Star Lites By Bill Ellis

PAUL HARVEY calls Uncle Sam an "Indian Giver." Harvey points out that although the average American is earning \$15 a week more than a year ago, the money won't buy any more.

And what is worse, the increase has forced the wage-earners into a higher tax bracket, and they end up with less spending money than they had prior to the raise.

Apparently, the only answer in trying to get ahead of the system lies in getting a government job.

Today, there are over 15 million people working for Uncle Sam. This is double the figure of 20 years ago. So lucrative are some federal jobs that there are 76 applicants for every opening.

White-collar government employees recently received a seven per cent increase in pay that brings the average federal employee up to \$17,350 per year.

The increase is on top of fringe benefits such as vacations (up to 26 working days), retirement (50 per cent of top salary at 55, after 30 years), automatic cost-of-living boosts and three times more sick leave than private workers receive.

In addition, promotions are automatic in the federal ranks. The longer an employee works, the more he earns, thanks to a three per cent raise every year or two. This year's seven per cent raise was extra.

And, in most cases, the job belongs to the federal employee as long as he wants it, no matter how much they goof off. And, no matter how many of us think they're not worth what we pay them, it's almost impossible to get fired from the government.

A study disclosed that since 1976, federal workers have received 12 pay raises, for salary increases of 94.8 per cent.

Americans are fast losing out on the
concept of majority rule.

Think about it a little while and see if you don't agree.

Americans by and large, we are virtually sure, do not go along with the liberal concepts promoted by that wing of the ERA movement. Yet, at the recent IWY national convention, as it happened at the state meeting, those radicals were able to pass their proposals.

The majority of the people are against welfare abuse, plus the expensive network of bureaucrats and other employees that welfare helps to employ. Yet, we see little being done to reform the welfare situation, although this was one of Carter's campaign promises.

We would bet that if a vote were taken, you'd find that an overwhelming number of Americans are against the Panama Canal giveaway treaty, soon to be debated by Congress. But this is another of the areas that our government seems determined to cram down the throats of the "average" citizen.

Do you still believe in majority rule? If you do, and if this system is to survive, then perhaps you had better stay in contact with your elected representatives, writing or contacting them often, to let them know how you stand on certain issues. Otherwise, we may find ourselves completely ruled before long by the not-so-silent minority.

THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT issues around 787 million checks each year. It also is nice and legal and keeps all its cancelled checks for the required seven years.

Each year, some 787 million old checks are taken out of file and 787 million new ones put in. What happens to the seven-year-old cancelled checks? Glad you asked.

We have just learned that they are recycled into toilet paper (among other things). Treasury officials say the cancelled checks produce 54 million rolls of toilet paper a year, which are used in the 10,000 federal buildings around the U.S.

Contest Names Co-Champions

The closest wind-up in the history of the Friona Star's annual football contest found not one, but co-champions for the 1977 event.

For the first time since the tie-breaker had been instigated to separate ties for the championship, the tie still could not be resolved, and R.L. Blakely and Jerry Hinkle were declared co-champions.

At the conclusion of the contest, four contestants were tied with identical scores of 208. Jack Clark, who went into the final week with a two-point lead, and Bobby Drake, who gained four points on the leader, joined Blakely and Hinkle in the traffic jam at the top of the list.

The final issue was not settled until Monday night's Oakland-Buffalo game (the tie-breaker game) was played.

After the dust had settled, Hinkle and Blakely were still deadlocked with an overall score of 170 on tiebreakers. Clark missed out on the top score by just a point at 171, and Drake came in fourth at 173.

Blakely and Hinkle split the grand prize (\$100) and second grand prize (\$25), each receiving a check for \$62.50. Clark was awarded third grand prize of \$15.

The two winning contestants had scores of 18 on the final week to Clark's 16, to force the tie. Drake had a finishing kick with a 20 to have a shot at all the marbles.

The winning score of 208 was a record score, topping by 10 the 198 posted by 1976 winner Clay Bandy.

In the final weekly contest, Movelda Fortenberry equalled the season high score in what was a tough week for some contestants, ringing the bell with a sparkling score of 21. Her only miss was in picking Navy to beat Army in the annual battle of the service academy teams.

Mrs. Fortenberry was awarded the weekly first prize of \$10.

Six contestants had scores of 20. From this list, Don Fortenberry claimed second place money of \$6 by missing the tie-breaker score by only three points. Ron Harkey had to settle for third place, missing the Oakland-Buffalo score by six points.

Others with scores of 20 were Marlene Mueller, Linda Drake, Craig Trimm and Bobby Drake.

Senate Runoff Voting Slated

Absentee voting began Wednesday in the county clerk's office for the state senate runoff election, which is next Saturday, December 10. The special voting period will end

Polling places for the runoff

Polling places for the runoff election will be the same places as the special election held last month. In Friona, voting will be at the Friona Fire Station.

Voters were alerted that they may vote in the runoff election whether or not they voted in the November 8 election. All eligible voters may cast a ballot in the runoff.

Opponents in the runoff are Bob Simpson, Democrat, and Bob Price, Republican, who were the leading vote-getters in the special election November 8, called to choose a successor to Max Sherman.

Simpson led the voting in the first round, getting 8,777 votes in the district. Price was second in the five-man race with 7,924.

A total of 921 voters cast ballots in Parmer County in the first election, but officials are predicting a lighter turnout for the runoff. The turnout could be influenced considerably by the weather.

Pheasant Season Begins December 10

The 1977 pheasant season in Parmer County will get underway Saturday, December 10, and continue through Sunday, December 25, spanning three weekends this year as it has in the past four years.

