Construction activity, as measured by building permits issued by the City of Friona, showed a modest gain during the calendar year just past, over the previous year.

Construction started during 1976 was valued at \$1,232,950, it was revealed in figures released by City Manager Jake Outland. This was an increase of \$79,200 over the total for the previous year, a 6.8 per cent gain.

For the second year in a row, a large non-residential building start make up a bulk of the total.

In late 1975, it was the figures on the nursing home that pushed the total above the \$1 million figure for the fourth time in six years.

In 1976, early in the year, a permit issued to Friona Wheat Growers to construct grain storage valued at \$575,000 turned out to represent almost half of the city's construction for the calendar year.

Eleven new homes were built in the city during 1976. This was down two from the previous year. New home construction was valued at \$482,500 for 1976. This figure amounted to \$536,500 the previous year.

Non-residential construction, boosted by the permit to Friona Wheat Growers, amounted to \$649,300. Other non-residential starts included the XIT Auto Ranch, a new

building for Welch Auto and an addition to City Body Shop.

Thirty-five permits were issued for additions or alterations, for construction valued at \$101,150. This compared to 31 such permits a year earlier, for \$112,800 in building costs.

In all, there were 52 building permits issued during the calendar year of 1976, compared to 54 for 1975.

The 1976 permit totals by month, were as follows: January \$579,500; February \$57,300; March \$2,000; April \$134,000; May \$84,050; June \$58,100; July \$93,200; August \$94,300; September \$102,900; October \$500; November \$3,800 and December \$22,800. Total \$1,232,950.

1976 Rainfall Total 'Way Below Average

It will come as no great surprise to farmers, gardeners or yard buffs that the total moisture received in the Friona area during the calendar year 1976 was well below average.

The total moisture received during the year was only 11.45 inches. This was over five inches less than the average rainfall measured for the five preceding years, which was 16.51 inches.

The figures were revealed this week by Friona city manager A.L. (Jake) Outland, official weather recorder for Friona.

Outland's figures showed that only in five months was there as much as an inch of moisture measured during the month. The year started

out on a dry note—with only .01 inch registered in January. It ended up even drier, when December came and went with not even a trace of moisture for the month.

In between, there were a lot of dry days still. September was the "wet" month, with a total of 2.37 inches spread over four different dates. August was close, with 2.31 logged, 1.59 of which came on one day, August 3.

The first quarter of the year did very little to help farmers get their land ready for planting, as only .57 of an inch was registered, 44 inch of this coming in March. The final quarter saw 1.28 inches received. Added to the first quarter's receipts gives the city a total of 1.85 inches for six months out of the year. That's an average of .30 inches per month.

The rainfall total for Friona for '76 was the lowest on record since 1968 when a total of 9.38 inches was recorded.

The totals for the past ten years, are as follows: 1967: 11.17; 1968: 9.38; 1969: 22.59; 1970: 13.71; 1971: 18.34; 1972: 15.73; 1973: 16.44; 1974: 17.37; 1975: 14.69 and 1976: 11.45.

The month by month total for 1976 was broken down as follows: January .01; February .12; March .44; April 1.18; May .95; June 1.75; July 1.04; August 2.31; September 2.37; October .84; November .44; December .00. Total 11.45.

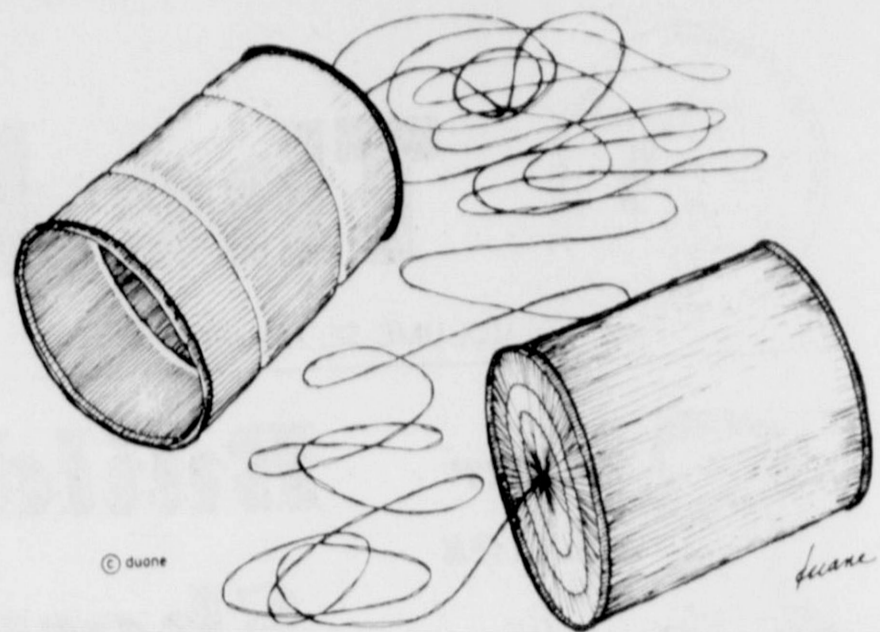
20 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 3, 1957

