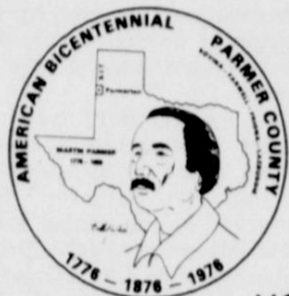

Early Morning Fire Claims Rural Victim

RESIDENTS IN OTHER states apparently share the problem that we in the Panhandle area of Texas have inherited due to the "one man, one vote" concept--more taxation and less representation.

This week we read that residents of two small islands off the coast of Massachusetts, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket, have found themselves slighted in that state's recent redistricting and realignment of their state legislature.

A state referendum passed in 1974 in Massachusetts trimmed the state legislature from 40 to 160 members. Nantucket, which has a year-around population of 6,000, and Martha's Vineyard, with a population of 8,000 found themselves lumped with a mainland district, although this district has no direct ferry connections with the islands.

So, in January, local leaders decided to dramatize their problem by voting to secede from the state, and posing the idea that they might even establish an independent nation.

Last week, the island leaders marched into the statehouse in Boston, and unfurled a flag proudly exhibiting a seagull, and declared themselves independent of the motherland of Massachusetts.

Neighboring state governors of Vermont, Connecticut and Rhode Island got into the act by offering to annex the two islands, if Massachusetts didn't want them.

State leaders called the islanders' action absurd, while grappling for a solution to the problem. But historians point out that residents of these islands can't be taken lightly. After all, they point out, Martha's Vineyard joined Massachusetts in 1692 only after seceding from New York!

So, watch out, Austin. We could secede, you know.

THANKS TO SEVERAL who called our attention to the article in the Lubbock paper this week concerning the local tie-in on the New Mexico treasure hunt.

According to the story, the city of Brownfield also has a local tie-in with the hunt, in the form of Curtis Lawson, who recalled a 1938 visit with "Doc" Noss, along with a C.D. Patterson and a man he remembered only as "Parr."

The three had driven to White Sands, N.M., according to the newspaper account, to talk to Noss about the possibility of investing in the gold recovery project.

Lonnie Mitchell, 55, died in a rural house fire early Wednesday morning, and his wife Norma was treated for minor burns at Parmer County Community Hospital.

Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said that Mrs. Mitchell was sitting in an automobile in front of the burning house, screaming "He's still in there," when members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department arrived on the scene.

The farmhouse was engulfed in flames when the firemen arrived, about 4 a.m. Wednesday. Flames were eating through the roof of the house and it was filled with smoke.

Mitchell was discovered in an inside room, lying just inside a doorway. He was burned beyond recognition. Smoke inhalation was blamed for Mitchell's death.

Mrs. Mitchell told the firemen that her husband pushed her outside, then said he was going back in "for some papers," and re-entered the burning house.

The Fire Chief theorized that the fire was started when a couch on which Mrs. Mitchell had been lying caught fire. She apparently had been smoking prior to falling asleep.

Mrs. Mitchell was treated for burns on her head and arms, and also for shock, but was not kept at the hospital.

Funeral services were scheduled for 2 p.m. Friday at the Calvary Missionary Baptist Church of Farwell, with the pastor, Carroll Watkins, officiating. Burial was to be in the Oklahoma Lane cemetery.

Pallbearers were Bill Roach, Frank Posey, Orval Walls, Jack

Taylor, Bobby Joe Winegeart and Fred Cantrell.

Mitchell was born in El Reno, Okla. He had lived in this area a number of years and had been in Friona about two years. He was a farmer, had served in the Army during World War II and was a member of the Broadview, N.M., Nazarene Church.

Survivors other than his widow include three daughters, Mrs. Carroll Ann Willis of Lubbock, Mrs. Mary Jane Wood of Deming, N.M.,

and Mrs. Linda Sue Winegeart of Germany; a son, Lonnie Dean of Lubbock; a sister, Mrs. Edna Stoutt of Wichita, Kan.; and ten grandchildren.

