AGAINST MIKE BLACKBURN

Court Dismisses Homicide Charges

Charges against Michael Blackburn of criminally negligent homicide were dismissed Tuesday in County Judge Paul Fortenberry's court at Farwell.

Blackburn, who had been charged in February when a two-vehicle accident on Main Street in Friona left one man dead, had entered a plea of not guilty to the charge that he had caused the death.

The charges were dismissed when the state prosecutor failed to prove elements of criminal negligence existed in this case. The state called five witnesses, but they all agreed that the accident would never have

happened if another vehicle, driven by David Darnell of Friona, had not pulled in front of Blackburn's pickup.

The accident happened on January 28 when Blackburn was driving a 1975 Ford pickup headed north on Main Street. A 1976 Dodge pickup headed south, driven by Darnell, attempted to turn left into the path of Blackburn. The two vehicles collided and Larry Smith, 24, of Friona, a passenger in the Darnell pickup, was dead on arrival at the local hospital after the accident.

Drivers of both vehicles were given traffic citations. Blackburn was cited for driving at an unsafe speed and Darnell was given a ticket

for failure to yield right of way during a left hand turn.

Six hours after the court was called into session Tuesday, defense attorney Doyle Elliott asked that the charges be dismissed. He had subpoenaed twelve witnesses that were ready to testify in Blackburn's defense, but at the conclusion of the state's case against the defense Elliott said he felt there was no use in going further since the state's five witnesses failed to provide evidence to support the charge.

After a short recess in the afternoon to ponder the case, County Attorney John Actkinson withdrew the charges and Judge Fortenberry declared Blackburn not guilty.

The defense's motion to dismiss the case was based on charges of insufficient and conflicting evidence and testimony. State's witnesses said empty beer bottles and cans were found at the scene, and both drivers admitted they had been drinking, but no evidence of the amount of beer each had consumed was confirmed. The alleged speed of Blackburn's pickup was ranged from 35 mph to 70 mph in a 30 mph speed zone.

The cause of Smith's death was not established in the courtroom either. Testimony of one witness said that Smith had received chest injuries several days prior to the accident. Proof of the cause of Smith's death was not introduced into the case.

The defense's main point throughout the case continued to be that an accident would not have happened if the pickup had not pulled in front of Blackburn's vehicle.

Craig Hunter Is New Squaw Coach

Craig Hunter, 28, of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, has been named as the new Friona girls' basketball and track coach for the next school year, it was announced last week.

Hunter, who has a varied experience in teaching and coaching, has been with Happy High School for the past year as head girls' basketball and track coach, varsity football line coach and boys assistant track coach.

He spent three years with Sanford-Fritch High School where he coached and taught until 1976.

From 1968 to 1970 he attended Oklahoma State University on a football scholarship, and majored in forestry. During the following three years he was enrolled at Panhandle State University on a football scholarship where he studied physical education and earth science.

Hunter is married to the former Karen Woods of Dalhart, and they

have two children, Jill, age two, and Jenny, four months.

New Rules Apply For Measles Shots

Students of the Friona Schools were presented with a memorandum last week from the Department of Health Resources concerning recommendations for measles vaccine booster shots.

Although no increase in measles cases have been reported locally, the memorandum stated that measles cases are now being reported in Texas child-care facilities and schools, and in order to prevent further spread of measles, the Department of Health is taking this means to notify parents that some children may need measles vaccine boosters.

A local doctor told the Star Monday that since 1967 Parmer County Community Hospital has been using a vaccine which prevents measles, but further said any child who received a shot before that time may not be properly immunized and should check with his family physician.

The memorandum advised that a child may need a measles booster if he received his measles vaccine before his first birthday, and has not had measles vaccine or measles illness since then. Also, if the child was immunized with "killed virus" or "inactivated" type of vaccine,

which was used between 1963 and 1967, he may need the booster.

Parmer County Community Hospital confirmed two cases of measles last month, but hospital officials said this was not out of the ordinary, and an outbreak is not occurring here. In this case, the memorandum said, there is no need for worry or haste, since revaccination may be obtained at the parents convenience. However, prompt attention should be directed to obtaining the measles booster if it is needed.

Spring Invades

Spring-like weather prevailed in the county last week with temperatures reaching into the 70's and 80's and scattered rain showers being reported in various sections.

