FOR THOSE OF YOU who might be newcomers to the Panhandle or High Plains area: Welcome to our "thunderstorm season."

As of this writing, we have had two such storms this week, and both have lived up to the thunderstorm tradition—complete with electrical display, loud rolling thunder, and what's even better—some beneficial rainfall.

The way the month of May has gone would leave you to believe that the 1977 growing season might be a rainy one for the area. If this is true, it could provide a welcome relief to the irrigation farmer, who traditionally spend their entire summers keeping an army of wells pumping full blast.

In addition to the work saved, rainfall also saves the region's precious underground water supply, to say nothing of trimming the farmer's mushrooming fuel bill which comes from running the irrigation wells non-stop.

This kind of dollar saving can mean a lot when it comes to tallying up the farmer's profit or loss totals for the year, and can enable him to invest a little more freely in machinery, vehicles, new household items, etc.

We're hoping that the rain trend continues, especially if we can get some beneficial showers spaced about right, without any of the "hard stuff" that can wipe out an entire crop.

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ONE OF OUR business friends was wondering aloud the other day if we really have as many tornadoes as the electronic media report from time to time, especially from last Monday evening's thunderstorm.

That's a good point, and one that is debated almost every time tornado season rolls around. The various TV stations even have different policies in regard to turbulent weather.

Channel 10, for example, seems to come out with a warning as soon as there is a cloud on the horizon. On the other hand, Channel 7 won't usually bother with a warning until an actual tornado funnel is seen bearing down on the station.

That gives the viewer a choice of policies, and they can react accordingly.

Back to my friend's question. It does seem, to the longtime resident, at least, that we have more tornadoes than we used to have. But, we also have such improved communications than we had even 20 years ago, that the fact is that we probably just have more funnel clouds reported than in the past. They have probably always been there, but if no one saw them but a prairie dog, they didn't get documented.

Also, the radar scanning devices that the weather bureau and the TV weathermen use gives a good idea of where a threatening cloud is located, in an area of considerable size. This allows more people to be alerted, if they desire to be.

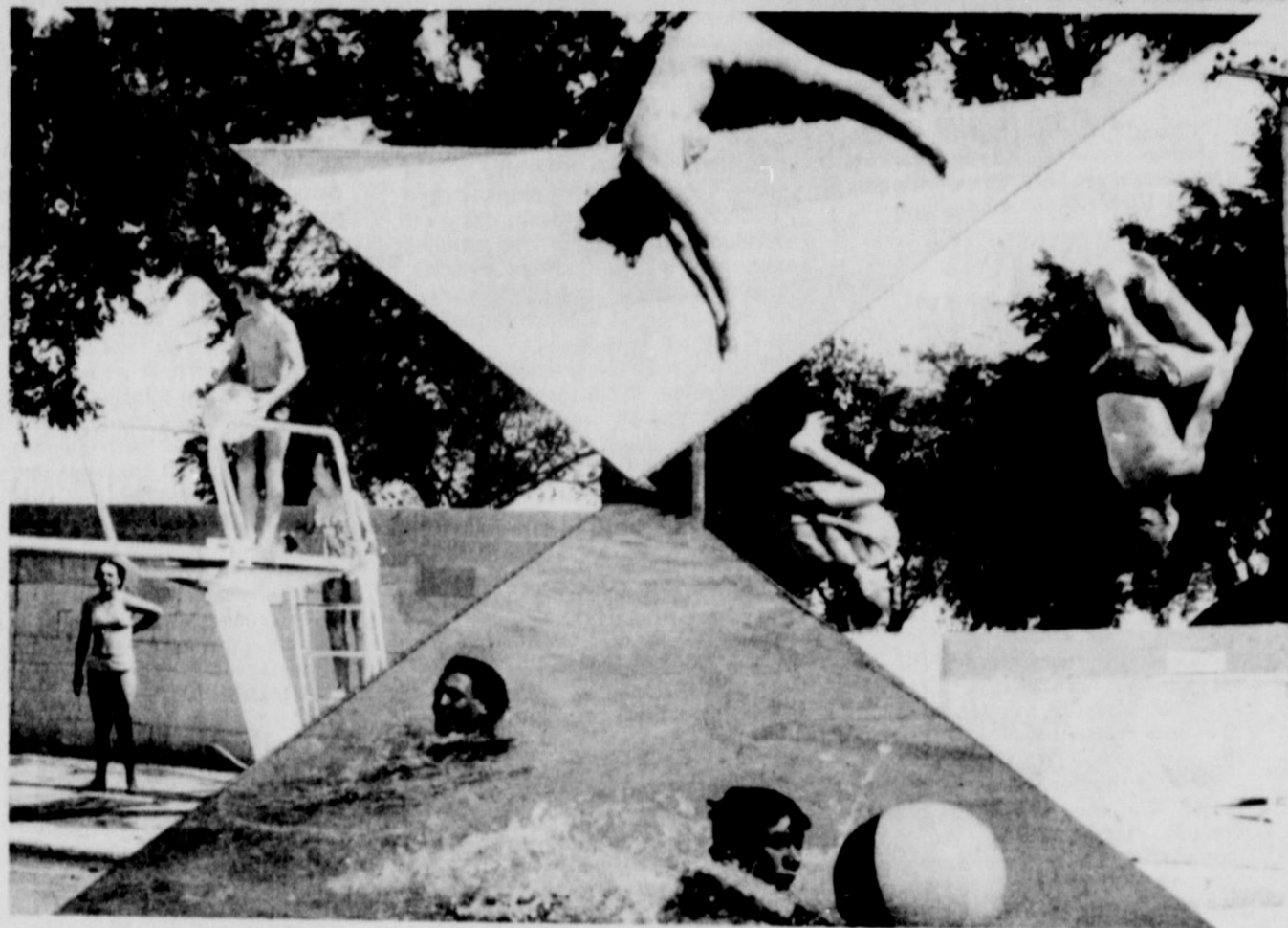
The question of preparing for threatening weather is a personal problem, and probably always will be. The 12 years we lived on Fifth Street, with a tornado shelter just two doors from us, we went to the shelter once or twice.