Tin Can Telephones

My good friend who lived in town had a fine tree house in his backyard that we used for our secret club meetings. His friends next door had a half dug-out fort in their backyard. We sometimes had clod fights with them but were generally on good speaking terms.

We used to yell back and forth to each other but their father got a job on the night shift down at the compress and they said we'd have to play quieter.

We decided we would need a way to get messages back and forth without waking their dad. One kid said he could make telephones out of tin cans. "Yore kiddin'?" "Naw, I'm not. I'll show ya."

He took a ball of heavy twine and a couple of tomato cans. The cans had one end out and the other left in. He took a nail and poked a hole right in the center of the end of the can. He pushed the hole of the twine through the hole and tied a double hard granny knot in it so it wouldn't go back through. He did the same to the other end of the twine and the

other can. "We're ready now." "Ya mean that's all there is to it?" "How you spect to talk through that thing?" "You'll see, take hold o' this end and g'over yonder."

We went about fifty feet away until the string was pulled taut, then he said for one of us to put the can over our ear. I was the first to try it.

When I stuck the can over my ear I heard some scratchy, thumping, ringing noises from the inside of the can. I looked at him and he asked if I had heard what he said. I said I had heard something but I didn't know it was him.

We stretched it from the tree house to the fort and, after playing around with it for quite a while we could sorta make out what was being said on the other end of the line. Of course, you could understand the message better if you listened with the other ear at the same time.

We didn't know words to use like "Break 19!" or "That's a big ten toe, good buddy!" but we got our messages across.

