Supreme Court Upholds Hoffa's Jury Tampering Conviction

Supreme Court upheld today the 1964 conviction of James R. Hoffa, Teamsters Union president, on jury tampering

"The use of secret informers is not per se unconstitutional," Justice Potter Stewart said in delivering the court's divided

SWEPT ASIDE

In his appeal Hoffa claimed his rights were violated by use of a paid government informer

Stewart swept aside this and other of the union leader's constitutional claims in affirming his conviction.

Chief Justice Earl Warren dissented. Justices Tom C. Clark and William O. Douglas filed a brief opinion saying they would have dismissed the appeal. Justices Byron R. White and Abe Fortas took no part in the case or in the decision.

There was no immediate comment from the Teamsters chief. Hoffa was tried in federal court in Chattanooga, Tenn., and was sentenced to eight years in prison and fined \$10,-

NOT EAVESDROPPER Hoffa's attorney, Joseph A. Fanelli, said Partin was placed in Hoffa's hotel suite in Nashville to gather information for the government.

However, Stewart said "Partin did not enter the suite by force or by stealth. He was not a surreptitious eavesdropper."

this effect "Courts have countenanced the use of informers from time immemorial; in cases of conspiracy or in other cases when the crime consists of preparing for another crime it is usually necessary to rely upon them or upon accomplices because the criminals will almost certainly

LEGAL MOVES

After dismissing Hoffa's several constitutional arguments, Stewart concluded his opinion affirming the labor leader's conviction by saying: "The Consti-tution does not require us to up-

set the jury's verdict." While today's decision was firmly against Hoffa, it does not necessarily mean he goes immediately to prison. Still open to him are an application for reconsideration by the high court, and possibly other legal moves.

Aged General **Weathers New Physical Test**

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's condition was reported "good" and his recovery prospects "excellent" after surgeons removed his gall bladder today, Walter Reed Army Hospital said.

Surgeons who operated on the 76-year-old five-star general said his heart action was "normal" during the operation that

lasted an hour and 45 minutes. Eisenhower in the past 10 had suffered two major heart attacks and the decision to remove his gall bladder withits "multiple" gall stones was in part aimed at avoiding any further strain on his heart,

'NO STONES'

The report on Eisenhower's condition came from the operating team in answer to written questions submitted by news.

The surgical team, headed by Lt. Gen. Leonard D. Heaton, said there were gall stones in the gall bladder but "no stones" were found in the common bile duct, the major channel of bile from the liver and gall bladder o the intestines.

The presence of stones in the common bile duct would have been potentially a more serious situation than evidently was found in Eisenhower's case.

LED TO KNIFE

The surgeons said that the operation disclosed that Eisenhower had "previous trouble" with the gall bladder - apparently before the recent diagnosis that led to the surgery.

Mamie Eisenhower, son John, and Dr. Milton Eisenhower the general's brother - were in the hospital ward and "they were kept informed periodically as to the progress of surgery, the surgeons reported.

"Gen. Heaton informed them the surgery was over," they

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





B52s Blast Red Forces **Before Drive**

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) - Striking at Communist forces believed readying another drive south, U.S. B52 Stratoforts bombed the Mu Gia Pass in North Vietnam today and the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam Sun-

The giant eight-engine bombers, each carying up to 27 tons of bombs, struck at a mile-long stretch of the mountain pass through which the North Vietnamese filter into Laos and down to South Vietnam.

The B52s attacked Communist concentrations Sunday in the demilitarized zone seven miles north of the U.S. Marine stronghold known as the Rockpile.

EIGHTH DRIVE

The attack on the Mu Gia Pass was the eighth B52 raid on North Vietnam and the first since Oct. 10. The B52s had not hit the demilitarized zone in almost two months, although other U.S. planes have pounded it repeatedly.

In other developments: -Some 2,000 more American combat infantrymen arrived in Vietnam to bolster U.S. strength

here to 365,700 men. -Two warships of the Thai navy arrived in Saigon to add to Thailand's contribution to the allied side. Thailand previously sent two C123 transport planes.

REDS DUCK

ASSAULTS BLUNTED

"Certainly I am positive that in some cases, when they decide to retreat, they go north," the spokesman said. He added, owever that he had no in formation that the North Vietnamese are using bases in China either to launch aerial missions or as a sanctuary.

In ground action, South Vietnamese infantrymen beat back three assaults today by an estimated Viet Cong battalion about 500 men — in two and a half hours of fighting 44 miles southwest of Saigon. Vietnamese headquarters said the gov-ernment forces took light casualties and killed 20 of the attackers.

FIERCE FIGHT

A reinforced platoon of up to 50 men from the U.S. 1st Infantry Division suffered heavy casualties Sunday in a fierce fight with an enemy force of unknown size about 10 miles north of Tay Ninh City, A U.S. spokesman said 26 Communists were killed. The clash was in War Zone C about 40 miles northwest of Saigon, an area of heavy fighting in Operation Attleboro last month.

