**ANOTHER PIECE** of Americana has bit the dust, and as usual, it was caused by a questionable law.

Next time you visit your favorite grocer, notice that there is no longer sawdust on the floor in the butcher's area behind the meat counter.

A law passed sometime earlier prohibits the use of sawdust in the meat area. The law argued that if a butcher dropped a cut of meat, a consumer might be sold meat with sawdust on it.

At least with the sawdust, the butchers had a way of keeping their floor clean, as the sawdust collected the meat grease. Now, our local butchers point out, they virtually have no way of doing this, and maintaining their floors will really be a problem.

Maybe the sawdust was a problem. If so, we had managed to survive for a number of years with it. Problem or not, it still seems preferable to a greasy, dirty floor, which could be the alternative.

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**SO FAR, WE HAVE** met two of the candidates who are seeking Max Sherman's senate seat in the special election expected to be held in November. Sherman has resigned his position to become president of West Texas State University.

We are impressed by the calibre of those running for Sherman's position, at least the two we have visited with. These are state representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo and Jim Brandon.

Simpson is a young, well-thought of member of the legislature, and has apparently represented his district well. He says his main concern is to get acquainted in the area outside Amarillo. He believes in holding the line on taxes, and in cutting down the bureaucracy.

Brandon, an Amarillo attorney, is a member of the Amarillo College board of regents. He served as Ronald Reagan's campaign chairman in 1976, and holds to all of Reagan's political leanings. This should gain him a built-in following.

Due to the special nature of the upcoming election, all candidates will run on one ballot whether Democrats or Republican. So far there are three Democrats and one Republican running, with Brandon being the only Republican.

Winner of the special election will be required to receive a majority of the votes cast in the election. If no candidate gets a majority, then the top two vote-getters, again regardless of party affiliation, will meet in a runoff.

In addition to those we have named, Mel Phillips and Jim Whittenburg are the announced candidates. Former congressman Bob Price has been rumored as a candidate for the position, but as of this writing, has not officially announced.

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**RECENT RAINS** have boosted the agricultural outlook in the local area, but the main concern continues to be crop prices, rather than yield.

Prices of corn and maize have been the biggest concern. The prices for these commodities continue to be on the low side, and it continues to be a major concern, as harvest time draws nearer.

Of course, lots of things can happen before the harvest begins. One can only hope that something will come along to bolster these sagging markets. It's sad for the farmers to have a good crop, and not have the prospects of having a profitable year. Farmers have tremendous investments in their business. They deserve a better outlook.

And as one of our visitors remarked this week, regardless of the other reasons, I want to continue to eat. That's a major reason that the farmer should receive a profit for his labors.

If the farmer goes out of business, who is going to feed our nation?

Eating is a habit that's hard to break. Those of you who have tried dieting can attest to that.

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Don't be too quick to criticize. Remember, even a clock that isn't running is right twice a day.

Sharla Benge, Friona's 1976 Maize Queen, is a contestant in the 31st annual Wheatheart of the Nation Pageant scheduled at 3:30 p.m., Saturday, August 20, in the Perryton High School auditorium.

She is among 26 entrants in this

year's contest. They come from three states and numerous Texas Panhandle communities.

Miss Benge will be a senior at Friona High School this fall. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. W.S. Benge.

The pageant is the highlight event of the annual Perryton Wheatheart of the Nation Celebration which features a week's worth of activities. These include a junior rodeo, tractor pull, old timer's reunion, demolition derby, parade, motorcycle rodeo, free breakfast and barbecue, and old fashion threshing bee.

These activities will be held during the week of August 15-21.

Contestants in the beauty pageant are vying for the first place scholarship of \$1,000 to the college or vocational school of the winner's choice. Other prizes awarded in the pageant are as follows: first runner-up, \$500 scholarship; second runner-up, \$250 scholarship; third and fourth place runners-up, individual gifts. The pageant sponsor is the Ochiltree County Chamber of Commerce.

Judges selecting the 1977 Miss Wheatheart include Bill Nelson, executive vice president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association and Producers Board; Mrs. Rosemary Clements, model and former Miss New Mexico (1967); and Mrs. Janis Geddes, co-owner of Brier-croft Dance Academy in Lubbock. The women have both participated in other beauty pageants as judges, contestants or directors.

Contestants begin their pageant experience with a rehearsal set for Friday afternoon, August 19. Judges will conduct interviews afterwards and continue them on the following Saturday. A dress rehearsal is scheduled at 8 p.m. that Friday.