One of those times was appropriate, as it was during the tornado of 1971. And we use the word during, because it is most appropriate. We almost took too much time in deciding to go.

But this spring, having a basement of our own, we have been down there twice already, since it's handy and comfortable.

In fact, this past Thursday at 5:45 a.m., we dragged our family out when that early-morning electrical storm came through, and had our own personal "tornado drill."

The only memorable comment was from daughter Laura, "This is about the dumbest thing I ever did." Which may have been right, but as head of a family, you'll occasionally do some dumb things, until every so often one of them will work out for the best.

Friona Area Gets Week Of Rainfall

The drought has been broken in Friona and Parmer County.

Three separate rains during the week left an official 2.35 inches of rain in Friona during the week, and the measurements were even higher in the outlying areas.

The rains of Thursday, coming after the area was already wet, caused some flooding in the city's low areas. City streets ran like rivers on two different occasions Thursday. Reeve Lake, in the northwest part of the city, caught the most water it has held in quite some time, and other lakes did likewise.

By Friday of this week, the month's total rainfall came to 3.81 inches, making it the wettest month since July of 1975, when a total of 3.87 was registered.

One area farmer said he had received eight inches since planting his corn. Neighboring Bovina has registered over six inches of moisture officially since May 7.

For the most part, the rain received in the immediate area has been beneficial, although there are places that are beginning to be "water-logged," and any additional moisture would be useless at this time.

The area received a tornado scare last Monday evening, when a black, threatening cloud came through from the southwest. Radio and TV reports had told of tornadoes being sighted in the Clovis area. TV radar showed the line of clouds stretching from the Clovis area virtually to

Tucumcari, with this area on the "bottom end."

However, the Friona area escaped the Monday threat with just a good rain, measuring an even inch. The rain was accompanied by a boisterous electrical display.

The electrical display and thunderstorm was repeated in the early hours of Thursday, when a line of clouds moved through the area after 5 a.m. Again, good steady rain was the results locally, with another .86 inch measured in the city's gauge. During the noon hour Thursday, the elements regrouped, and the city received another 30-minute shower, which added another .49 inch to the total and once again flooded some streets.

No part of the county has missed out on the recent rains, with some parts getting heavier rains than have been received locally. Some

hail damage has been noted in isolated areas, although the damage has been spotted, and thus far has been outweighed by the beneficial moisture, and consequential saving of underground water and irrigation gas.

ASCS Will Register Beef Producer Voters

"The Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office will register beef producers June 6-17 to vote on the beef research and information order," said Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director. Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum.