BRIDGES BLASTED

Ground fighting elsewhere was small and scattered, both the U.S. and Vietnamese military commands reported. U.S. headquarters announced

that 442 American planes and four helicopters have been lost over North Vietnam since the start of the air offensive in August 1964. Over South Vietnam, headquarters said, 141 U.S. planes have gone down in com-bat and more than 240 helicopters have been lost since Janu-

Over North Vietnam, U.S. jet fighter - bombers flew through thunderstorms and low clouds Sunday on 85 bombing missions. Pilots reported destroying or damaging seven bridges, 13 junks and barges, an antiair-craft gun site, 16 staging and storage areas, and two bridges

northwest of Dong Hoi. The B52 raid on the Mu Gla Pass was the third by the huge bombers on this key target. The Guam-based Stratoforts struck the pass last April 12 - in the first B52 raid over North Vietnam - and again on April 27.



Animals Take LSD 'Trip'

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - Mice walked backwards, rabbits grew mean, and dogs just stared at the walls.

It was the effect of the hallucinatory drug LSD, fed to animals for two years by Dr. M. Jackson Marr, a psychology professor at Georgia Tech who hopes to find out what happens to animals - including people - on an LSD "trip."

His conclusion: LSD can be extremely dangerous when not administered under professional direction. "I would rather distribute cyanide free than LSD, because most people know how dangerous cyanide is," he said.

The drug has beneficial effects in treating patients, he said, but under improper application its dangers are "directly proportional to the incompetency of the person."

Reactions to LSD are as diverse and complex as the personalities of the users, Marr said, and it's the same with animals.

Rabbits and cats became pugnacious. Mice walked backward. Guppies tried to swim through their aquarium walls. Dogs became listless, stretched out and staring at a wall for



Landmark Decision

The United States Supreme Court's decision in the Julian Bond case far transcends the civil rights, or discrimination, issue involved. It has fundamental importance for representative government and the separation of powers in our Republican sys-

Bond, a Negro, was three times elected to the Georgia Legislature's General Assembly (House). Twice the legislature refused to seat him, and probably would have again. It relied on the federal and state constitutional rule that a lawmaking body is the judge of the election and qualifications of its members.

Bond had made unpopular, even repugnant, statements on the Vietnam war and the military draft. The Georgia Legislature said he thus was unqualified to serve, unfit because he could not uphold the office-taking oath to support the constitution

The U.S. Supreme Court, reversing that, has reinterpreted the U.S. Constitution's clause, "Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns, and qualifications of its own members. . ." The Texas Constitution's like clause is, "Each house shall be the judge of the qualifications and elections of its own members.

The other states have such rules, expressly or by implication. The highest court now says that power of the lawmaking bodies is limited to settling contested elections, and rejecting an elected candidate who fails to meet specified constitutional or statutory qualifications. It cannot reject an elected candidate because of his views nor try to read his mind regarding the sincerity of his oath of office.

The court's opinion says that citizens have the right to know the views of candidates they elect, and candidates would not be free to express those views if they could be rejected from office because of them.

On separation of powers, the U.S. Supreme Court held that lawmaking bodies cannot act capriciously, arbitrarily, or discriminatingly on such decisions. They must act within constitutional restraints interpreted by the judiciary. The Julian Bond case is truly a landmark decision, not because it seats a Negro in the Georgia legislature, but because of the much larger principle and application involved. It will be interesting now to see what effect this has on the complaint that Rep. Adam Clayton Powell "is not an inhabitant" of the district he represents.

Some Changes Due

Sometime before next June 30 Congress will have to produce a new version of the Selective Service and Training Act, popularly known as the draft, or extend the present law.

Because of the approaching deadline, private and public discussion of the draft has become a major source of news in recent months. There is no scarcity of alternatives. They range from universal military service, including women, to the drafting of 18-

year-olds only A minority profess to believe that the needs of the military services can be filled by volunteers - often the proviso is added, "if pay rates are increased substantially." But few responsible authorities are prepared to do without the draft. There is fairly general agreement that there are widespread inequities in the present system, but there is no general agree-

ment on a substitute

It is almost certain that there will be changes in the present law to satisfy some of the critics. The tentative form of the new law may emerge later this month or early next month, when the President's 20-member panel, the National Commission on Selective Service, is scheduled to make recommendations.

Congress will then be called upon to consider the President's proposals. The new law, whatever its dimensions, may be no more palatable to the youths in the land than the old and maybe wishing. one. But it will be an attempt to make the draft fairer, and more uniform, and perhaps remove some of the uncertainty under which so many college students now must live in their relations with local draft

David Lawrence Missiles And Anti-Missiles

WASHINGTON - Yes, there could apprehension as to the effectiveness be another Pearl Harbor. But it would be much worse next time. For it is estimated that 130 million Americans would be killed by a surprise nuclear attack. This is why there is so much discussion now in military circles about what is called the "Nike-X" system of anti-missile missiles. This, with certain other defensive measures, would be expected to cut the deaths to something like 60 million, and thereby save 70 million lives.

