County Benefits From Travel \$\$\$

Parmer County received \$274,000 of the state's \$5,306,118,000 travel receipts in 1975, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Parmer County had eight of the state's 207,676 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$44,000.

It also estimated \$11,000 in State and \$3,000 in local taxes were paid by visitors.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model, which for the first time, breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the

traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending enroute, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which, last year, estimated that Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's \$75 billion travel industry. Only California and Florida now outrank Texas, the Center said.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

Squaws Travel To State For Second Try

The Friona Squaws represent FHS at the girls state track and field meet in Austin this weekend, with their 880-yard relay team in the finals of the class AA division.

It marks the second straight year for this particular relay team to compete in the state meet, and it's the fourth consecutive year for the Squaws to send track teams to the state meet. Friona had mile relay teams in the 1974 and 1975 meets.

The foursome of Cindy Cleveland, Paige Osborn, Jatón Widner and Janice Peak make up the 880-yard relay team. It's the same four girls who ran the event last year, being virtually unbeaten going into the state meet of '76. Sylvia Malouf serves as alternate for the Squaw relay team.

The team had a harder time getting to the state meet this year. In fact, it took a fantastic anchor lap by Miss Peak to pull the team into second place by an eyelash at the regional meet two weeks ago.

Their best time of the season is 1:45.1, coming at the regional meet, where district mate Littlefield took first place.

The competition at the 1977 state meet is also expected to be fierce. A team from another section of the state has a 1:42.9 clocking to its credit.

Class AA was to hold the finals in the running events beginning at 7:30 p.m. Friday (May 6), which was too late to have results in this week's edition of the Star.

However, the Star planned to be represented at the meet, and will carry results and photos in next week's edition.

Clovis Residents Injured In Crash

Two Clovis residents, employees of MBPXL, were injured Wednesday afternoon when the motorcycle on which they were riding had a blowout just a half mile west of their destination.

Charles Huckabee, 25, was the driver, and Barry Brewer, 19, was the passenger. Both were taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona Ambulance Service, and Huckabee was later transferred to Clovis Memorial Hospital.

Huckabee said his rear tire blew

out, causing both passengers to be thrown over the front wheel of the cycle. The accident happened one-half mile west of the MBPXL entrance, on Highway 60.

Ambulance attendant Rex Williams said that undoubtedly the protective helmets worn by the riders kept their injuries down. In fact, he speculated that the helmet may have saved Brewer's life, as his helmet was pretty well battered up.

The accident was reported at 6:40 p.m. Wednesday afternoon.

Jumping Rope

Children's games come and go but one that seems to remain popular is "jumping the rope." Jumping rope can be done by one or several players, is good exercise and it helps to build coordination.
You could buy single jump ropes when I was growing up but we usually made our own. Cotton window weight rope was just about the best thing to use. From a broomstick we'd cut two handles about 6 inches long. We would notch the ends of each one with a pocket knife then tie the rope to them.

Group jump ropes didn't have handles and they were usually made from heavier rope. The ends would be knotted for a hand grip.

Jumping the rope consisted of twirling the rope over your head then jumping over it as it came under your feet while you said or sang some rhyme or counted. The idea was to see how long you could go without messing up.

In group jumping one or two people turned a long rope and one or several players jumped at the same time.

Some of chants were as follows:
One, two, buckle my shoe.
Three, four, shut the door,
Five, six, pick up sticks,
Seven, eight, lay them straight,
Nine, ten, a big fat hen.

Raspberry, raspberry, raspberry jam.
What are the initials of

your young man?
A.B.C.

Mother, Mother, I am ill,
Send for the doctor to give me a pill.
Doctor, Doctor shall I die?

Yes, my dear, and so shall I.
How many carriages shall I have?
One, two, three.

Various words described different ways of jumping the rope. "Hot Peppers" meant to turn the rope as fast as possible to try to get the jumper to miss. "High Waters" was where you spun the rope a foot or so off the ground and the jumper had to jump much higher than usual. In "Rocking the Boat"

or "Rocking the Cradle" the rope swung back and forth under the feet, not over the head. In "Run Through" the player ran through the fast-turning rope, trying not to be touched by the rope.