Little Dribblers Attend State Meet

Friona's Little Dribbler All-Stars were competing in the state "American Major" division tournament at Hearst this week, after winning the regional tournament at Bovina last weekend.

The Friona team won four out of five games at the regional tournament, which was made up of teams from Sudan, Springlake-Earth, Farwell, Olton, Bovina and Sierra Blanca (from the El Paso area), in addition to Friona.

Friona drew a bye in the first round of the state tournament, which has teams additionally from Denver City, Hale Center and Breckenridge.

Friona was to meet the winner of the Denver City-Breckenridge game at 9 a.m. Friday. The team then was to play again Friday afternoon, regardless of whether they won or lost. The tournament is a double-

elimination event, with the finals set for 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

In the regional tournament, Friona downed Sudan, 24-22 in an overtime, in their first-round game, behind Mike Neill's 14 points. It was a come-from-behind effort for Friona, which trailed 16-11 at halftime and tied 22-22 at the end of regulation play.

The team then scored an easy win over Sierra Blanca, 40-20, running up a 26-10 lead after three quarters. All players on Friona's roster scored points except one in this game.

Friona then met Bovina, a team with the unlikely combination of four left-handed players, and it was a nip

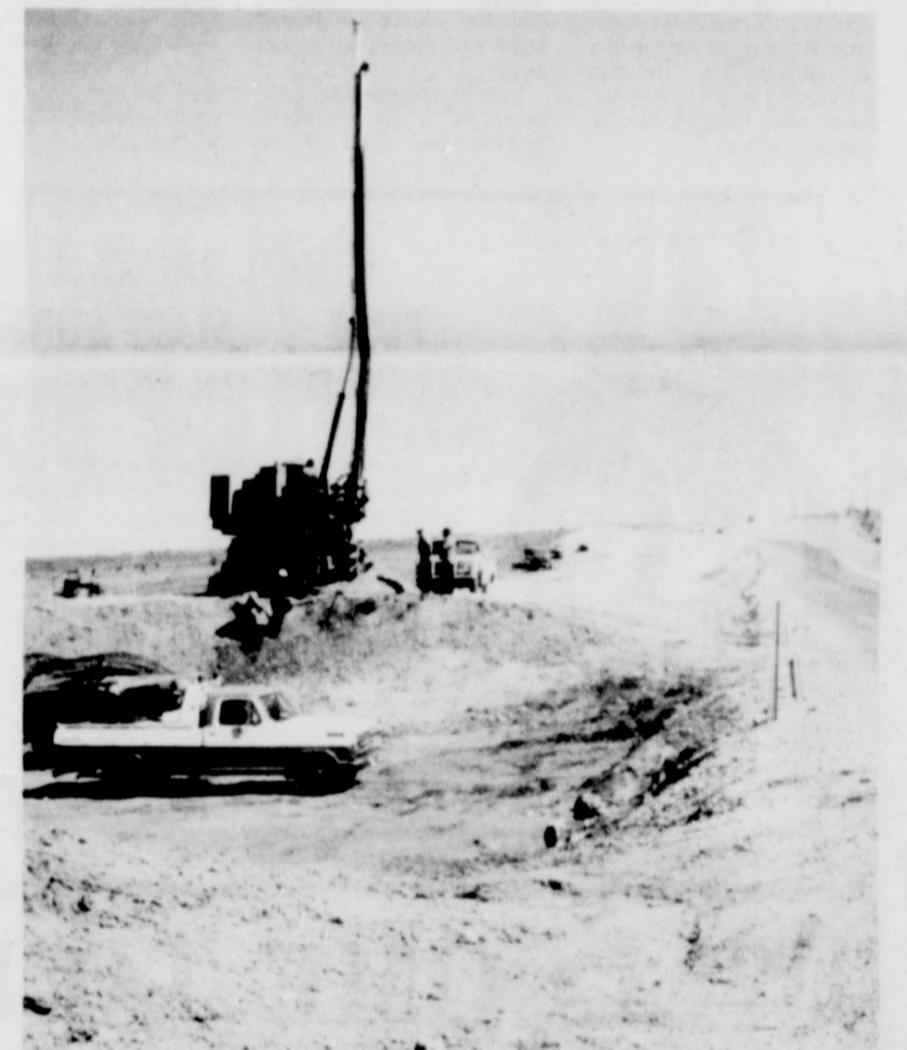
Appeal Made For Names

Friona schools made another appeal this week for names of all children who will be in kindergarten next school year. All parents of children who have not been in school before and who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1977 are urged to be sure the school has the child's name, date of birth, parents' names and addresses.

"We are not getting these names in as quickly as we ordinarily do, and I don't feel that our pre-school population has dropped drastically," stated Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe in making an appeal for names.

Parents of prospective kindergarten students are asked to call Freeman Melton, Jr., elementary school principal, and request a form to be filled out.

A meeting will be held for next year's kindergarten parents later this spring. Parents will be notified as to the date and time of this meeting.

Council To Hold Hearing On Change

The Friona City Council again considered the possibility of equipping the city with steel trash containers at its regular meeting last Monday.