BUT THERE are as yet no antimissile defenses in the United States, and reliance is being placed entirely on the plan to use an avalanche of missiles to retaliate with such intensity that 100 million people in the enemy country could be killed and the economy destroyed.

The argument continues, however, as to whether the deterrent is adequate. The U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff are on record unanimously in favor of "Nike-X." Without mentioning this phase of the problem, Secretary of Defense McNamara - after a long discussion with President Johnsonlast week issued to the press a memorandum designed to allay any public

of America's missile strength

IT IS EVIDENT the administration felt it necessary to take public note of reports that the Soviets are rapidly increasing their missile strength. These reports began to filter out about three weeks ago from Western Europe and the Pentagon. They indicated that America's lead of four to one in intercontinental ballistic missiles was rapidly diminishing and that perhaps by 1970 the Soviet Union would catch up with the United States. Also, the Russians were reported already to be deploying an anti-missile system of their own around Moscow, Leningrad and other cities.

IN HIS statement, Secretary Mc-Namara conceded that U.S. intelligence agencies had underestimated the number of intercontinental ballistic missiles that the Soviets would have in place by the middle of 1968 and in subsequent years. But he insisted that this country could still deal a crushing counterblow to any attacking enemy.

The big question is whether the Russians will catch up with us. The possibility of a sneak attack is conceded. though the probability is very much discounted. For even if one country could inflict incredible damage on the other, the chances of an equally damaging retaliation are still considered to be a powerful deterrent. Secretary McNamara said in his memorandum the other day:

Mr. McNamara said that, even if the new intelligence estimate of Soviet buildup by mid-1968 proves accurate, the United States "will continue to have a substantial quantitative and qualitative superiority over the Soviet Union in intercontinental ballistic missiles at that time."

THE GREAT unanswered question is whether an irresponsible government in Moscow or Peiping will take all this into account. The irresponsible elements in Tokyo certainly didn't think things through when they ordered the attack on the United States on Dec. 7, 1941. It is necessary, therefore, to make sure that the people of every large country possessing nuclear weapons are kept fully informed of the dangers of a nuclear war, so that they may exercise a restraining hand and prevent any more Pearl Harbors.

The Johnson-Goldwater Problem

WASHINGTON - Among the selfevident truths of the 1966 election, is this one. All-out Johnsonism is as obsolete as all-out Goldwaterism. It is a conclusion reached by the writer upon the sorrowful testimony of two defeated candidates, one a Northern Democrat and the other a borderstate Republican, both of whom prefer the mercy of anonymity.

The Democrat complained that the architects of the Great Society have made a political miscalculation. The salient fact about the United States, he said, is not the residue of poverty, but the prevalence of prosperity. For all practical purposes, unemployment has disappeared. Except in politically insignificant numbers, the poor are no longer with us.

THE DEFEATED Democrat wants to remind his party that four-fifths of the voting-age population are now middle-class, with a two-car, color-TV status to maintain. The only known threat to their prosperity is the Johnson-period inflation which, they widely believe, is the result of domestic spending programs for ne'er-do-wells ing. Bees may like honey but No one is safe from attack and petty criminals in the city slums. Middle-class America did not rally in November to the supporters, the apologists and the tagalongs of the Johnson programs.

> THUS THE Democrat rationalized his defeat, and the Republican gave a similar analysis of his own disappointment - similar in that he blamed the man whom his party had nominated for President in 1964.

This Congressional candidate had been a Goldwater delegate, he said, and had never regretted it - until lately. During the campaign, his Democratic opponent kept reminding him of it, and as soon as the campaign ended some fellow-Republicans came around to do the same thing. They said he could run again for Con-

gress with their support - but only if he pledged himself, here and now, to Gov. Romney as the next presidential nominee.

THE MORAL in this tale of two defeated candidates is plain to read. If the Democrats have a nearby future, they can only achieve it by toning-down Lyndon. If the Republicans hope to keep on winning, they must water-down Barry. Both parties, that is, must admit to recent mistakes and must rectify them before coming again to the polls.

FOR THE Democrats, this means an agonizing reappraisal of the policies that guided the 89th Congress. In substance, these policies undertook to seize upon the national prosperity and to subdivide it among those who had earned it and those who had not. There is little equity in legislation which does not smile on industry and enterprising persons that move from the stifling cities to the elbow-room of the suburbs. Very little can be said for a War on Poverty which has become warfare among its own rank and file. Education and health insurance, the first being an investment in youth and the second a recompense for old age, should not be made matters of policial showmanship. They must not be laid on as crash programs with all the attendant waste and disillusion. Above all, for cities and suburbs, for earners and nonearners, the Democrats must promote no program ahead of the national defense and the winning of our wars.

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

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