## Phillips Pleased With Scrimmage

Head coach Lonnie Phillips was well pleased with the performance of the Chiefs during the scrimmage against Boy's Ranch Thursday and said if it had been a real game he has no doubt the Chiefs would have won.

"From the fan's point of view the Chiefs scored one TD and Boy's Ranch scored twice," Phillips said. "But the only thing which gave Boy's Ranch its points was the automatic advancement of the ball."

Boys Ranch did complete a pass which resulted in a 58-yard TD, but the Roughriders picked up only five first downs in the scrimmage and had 136 total yards, averaging just 2.7 yards per carry.

The Chiefs picked up 12 first downs and ground out 240 total yards, completing one pass inside paydirt.

"We felt our defense did a lot better than we first thought," Phillips said. "Boys Ranch had only 63 yards rushing in 39 carries. Our running backs are a lot further along than they were last year, also. They averaged over five yards per carry. We felt real good about the scrimmage."

The coaching staff substituted players freely in order to get a look at all the boys. With all players seeing action the coaches were able to pick out strong points as well as weaknesses. Fans will be able to tell more about the Chiefs game plan next Thursday in the Vega scrimmage, Phillips said.

Coaches were also pleased with the performance of the Junior Varsity. Although the JV didn't reach the goal line they held Boys Ranch away from a score also. JV coaches were well pleased with the bright spots which showed up on the JV offensive squad.

Roughriders coaches were also pleased with their team's efforts and feel they will have a much better team than was first thought.

The Chiefs' first game will be against Floydada on September 2. The Whirlwinds are not thought to be as fast as they were last year but still pose a threat for the 4-AA district crown. Floydada should be an explosive team this year but are also young and inexperienced in several areas.

The JV will do battle at Morton with the Indian JV on September 1.

