## Star Lites By Bill Ellis

**BEEF PRODUCERS** will soon be faced with the most important decision they've had to make in a long time.

Basically, here's the question: will producers continue to take their lumps in an erratic, boom-or-bust industry like they have for the last several years, or will they take charge of the beef business and run it like a business?

Cattlemen will answer that question themselves the first week in July when they vote in the national beef referendum.

Up for consideration is the beef research and information plan—a producer program to strengthen markets here and overseas, step up research on producer problems and improve decision-making information throughout the industry.

Producers will fund the program through a deduction of 30 cents on each \$100 of cattle sales. But the program is voluntary. Any producer who doesn't want to participate can get a quick refund.

A Beef Board of 68 working cattlemen will decide how the money will be invested and will contract with appropriate organizations—like universities, or the National Live Stock and Meat Board—to do the actual work.

This isn't a program put together in some corporate boardroom. It came from farms, feedlots and ranches. It was developed by producers; producers wrote the law and worked it through Congress; and producers themselves are paying for the referendum through voluntary donations and fund-raising projects.

Most cattle producers we've talked with—including virtually all national cattle leaders—endorse the plan. At six USDA hearings held last autumn where almost every recognized cattle organization sent a representative, 150 people testified in favor of the plan, just six against.

What it all boils down to is this: an opportunity—maybe the last for a long time—to take charge of the beef industry and build a profitable future.

The beef research and information plan is a serious and down-to-earth approach to everyday problems that face cattle producers. It deserves serious consideration. And it deserves a "yes" vote.

## Registration Underway For Local Cattlemen

Registration is now underway for voting on the producer referendum on Beef Research and Information program.

Voters will be able to register through June 17 to vote in the upcoming referendum.

Cattlemen must vote between July

5 through 15 for or against the referendum. Voters will cast their votes at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Farwell.

The law requires that beef producers register at least two weeks before the referendum in

order to vote.

Producers eligible to register and vote are those who owned cattle during the past 12 months, prior to the referendum, including 4-H and FFA members, men and women.

If the vote is favorable, a Beef Board will be appointed. This board will consist of not more than 68 members, selected from the beef producer ranks by the Secretary of Agriculture as nominated by their producer organizations. Representation on the board would be proportional to cattle production in each state or geographic area.

If the program becomes operational, the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA would monitor it, or serve in effect as a referee, to assure that it stays within the legislative authority, and accomplishes the goals of the program as voted on by producers in the referendum.

The investment needed for the program is to be provided by a collection of 30 cents on each \$100 of cattle sales. This is based on a "value added" system that guarantees each person pays his fair share.

## Disposal System Being Deliberated

Members of Friona's city council are still deliberating about the changeover from the city's present trash collecting system to a new side-loading compactor system.

Although three bids were opened and read at the council business meeting Monday night, the delay on making a final decision stemmed from how the \$80,000 would be obtained for making the purchase of the system.

In a statement released Wednesday, City Manager Jake Outland said by July the city would have almost \$50,000 in revenue sharing. This, he said, comes from \$39,000 on hand in revenue sharing funds, and another \$9,000 which the city will

receive as its quarterly allotment from the state.

Officials agreed to transfer \$30,000 from the water-sewer fund to supplement the revenue sharing funds for the purpose of investing in the trash disposal system. This would make up the amount of money needed to purchase the system, and the councilmen plan to reconsider the bids in a specially called meeting.

Money received from the state each quarter would be re-transferred to the water-sewer fund to repay the \$30,000.

In other business, Dr. Lee Spring was appointed City Health Officer for a three year term.

## Industrial Accident Kills Clovis Man

A freak accident in the refrigeration division at the MBPXL plant west of Friona Sunday claimed the life of James E. Duran, 43, of Clovis.

Mr. Duran, a refrigeration maintenance man, was attempting to repair one of the ammonia circuits in the plant refrigeration system.

Mr. Duran and his co-worker followed the precautionary step of evacuating the circuit after a meal break, the pair donned masks. Mr. Duran then began to remove the cover of a valve in a pressurized system rather than the one evacuated.