Individual rope jumpers could run as they jumped, skip or just stand in one place. Skilled jumpers could cross their arms in front of them as the rope went around.

I have no idea what the record for jumping the rope might be but I knew several kids that could jump well above a hundred times. The chants and counting may change but jumping the rope is about the same as it's always been — a game of skill and fun.

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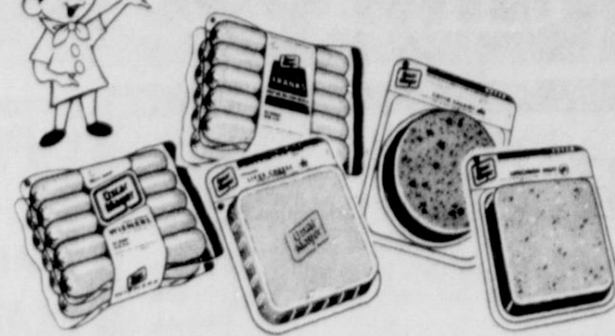

The junior livestock team was fifth. Joe Dan Tarter was second high individual overall, high individual in swine and second high in beef. Charles Johnson was second high individual in sheep. The team was also second in sheep judging. The junior rifle team placed ninth with a score of 251

points. In the contest on April 30, Johanna Mesman was third in girls Junior Public Speaking.

The senior dairy team will travel to State 4-H Roundup on June 7-8 to compete with other teams from throughout Texas.

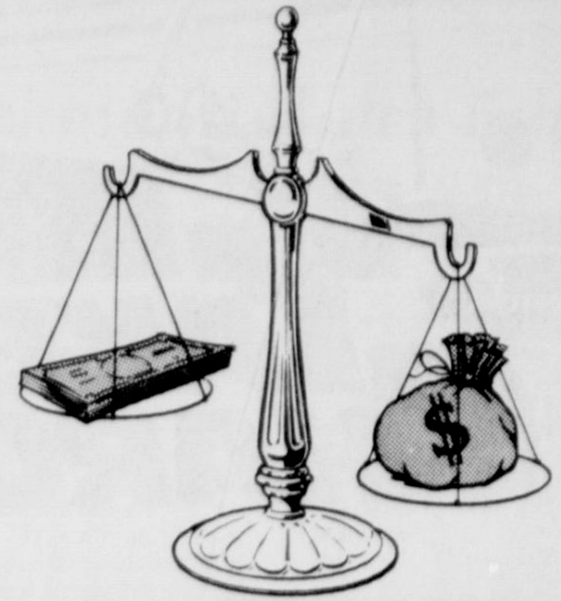
Insurance Holds General Meeting

SCS Report

The Soil Conservation Service conducted a conservation tour for the Farwell's sixth grade, Social Study class.

There were about fifty students on two buses. The tour went east from Farwell to Oklahoma Lane, north to Bovina and back to Farwell.

The tour started by showing different types of sprinkler irrigation systems. Then row irrigation was pointed out. Terraces and waterways on the Joe Jones farm were pointed out.

Other things pointed out were signs of wind erosion, lake pumps and tail water systems; wildlife areas for pheasants; different crops grown in the county. Also the word "silt" was explained as was the term "crop residue."

The group got off the buses and walked out on the Bovina flood water retarding dam, an explanation of how the structure work was given.