However, since the city is considering spending Revenue Sharing Funds, it will be necessary for the city to seek another bid on the project, and also to hold a public hearing on the acceptability of having the new trash system.

In other business, payment to McKillip Dragline Service of Farwell for digging two landfill pits was approved.

A resolution declaring the results of the annual City Election was approved, and the oaths were administered to the two new members of the council, Beth Thompson and Jerry Brown.

B.K. Buske was appointed by the council as Mayor Pro-Tem.

The possibility of repainting the interior of the Law Enforcement Center building was tabled. Approval was granted for the renewal of contract with the consulting engineer, at a 2.71 per cent increase in cost due to inflation. The council also authorized City Manager Jake Outland to enter into contract with Jake Diel Dirt and Paving Company for sealcoating of 22 blocks in the city this summer, to

repair streets most damaged by freezing, etc. The project is to cost an estimated \$11,000.

Doyle Elliott, city attorney, submitted his resignation. Selection of a consulting attorney is pending.

SCS Awards RWD Pact

The Soil Conservation Service awarded the contract on the Lazbuddie dam on Running Water Draw to Earth Movers, Inc. of Amarillo, otherwise known as DePauw.

The bid amount was \$1,293,850.00. Construction on the dam is expected to begin within three to four weeks, or around May 1.

Construction of the dam on Running Water Draw will climax a number of years of efforts by the local Soil Conservation District representatives.

The dam near Bovina on Catfish Draw, a tributary to RWD, was completed in 1973. A contract to re-seed the Bovina dam with grass was awarded to Erwin Brockmyer of the Austin area.

REMEMBERING... Boom Town

When the first derrick was set up it was regarded with curiosity by most people in the county, so much so that folks would come from miles around just to watch the drilling process and discuss the possibility of a strike, though most doubted that would happen.

When the well came in it was said to be the most spectacular sight. Oil shot more than a hundred feet over the top of the rig. The driller said it was the best well he'd ever seen.

Within a few months the night sky was lit up with derrick lights, flares and burning slush pits. Big trucks tore up and down the dusty roads and strangers started moving in.

