WE HAVE SEEN and heard about a number of clever signs dealing with the agriculture strike, which the farmers have placed on parading tractors, etc.

One of the best ones we've heard lately was this one, which reportedly adorned one of the 50 tractors representing the 50 states, which were paraded past the White House in Washington recently. The sign to which we're referring said "If Dolly Parton had to survive on these prices, she would be flat busted."

Perhaps those "straight lines" do more to get the farmers' point across than any amount of talking would do.

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ALONG THE LINE of making a point, a speaker we heard this week told of how he was trying to make a point with a congressional friend, to convince him that agricultural products, in particular beef, was not too high, in proportion to other things.

"When will we ever see \$1.00 a pound steaks again?" the friend challenged.

"Well, you used to make \$12,500 as a congressman. Then you all voted yourselves raises to \$22,500, again to \$35,000 and now I hear the salaries are going to \$50,000 a year. I guess you could say you can expect \$1.00 a pound steak again when you vote to return to making \$12,500 in congress," the speaker said.

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THEN THERE IS the story, perhaps it could have been exchanged during farmer conventions, similar to the recent Washington rally:

It seems that a farmer from Texas was exchanging ideas and problems with a farmer from Missouri. The Texan asked his new friend how large his farm in Missouri was. "Oh, it's 80 acres," the Missourian replied, then just to be courteous, asked the Texas farmer the size of his spread.

"Why, I can get in my pickup in the morning and drive all day, and never be off my land," said the High Plains farmer, in true Texan style. Unabashed, the Missourian had a comeback: "You know, I had a pickup like that once!" was his clincher.

Farmers Report; Discuss Cutback

Approximately 250 farmers were on hand at the Community Center here Monday night to hear reports from those who have participated in the American Agriculture Movement's Washington Rally.

"I think we convinced the folks in Washington that we're not just a bunch of hicks from the sticks, with a wheat straw in our mouths," said Ron Awtrey, who served as master of ceremonies for the meeting, and also gave impressions of his trip to Washington.

It was the general consensus that the thinking around Washington has changed considerably since the farmers began their lobbying effort.

It was also pointed out that there have been a lot more farmers attending the rally than has generally been reported in newspapers and on television, and that the Washington news media gave the movement more coverage than it received nationally.

Awtrey credited Congressmen George Mahon and Jack Hightower with being extremely helpful in setting up meetings with a number of officials that the local farm group wanted to get their message to. "We could not have had the success we had if we had not done this advance planning, and had the help we had from Mahon and Hightower," he said.

Bob Wylie reported on a meeting he attended at which Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland was quizzed. Wylie said that Bergland finally admitted that he had the power, under the Stagall Act, to increase parity to 90 per cent, but also added that he did not intend to take the action, preferring instead to follow the new farm bill, which farmers feel will not help them enough.

Others who reported on what they did and heard in Washington were Conrad Renner, Raymond Hamilton, Clyde Woodard, Charles

Hamilton and Edwin Lide of Bovina. During his remarks, Lide commented:

"We still have a fight on our hands, and have some tough nuts to crack, but I believe we can do the job if we stay with it," Lide told the group of farmers Monday.

"We've got to win this fight, because, if we don't, the American farmer is doomed. If we don't make a profit, we can't feed our families, pay our taxes, and keep our schools and communities going," Lide concluded.

It was reported at the meeting that Bovina, Friona and Parmer County has been well represented in Washington since the beginning of the rally. Over 70 residents of the county have made the trip during the first two weeks, and more were to leave this week.

In addition, it was pointed out that

A.L. Black, a nationally recognized soil and water conservation leader of Friona, Texas, was elected chairman of the six-state High Plains Study Council this week. The Council is an organization of states with substantial land areas overlying the Ogallala Aquifer, the area's principal source of water.

The Council was organized a year ago to advise and assist the federal government in a \$6 million study of the area's natural resource needs.