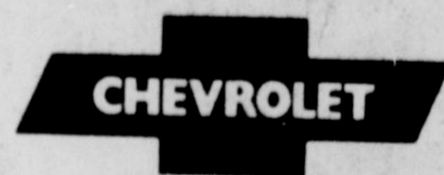

Myrl Buske Named Winner At Allen's

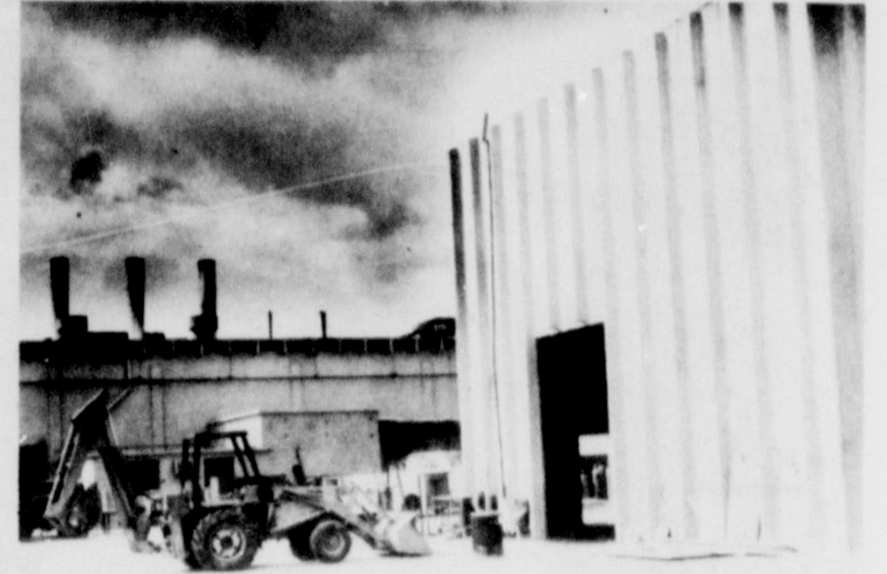

Expansion Is Begun By Packing Plant

Construction is well underway at the MBPXL plant west of Friona, with a portion of the new facilities almost completed.

The new addition, which will establish about 300 new jobs when completed, is a new fabrication facility. Here workers will transfer dressed carcasses to be cut into sections that will be sent to retail level butchers. A bone drying room is almost completed now, and the entire new operation is scheduled to be finished by the middle of 1978.

Bill Giles, MBPXL office manager, said there were a number of reasons that the plant is expanding. He said the Missouri Beef Company wanted to expand and felt the Friona area had the available work force, and the slaughter house already in operation here would convenience a fabrication facility.

Dave LaFleur, MBPXL Corporation president, said the plant will be able to slaughter an additional 800 to

1,000 cattle per day. Both Friona and Bovina Chamber of Commerces have been deliberating recently about the possible increase in housing facilities to facilitate the increase work force at the plant.

Friona city officials have expressed excitement about the expansion, and many businessmen have stated that they felt no other operation in this area had the potential to pull in this many additional families to the community. Cattle raisers are hopeful that the increase will boost the sagging cattle market, which in turn would help hay raisers and feed dealers who supply feed yards.

A look at the present operation expresses the plant's growth. Last week marked the 10th anniversary of the announcement that the plant would come to Parmer County.

The new expansion program will cost a proposed \$7 million and cover about 50,000 square feet of space.

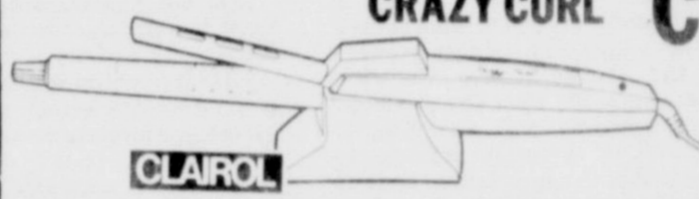

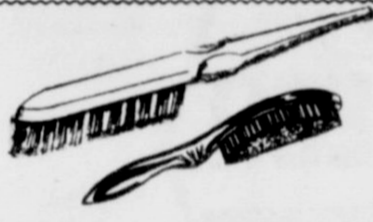

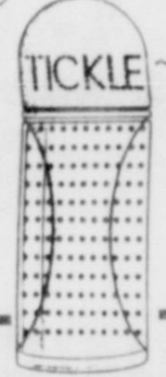

At Home In Parmer County

THIS CONTROVERSY—WHAT CONSUMERS CAN DO

Clothing experts have pinpointed—and are answering—major questions posed by consumers about the now-banned TRIS finish (a flame-retardant fabric finish).

Since the April 7 ban of TRIS from the U.S. market by the Consumer Products Safety Commission, consumers are asking how to make garments safe that were purchased before that date.