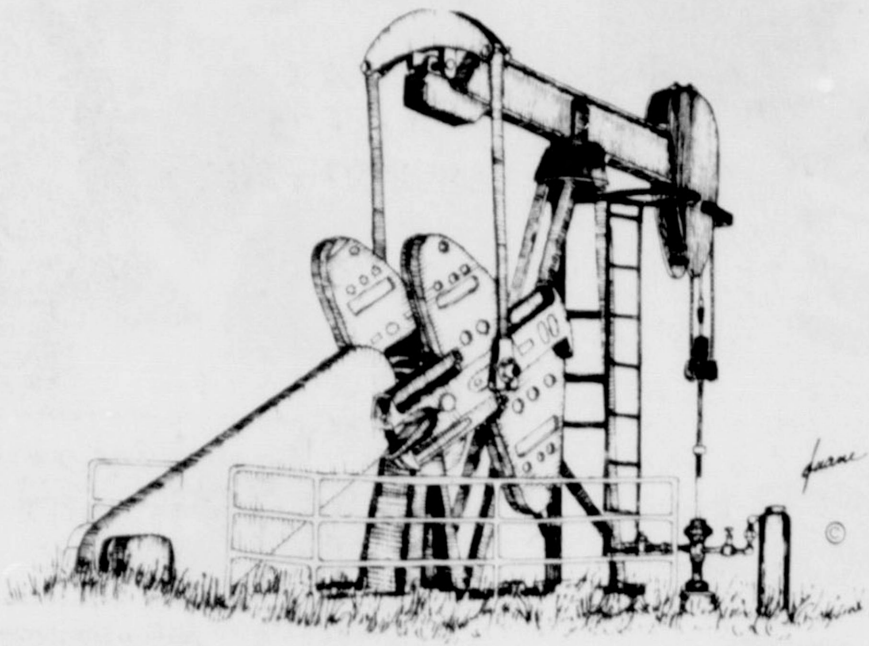
Before that when we went into town it was sort of quiet, peaceful with a few local townspeople and farmers standing around the courthouse lawn talking about the weather. The discovery of oil changed all that. The streets were jammed with trucks and cars and rigs and machinery. NO VACANCY signs were out on all hotels, boarding houses, and tourist courts. Sidewalks were so crowded with people you could hardly walk. Shacks were thrown together for living quarters and one family I knew even lived in an old oil tank. The tank wasn't as bad as it may sound, they put windows and a door in it and it was fixed up pretty nice, better than lots of folks' houses. There were numerous fights in the streets and once I even saw a man standing on the top of a pickup preachin'. He was screaming to the crowd but most were ignoring him or laughing at him.

A friend of mine washed dishes in one of the cafes. Seems a big roughneck came in late one night and ordered a T-bone steak. The owner said, "Don't have no T-bone steak, you'll have to order something else." The perturbed roughneck grabbed him by the collar, and said, "I'm ordering alright, I'm ordering you to cook me a T-bone steak, if you don't have one you better find one!" The owner ran to the kitchen and grabbed a round steak. He cut the bone out of it then started digging in the garbage can. My friend ask him what he was doing and he whispered, "If the man wants a T-bone steak he'll get a T-bone steak." He dug out a T-bone from the garbage and pounded it into the round steak and cooked it for the man.

Lots of people got rich overnight. A man we knew had been poor all his life. He

had an old rocky farm that seldom produced a crop but they drilled him more than a dozen good wells. When he went in to pay off the mortgage the banker said, "Lawrence, looks like you'll have money to buy all the things you need." Lawrence replied, "Danged if I don't think I'll buy some things I don't need for a change!"

The town grew five times larger in little more than a year. But it came through the growing pains with an unexpected maturity. Far-sighted civic leaders saw to it that revenues went towards public improvements. Streets were paved, parks were constructed, recreational facilities were established and new schools were built. Some said the finest in the state. The town continues to grow and prosper to this day on the foundation laid by the oil boom.

45 YEARS AGO—APRIL 8, 1932

The 1932 Friona school election passed off Saturday very quietly and resulted in the election of David Mosley, F.W. Reeve and J.B. McFarland.

Friona's third city election passed into history Tuesday evening, when the election forces had finished the count and declared the results. M.A. Crum was elected mayor. Other candidates were F.W. Reeve and S. Mitchell. F.L. Spring and E.V. Rushing were elected board members. Other candidates for board members were D.H. Meade, E.B. McLellan and L.R. Dilger.

35 YEARS AGO—APRIL 3, 1942

Residents of Friona and surrounding territory will be privileged to take the Red Cross First Aid course, according to announcements today. The course, as in many other communities, will be taught by State Highway patrolmen and will feature two classes each week.