Although no moisture was reported by the city this week, rural residents to the north and east of Friona received light rain Monday and threatening conditions existed again Thursday and Friday.

REMEMBERING... Home Remedies

Most of the communities around where I grew up were about as big as factories as they were of skyscrapers and consequently, most "doctors" was done in the home, usually by a granny or neighbor who had the knack for it. Some remedies were traded or passed around freely whenever anybody had a need. Just about any kind of affliction could be treated with some concoction whose ingredients could be found in most homes. Things like coal oil, epsom salts, turpentine, baking soda, castor oil and certainly a little importance—whiskey.

Other items good for curin' were found in the fields and pastures if one knew where to look and what he was looking for. Various roots, herbs, leaves, saps, and berries as well as some types of clay could be made into medicines. It was common knowledge what was good for curing but if you were in doubt you could always ask around. Chances were you'd get several different answers for one particular ailment but then, people now-a-days like to get more than one medical opinion.

There were remedies for nose bleed, warts, whooping cough, sneezing, sleeplessness, belly ache, diarrhea, fever, biliousness, constipation and bedwetting, although the remedies were sometimes harder on a person than the affliction. For example, a person who was tired, weak or pale was sometimes treated by drinking water that had set for several days with nails in it. Supposedly the rusty water contained just the right thing to perk a person up and make him strong.

Something I remember all too well was the fact that everytime I would fuss with my brother or sister or was grouchy I was sure to get a dose of sirup of pepsin. Seems a person's attitude is

linked somehow to his bowels and naturally when one is stubborn the other will be too. Anyhow when I heard the words "sirup of pepsin"

my attitude immediately became more tolerable.

Many households had a big illustrated medical book. Just about all pertinent

medical knowledge was housed therein, a ready reference as to the cause and cure of any ailment. The book was usually kept high on a shelf in the closet, out of reach of children who might look at the illustrations and see something they shouldn't. The books were sometimes obtained free when you subscribed to a five-year subscription in some farm magazine but they could also be bought by mail order.

Some people swore by certain remedies while other people died by those same remedies. Lots of folks believed like me that in our community who said, "Brother when it comes your time to go you're gone, an' there ain't no amount of medicine gonna keep you here."

But I'm glad I live only a short distance from fine hospitals, doctors and drug stores and don't have to depend upon coal oil and turpentine to keep me well.

46 YEARS AGO—APRIL 29, 1932
L.G. Simpson, superintendent of the city water works, has been quite busy during the past two weeks installing water meters for those of the city's patrons who have not as yet had meters.

The new golf course which has been in process of construction for the past two weeks, under auspices of the Friona Golf Club, was pronounced ready for use Sunday and many of the members spent a part of the day playing thereon.

25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 16, 1952
Prior to the A.A.A.'s wheat program, huge supplies always meant low prices. Clin Schiebler, chairman, Deaf Smith county A.A.A. committee, said this week. During the last few years domestic wheat prices have consistently followed low prices, Schiebler said. During 1928, 1929 and 1940, farmers received 36.2 cents, 49.2 cents and 49.2 cents

per bushel, respectively, while the average loan rate for the same years was 23 cents, 43 cents and 43.5 cents per bushel, respectively.

25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 22, 1952
Evidently the newly elected Friona city commission has culled up its sleeves and gone to work, judging by the amount of business transacted by that group in the last week. With the telephone rate increase on the agenda, summer water rates to be determined, and routine city business needing attention, telephone rate increases were granted the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company Friday night by the Friona City Commission.

20 YEARS AGO—APRIL 25, 1957
School bonds totaling \$300,000, which were approved last month by the voters of the district for the purpose of additional buildings were sold to Municipal Securities Co., Edelman Fidelity Co., and Thornton & McWaters, Inc., Tuesday evening. The bids which were accepted averaged 4.648 per cent interest. Of the six companies which submitted bids, five sent representatives to the meeting.

Farmer County notaries public were reminded this week by Hugh Wootley, county clerk, that they must re-qualify themselves between June 1 and June 30 if they want to keep their commissions. Secretary of State Jullie Hensley has announced that he will appoint persons now holding commissions, but they must file a new oath and bond with the county clerk in that period.

