limit. The latest in the long series of what appears to be "harrassment tactics" against the community hospitals appears to be the product of computer machines.

Surely no human being in his right mind could have concocted such a pact of ridiculous ideas, much less propose that they be made rules and regulations for our nation's hospitals

We hope that if you are interested in maintaining such a hospital as Parmer County Community Hospital, that you will read the article elsewhere on this page.

Secondly, we hope that you will write four letters. First, write a letter to the DHEW, protesting the action and pointing out the tremendous hardship that would be brought about should these regulations be passed.

Also, take time to write to Congressman George Mahon, and Senators Tower and Bentsen, telling them how absurd the idea is, as well as being an insult to the entire medical profession.

If we don't take the time to protest, then "Big Brother" may decide for us how our medical facilities may be fashioned.

These latest proposals are just another step toward bringing our nation into a Socialized Medicine program, a program which has not succeeded in other lands, but one that the "people planners" seem bound and determined to devise for

WE HAVE REPORTED in the past about the various "Who's Who" con games which are practiced by a number of publishing companies which devise Who's Who lists for every group from high school students to ministers in order to sell the books and-or plaques.

We have been advised that some high school students have received the forms already this year. You'll recall that in one recent year, it was pointed out that virtually every member of some schools, including dropouts and all, received the Who's Who forms.

And if it's publicity you're seeking, we are trying to enforce a rule against publishing such "honors," unless they are given to us by a high school or college.

++++ THIS MONTH'S bills from Southwestern Public Service Company may have caused some "wonderment," because the bills contained a new break-down.

The statements contained an amount labeled as "fuel cost adjustment." This is in keeping with a provision that the electric company has with the City of Friona, that the monthly rates are determined according to the cost of fuel used in producing the electricity.

The amounts on the October statements did not represent a new charge, according to a company spokesman. Southwestern Public Service Company merely began breaking the total down. Previously, the billing amount had been shown in a lump sum, with the fuel cost adjustment included in the total.

Proposed Regulation Would Hurt Hospitals

Parmer County Community Hospital, and others in small and medium-sized communities would become mere "receiving stations" for the large medical centers if Department of Health, Education and Welfare (DHEW) "standards" are adopted.

Hospital beds and services will be rationed, if proposals published in the Federal Register on September 23, 1977 are carried out.

Dr. Paul Spring, chief of staff at PCCH, said that the proposed regulations mean that within five years Texas will be required to reduce the number of hospital beds by approximately 17,500.

"It looks like another in the long series of attempts to eliminate the small hospitals. It is an effort to centralize medical facilities. They think it would cut down on medical expenses, but in the process it would leave millions of people living in small to medium-sized communities without medical facilities," said Dr.

The proposed guidelines as published will require hospitals to have an occupancy rate of at least 80 per cent over all. Also, a hospital must have, in order to maintain obstetrics services, a minimum of 500 deliveries per year.

(Parmer County Community Hospital tabulated 171 deliveries in 1976, according to hospital records. Dr. Spring said that even hospitals in cities the size of Hereford and Dumas would be hard put to qualify under this requirement.)


"They tried to 'regulate' us out of business a few years ago, but most of the small hospitals have managed to comply with their requirements, causing medical bill to go up, naturally.

"On one hand, the American Medical Association (AMA) is spending money to educate doctors especially for the rural areas, while on the other it is attempting to eliminate the small hospitals. It doesn't make much sense," the longtime Friona doctor said.

Dr. Spring said he felt that if the public would voice their opinion to their elected officials, and especially to the DHEW, the proposals could be "nipped in the bud.

In addition to the regulations mentioned, hospitals will be required to comply with special restrictions on open heart surgery, cancer therapy, renal dialysis and cardiac diagnostic procedures. In addition, there would be geographic restrictions on services that are available to a community within 45 minutes travel time (to a medical

DHEW is giving the public, hospitals and physicians until November 22, 1977, to comment on these proposals. Comments will be received by Health Resources Administration, Room 10-22, 3700 East-West Highway, Hyattsville, Maryland 20782.

Jerry Wright, a Springfield, Colo. farmer and former Muleshoe resident, will be the guest speaker. Gene Hammond of Boise City, Okla., will also be present. A question and answer session will be conducted following Wright's presentation.

Proponents of the AGM encour-

age all interested Parmer County farmers and their wives to attend the meeting in Hereford. Supporters of the Movement will schedule a meeting in Parmer County at a future date.

Last Sunday a similar meeting was held at Umbarger with the result that interested farmers in the area have established their own

AGM office. The Movement is "spreading like wildfire," says its proponents, adding that to date some one million members in 45 states-including Delaware and Washington -- subscribe to its philosophy.