## Child Abuse Is Charged

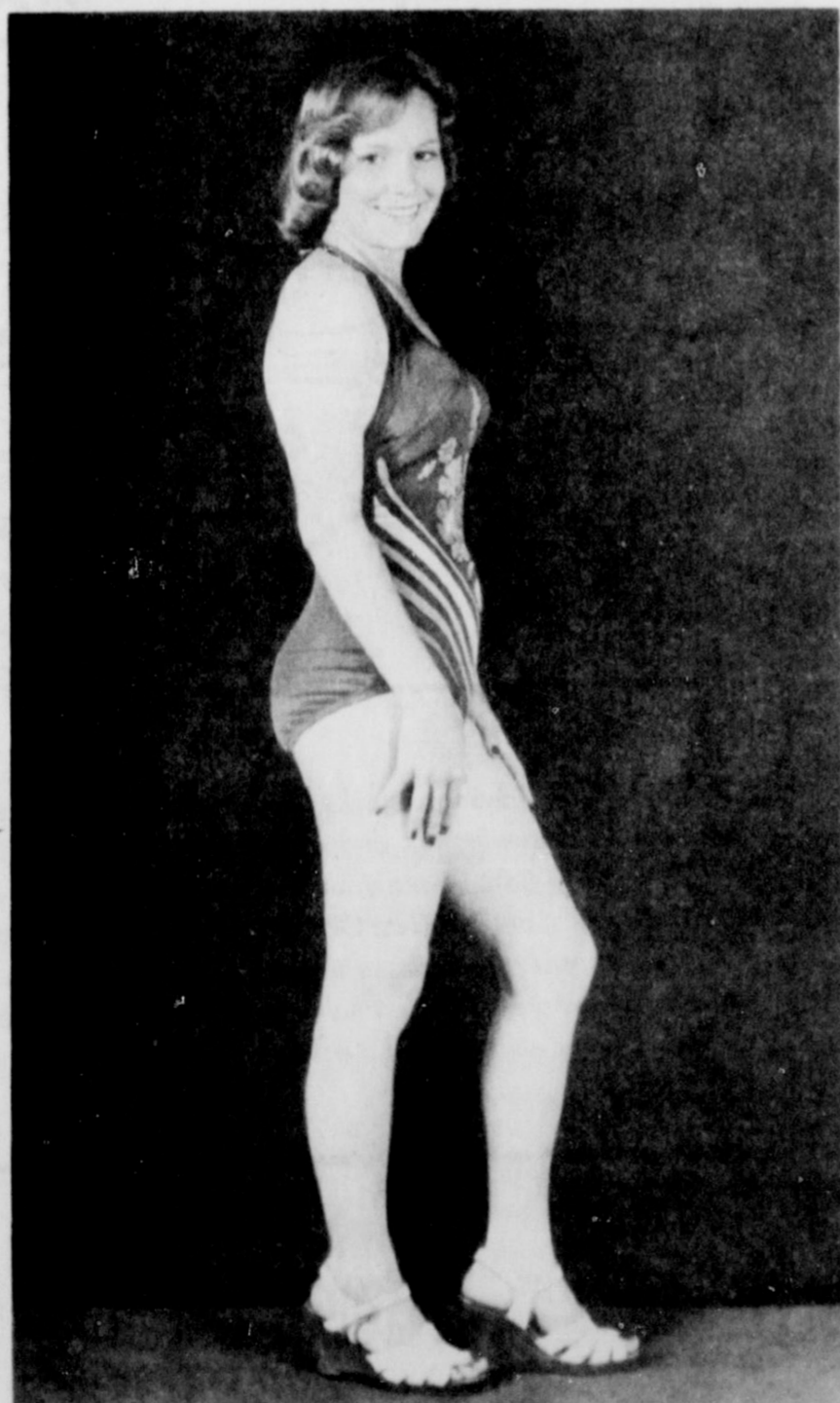

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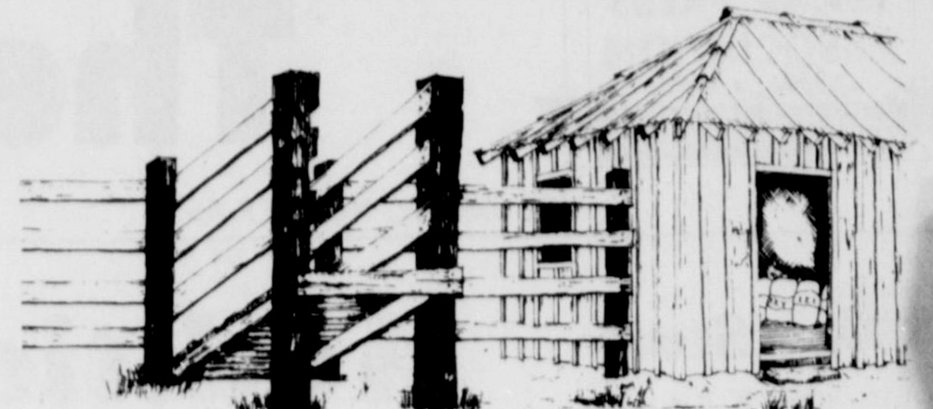
# REMEMBERING... Auction Sale

She was a tiny little pig when we got her but Dad told us that if we would feed her and fatten her up we could sell her and keep all the money for ourselves.

You could almost see her growing as we fed her table scraps, milk that was about to turn bad, corn from the field, watermelons and anything else we thought she might like. We scrubbed her and brushed her hair every day or two to make her pretty.

Before long Dad said it was time to take her to the sale so we loaded her in a trailer and went into town.



Lots of trailers were at the auction yards when we got there. When our turn came we backed up to the chute and a man helped us get her unloaded. She was tagged with a cardboard number stuck on her back with some sticky goo.

We climbed up onto a platform that was above all the pens. We walked around up there for awhile looking over all the livestock. There were big, mean looking bulls and little scared calves, some horses and a few sheep.

Dad said we'd better go inside, it was time for the sale to start. The building was shaped like a half circle with bleachers around the outside wall. A high iron fence was between us and the auction ring. The auctioneer and his helpers were at a table behind and above the ring.

When the sale started I couldn't understand a word the auctioneer said. It was like some foreign language but most of the people seemed to know what was going on because one would holler "Yea!" Another would wave his hat, one would say "Here" another "Yo." Then the animal in the ring would be gone and another one brought in. I never could figure out who was buying the stock or what they were paying until Dad explained the bidding and

told us certain things to watch for and listen for. We got excited and jumped

up and down when our pig came in. The auctioneer made some remark about the pig never missing any meals and everybody laughed. The bidding started and went fast and before I knew it she was out of the ring and another was being brought in. Dad was smiling, saying we got a lot more for her than he expected. We were beside ourselves with happiness so I asked who had bought her. Dad pointed to a man near us, so I went over and told him he had bought himself a fine pig and what did he plan to do with her. "Why, Boy, I plan to make sausage out of her"

"Sausage? Sausage? No! Don't do that! She's a pet. She..." He had walked off.