Consumers can follow a specific procedure to wash the excess TRIS finish from fabric surfaces—or they can return unused merchandise still in original packages and receive a refund. Also, if they choose, they may discard these garments without fear of environmental damage.

Many consumers ask if they can remove the finish with soap and chlorine bleach—and the answer is "no."

To make a garment safe—according to the Commission—consumers should wash the garment three or more times according to the recommended care instructions on the label, using DETERGENT—NOT SOAP.

This removes much of the chemical from the fabric surface—and it removes the risk of illness, but it still allows the flame-retardant protection to remain, Commission experts say.

Also, consumers ask how they will know if a garment is finished with TRIS.

TRIS is sometimes used on 100 per cent polyester—and always on acetate, triacetate and blends of these fibers.

Consumers may find out about polyester garments by asking at the store in which they purchased the

garment—because only the manufacturer of a polyester garment knows if it is TRIS-finished.

Many other consumers want to know if it is "okay" to buy new sleepwear for children at this time—and the answer is "yes," if they purchase flame-retardant garments of 100 per cent cotton or nylon or certain polyesters or inherently flame-retardant fabrics, such as modacrylic, vinyon and Cordelan.

These fabrics, all used for children's sleepwear, are not TRIS-finished. They have other flame-retardant finishes that have not been proven harmful.

Still other consumers ask if there is a difference between flame-resistant and flame-retardant—and the answer is "no." They both refer to fabrics that will not support a flame after the source of fire is removed.

Also, there are exact requirements for returning TRIS-finished merchandise and receiving a refund. Only garments that are in the originally purchased condition may be returned to the store where purchased. Fabric purchased for children's sleepwear that has not been washed or cut may be returned.

The April 7 ban on TRIS was the result of National Cancer Institute tests that revealed TRIS causes cancer in animals.

Corn Growers To Meet July 29

Texas Corn Growers Association is now officially certified as representative of producers in 18 counties and will hold a referendum for officers and assessments July 29.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown certified the group in a hearing in Austin on April 28. Under the Commodity Referendum Act, the Texas Department of Agriculture is responsible for monitoring the referendum and subsequent assessment procedures.

Corn growers will vote in their county seats for six board members who will set assessments collected

from producers, not to exceed one-half cent per bushel.

Monies collected in the program are used for education, research, market development and promotion of corn, Commissioner Brown stated.

Persons who wish to be a candidate for the board must submit petitions signed by ten corn growers to the Texas Corn Growers Association, 707 West Grant Street, Dimmitt, Texas 79027. Carl King of Dimmitt is currently serving as president of the association. June 29 is the deadline for petitions.

SCS Awards RWD Pact

The Soil Conservation Service awarded the contract on the Lazbuddie dam on Running Water Draw to Earth Movers, Inc. of Amarillo, otherwise known as DePauw.

The bid amount was \$1,293,850.00. Construction on the dam is expected to begin in May. Construction of the dam-

site on Running Water Draw will climax a number of years of efforts by the local Soil Conservation District representatives.

The dam near Bovina on Catfish Draw, a tributary to RWD, was completed in 1973. A contract to re-see the Bovina dam with grass was awarded to Erwin Brockmyer of the Austin area.

The Seven-Headed Well

As many a wise man has said, it doesn't pay to lose your head over the prospect of ill-gotten riches.



There's a sinister monument in Scotland that proves it—the Well of the Seven Heads. It's an obelisk with a frieze of seven dismembered heads around the top, with a well below to refresh the tired traveler. On each of the four sides of the well is an inscription in a different language—English, Gaelic, French and Latin—and each language tells the same story:

A lord who had to go abroad entrusted the safe keeping of his only son to his seven younger brothers. But the brothers saw a chance of inheriting the estate and murdered the boy.

When the lord's clansmen heard of this, they chased the seven brothers, and killed and beheaded them. Then, when the lord returned, they washed the seven heads in a well on the lake shore and presented them to their chief. Teacher's Scotch Information Centre suggests that sensitive visitors drive right past the Well of the Seven Heads.