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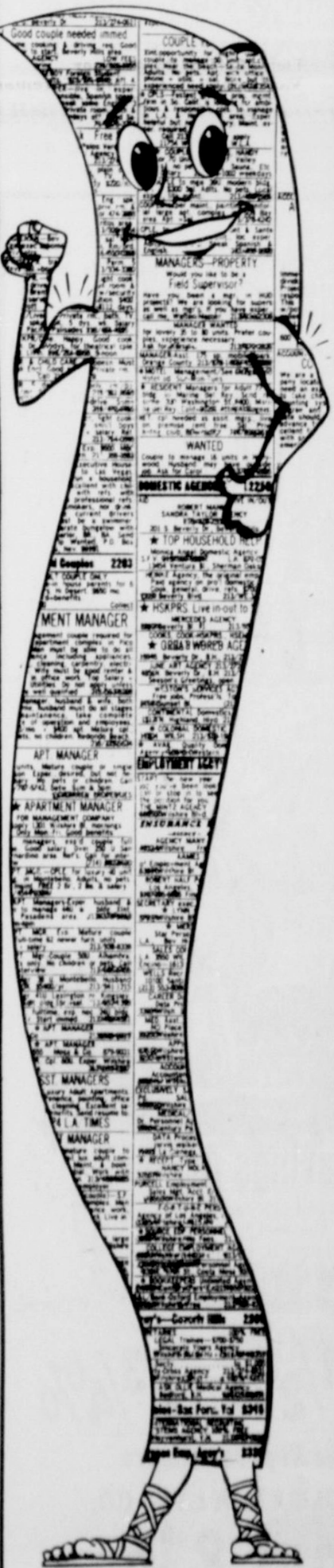

Fifteen Explorer Scouts from Friona tied for first place in the annual Explorer Olympics held April 15-16 at WTSU in Canyon, with every member of the post winning at least one medal.

The post from Friona was presented with a total of 36 individual and team medals for a total of 179 points to tie with the scouts from Amarillo.

In table tennis doubles, Cindy and Vickie Smiley won the gold medal; Leslie White and Bret Moore won the bronze. Vickie came back to win the gold medal in singles competition.

Leslie White captured the gold medal in the high jump, followed by Bret Moore who won the silver medal. In girls competition, Linda Nelson won the gold and Chris Lyons the bronze.

Bret Moore took a bronze in the long jump for the boys while Linda Nelson took the silver medal.

Leslie White did an excellent job in the mile run to win the gold medal.

Leslie came back to run the 100 yard dash and the gold medal in it. The girls swept the field for Friona; Linda Nelson, gold, Tommie Nelson, silver, and Chris Lyons, bronze.

Sylvia Malouf took first in the girls division for diving and Leslie White won the silver medal in the boys division.

Junior High Boys Excell At District

Friona's seventh and eighth grade Braves finished strong in the District 3-AA track meet at Olton last week.

The seventh grade boys were leading Muleshoe in the meet and maintained a close race for the district title until the last event of the day, when the Mules edged in front after the Braves were disqualified in the mile relay.

In the relay a Muleshoe runner and a lad from Friona were said to have collided causing the Mule to drop his stick. Although Friona had finished first in the race, the event was forfeited to Muleshoe by the judges.

The seventh graders won the 220-yard dash when Nelson Jackson finished with a 26.8 time. Robert Caballero pulled in another first place for the Braves by winning the 440-yard dash. Kirk Wright won the high jump with a 4-10 effort.

The Braves' 440-yard relay team placed second with a time of 51.3, and Marciano Escalante got another second place in the 880-yard run. Rudy Mendoza was third in the 330 intermediate hurdles, Tony Rios fourth in the 100-yard dash, Rocky Nichols fourth in the 120 high hurdles, Mendoza fourth in the 880 run and Rios fifth in the 220-yard dash.

Chitto Caballero won two first place ribbons for the eighth grade team in the 440-yard dash and the 120

hurdles. Mike Leal was first in the 880 yard run and teamed up with Mario Gonzales, Martin Mercado and Caballero to win the mile relay.

Mercado finished second in the 330 yard hurdles with Leal getting third and Tony Jackson sixth. Ricky Vera was sixth in the 880-yard run and Mark Blankenship got a fifth place in the 1320-yard run. Tony Jackson was seventh in the 120-yard hurdles.

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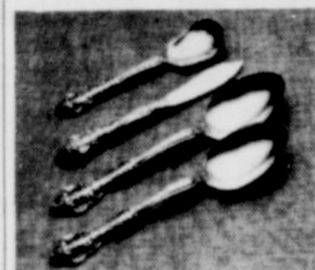

Two Chieftains In Region Event

Friona High School's Chieftains managed to qualify two tracksters for the regional track meet this weekend in Lubbock.