He was overcome by the rush of the liquid ammonia. He was then taken to the Parmer County Community Hospital. Duran had been an employee of MBPXL since

October of 1976.

The other employee jumped free of the fumes, receiving only minor burns on his legs.

Duran was a tenant farmer in the Bovina-Friona area for nine years, then was employed by Sears for thirteen years before going to work for Missouri Beef Packers.

Surviving are the widow, Cleo; seven daughters, Mrs. Lucy Bonney and Mrs. Ruby Chavez, both of Clovis, Mrs. Jenny Darel of Midland, Miss Diana Duran of the U.S. Army, and Loretta, Mary and Sara, all of the home; four sons, Andrew, James, Jr., John and Francis, all of the home; one brother, Thomas of Clovis and seven grandchildren.

He was buried Wednesday in Lawn Haven Gardens in Clovis.

## Firemen Build Training Field

Friona firemen will soon have a realistic, hazard-like drill field on which to train and practice life-saving and fire fighting.

The firemen's drill field, with its 35 foot drill tower, burning pits and smoke-filled houses, is all part of a plan born in the minds of local firemen about a year ago after they attended the 100th meeting of the State Firemen's Convention in Austin.

"This training field complies with the new state program," Ruben Taylor, training officer for the fire department said. "We began talking about building a drill field a year ago, but started on it only last month."

The city donated \$1,000 to the fire department to aid them in building the field, but those funds were gone within the first few days. The firemen have since been paying some of the needs themselves.

Already on the location, which is on the southeast side of the city, is an old house which will serve as a "smoke house." Here firemen will train with breathing equipment and get used to a smoke filled house. Firemen are also planning to build a house made of blocks which will not burn when a fire is set inside it. A garage will be attached for firemen

to practice getting a dummy out of a car during hazardous conditions.

"We will be able to train our young firemen to fight oil pit fires, butane tank fires, and rescue people from buildings and towers," Ralph Shirley, Friona Fire Chief said. "We've been working on this location at night for some time, and we work on it during drills."

The training field will help the department get their firemen certified. Out of 30 men 19 are now certified.

"It has been over two months since we had to go out on a fire," Shirley said, which is speaking well of the people's fire safety. The firemen will continue to train but hope the no-fire trend continues.

## McCormick Indicted For Murder I

Robert McCormick of Bovina, accused of fatally shooting his ex-wife, Betty, in Clovis on May 26, was indicted by the Curry County Grand Jury Friday afternoon on charges of first degree murder and aggravated battery with a deadly weapon.

Betty McCormick, 42, died less than two hours after she was shot in the head and chest at the Levi Strauss plant where she was employed. The shooting occurred as Mrs. McCormick and a friend, Judy Page, 39, also of Bovina, were preparing to leave the plant after completing their shift.

Ms. Page sustained a minor gunshot wound in a shoulder a few minutes before Mrs. McCormick was shot.

McCormick, 46, was arrested by Clovis police on the parking lot of the Levi plant. A .22 caliber handgun was recovered by police. McCormick is being held in the Curry County Jail.