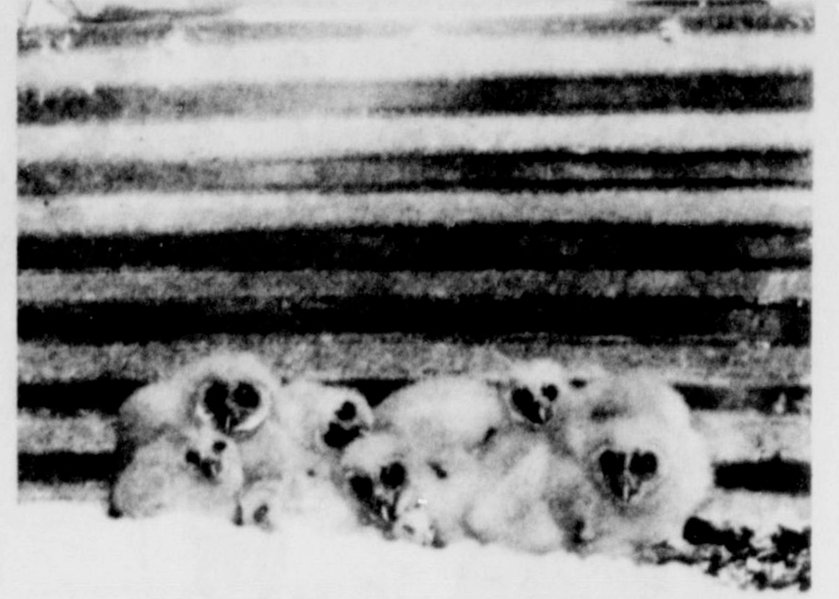

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that sharp increases in Texas utility rates have nearly doubled state utility tax revenues since 1972.

water utilities and telephone companies brought in \$80.2 million in fiscal 1976, compared to \$42.7 million in fiscal 1972.

He noted that the upward trend continues, as the same gross receipts taxes have yielded \$53 million during the first six months of fiscal 1977.

The utility tax analysis is contained in the Comptroller's April monthly financial statement, which also includes an expanded report on the impact to Texas of federal regulation of natural gas prices.

Bullock said that state expenditures during February totaled \$519 million, bringing total expenditures during the first six months of fiscal 1977 to \$3.36 billion, a one per cent increase over the previous year.

Spending by the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation continued to decline, he said. Highway construction and maintenance expenditures for the first half of the current fiscal year were \$298.1 million, down \$102.3 million from fiscal 1976 levels.

The Comptroller said the February state revenues of \$657.4 million pushed the fiscal year-to-date revenue total to \$3.25 billion, nine per cent ahead of fiscal 1976.