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 68 beef producers, from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produced beef during calendar 1976 are eligible to register. This includes feedlot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity—such as family,

Ex Bovina Man Held In Fatal Shooting

A 46-year-old former Bovina man was charged Thursday with the murder of his wife as she sat in the lobby of the Levi Strauss plant on the east side of Clovis, where she was employed.

Robert McCormick, now of Lubbock, was arrested by police late Thursday after he had shot his wife, Betty, 41, a resident of Bovina, three times with a .22 pistol. He was also charged with aggravated battery in the wounding of another Bovina woman, Judy Page, 38, who was also employed at the plant.

Investigating officers said McCormick was outside the plant when his wife and Mrs. Page came out the front door at about 3:35 p.m. Mrs. Page is said to have ran toward the south side of the plant after seeing McCormick. Mrs. McCormick ran back inside the plant.

McCormick fired two shots at Mrs. Page, grazing her shoulder with one

bullet. She made her way to the rear of the plant where she re-entered the building.

Police said McCormick entered the plant and found his wife seated in the lobby, where he began firing at her. On bullet struck her in the head and two in the chest. She was pronounced dead at Clovis Memorial Hospital at 5:10 p.m. Her body was flown to Albuquerque for autopsy.

Witnesses told police that McCormick was at a Clovis bar earlier in the day where he reportedly told a barmaid he was going to shoot his wife. Witnesses said he left the bar about 3:30 p.m. The shooting occurred at the plant about 3:37.

When officers arrived at the scene McCormick had placed the gun to his own head, but he surrendered to police. He apparently suffered an epileptic seizure after the shooting. He and Mrs. Page were reported in good condition Friday.

Hearings Concluded On Trash Proposal

Once again, a sparse crowd attended the hearing called by the City of Friona this week to seek the public's wishes on the proposed changeover in the method of trash collection.

City manager Jake Outland explained that the city is searching for an easier method than that currently in use, which causes city trash employees to handle 55-gallon barrels.

Those attending the second hearing expressed their concern over the possibility of the container system being a threat to yard

fences, and also leaving room for emergency vehicles.

Mayor Fleming explained that the side-loading system should pick up the containers and set them back down in the exact spot each time.

Another citizen expressed concern for the elderly and others, who might have to walk several feet down alleys, particularly in wet or muddy weather.

It is proposed to locate the containers two per every 300-foot block. Thus, no citizen would have to walk over 100 feet, but it is safe to say the majority would have to go farther than they do with the present system.

In answer to another question, it was explained that grass clippings will no longer need to be bagged if the proposed system is purchased. The grass can be dumped into the containers.

Concern was also expressed over the fact that the purchase of the collection system would obligate the city's Revenue Sharing Funds for a three-year period. The cost is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$85,000.

The city manager explained that the city has solicited bids for the system, and these are to be opened at the June 6 meeting of the council. A decision may or may not be made on purchasing the system at the June 6 meeting.

Farmer Dies In Tractor Mishap

Henry Kuper, 64, a long time resident of the Summerfield community, died late Monday after he had received multiple injuries in a tractor accident on his farm.

Mr. Kuper was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, by a Pottor County helicopter, after he was discovered by a neighbor. He died about an hour after reaching the hospital.

Deaf Smith County sheriff's officers said Mr. Kuper was run over by the large rear wheel of the tractor

after starting the motor from the ground.

Survivors include the widow, Emma, three sons, John and Larry, both of Summerfield, and Marvin of Griggs, Oklahoma; three daughters, Mrs. Carolyn Evers of Hereford, Mrs. Dolores Fleming of Guymon, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Lynda Milburn of Friona. Also two sisters and 18 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Thursday at St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Hereford and burial was in the St. Anthony's Cemetery.

The Beef Referendum: What Is It? - Article Explains

The Beef Referendum. What is it? There has been a lot of publicity lately on the proposed Beef Research and Information Plan that will be voted on in early July. Here are some facts about what the program is and who is eligible to vote.

The program is designed to allow the establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, supplying of producer and consumer information with respect to use of cattle, beef and beef products.

Similarly, the program would allow for the establishment and conducting of research, market development projects and studies with respect to production, growing, sale, processing and distribution, marketing or utilization of cattle, beef and beef products.

The program also would include development and expansion of foreign markets.

It will be financed, administered and controlled by cattle producers. If passed, the national Beef Board will be organized with 68 representatives from across the country. Based on cattle numbers, Texas will have seven producers on the Board. This Board will determine what needs to be done and who will carry out the needed program.