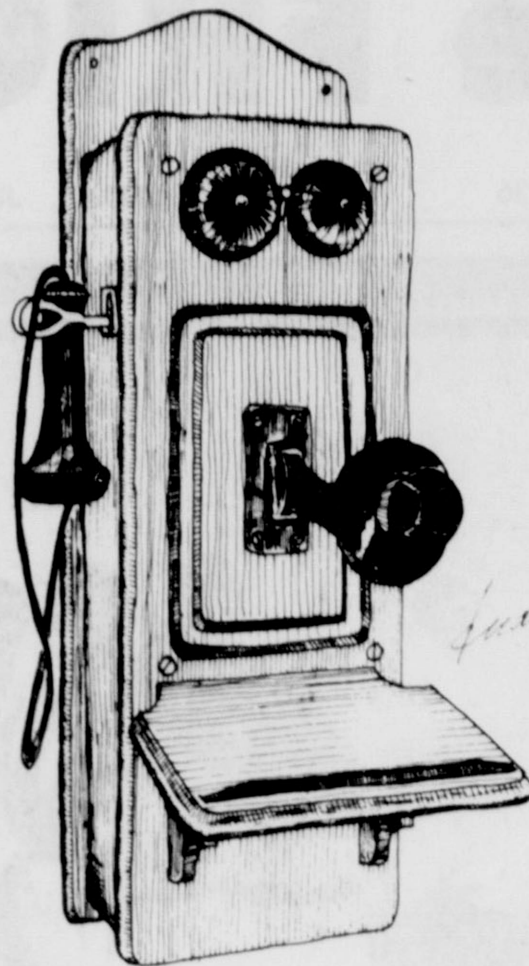
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## 5 YEARS AGO—JUNE 1, 1972

## REMEMBERING... Sounds

Think how long it has been. Remember? Remember when the last time was that you heard the windmill creaking in the night, or the sound of crickets or maybe bull frogs down by the pond? Or do you recall the tiny sound water made as it trickled down through the rocks, ferns and moss in the spring branch?

I have listed some other sounds that I remember. As I wrote I could almost hear them clearly as if it were another time and they were really happening. As you read, please think of these sounds and, yes, others that have special meaning to you. Remember...? A horse pulling a wagon down the road in front of the house; field hands singing as they hoed in the cotton patch; the sound a full cotton sack made as it was pulled along between the rows of cotton; the sound the garden gate made when the wind blew or when you opened it; the "PLUNK" when you tropped a rock into the cistern; a whippoorwill's call in the late evening, wind in the trees or a train whistle a long way off?

Maybe you remember the sound made by the first squirt of milk from the cow into an empty milk bucket, or other sounds like the "pop-pop-pop" of the big

green "Popping Johnnie" tractor like we had when I was a kid; a rooster's crow in the morning; bacon frying in the skillet; the first cry of your first child; rain on a tin roof; Mary Ellen's song leading at church when the pianist didn't show up; the mystery shows on the radio a long time ago; a porch swing; the crackle of a campfire; the "cheep, cheep" of baby birds in a nest when they thought you were their mother; the big bell that hung in front of the school.

I remember the sound of the hammer striking the anvil in Dad's shop, a lost calf bawling for its mother, a churn as it sloshed, sloshed, making butter. There were other sounds like stropping a straight razor; chopping wood; pigs eating slop; a cow bell up the trail aways; the winning of a new puppy the first night we had him, a tea kettle singing on the stove, a victrola winding down, a telephone ringing two shorts and a long on a party line.

Some sounds I shall never forget are the rustle of mother's starched apron as she readied Sunday dinner; the floor board that creaked when you stepped on it a certain way; the music box Grandmother kept on her dresser and the first shove! full of dirt on my Grandpa's coffin.

Congressman George Mahon was advised late on Wednesday, June 1, by the Federal Interagency Drought Emergency Co-ordinating Committee that the 46 additional Texas counties have been approved for emergency drought assistance. The FFA members, who come from Texas and New Mexico, will be competing for five trips to the National FFA Convention at Kansas City. Thirteen hours of instruction are offered in each of three subjects, Farm Motors, Farm Wiring and Electric Controls.

Two students from the wiring and motor courses and one from the controls course are selected as outstanding and receive the trips to Kansas City for their accomplishment. The program for the conference was coordinated by Walter Labay, Area I Vocational Agriculture Supervisor, and Sam Thomas, Southwestern Public Service Company's Agriculture Development Manager. Glenn Bickel, SPS Power Sales Engineer, will moderate the general sessions.

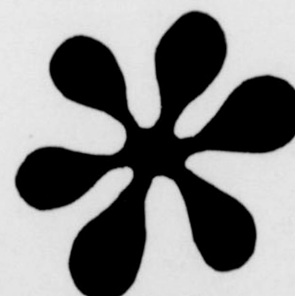

Funeral services for Jimmie Lee Brooks, 77, a Castro County farmer, who moved to the Frio Community in 1939, were conducted in the Frio Baptist Church Tuesday afternoon by Rev. Johnny Timms, pastor.