AGM members stress that it is a movement and not an organization and that it is designed to "help farmers help themselves."

Farmers are asking 100 per cent parity for all agricultural products. This means, according to Section 101 of the USDA's National Economic Stability Act of 1977 that agricultural products prices "shall be increased or decreased on a period basis to justify increases in production costs

and living costs for the producers." It means, according to proponents of the Movement, the farmer and rancher based on the current condition of the economy, which includes both what it costs the farmer and the rancher to bring his produce to market and what it costs

him to maintain a decent standard of living.

According to an AGM newsletter, another way to explain parity is that "if it costs a bushel of corn or a pound of beef to buy a product in 1967 (the last time parity was adjusted), it should still cost a bushel of corn or pound of beef, regardless of the dollar cost of the product-prices must fluctuate together.'

The current action is not an appeal for price supports, the creation of a false economy for agriculture, or for government subsidies. It is, rather, a rejection of the current farm

According to a nine-state midwestern survey "if low prices for wheat and livestock continue, more than 25 per cent of farmers will be required to refinance current loans or liquidate their assets to meet loan payments."

Rainfall Puts Halt On Harvest Schedule

Cool, fall-like weather was the standard in the Friona area for the past week, a dramatic change from the summerlike weather that had held sway through the month of September

After a final week of September that had temperatures in the 90s virtually every day, the maximums during the past week were in the 70s and 60s, with Wednesday's high of 68 being the lowest maximum of the season. The temperature dropped to a low of 42 degrees last Sunday morning, October 2, lowest reading of the season and just 10 degrees above freezing.

Wednesday and Thursday produced foggy, drizzly weather, and finally culminated in a gentle rain that began about 7 p.m. Thursday and lasted well into the night. Official measurement in Friona was

appreciable moisture in virtually a month, and brought to a halt the harvest activities, although the harvest had hit an "in between" stage for the most part. Most of the corn is now harvested, with maize and cotton now awaiting their turns.

## **Hereford Rites Conducted** For Jack Carrothers

A memorial service for Jack Carrothers, well known cattleman, was conducted Thursday Hereford.

Services were conducted at the First United Methodist Church of Hereford. Dr. Jordan Grooms, pastor, officiated.

Carrothers was president and chairman of the board of Friona Industries. He was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital Monday afternoon, after surrering an apparent heart attack at Friona Industries.

Carrothers came to Friona in 1962 to supervise the construction of and become manager of Friona Feed Yards. Carrothers has been a guiding force in the area's cattle industry, and helped Friona Industries expand to include four major feed yards, along with Hi-Pro Feeds, Black Grain Company and Friona Transport.

An active spokesman for the cattle industry, Carrothers was a founding member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, and served as its first president, in 1967 and 1968. He also

has been a member of the board of directors of the American Cattlemen's Association and the National Livestock and Meat Board.

The cattle industry leader served as a director on the Meat Board's beef industry council, and recently had been appointed chairman of the council's Communications Comways of promoting the beef industry. He was much in demand as a speaker for beef seminars all the way to the national level.

Carrothers lived in California much of his life, but was living in Colorado when he accepted the challenge of helping to develop the cattle feeding industry in Texas. He was a graduate of Oregon State University.

He was a veteran of World War II, and was a Methodist. He and his wife Betty had lived in Hereford for the past ten years.

Survivors include his wife Betty, three sons, Robert and John S. Carrothers, both of Dallas, William T. Carrothers of Amarillo, and a daughter, Mrs. Cathy Ann Poarch of

Two sisters also survive, Mrs. Harriet Charles of Provo, Utah and Mrs. R. L. Waldie of Coronado, California, as well as his stepfather. R. W. Baird of Coronado, California and two grandchildren.

DE students gain experience on a job, and study related subjects in a high school classroom. Study in DE is usually highly individualized. Each student uses publications directly related to a job or a career goal. They cover everything from advertising to warehousing, and from auto parts to precious gems.







## Chiefs Outlast Hart For Homecoming Win

In one of the wildest football games ever concocted for Homecoming, the Friona Chieftains outlasted Hart's Longhorns, 20-18 here last Friday. The win snapped the Chieftains' four-game losing streak, but was not achieved without some anxious moments.

The Chieftains held a 20-6 lead over the visitors entering the fourth quarter, but had to hold on for dear life as the speedy Longhorns threatened to snatch the victory from the Chieftains' grasp.

Only some good defense when it counted, including a couple of pass deflections by Jeff Whiteside which cost Hart at least eight points brought about the victory.