Koty Kothmann and Mark Neill both qualified by placing high in the district meet last week in Olton. Kothmann, in the discus, placed second in district with a throw of 136-2 and Neill went 20-3 in the long jump to place second in that event.

The Chiefs came in third in the 440 relay with a time of 46.5, and in the 110-yard dash Eddie Brailif placed fourth with a time of 10.4. The mile relay team turned in a time of 3:44.1 and gained another fourth place for the Chiefs.

Other district results were Justin

McNeely, 440-yard dash, fourth; Koty Kothmann, shot put, fifth; Jeff Whiteside, long jump, fourth, and in the high jump it was Mark Neill, fifth, Mike Hutson, sixth and Kevin Kothmann, seventh.

High point individual was Neill with 12 points.

"We feel like the season has been very successful from a standpoint of participation," Coach Gary Jones said. "Many of the young men have found out they have a lot to contribute to the track team. The whole team's attitude has been tremendous all year long."

Many of the Chiefs ran their season best times at the district meet.

Freshman Take 3-AA District Meet

The Friona Freshman Chiefs captured nine first place ribbons last week at Olton and walked away with the district championship with 168 points.

Rod Owen finished the meet with 38 points to become the individual high point man. His points came from being on both first place relay teams, winning first in the 330-yard hurdles and the long jump, and finishing second in the high jump.

Milon Dixon, Robert Alexander, David Fleming and Owen won the 440 relay with a winning time of 47.1, and won the mile relay with a time of 3:42.5.

Terry Salas won the 880 run with a time of 2:12.6, David Fleming placed first in the 440-yard dash in 55.7, Robert Alexander won the 220-yard dash with 24.7, Chuck Nichols won the pole vault by clearing 9'6" and

took first in the high jump with a jump of 5'8".

Mike Gowens sailed 17'10 1/2" to grab a second place for the frosh team in the long jump, and Fidel Morales threw the discus 129'5" for another second place.

Robert Jackson placed third in the 440-yard dash and Mike Gowens brought in a fourth place. Dixon pulled in a third place in the 220-yard dash and finished fifth in the 100. In the mile run it was Ben Landrum finishing third and Kirk Frye getting sixth. Brett Moore placed third in the high jump, and Jerry Harrelson finished sixth in the shot put.

Friona was 46 points ahead of Muleshoe, the nearest team to the Freshman Chiefs. The frosh Mules scored 122 points.

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Whirlwind Finish Nets State Berth

For the second straight year, the Friona Squaws' 880-yard relay team qualified for the state meet, but this year it took a great anchor lap to pull the team into second place at the regional finals, and assure the Austin trip.

Senior anchor girl Janice Peak brought the team from a fifth-place standing when she received the baton to the runnerup position, nipping third-place Childress at the finish line by .1 of a second.

The Squaws, in a highly competitive field, found themselves boxed around during the course of the race, which also introduced a new aspect of the relay with which the team had not previously been familiar.

For the first time all season, officials at the regional meet allowed the third runner to cut in to the inside lane. Ordinarily, the race is run with all contestants holding their lanes for the course of the race.

Jaton Widner, the Squaws' third runner, found herself volleying for position for most of her lap with a runner from Cooper. It also was confusing for the team at the end of the third lap when it was time to make the handoff.

When Miss Peak received the baton, she was in fifth place. The first and second place runners had good leads, with the rest of the field bunched up fairly close.

The Squaw sprinter, who had run in the regional 220-yard dash finals about an hour earlier, put on a great spurt to claim third place, and then nipped the Childress anchor girl at the tape, using her experience to lean forward and reach the finish line ahead, literally by a head.

"It was odd. We were fighting for position all the way around the curve. And when I was getting ready to hand off, I couldn't find Janice at first," said Miss Widner, in reference to the new quirk inserted for the race by the regional officials.

"It helped that she (the Childress runner) gave me the inside lane. We had learned about leaning for the finish line, and this also made the difference," commented Miss Peak, after the happy Squaw foursome were reunited after the race. Other members of the team are Cindy Cleveland and Paige Osborn.

Friona recorded a 1:45.1, their best time for the race this season. It was just .7 second off the school

mark of 1:44.6, set in the state finals a year ago by the same four girls.