Black, chairman of the Texas Water Development Board, succeeds Governor David Boren of Oklahoma as head of the Council. Member states are Texas, Okla-

homa, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Nebraska. The Council's first annual meeting was held in Oklahoma City earlier this week to review plans for the study about to get underway.

The new chairman is a farmer, banker and agribusiness leader with substantial livestock interests.

The U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration (EDA) has requested proposals from private consultant firms to serve as the general contractor to oversee and conduct the study of the economic impact of the dwindling natural resources of the area.

Black said a bidders' conference will be held February 14 at the Airport Marina Hotel, D-FW Airport, midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

The full Council and EDA representatives plan to meet early in May to evaluate the proposals and select a contractor to conduct the study.

Public Works legislation enacted by Congress late in 1976 authorized the study. A total of \$3 million has

been appropriated for fiscal year 1978 for the study.

The study was authorized to "assure an adequate supply of food to the nation and to promote the economic vitality of the High Plains Region." The Congressional action authorizing the study noted the declining water resources of the Ogallala Aquifer and charged the EDA, in cooperation with state and other federal agencies, to develop plans to increase water supplies in the area and report recommendations to Congress for further action.

Black said the multi-state organization set up to work with the federal government is a unique and unusual approach to seek solutions and bring about actions to cope with a critical situation developing in the High Plains Region.

The High Plains study will consider all past and ongoing studies, plans and work on depleted water resources in the region, and will examine the feasibility of various alternatives to provide adequate water supplies in the area.

The study will include, but is not limited to, the study of transfer of water from adjacent areas. This portion of the study will be conducted by the U.S. Corps of Engineers in cooperation with the EDA and the High Plains Council. If water transfer is found to be a part of a reasonable solution, the report to Congress shall include a recommended plan for allocating and distributing water in an equitable fashion, taking into account existing water rights and the needs for future growth of all affected areas.

An interim report will be made to Congress no later than October 1, this year, and a final report with recommendations shall be made to Congress no later than July 1, 1980.

"From our studies in Texas, we know the problems and importance of the declining water supplies in the Ogallala in our State, and we recognize the importance of the area's food and fiber production," stated Black.

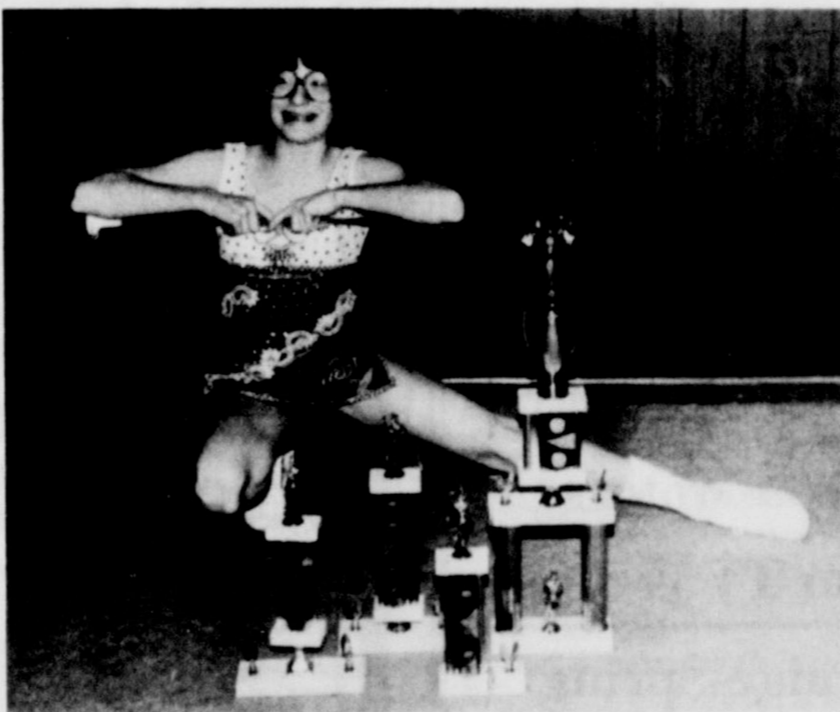

Snowfall Adds .39" To Area Farmland

The Friona area received its second major snowfall in two weeks early Tuesday morning, when a good three-inch cover was measured.