I was crying but my brother told me to cut it out. "Daddy won't let us have another pig if he sees you're a blubbering cry baby."

I guess I had never stopped to think what people raised livestock for. We met Dad out front by a window where a man was counting out money to him. Dad, in turn, divided it in half and counted it out to us. My eyes were still red but as I clinched what seemed like a fortune in my hand, a pretty good smile came across my freckled face.

## Lions To Sponsor Defensive Driving

A defensive driving course will be held September 27-29 for residents of Friona and the surrounding area who wish to receive a reduction in their car insurance.

The course, sponsored by the Friona Noon Lions Club, will be conducted in the high school cafeteria from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., and will be instructed by Department of

Public Safety officer Tony Guess of Amarillo.

"Anyone taking the course will be entitled to a ten per cent reduction in their collision and liability insurance," Carrol Gatlin, chairman of the course, said. "This will be good for a three year period."

Gatlin said that on late model cars the reduction could amount to \$20 per year per car. Couples who have an extra car in the family are urged to enroll as they will both get the 10 per cent reduction if they are each the principle driver of their cars.

"In other words," Gatlin said, "this is a per car-per driver course, and an opportunity for two car families to save on insurance."

Noon Lion president B.K. Buske said this course could be one of the best Lion projects in terms of time spent and money raised. He stated that 100 participants would be a worthy minimum goal to shoot for.

Gatlin said a pre-registration location would be announced later, but tentative registration fee is \$12 per person. He went on to say that the course would be worthwhile to drivers in that they will learn defensive driving procedures.

The course will be an all-classroom type program with no actual time spent driving. Persons interested in the course are asked to contact Gatlin for details.