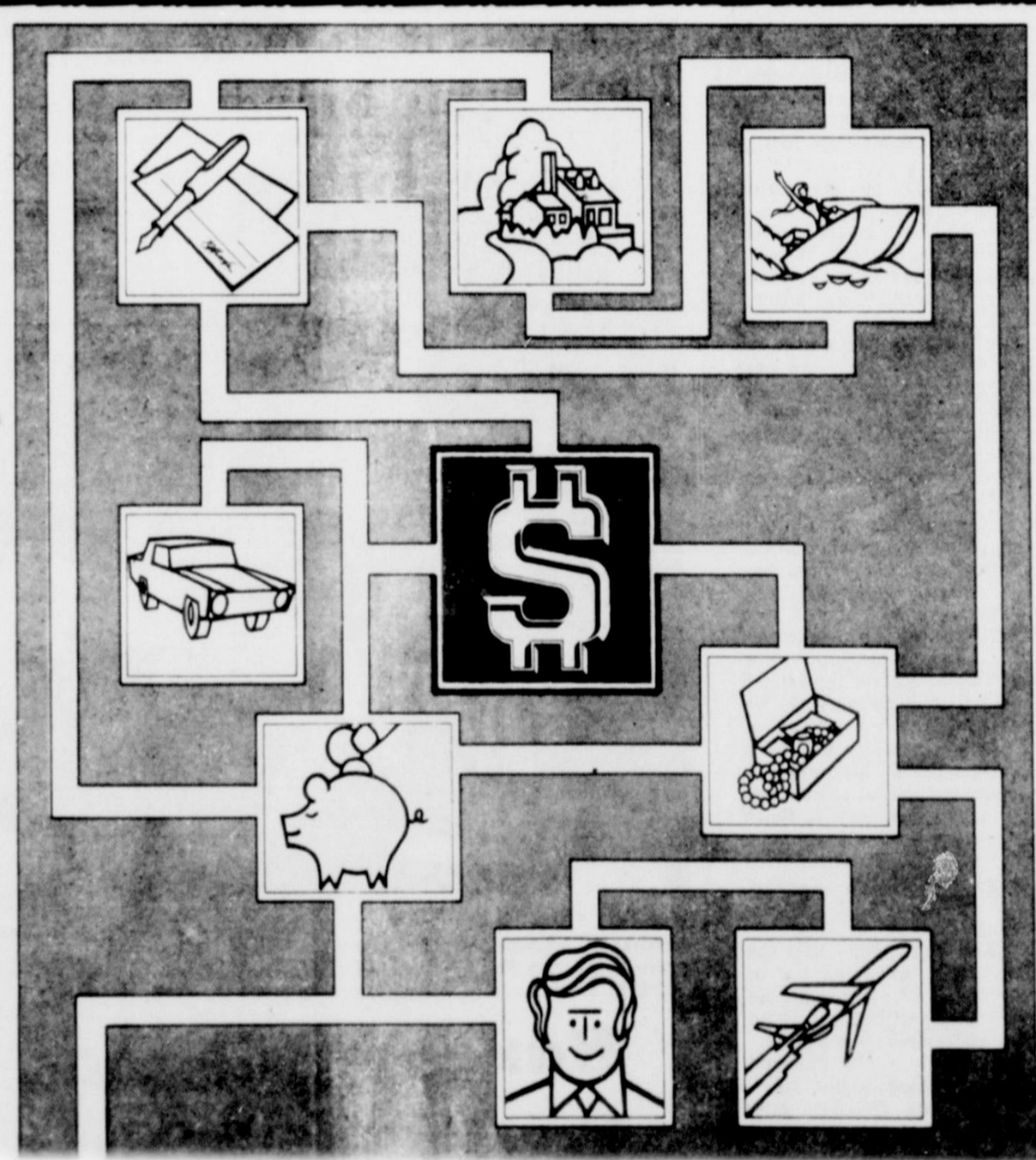



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Chiefs Finalists At Amarillo Meet

The Friona Chieftains stumbled in the final game of the Fourth Annual Amarillo Basketball Tournament as Canyon's Eagles soundly defeated them 65-33.

Canyon, the tournament's defending champions, were never actually challenged by the Chiefs who couldn't seem to get their breath after two hard fought battles against Farwell and Dalhart earlier in the tournament.

Friona won their first game against the Steers by a 65-51 margin. The game seemed to be all Friona's as the Chiefs jumped to a 21-15 lead early in the game.

Farwell came back in the second quarter to outscore the Chiefs 15-9, taking a 30-30 tie into the dressing room at halftime.

Friona's defense took over after the half and the Chiefs held the Steers to eight points while they scored 16. From then on it was under control as the Chiefs poured in 19 points to the Steers' 13, winning their first round tourney match.

Mark Neill had an outstanding game for the Chiefs, scoring 31 points and hauling down 11 rebounds. He was followed by Keith Martin and Jeff Whiteside with nine points each.

Friona shot 54 per cent from the free throw line, hitting 13 of 24 attempts, and 44 per cent from the floor, hitting 27 of 62 shots.

The Chiefs' second game of the following Tuesday night, was a real heart-stopper against the Dalhart Wolves, a team that had only lost one game this season to the Stratford Elks. Friona hung on to win in a gym that was hardly large enough to host a ping-pong tournament, 44-41.

The game was rough from the start and defense prevailed for both teams as they tried to beat the referees as well as their respective opponent.

At the end of the first quarter, the score stood 7-4, Friona.

The Chiefs controlled the second period tip-off and began to stretch their lead a little, when Mark Neill made a diving attempt to save a ball from going out-of-bounds. His efforts forced him to dive face first onto the floor to keep from hitting fans sitting along the out-of-bounds line. Neill was shaken up on the play and forced to sit out the remainder of the half.

Dalhart was able to chip away at the Chiefs' slim margin with Neill out and went on to take the lead by one point at the half 20-19.

Dalhart came out with a stiff defense the second half and held the Chiefs to only three points in the third quarter, while they went on to score 12, stretching their lead to 10.

The tide turned in the fourth quarter as Friona's defense took over and the offense found the range. With three of Dalhart's players fouling out, the Chieftains

played an impressive game of catch-up making up their ten points and then some as they went on to win by a scant 44-41 score.

Mark Neill led the scoring for Friona with 20 points, followed by Jeff Whiteside with 10. The Chiefs managed a 64 per cent average from the line, hitting 9 of 14 free throws and 33 per cent from the floor, putting in 16 of 48.

The win pushed the Chiefs into the finals against Canyon held the next evening at the Amarillo Civic Center.

Scanning the pages of the Friona Star for the past year came up with these headline events:

JANUARY

Political activity began to simmer somewhat across the county this week, with 1976 scheduled to be a general election year. A contest developed for County Sheriff, when H.R. (Bill) Denney announced as an opponent to incumbent Charlie Lovelace. Denney is currently serving as Friona's Chief of Police.

A perpetual scholarship, to assist graduating senior students at Friona and Bovina High Schools has been announced by Leo and Margaret Ruzicka. Ruzicka announced that he and his wife had placed in a certificate of deposit a total of \$10,000.