This snowfall was considerably wetter than the one a week previously. Where the earlier snowfall left only an official .05 inch of moisture, this week's rang in at .39 inches, the most moisture received in quite some time.

Like the snow of the previous week, this one fell evenly for the most part. There was some drifting on Tuesday night when the wind blew fairly high.

The moisture recorded early Tuesday brought January's total

moisture to .57 inches, measured on five dates.

Temperatures remained on the cold side for a third consecutive week. The high point came on Sunday when the mercury reached 48 degrees. Otherwise, the highs were in the thirties and lows in the twenties virtually every day.

Co-Op To Sponsor Annual Speech Contest

Entry deadline will be Monday, February 20. Judges will listen to finalists' 5-8 minute speeches and combine the test scores to determine the winners.

This is the 14th year that Deaf Smith REC has sponsored the speech contest. Winners last year were Joyce Aker of Nazareth and Bryan Johnston of Friona. The highlight, according to Bryan was "the friends he made on the trip."

As participants in the 14th Rural Electric Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by bus to Washington, where they will spend four days visiting places of historical interest as well as their congressmen. Last year's trip included a visit with the President of the United States.

Approximately 1,000 Youth Tour participants from across the nation will meet during this week for a special program coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. The program will feature congressional leaders and high government officials, a visit to the White House, and a fun-filled "Happening" will highlight the days' events.

"Kids, get those entry forms started."

This year's speech topic: "The Energy Crisis"—resource materials are available from the cooperative or your high school English, Speech and FFA Departments, according to

Greg Black, who is in charge of the Youth Tour Contest.

Speeches will be judged on the basis of: (1) Knowledge of subject, 40 per cent; (2) Speaking ability, 30 per cent; (3) Appearance, 10 per cent; (4) Personality, 10 per cent; (5) Poise, 10 per cent.

An all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C. next June will be awarded to two young people from this area by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, according to James Hull, manager of the rural electric

system.

It is part of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's Annual Rural Electric Youth Tour that brings around 1,000 young people to the nation's capital each year.

James Hull said winners of the speech contest and quiz, to be given March 15, will be awarded the 12-day trip to Washington, D.C. All high school juniors between 16 and 18 years of age in the service area are eligible to enter the contest.

50 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 27, 1928

As we understand it, the plan will provide an eight-room addition adjoining the west of the auditorium wing of the present building, forming a "T".