An excellent pheasant crop is forecast for the 1977 hunt. According to Jack Patterson, who has been close to the pheasant program since its inception, the pheasant population seems to rise and fall with the area's winter wheat crop, which was good this past year.

It will mark the 14th annual pheasant season for hunters in Parmer County.

More than 2000 pheasants were released in Parmer County by the game association in 1962 and '63 with the population growing steadily since that time.

The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters with the hens being protected by state laws.

The limit this year will be two cocks per day with four in possession, the same as the past several years. The season and rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The later season for hunting pheasants has proven popular, especially with college students. Although a large number of hunters will be in the fields throughout the season, most of the hunters will be stalking the colorful bird the opening weekend of the season.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and Farwell again this year with three cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

. The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize with second place awarded \$10 and third place \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Parmer County Game Management Association.

Further details concerning the local contest will be printed in next week's edition of The Friona Star.

Senator Tower To Visit On Wednesday

Senator John Tower will speak in Friona on Wednesday, December 7 at the Friona State Bank's Community Room, for his "Town Hall" meeting with constituents, that was previously scheduled in early November, but had to be postponed due to pressing Senate business.

Purpose of the meeting is for Sen. Tower to report briefly on the success and failures of the Congress, and to answer questions from citizens. He expects to hear opinions from residents on national issues.

In a news release this week, Tower said that the 95th Congress "produced some good and bad decisions, but so far has left some major legislation in limbo."

"The major issues of an effective national energy policy, Social Security, welfare and labor reform still remain to be solved," Tower said. "My upcoming conversations with citizens in Texas will assist me greatly in speaking out and voting on the reports that emerge from the House-Senate conference committees in December."

Tower has stops scheduled for 21 communities during the swing.

Protest Date Extended For DHEW Issue

The period for lodging protests to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for its proposed guidelines for the medical profession has been extended until December 9, 1977, it was announced this week.

The proposed guidelines published

The proposed guidelines published in September by the DHEW would impose severe hardships on a number of small town hospitals, such as Parmer County Community Hospital.

The DHEW proposals would strip smaller hospitals of a number of its responsibilities and move them to larger medical centers.

Included in this curtailing of service would be the obstetrics service at hospitals with fewer than 500 births per year. The latest figures show 170 births per year at PCCH in Friona.

Tower noted that accomplishments this year included Senate passage of a natural gas deregulation bill, defeat of the common situs picketing bill, delay of a saccharin ban for 18 months, legislation prohibiting unionization of the military, and changes in the Disaster Relief Act to assist small businessmen.

"Unfortunately, the new administration has been equally busy lobbying for heavy taxes on the energy industry and consumers, cancelling production of the B-I bomber and the Minuteman Three ICBM, pulling ground forces out of Korea, agreeing to give away the Panama Canal, and opening new ties with Cuba," Tower said.

He also contended that the farm bill, while more than the administration wanted, falls short of the support producers of food and fiber need to stay in business.

"The Department of Agriculture has recently announced its projection for food price increases next year," reported Tower, "and once again it appears that the Texas producers are going to take it in the neck."

Tower, now serving his third term, is top-ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee and second-ranking GOP member of the Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee. He also serves on the Senate Ethics Committee and is chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee.

Friona Gains Eight Spots On All-Stars

Tri-champions Friona, Littlefield and Muleshoe hogged the spots on the All-District 3-AA team announced this week by district coaches.

The three teams which tied for the district championship landed 23 spots on the 31-man offensive and defensive all-district team, which included for the first time a spot for place kicker and punter.

Friona landed eight on the mythical team, same as Muleshoe, while playoff representative Littlefield had seven spots. Dimmitt and Olton each had three players on the team, while Morton landed a pair.

Friona's Koty Kothmann was one of only two players to be named both on the offensive and defensive units, and was unanimous choice for both teams. Kothmann, 218-pounder, was picked at lineman on first team offense and defense.

The Chieftains, who dominated District 3-AA statistics, landed four of the six places on the first team offense for line positions.

Both of Friona's starting tackles and the center made the squad. In addition to Kothmann, linemen chosen were 210-pound tackle Tommy Schilling and 245-pounder Junior Jeff Peak. Perry Church, 170-pound center, was the first-team center chosen by district coaches.



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Letter To he Editor

Editor' Note: The following is letter from several Friona residents who attended the Pro-Family, Pro-Life rally and the International Women's Year conference in Houston Saturday, November 19. A detailed report of the meetings will be published in the Star next week.

On Saturday, November 19 several local women attended a pro-life pro-family rally in Houston. This rally was in protest of the International Women's Year Conference being held at the same time.

The IWY conference was billed as a "coming together of women" and delegates from each state are supposed to be representative of the views of the majority of women in the U.S.A.

The following proposals were voted on and sent to Congress to be legislated into law: E.R.A. ratification in all states; federally funded abortion-on-demand for all women regardless of age; federally funded child care centers (24 hours a day) so all women will be freed from the "burden" of raising children and can enter the work force; and the elimination of discrimination on the basis of sexual and affectional preference in areas including (but not limited to) employment, housing, public accomodations, credit, public facilities (schools, hospitals, etc ...); government funding, and the military (this means homosexuals would have any and all rights that you have, including the right to adopt children).

Many other proposals were passed regarding a guaranteed income for all people, wages paid for homemaking, a quota system of employment for women and sex education (homosexual as well as hetrosexual) in schools including elementary schools. Although none of these proposals have yet become law, they are to be introduced to the President and Congress as the wishes of ALL women in America.

Their resolutions do not reflect the viewpoints of us and we do not feel these resolutions are representative of the people in our community. We encourage anyone who disagrees with any of the proposals to let your Congressmen know immediately. Your voice will be heard.

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
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Lodges Request Kidney Donors