The Squaws' other relay foursome, the mile relay team, ran by far its best time of the year, a 4:03.9, but had to settle for third place in the regional finals behind Lubbock Cooper, which ran a 4:00.56 and Tullia, at 4:00.98, to become the two state meet qualifiers from this region.

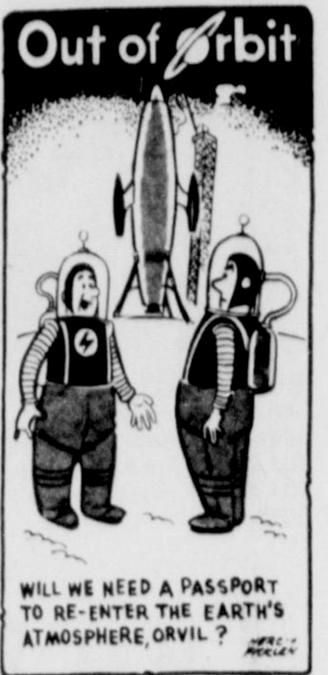
Members of the mile relay team are Sylvia Malouf, Jaton Widner, Janice Peak and Paige Osborn.

Paige Osborn, turning in a 59.1 in the 440-yard dash, likewise had to settle for third place, although her time was her best of the season.

Miss Peak ran a 26.06 in the 220-yard dash, and placed fifth. Brenda Price of Post, defending regional champion, placed third this year, giving an idea of how competitive the girls' regional track meet has become in a short time.

Sylvia Malouf, Friona's other entrant in individual events, equalled her best jumps in the long jump and triple jump, but did not place in the top six in either event.

The state meet will be held May 6-7 in Austin.

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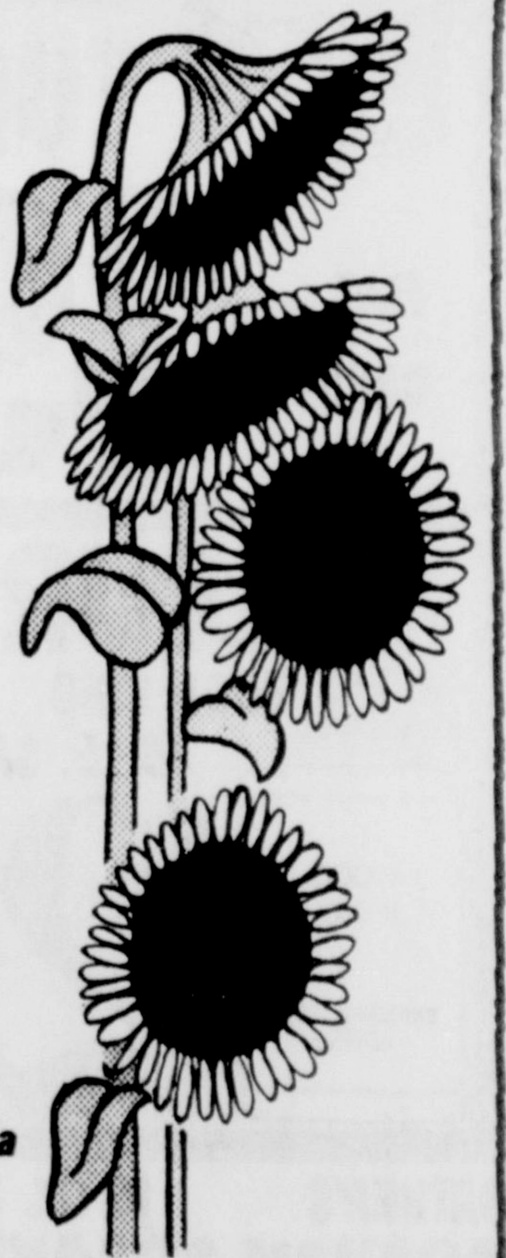