40 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 28, 1938

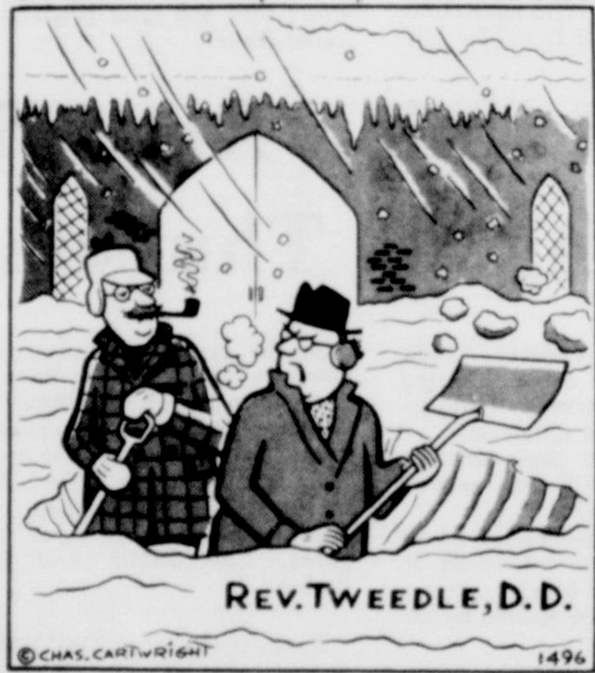

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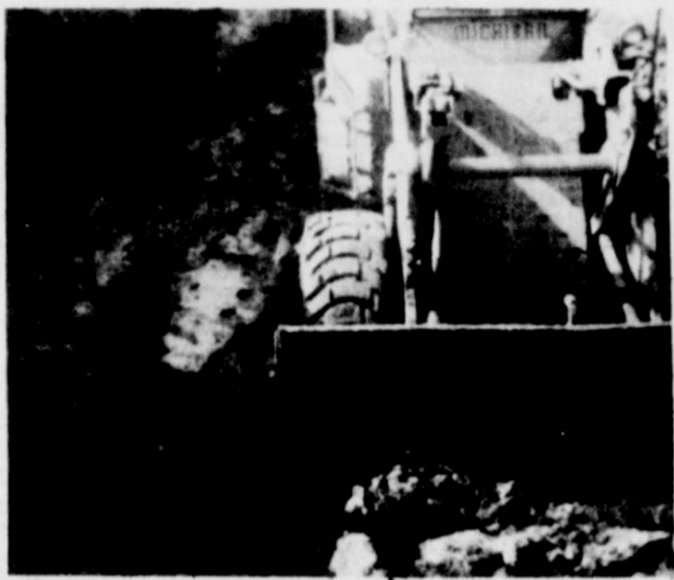
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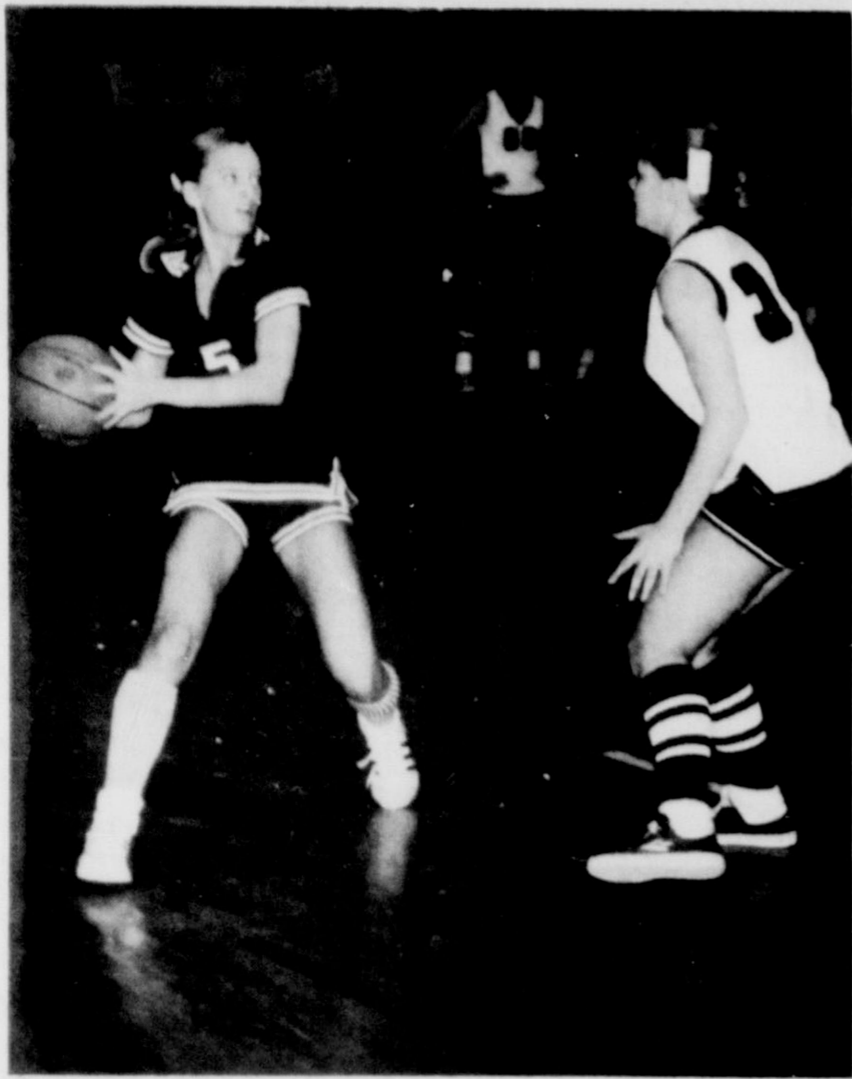

