Declarer cannot score a ninth trick without driving out the ace of diamonds, and East is now in position to cash three hearts and send his opponent down





## Ruby Trial In February?

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Jack Ruby's second trial for the slaying of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald has been set for the North Texas city of Wichita Falls, possibly in February.

Dist Judge Louis T. Holland Falls, a city of about 115,000 persons, Tuesday after a conference with defense and prosecuion attorneys

Although Holland set no exact date for the trial, he said the case would be heard in early 1967-possibly February. He said setting of the case would depend on availability of prosecution and defense lawyers.

### TEASE OPERATOR

Ruby, 55, is a former Dallas strip-tease joint operator who gunned down Oswald before a national television audience just two days after the assassination of President John F. Kennedy

The Warren Commission said Oswald, alone and with no conspirators, conceived and carried out the Kennedy slaying. didn't shoot anybody," he was quoted by Dallas newspapers as telling police during interroga-

Holland was appointed presiding judge when Ruby's trial judge, Joe B. Brown, voluntarily stepped out during the former Chicago man's appeal. He said he would preside throughout Ruby's second trial.

Holland also said the change of venue ordered last Oct. 5 by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals will become effective immediately although the official

### order has not been signed. VENUE CHANGE

The change of venue will take Ruby out of the Dallas County Jail and from the custody of Dallas Sheriff Bill Decker. However, Ruby's removal to the Wichita County jail is not expected until just prior to the start of his new trial.

Ruby was convicted of murder in his first trial and given the death penalty. In its October decision, however, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the conviction and ordered the change of venue.



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



## A Prickly Question

President Johnson gingerly grasped a nettle when he established a study group to search for new ways to cope with strikes that threaten the national interest. What will come from this approach few men would dare to pre-

There is a growing body of public opinion that strikes against the national interest can no longer be tolerated. Yet it is no easy task to draw the line between those strikes which affect the public interest and those which do not.

A nationwide railroad strike, for instance, could bring national disaster. The same could be said for a nationwide strike of truckers. In recent years air service has become a vital part of the nation's transportation system. A shutdown in the steel industry would have the most serious economic and military consequences. But does a strike on a single railroad, truck line, airline, or steel com-

pany threaten the national interest? The question of legislative remedies is another prickly aspect. What stronger weapons does the President need to prevent strikes which threaten the national interest, other than the ones he already has?

Since the national interest is paramount, a compulsory arbitration law may be necessary. With that the freedom of labor and business to negotiate freely will be destroyed in major industries. Neither business nor labor are enthusiastic about compulsory arbitration. Labor leaders do not wish to see their unions lose their freedom. Business has no desire to turn over its books to federal investigators to determine if a wage increase is justified. This appears to be the logical conclusion of a compulsory arbitration act.

As with most issues of substance, no simple, handy remedies will be found. Perhaps the best remedy is for the utmost in statesmanship and responsibility to be exhibited by both labor and management. The freedom of labor and business will be circumscribed in any form of compulsory

### The Nebulous Line

Ever since the 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution in 1913 authorized federal income taxation, the worried question has been persistently raised: How high can income tax rates go, and how steeply can they be graduated, before the work incentives of the most talented, energetic and productive people become so impaired as to damage national economic development and social progress?

The question has been theoretically analyzed and emotionally debated with each successive hike in federal income taxation. And perhaps it cannot be conclusively answered until the danger point has been reached and serious damage done.

In the 20th of its series of govern-

ment finance studies, the highly respected Brookings Institution, in collaboration with the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center (one of the better scientific polling agencies) concludes that the present level of federal income tax rates has little effect on work incentives. Spe-

to the effect of taxes on work incentives, contrary to popular opinion, appears very small-probably less than half of one per cent.'

That conclusion, interesting if unwelcome, derives from responses of a representative sample of 976 earners of \$10,000 a year up. The survey found the median average work week of the affluent to be 48 hours, with many holding more than one job and having wives who also worked. And seven out of eight said taxation was no consideration in how long or hard they worked.

Various factors, requiring more study, may explain that. Work is often its own adequate incentive, especially for the creative. Necessity may play a part. Power may be a motivation rivaling income in high-level work incentives. And the prestige of a higher salary, even if taxation does take much or even most of it, is a social motivation rivaling economic motivation. Anyway the study strongly suggests that there really is no clearly markable percentage line at which income taxation becomes self- get the public interested. defeating.