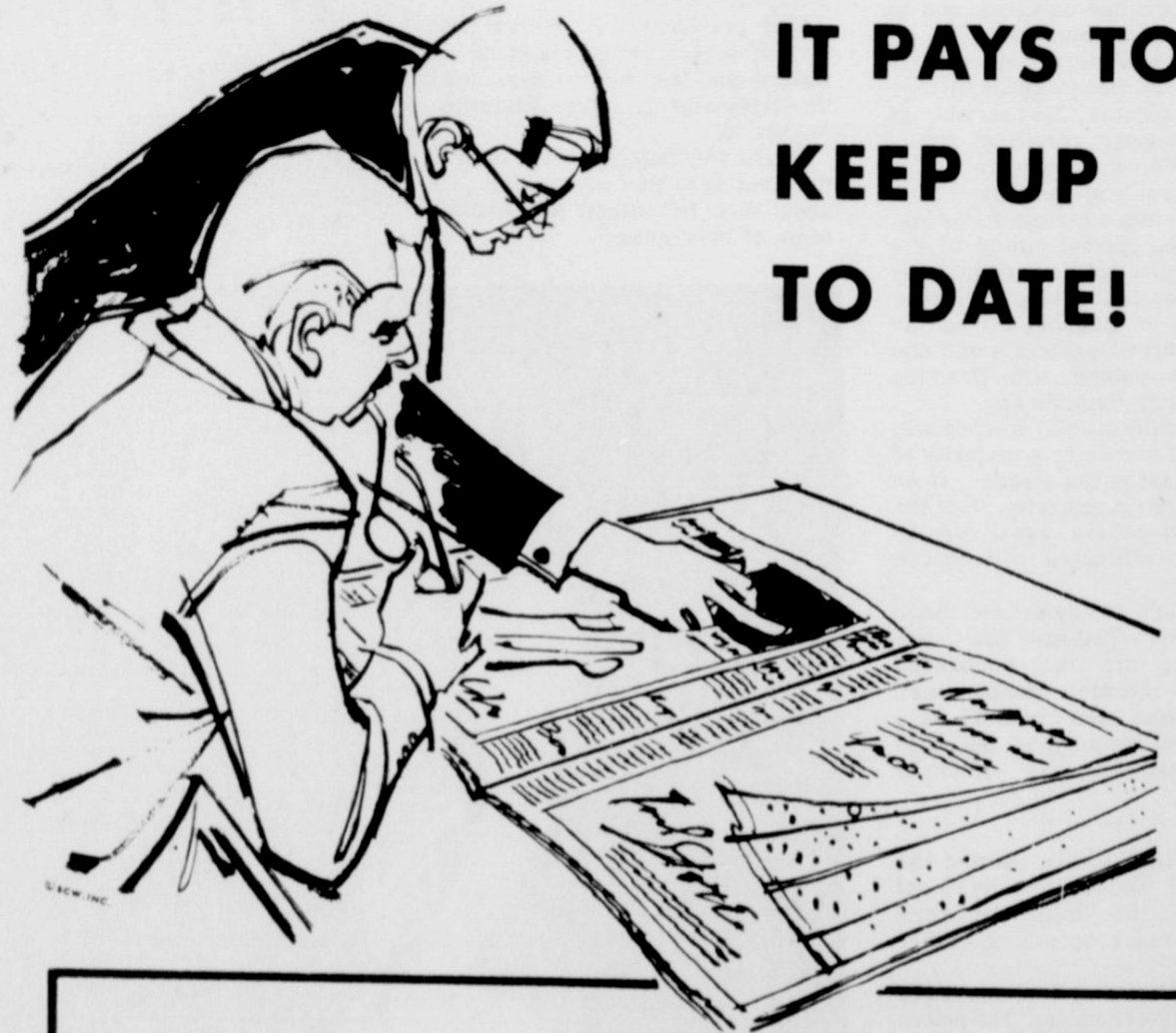

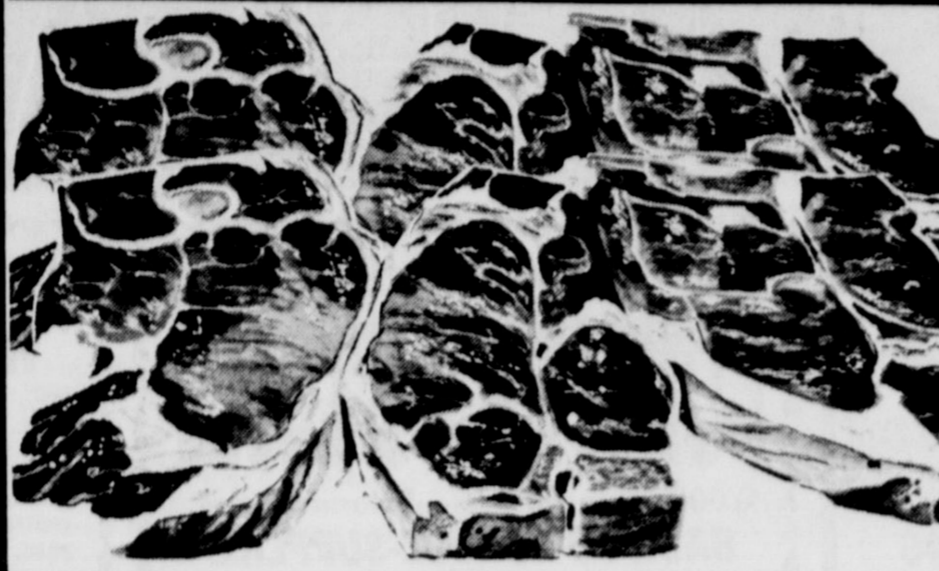

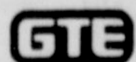

Mr. and Mrs. Mills often team to sing duets for church services.

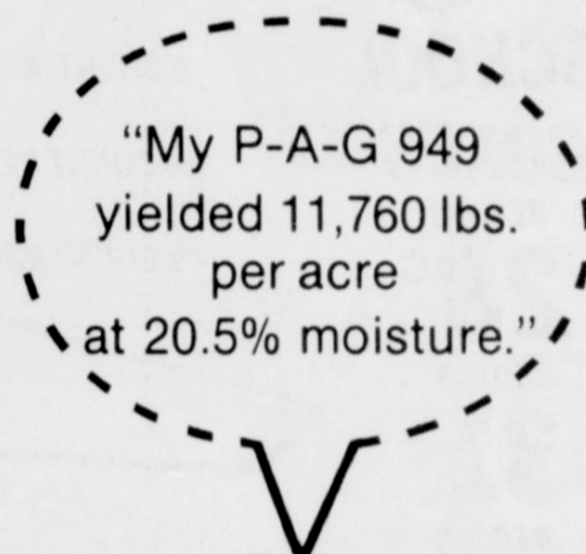
Mills has a degree in zoology, in addition to his master of divinity. Debbie has a BS degree in theater arts, with emphasis on directing.