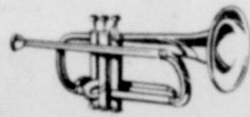
Band Wins Two Awards At Festival

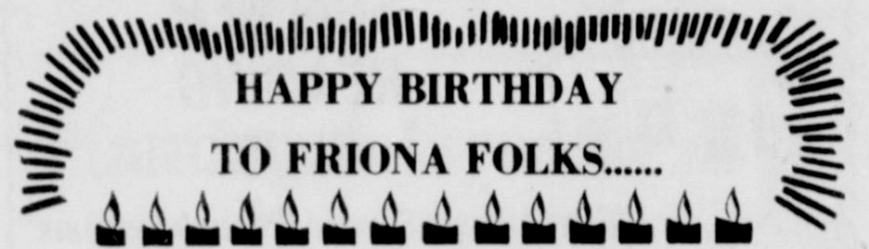

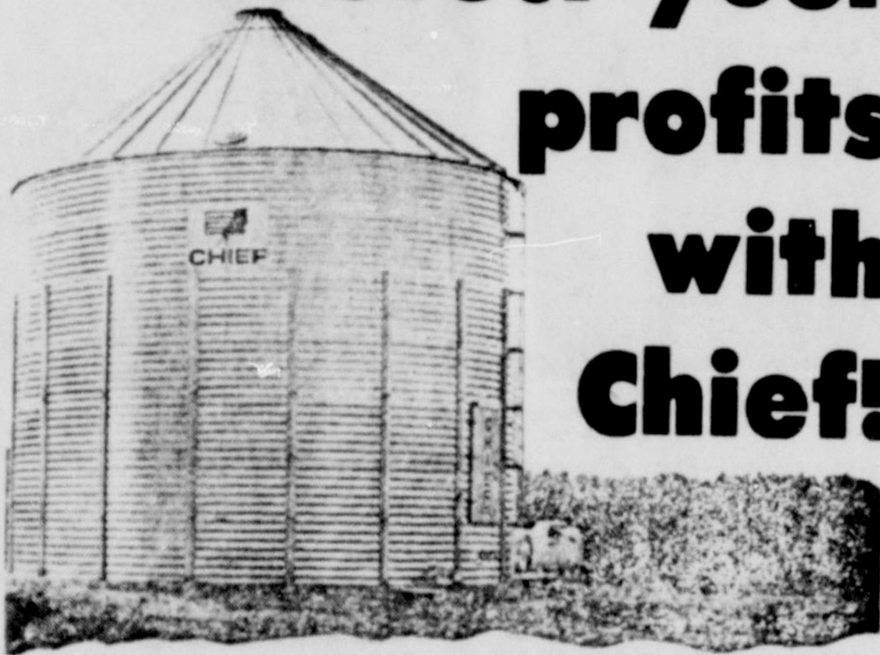

BICYCLE CARE

If your two-wheeler has been in the corner of the garage all winter, it's time to use a little "elbow grease" to get those wheels rolling.

Here are some things you can do to put your bicycle in good working condition.

* A bicycle has many moving parts, therefore it needs proper lubrication. Oil the chain, gears and hand brakes regularly. Remove the chain and clean it with a toothbrush and a good cleaning solvent before lubrication.

* Brakes require routine checks and adjustments. For braking efficiency be sure that the brake-pads are in good condition and aligned with the wheel rim. Also check the brake cable for excessive slack and tighten it accordingly.



* Your tire treads should be inspected regularly for small sharp pieces of glass or gravel which can work their way into the tires and puncture them. Pedaling is made easier when riding with the correct amount of air pressure, so make certain that your tires are properly inflated.

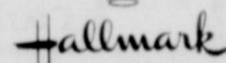

"The Complete Jack The Ripper" by Donald Rumbelow is available at Friona Public Library.