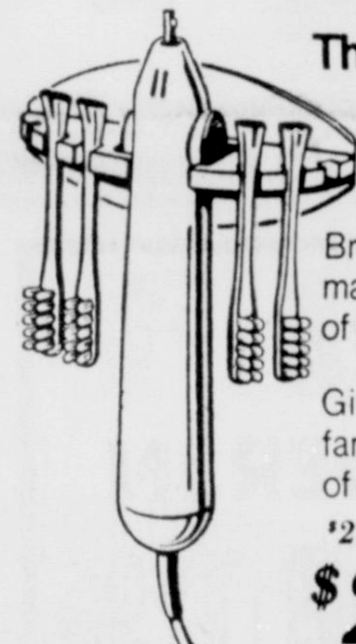

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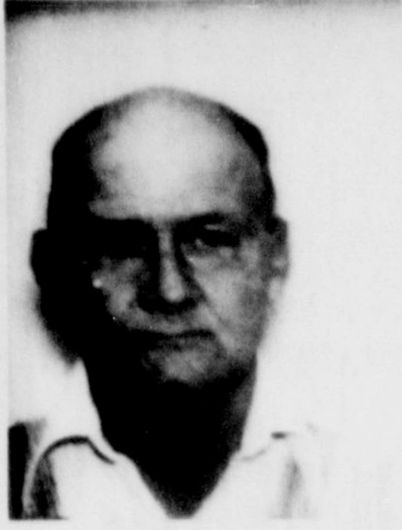

"NOW" FASHION—on a shoestring budget—is possible with just a few ideas for updating current wardrobes.

Tunics may be belted or loose and worn over skirts or pants, or over both for evening wear with a three-layer look.

—Hang on to those vests, blazers, and soft blouses with pussycat bows.

They're still great wardrobe assets for the coming season.

—Also popular are shirt-dresses with a softened look and bare-topped sundresses in many versions, so pull out appropriate dresses from the past and wear "as is" or modify them into a more modern version.

—And don't forget inexpensive accessory items to give your wardrobe a lift. Choose exciting, new looks in shawls, scarves, jewelry, hair ornaments, bags, shoes, and sun glasses.

Third Graders Tour County Facilities

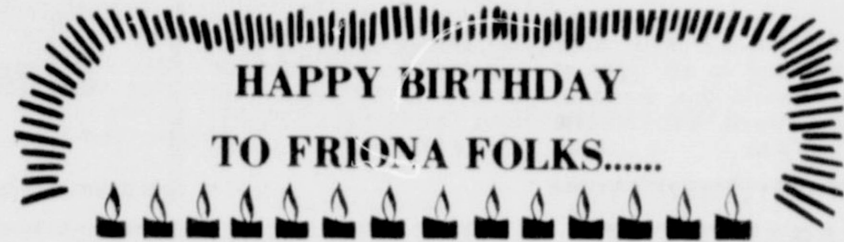
One hundred thirty third grade students from Friona took a county-wide conservation tour last week conducted by the Soil Conservation Service.

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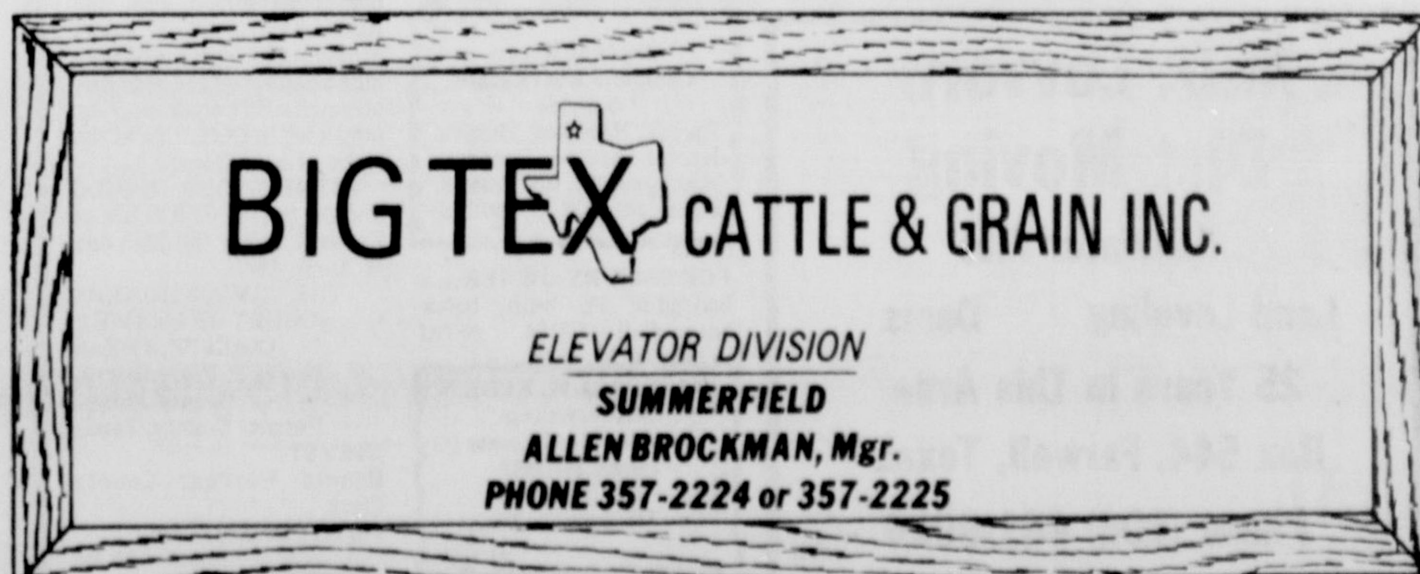