Every producer will pay his fair share. Whenever cattle are sold, three tenths of one per cent of the sale price will be set aside—to be collected ultimately at the point of slaughter. If someone doesn't want to participate in the collection program, he can request, and receive, a refund on his contribution.

More than 90 cattle producer

groups have officially endorsed this "Beef Research and Information Act". These groups represent cattle breeders, calf producers, stocker operators and feeders.

Producers eligible to register and vote are those who owned cattle during the past 12 months, prior to the referendum, including 4-H and FFA members, men and women. There is no age limit or minimum requirement of numbers of cattle owned in order to qualify to vote. Any questions about bonafide ownership can be resolved by tax records, sales slips, registration papers or any other valid papers showing ownership of livestock.

A partnership, cooperative, corporation or similar business is considered as only a single entity for the purpose of voting in the referendum. Where a husband and wife own cattle jointly, this will be considered a single entity and only one may vote. If each owns cattle separately and has documented proof of ownership, this is considered as two entities and each may vote.

In the event that a person owns cattle in a county other than where he lives, or if he cannot make it to the polls during the registration of voting period, it will be possible to write or telephone the county ASCS office for an absentee ballot.

Eligible producers should contact the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office to receive a registration form. The county ASCS office will conduct registering and the referendum.

The registration period is June 6-17. The voting period is July 5-15.

At least 50 per cent of the cattle owners who register must vote—and two-thirds must vote affirmatively—in order for the referendum to be valid.

If the program becomes operational, the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA would monitor it, or serve in effect as a referee, to assure that it stays within the legislative authority and accomplishes the goals of the program as voted on by producers in the referendum. Should producers approve the program, the initial board meeting might be held in the late fall of 1977.

Thus, it likely would be 1978 before a research and information program for cattle and beef could be fully developed and first assessments begin on sales of cattle.

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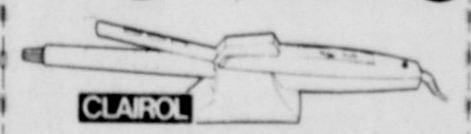
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Parson To Receive Degree

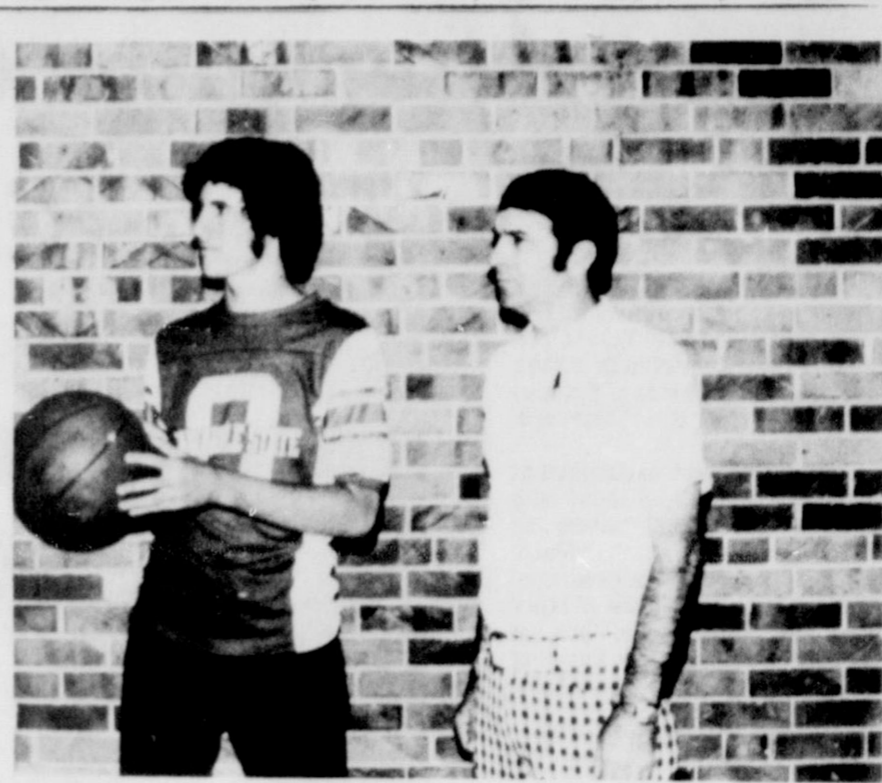