## Holmes Alexander You'll Love Or Loathe Them

WASHINGTON - Not many polemic books turn out to be lasting literature, any more than cartoons turn out to be enduring art - but how often the special - pleading tract and the grossly - extravagant caricature can illuminate and demonstrate the problems that we love with. Here are some wide - swinging books with social comment, often - distorted but vividly instructive.

IN "MARX'S Concept of Man," Erich Fromm tries to alter the accepted American belief (he calls it an "irrational and paranoid attitude") that Marx, the messiah of commun-'ism, is a "devil." Psychiatrist Fromm's contemptuous opinion of America, previously expressed in his other books, serves him well in this one. The more he depicts private enterprise as slavery and the average man's desire to better himself as degrading, the more Dr. Fromm can elevate the Marxian philosophy of freedom - through - socialism. The worst thing he can say about Russia is that it is not Marxian enough, but

### Billy Graham

You say that to be a Christian all we must do is repent of our sins, confess Christ openly, and we are saved. Is this all there is to being a Christian?

While I don't recall making that precise statement, it is in fact the core of 'beginning' the Christian life. The Bible says, "As many as received Him, to them gave He the power to become the sons of God." But birth and development are two different things, and we should not confuse the two. To be 'born of God' is one thing, but to develop into Christian maturity is another. Birth may be simple and easy, but growth practically always involves 'growing

To be a mature Christian is one of the most rigorous, challenging adventures in the world. One must resist conformity, be self - effacing, and above all, bend one's will to the will of God. An acorn can be dropped into the ground with little effort, but to nurture that tiny seed into a might oak takes patience and toil. If I left the impression that it is a light, easy thing to be an effective Christian, I am sorry. But, though it is a tough challenge, the rewards in this life and the life to come, are enormous, "And everyone that hath forsaken houses, or brethren or sisters or fathers, or wife or mother, or children, or lands, for my name's sake, shall receive an hundred fold, and shall inherit everhis most caustic tirades are against poor old homo Americanus.

JUST AS Dr. Fromm chides Americans for thinking of Marx as a "devil," Robert H. Montgomery, in his foreward to "The New Americanism" by Robert Welch, literally does the same for his protagonist. The Welch pitch in this instance is that the form, the quality and nationality of any government is not nearly so significant as its quantity - its sheer size. He agrees with Lord Acton that great men in the political area are almost always bad men, and with Professor Sorokin of Harvard that mankind's rulers are historically "the most criminal group in a respective population." From here Mr. Welch moves to his clincher: Reduce the size of all national governments by one-third, and you reduce the probability of war in the same ratio.

TODAY THE biggest warlike decision is whether to match Russia in defensive as well as offensive nuclear weapons. M. Evans proposes that we "cashier" the whole caboodle of peaceplanners who have conspired to insure that we can't win our next big

ANOTHER CABOODLE of miscreants, according to L. Brent Bozell in "The Warren Revolution," are our modern "constitution - makers." Readers who look for "Hang Earl Warren" won't find it in this closelyargued volume, but they may feel like going out to look for a rope, provided they can stick with the tedious but devastating scholarship. Bozell says that we always did have two constitutions: one fixed and one fluid. The fixed one declares, in the First Amendment, that "Congress shall make no law abridging the freedom of speech." The fluid one says that free speech, while a dandy thing, must not be misused to endanger our

## A Voice That Wasn't Heeded

WASHINGTON - While much attention is currently being given to the anniversary of the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor 25 years ago, little is generally known, even today, about what really happened in the months immediately preceding the outbreak. American officials had a feeling at the time that an attack was imminent, but military men thought it would come in the vicinity of the Philippines.

A FEW WEEKS before the assault on Pearl Harbor, this correspondent had a long talk here with Admiral Nomura, the Japanese ambassador to the United States, who was plainly worried about a possible war. He felt it would be senseless, and privately remarked:

"If war comes, you will win. But war settles nothing that peaceful negotiation at the opportune moment could not settle much better.'

Subsequently a member of the Japanese parliament who had graduated from an American college called on this writer in Washington and explained that, while the military clique had virtually taken over in Japan, there was still a chance for peace. The Japanese ambassador and the visitor from Japan later talked at length with this correspondent, who urged that all such information be disclosed just as frankly to the Department of State.