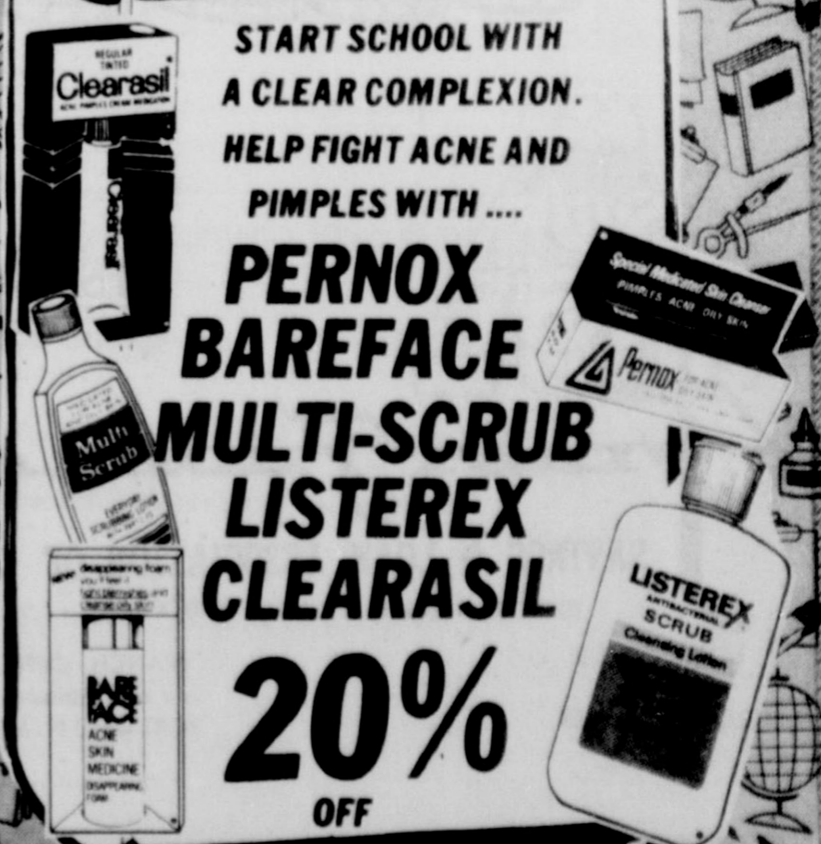

## Friona Woman Aids Crop Report Work

Wilda Millican of 608 Arrah, Friona, travels to cotton fields in her area to check on the progress of the crop.

She's not a cotton buyer; she is one of 54 field enumerators in Texas employed by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service to provide a detailed study of a "section" of a cotton field, 10 feet x 2 rows.

This work is part of the overall process of estimating cotton yields and harvesting losses in providing statistics on the state's cotton production.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown commended the work of the enumerators. "We have found that these enumerators are trained well by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service and do a thorough job."

During the cotton growing season, special plant counts and measurements are made to indicate yield as a guide to production. There are 710 such sample units across the state. The enumerator returns to the

same units each month to count the number of squares, blooms and bolls. This information along with the acreage data, and a continuing response to mail questionnaires sent to cotton farmers are important ingredients in accurate monthly production forecasts, issued beginning August 1 through December.

Near harvest time, the enumerator, who started the season with an intensive training course, picks the cotton in the sample units and sends it to the laboratory in Austin for moisture checks and other examinations to refine the estimate.

After the farmer harvests the field, the enumerator makes one final visit to glean the cotton missed by the stripper or picker as an indication of harvesting loss.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is a cooperative effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Such field surveys are conducted for wheat and corn also.

The afternoon event each year attracts over 1200 visitors who tour the Experiment Station's numerous research plots and discuss new developments in agriculture with scientists and specialists.

Joining in the event will be the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Agricultural Research Service, USDA; and agricultural meteorology office of the National Weather Service.

Drs. Levon Ray, Jack Gipson and Earl Minton are cooperating in the cotton variety studies. Their discussions during field tour stops will include tests on disease resistance, short season and glandless varieties, and performance records of about 50 unreleased varieties.

Pallbearers were Arthur Drake, Bruce Parr, Kenyth Cass, Eldred Brown, Baker Duggins and Bill Carthel.