There will be no meeting of the Auxiliary during the month of May.

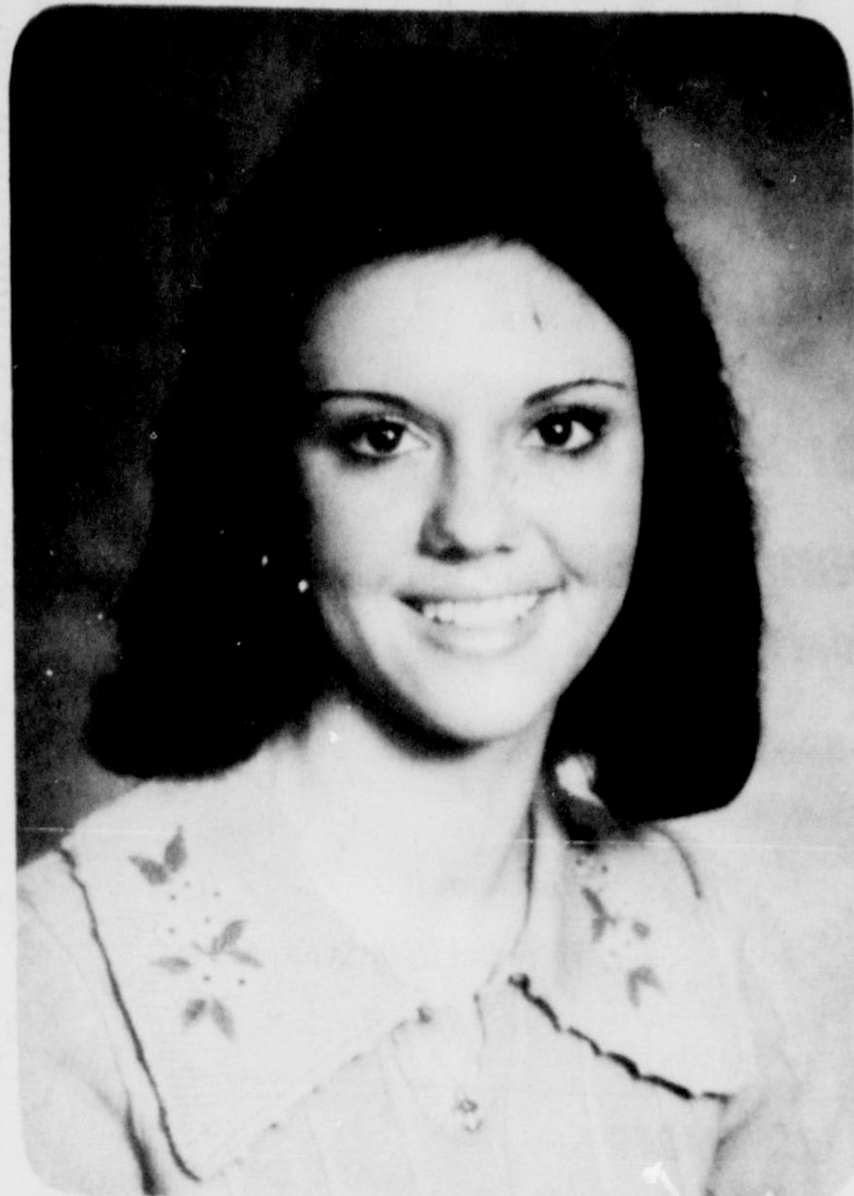
D. Parsons Inducted In Society