Harold Lillard, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.F. Lillard, of this community, departed Wednesday morning for Lubbock, where he was called to take final examination as a flying cadet.

25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 3, 1952

Announcement was made this week of a new gin to be erected one and a quarter miles south of Hub. This is a complete new Continental electric gin, being built by Miles and Fleming of Burkburnett with construction to begin about April 5.

Friona businessmen came through this week and are posting some \$400 in awards for winning entries in the Parmer County Junior

Livestock Show to be held at the local fairgrounds next weekend, Friday and Saturday, April 11 and 12. Though original plans called for elimination of cash prizes, it was decided at a meeting Wednesday evening at the Chamber of Commerce offices that the money would stimulate interest sufficient to warrant the prizes.

20 YEARS AGO—APRIL 4, 1957

One man received serious injuries and another one was less seriously hurt in a well drilling accident on the Leonard Haws farm east of town Monday afternoon. At the time of the accident the drill stem was being lifted up so that a joint of pipe could be put into the hole. Sonny Weaks became pinned beneath the drill stem and called to Waymon Wilkins to get him out. In trying to free Weaks, Wilkins became entangled in the rope by both his feet and arms. Upon hearing the confusion Bill Bandy ran to turn off the motor. Weaks suffered a gash in his head. He was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital and released. Wilkins was moved to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

15 YEARS AGO—APRIL 5, 1962

Plaques were presented to Friona's outstanding citizens at the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture annual banquet Friday. Mrs. Arvella England was chosen most courteous employee; Miss Jo Phillips, teacher of the year; George Jones, man of the year; and Mrs. Rose Lange, woman of the year. Voting was very light in the city

election Tuesday. Of the estimated 490 qualified voters in the city, 76 cast ballots. Raymond Fleming was re-elected mayor for another term and Glenn Reeve and Ralph Taylor gained alderman positions.

10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 30, 1967

David White, sixth-grade student at Friona Junior High School, won the Parmer County junior spelling bee held at Bovina last week. David, the son of Mr. and Mrs. N.C. White, Jr. of Route 1, Friona, won the bee over some 14 other spellers from throughout the county.

5 YEARS AGO—APRIL 6, 1972

Friona voters turned out in near-record numbers, in spite of the Easter weekend, to give their okay to two \$50,000 bond issues last Saturday on the annual city election ballot. Voters also returned incumbent aldermen Gary Grown and Bill Ellis to the City Council. Mayor R.L. Fleming, unopposed on the ballot, was re-elected. The new fire station issue (Proposition 1) passed by approximately a 3-1 margin, getting 306 favorable votes, to 119 opposed. The \$50,000 waterworks issue (Proposition 2) passed by a larger margin of approximately 6-1, with 366 favorable votes to only 60 votes against.

Wesley Barnett and Ronald Smiley were elected to the Friona School Board in the annual trustee election last Saturday. Holdover members of the school board are Steve Messenger, John Blackburn, Floyd Schueler, David Grimsley and Leroy Johnson.

Men are also asked to accompany their wives to the meeting and express their opinion on what needs to be done to keep the farmer in business.

Corn Growers Set Parley

A meeting scheduled in Dimmitt Tuesday will be the first of three corn growers' meetings to be held this month over the area by the Texas Corn Growers Association, to discuss a proposed check-off fee referendum.

Set for 7:30 p.m. in the Castro County Courthouse community room, the meeting is for corn growers in Castro, Parmer, Lamb, Deaf Smith and Bailey counties.

The proposed check-off fee on corn would provide funds for research, marketing and development of the crop, according to Carl King, president of the Texas Corn Growers.

King was elected to a director's post on the National Corn Growers Association recently in a meeting at Moline, Ill.

"I'm glad the Texas Corn Growers Association is now represented on the national board," King remarked.

Other meetings scheduled are: --April 19 in Plainview for corn growers in Hale, Swisher, Floyd, Briscoe and Randall counties.

--April 26 at Dumas for growers in Moore, Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Hartley, Hutchison and Carson counties.