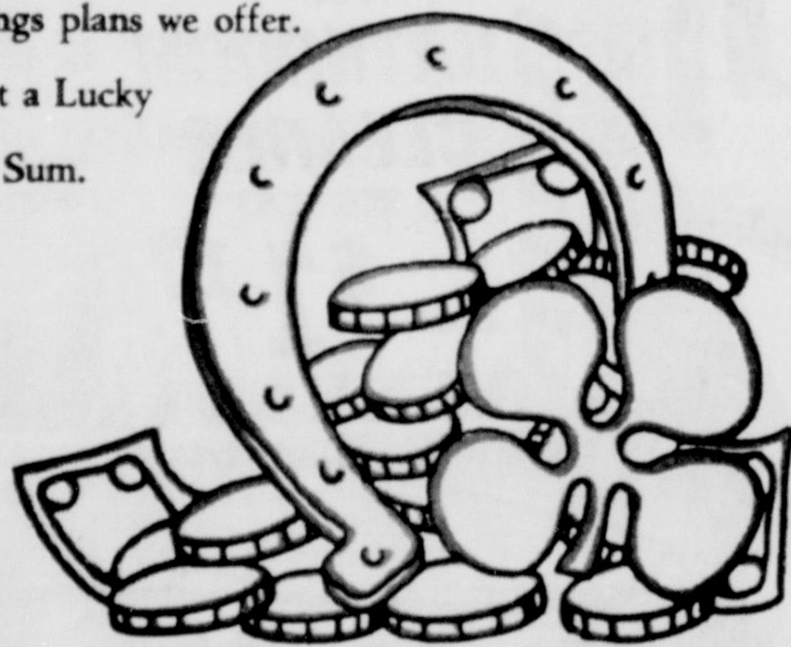

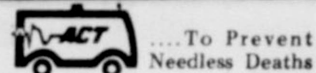

So far, 100,000 citizens have learned CPR in that city. Before Seattle's program began, 11 percent of people whose hearts stopped out of hospital lived to become long-term survivors. 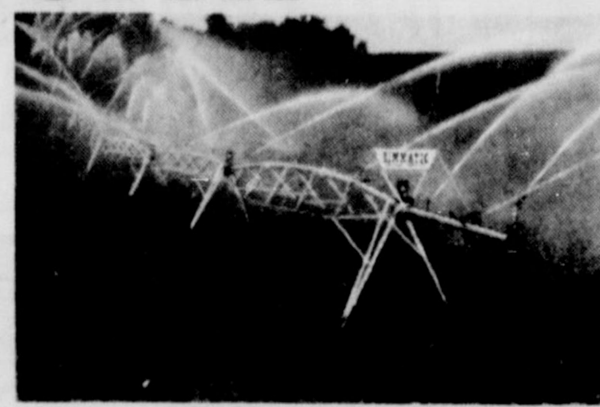

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## Carl Evans Enrolls In Medical School

Forty students began their medical schooling, Tuesday, August 16, when they registered for the fall semester at Texas Tech University School of Medicine (TTUSM).

Included in the freshman class is a Friona High School graduate, Carl Evans, the son of Herb Evans. Carl is a 1973 graduate of Friona High School.

Freshman orientation preceded registration on August 15 and 16. Included in the orientation activities was an introduction to the university, the tutorial team program, the basic sciences chairpersons and a get-acquainted party.

The freshman class is selected out of approximately 1200 applicants to TTUSM, according to John Pelley, Ph.D., assistant dean for admissions. The applicants are evaluated by an Admissions Council comprised of approximately 20 members representing a cross-section of the medical school faculty and including medical students and community physicians.

The council presently screens all applications for overall merit. Each eligible application folder is personally reviewed and evaluated.

Included in the evaluation are the curriculum, school attended, grades, quality of written comments, outside interests, part-time employment and letter of recommendation.

Approximately one-fourth of the applicants whose folders are reviewed are invited to an interview. On the day of the interviews, an orientation program is conducted to familiarize the students with admissions policies, curriculum, student life, and the history and operation of the school.

Each student is then interviewed in a one-half hour personal interview and a 45-minute group interview. Each individual and group interview procedure is structured in order to make the interview process consistent for all applicants.

"Personal attention is the key word in admissions at TTUSM. The faculty puts a great deal of personal effort into selection. We could select by a token interview and the use of a computer which would save a great deal of effort, but we have faculty that realizes academics should not be the only criterion for admissions," Pelley said.