Whiteside starred both on offense and defense. The small halfback scored Friona's first touchdown early in the game, on a stellar pass reception on a desperate fourth

Mike Hutson set up the drive with a pass interception which he ran back to the Hart 45. Whiteside ran for a first down to the Longhorn 35, but three more plays found the Chiefs facing fourth and three from

Quarterback Chris Barnett rolled out, and then lofted a pass toward the Hart goal. It appeared that Hart might intercept the pass, but at the last second, Whiteside went up and literally took the ball away from the defender, and fell inside the goal-line for six points.

Kevin Pope's kick made it 7-0, and after only 4:25 had elapsed in the first quarter, the home fans had something to cheer about.

The Chiefs had another chance a few plays later when two Hart backfield men ran together on a reverse play, causing a fumble, which Koty Kothmann hopped on at the Hart 36. However, after driving to the Hart 10, Friona returned the favor, fumbling the ball back to the visitors.

Early in the second quarter, following their second fumble recovery. Hart got on the scoreboard when Glen Black ran eight yards. The kick attempt was wide, and the Chiefs still had the lead at 7-6.

The Chiefs took the ensuing kickoff and made one of their best drives of the entire season. The drive covered 71 yards in 14 plays, and ate up six minutes of clock time. Quarterback Barnett mixed up the plays expertly, passing twice for big plays, and throwing an arsenal of runningbacks at the Longhorns.

Barnett's pass to Terry Wilcox kept the drive alive early on a big third down play from the Chieftain 35. Fullback Glen London got untracked, making two big runs for first downs

It appeared that Hart might get tough close to their goal, when Barnett went to the air again. On third down, he found Kevin Kothmann in the end zone. Kothmann made a nice catch, making sure he was in bounds with the ball.

with 4:46 left in the half.

Hart threatened to pull even, marching to the Chieftain 14 as the

clock was ticking away. However, as the 'Horns went to the air, Whiteside batted the ball away from the would-be receiver in the end zone to save a touchdown, and Hart's field goal attempt was wide with 10 seconds left on the clock.

A gamble by the Longhorns set up Friona's third TD. Hart's quarterback, Eliazar Castillo, tried to run for a first down from a punting formation from his own 29, and was stopped a yard short. Friona took over on the Hart 31.

Six plays later, London bulled his way into the end zone for six big points and Friona's lead became 14 points at 20-6 with 4:25 left in the third quarter. A high snap foiled the Chiefs' PAT try, although Ernest Mills, the holder, almost ran it in for two points.

Hart may have been down, but the Longhorns were not out. Early in the third quarter, Castillo found end Johnny Newsome behind his defenders, and hit him with a strike good for 35 yards and a TD. The score became 20-12 with 10:40 left in the game. A pass try for two points went incomplete.

Whiteside fumbled trying to get the extra yard on the kickoff, and Hart had the ball at Friona's 28. Only a pass interception by Todd Bandy saved the day for Friona four plays later. Friona took over on its

Some timely running by London got the team out of a hole as Friona brought the ball out to near midfield.

However, the Chiefs were forced to punt. For the second time in two weeks, the team found out that bad things can happen on punts. This

time, Castillo turned the tables by returning the kick 70 yards for a score. It was a nifty run, as the speedy quarterback found his path blocked by a number of defenders in the middle of the field, and just reversed his field and had clear sailing up the right sideline.

Here's where Whiteside's quick hands saved the day once again. Castillo had a receiver in the end zone on the PAT try, which would have tied the score. But at the last second, Jeff batted the ball away from the intended receiver and Friona was clinging to a 20-18 lead.

The last five minutes of the game seemed like an eternity. Friona drove to the Hart 31, only to lose the ball on downs.

Wilcox intercepted a Hart pass at the 22 with 2:06 remaining, and things looked good. However, Eddie Braillif fumbled three plays later, and Hart had the ball back.

Forced to the air, Hart found Whiteside to be a real thorn in their side as the little defensive back made the fourth interception for Friona with a minute left on the

The game's final play was a weird one. Barnett took the snap, faded back, rolled out, and finally tossed the ball to an official, who apparently stunned, caught the ball. The gun had sounded while the play unravelled, and Hart felt they should have another play.

But the officials ruled that the game was over, and the large Friona Homecoming crowd breathed a sigh of relief and started for the exits.

Having their best offensive night of the season with 315 net yards

gained, the Chiefs had a great one-two punch in Whiteside and London. Whiteside was the leading ground-gainer with 120 yards, and London had 104 yards.

It's a rarity for a team to have two players over 100 yards in one game.