MANY YEARS later, former President Hoover, upon learning of the strenuous efforts made by Ambassador Nomura to prevent a war, wrote him a letter in which Mr. Hoover

"In making a study of the period when you so earnestly and ably strove to prevent a war in the Pacific, I find myself time and again filled with admiration for your efforts. And what a better world this would be had your urging been heeded!"

It is a fact that Admiral Normura wasn't told in advance by his government of the plan to attack in Hawaii or of any decision to break off diplomatic relations with the United States.

CORDELL HULL, who was Secretary of State at the time, voiced his anxiety in cabinet councils. He believed that war with Japan was likely and was well aware that the Hitler government in Berlin was doing everything it could to consummate a secret alliance with the Tokyo

While American entry into World War II might not have been prevented, due to dangers on the Atlantic side, there is reason to think the Japanese might have become an ally of the West rather than a partner of the Nazi government in Germany. On Nov. 27, 1941, this correspondent wrote in one of his dispatches:

"AS BEFITS A delicate negotiation, the conversations between the Japanese and American governments have been carried on with the utmost secrecy. Yet everybody knows that matters of the gravest importance are under discussion. The issues are fundamental, and while there are certain risks in publicity, there are, on the other hand, considerations which would make it possible for the Japanese and the American peoples to avoid friction if the nature of the problem were better understood by the public in both coun-

"The United States holds some trump cards because her financial and economic resources can be of material assistance to both Japan and China in an era of reconstruction, and everybody knows that economically both countries are in desperate circumstances.

THROUGH government control of the press, the people of Japan were kept in the dark about negotiations with the United States. Maybe if world wide radio had been available to all peoples then, the result would have been different.

The lessons of 1941 are more than ever important today. President Johnson by his recent trip to Asia dramatized before all Asian peoples the deep interest of the United States in helping them achieve a better standard of living, the lack of which has enabled the Communists to gain the upper hand in China.

IT IS APPARENT, as Ambassador Nomura predicted, that war hasn't settled the Asian dilemma. The peoples of the world, however, are better informed today, and this can lead to constructive steps in Asia such as were taken in Europe in 1947 through the Marshall Plan, Maybe if Asia had been given similar help in the postwar period, China would not have been seized in 1949 by the Communists. Then perhaps there wouldn't have been a Korean War in 1950 or a Vietnam War today, both of which have cost many more billions than would have been needed to finance a plan for economic aid to Asia through the last 20 years. NEW YORK (AP)-On this 25th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, the economy of that once-defeated land is booming. Industrial might has replaced military

Reflecting this, its people, once led by militarists, seem dedicated to peace. But in 25 years a cruel irony has developed, and now much of Japan's good life is sustained by a war in Vietnam

HUNDREDS of millions of dollars

Vietnam. The relations between the United States and Japan, in a commercial sense at least, seem now as cordial as those between any two nations. Big problems exist, of course, but each problem can be worked out by diplom-

There are similarities in the businessmen of both nations that are really remarkable. Prototypes and counter parts are found in each. A "typical" American businessman is not much different from a "typical" Japanese businessman.

PARTLY BECAUSE of American aid, which began immediately after the war, partly through American technology, and a good deal through Japanese inventiveness, ingenuity and good sense, Japan quickly recovered from World War II.

During this period a mutual respect developed among commercial interests and is now sometimes re- ance of payments account.

ferred to as the "Pacific partnership" of Japan and America.

Annual trade between the two nations now is close to \$4.5 billion, perhaps the greatest trans-oceanic commerce ever developed between two It may be argued, and it has been,

that modern Japan's well being results from its need to fulfill the demands of its people through commercial rather than military means. MODERN JAPAN is no better off in natural resources than it ever was.

In fact, it is far shorter of resources than its Atlantic counterpart, Britain, or any of the heavily industrialized nations of Europe. Japan has attempted to solve

through commerce what its previous military leaders would not have believed possible.

For example, it must import its coal, some even from the United States. It must import scrap steel from North America and iron ore from Australia. But, nevertheless, it still exports finished steel to the United States.

There are many measures of this success. Here are a few:

-A very large percentage of the cheap transistor radios sold in America, even some which carry wellknown trademarks, are made in Ja-

-Japan is the world's largest shipbuilder and its steel mills are the third most productive in the world.