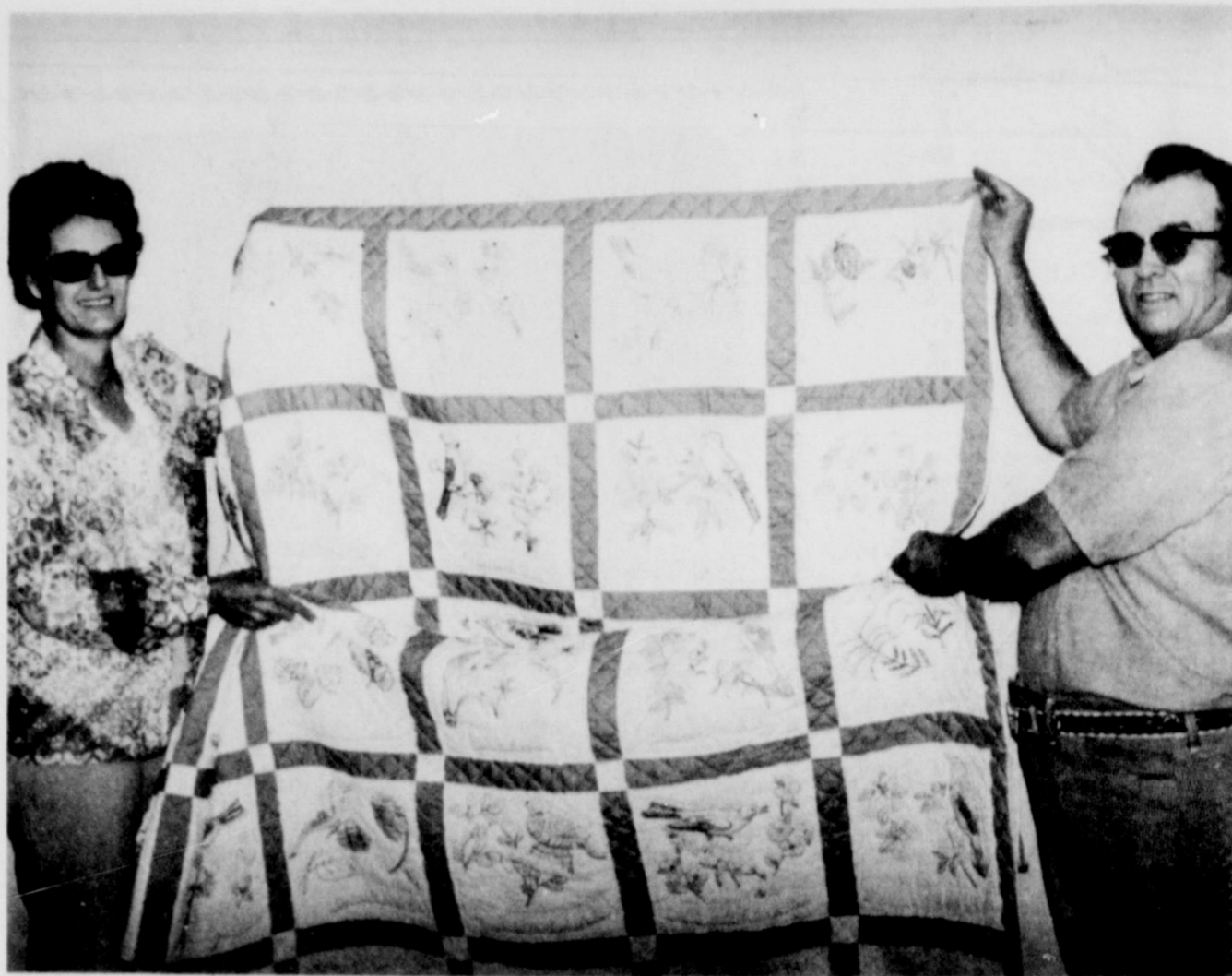
Just who was Jack the Ripper? Whoever he was his grisly murders terrorized the London of 1888 and have since become classic crimes, the ultimate in unsolved mysteries.

This book explores anew the murky East End slums and the hideous violence they spawned.

As a member of London's famed City Police Force Donald Rumbelow has had access to official police files on the Ripper murders, kept by law

from public view till 1992. He describes the five murdered prostitutes and reconstructs each of the five murders. He analyzes the initial police investigations, badly bungled, perhaps deliberately botched. And he publishes in full, for the first time, the two major documents in the case.

The cases against the ten leading candidates for the shroud of Jack the Ripper are examined at length, and readers may end up identifying the "real" Jack the Ripper!

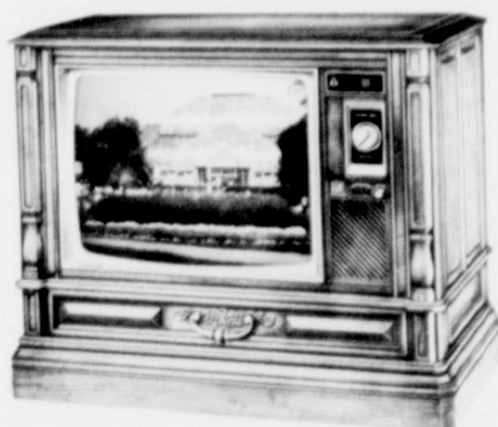

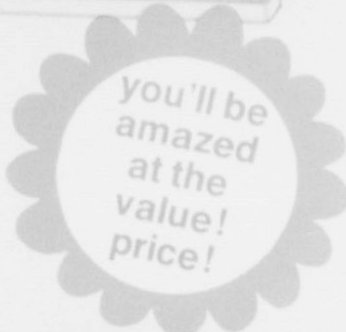