Burial was scheduled Wednesday afternoon in Fairlawn Cemetery at Comanche, Oklahoma, after graveside rites.

Mr. Brooks was an Oklahoma native and married Beatrice McClennen April 22, 1923, in Corum, Oklahoma. He was a World War I veteran, having served in the U.S. Navy.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. L.D. (Juanice) Taylor of Friona; a sister, Eula Hays of Comanche; two brothers, Ernest of Comanche and Cecil of Modesto, Calif.; four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

**Crop Acreage Reported At ASCS Office**

It is extremely important that 1977 crop acreages be reported to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office.

Wheat and barley acreage should be reported by June 20, and must be reported before harvest.

Cotton, corn and grain sorghum must be reported by August 1.

Under proposed legislation, 1977 acreages will have a direct bearing on 1978 farm program participation.

If there is a set-aside program in 1978, the farm's program benefits will likely be tied to the 1977 acreage planted for harvest. Of course, about one-half the wheat and barley acreages in Parmer County have already been reported. If there has been no change in acreage, no further report is needed on these farms—Except for, cotton, corn and grain sorghum. If you have not reported any acreages as yet, farmers may report all crops at the same time if they are planted.

Farmers should make sure that their acreage measurements are accurate. Errors in acreage reports can be costly.

If a farmer wants the ASCS to measure his acreage, the fee is \$11.00 for the first 160 acres on a farm-plus, \$9.00 for each additional 160 acres. If ASCS measures the acreage, the farmer will have no problem in timely and accurately filing his acreage report. Farmers wanting ASCS measurement service must apply by no later than July 8.

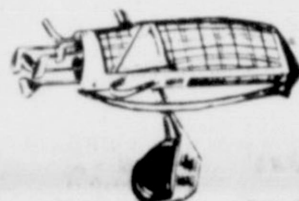
Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for

City officials hope now they can rest over the subject, and parents seem to be pleased, and the children continue to have fun splashing in the pool.

**At Home In Parmer County**

With the new smooth top cooking surfaces so popular I thought some of you could use this information.

Cooking on smooth-top ranges works best in pans that have a wide, flat bottom--and are made of materials with a high heat-conducting ability.

A variety of cookware fits that description--from stainless steel with an aluminum clad bottom to certain glass ceramic pieces.

In recent research by the Ohio State University College of Home

Economics, two different glass ceramic pans performed comparably to a stainless steel utensil with an aluminum-clad bottom. However, the stainless steel, aluminum-clad utensil performed most effectively when all types of ranges were considered.

During the studies, researchers used five different types of pans--to test heat distribution patterns, the interior bottom surfaces--and the time necessary to heat water and to heat oil.