These 18 counties, which produce more than 89 per cent of all corn grown in Texas, are in the area earmarked for the proposed checkoff referendum.

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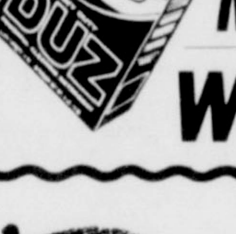

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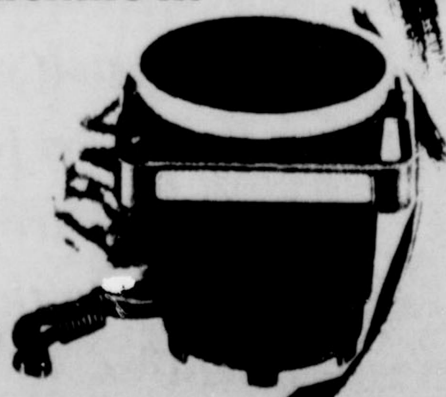

Winners Listed In Bovina

A moderate turn-out Bovina citizens cast 252 ballots Saturday in designating their choices for two vacancies on the City Council.

Rouel Barron was the recipient of the highest number of votes for any council candidate with 127, and Fred W. O'Hair also was elected, receiving 100 votes.

Ken Horn, running to succeed himself, was given the nod by 72 balloters, while Norma Whitten collected 94 votes; Radford Venable, 41; Jim Carey, 34, and Dwaln Nance, 27.

crashes is not increasing. In 1976, the U.S. airline industry had the fewest accidents in its history, and the lowest number of fatalities in 20 years, even though a record 2.5 billion miles were logged and the number of passengers hit an all-time high of 220 million.

Private and corporate airplanes have a lesser safety record than the commercial flights, and this explains why you hear about more crashes involving small planes.

But, according to the latest travel statistics, flying commercially is still ten times as safe as driving, based on deaths per miles of travel. However, compared to trains and buses, flying is a bit more risky, the figures show.

The two jumbo jets which crashed in the Canary Islands on March 27 and claimed more than 575 lives, involved charter flights. Figures were not readily available on charter flights versus regularly scheduled flights, but it could appear that such flights are more risky.

Also, figures released by the London Sunday Times indicate that foreign airlines are apparently less safe than those in the United States. The study showed that the U.S. airlines were four times as safe as the world average, and 25 times as safe as airlines in Eastern Europe. The reason cited was the U.S. safety standards which are stricter and more stringently enforced.

Foreign countries, it was pointed out, usually adopt each new American safety standard, but not until several years after it has been in force in the U.S.

Light Turnout Elects Leaders

In a comparatively light turnout of voters last Saturday, Friona voters elected two members to the school board, and three members to the Friona City Council.

Re-elected to the school board was Jerry Hinkle, who led the four-man field with 217 votes. Jerry London was also elected to a three-year term, with 192 votes. Otherwise on the school ballot, M.C. Osborn received 154 votes and Gaylord Maurer 124 votes.

D.C. Herring, unopposed for a spot on the county school board, received 233 votes. A total of 353 persons voted in the school election.

In the city council race, Jerry Brown and Beth Thompson were elected to the council, and incumbent Pat Pace was re-elected. Brown received 278 votes; Mrs. Thompson 271 and Pace 237. The fourth candidate, Haywood Vaughn, trailed with 82 votes.

A total of 305 voted in the city election.

City Building Permits Slow During March

Three building permits were issued by the City of Friona for the month of March. Of the three, one was for a new residence, valued at \$40,000; one for an addition to a residence, to cost \$15,000, and another for an addition to a commercial building at \$4,500, for a total of \$59,500 for the month.

Other monthly records released by City Manager Jake Outland showed three new water taps made during the month, making a total of 1360 active taps within the city.

Water department records showed that a total of 18,890,000 gallons of water were pumped during March, an average of 609,384 gallons per day, a considerable increase over February.

Moisture received during the month amounted to .72 inch, most of which came in a good slow rain March 26-27.