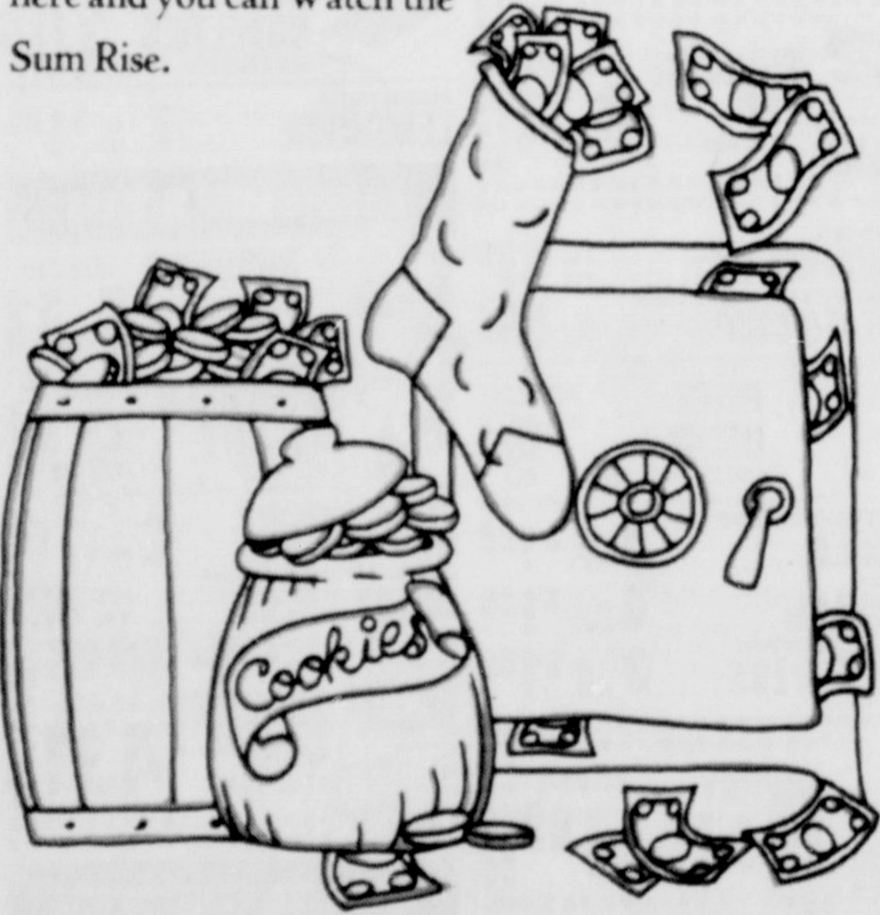

## USDA Offers Film On Farmland

"Prime Farmland" is the topic of a new slide show prepared by the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

Herb Evans, district conservationist for SCS at Friona, said the 11-minute presentation explores the loss of the nation's best farmland and the possible consequence of the loss.

About three million acres of rural land each year are shifted from agriculture to other uses—such as housing developments, ponds and lakes, highways, shopping centers and parking lots.

Many of these acres were among our most productive in terms of food and fiber. But once they are sealed over by homes and asphalt, they are lost to agriculture forever.

The "Prime Farmland" slide show reports on steps taken by several state and local governments to protect this valuable land. It also tells about SCS's prime farmland inventory now underway throughout the country.

In addition to its importance to farmers and ranchers, the show will be of interest to civic and service clubs, conservation and environmental groups, state and local governing bodies and schools.

To get the show scheduled, interested parties can contact Soil Conservation Service, Friona.

"The Soil Conservation Service is interested in the conservation of all over natural resources," Herb Evans, District Conservationist of the SCS office said. "In our everyday work we deal with problems farmers have in conserving their soil, water and plants."

"What a lot of people don't realize, we are also interested in the conservation of our urban or residential areas, too."

"If you live in town and are having a problem conserving your soil or any other natural resources, you can contact the SCS office in Friona, and we'll be glad to assist you," Evans stated.

## State Rep. To Be In Farwell

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced he is sending a representative from his Amarillo Field Office to Farwell on Wednesday, June 22, to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Jerrell Thaxton will meet with local taxpayers at the County Court House in Parmer County from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

"If Parmer County merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Mr. Thaxton will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representative on June 22, that they can still get their questions answered quickly by calling his toll-free information number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

The Amarillo Field Office headed by Claudia Stravato, serves the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

## Investors Are Urged To Check Taxes

Comptroller Bob Bullock again warned investors recently that if they are interested in buying a Texas business they would be smart to check carefully to see if the business owes the state delinquent sales taxes.

"Without checking, it's like buying a pig in a poke," said Bullock. "It's just not a happy event to buy a business, open up shop and then get a fat bill for delinquent sales taxes before you get started."

Bullock said the sales tax law makes the new owner responsible for any delinquency run up by previous owners.

He urged the news media to help get the warning out to all potential business investors.

Bullock noted that his office has changed procedures to make it easier for business buyers to get delinquency information quickly.