One new sewer tap was added, bringing the total number of such taps to 1332 in the city.

Seven fire alarms were sounded during the month. Four of these were grass fires, with the greatest damage estimated at \$1,000 at the Grimsley farm March 1. An estimated \$3,000 in damage was suffered at an apartment at 1109 Washington on March 28.

Police Department records showed 60 arrests during the month, including 49 for traffic violations, and three for being drunk in public.

Three thousand pounds of dry fertilizer was applied to the City Park March 7, with good waterings following.

Consulting city engineer M.R. (Red) Smith visited the city March 10 and selected blocks to be included in the city's annual sealcoat maintenance program this summer.

Library records showed 764 books checked out by 294 patrons during the month, of which eight were new readers. A total of 401 new books have been received and processed since January 1.

The city's trash hauling operations were interrupted once during the month due to high north winds which made it impossible to load the truck.

Training Course Set For Friona

A Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training class will be held April 11-12-14 at the Friona City Hall, it was announced this week. Classes will be conducted from 7-10 p.m. nightly.

Janice Auburg, a certified CPR instructor, will conduct the classes.

The CPR equipment was purchased by the county, and can be used by any group within Parmer County interested in promoting the classes.

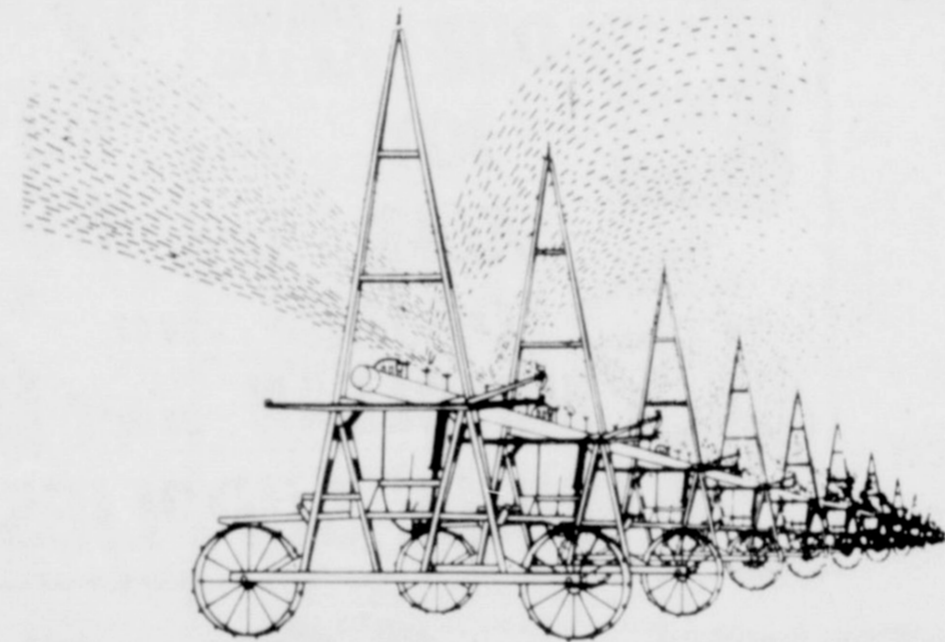

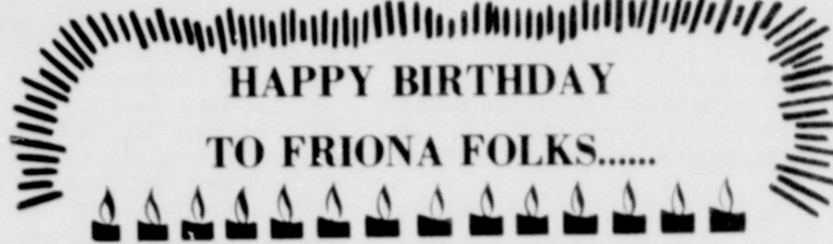
This is a special month in Friona because the American Cancer Society's educational and fund raising Crusade gives people a chance to DO something about cancer.