Five-Point Play Ruins Chiefs' Super Effort

It was one of the hardest-hitting basketball games witnessed on the local court in the last few years. It was a game that took a lot out of both teams.

In the end, Dimmitt claimed a 43-39 win over the Friona Chieftains, and virtually wrapped up the first half district title.

But the Bobcats knew they had been in a game. In fact, they trailed for about three quarters of the contest, having to come from behind for the win.

Dimmitt had led briefly, at 4-0 in the early going. But a tip-in shot by Kevin Kothmann and a three-point play by Koty Kothmann sent Friona into a 5-4 lead, and the Chiefs were to have the upper hand for quite a while.

Kevin Kothmann's pair of free shots, and his perfect shot from the corner hiked Friona's early lead to 9-4 with 4:29 left in the opening quarter. It would have been 11-4, but Whiteside was called for travelling on his reverse lay-in.

That allowed the Bobcats to trim the margin to 9-7, but Kevin Kothmann hit again on a long jump shot for an 11-7 score. He followed that a moment later with his tenth point of the quarter and Friona should have had a 15-11 first quarter lead. But Dimmitt scored with a second showing on the clock to trim the lead to 15-13 at the quarter.

Defense was the rule in the second quarter. Friona couldn't seem to hit the basket, except for Kothmann's jumper which made it 17-13 at the time. The Bobcats came back to tie the score before Friona could get back on the scoreboard.

Rocky Rawls gave Dimmitt a 21-20 lead at the 2:22 mark, but it lasted only until Friona worked the ball downcourt and Kothmann hit again on his patented shot from the side, which made it 22-21.

Jeff Whiteside finally broke his scoring goose-egg with a long jump shot 32 seconds before halftime for a 24-21 score.

Dimmitt then managed to tie the score on a three-point play with six seconds left. That set the stage for a last-second shot by Lawrence Fithen.

Whiteside rebounded a missed

free throw shot and brought the ball to midcourt. He juggled the ball a second, then handed it to Fithen, whose 25-foot shot at the buzzer hit only the bottom of the net, and the official held up a pair of fingers, indicating Friona had a 26-24 halftime lead.

The third quarter was a study in defense. Only 14 total points were scored: eight by Dimmitt and six by the Chiefs.

After Dimmitt tied the score at 26-24, Todd Bandy stole the ball from Rawls and drove the length of the court. His lay-up bounced off, but he stuffed it back in and Friona had a 28-26 lead. That was at the 4:11 mark, and only one basket had been scored by each team since the half.

Rawls again tied it for the Bobcats but Kevin Kothmann, who had one of his banner games, scored on a shot from the boondocks, and Friona was back on top, 30-28. Dimmitt got a basket with 1:20 left, and that allowed the 'Cats to tie the score at the quarter mark, 32-32.

In a game this hard fought and low-scoring, you knew that the team that got the breaks would win. Dimmitt definitely had the breaks, as the Bobcats cashed in on a "five-point play" midway through the period, to take their longest lead.

Jim Bradford scored for a 34-32 lead. Then the Bobcats stole the ball as Friona tried to work it upcourt, and Thompson Mayberry made the front end of a 1-1 free throw attempt. As luck would have it, Mark Summers rebounded Mayberry's second shot, and put it in for two, and from what had been a 32-32 game, Dimmitt came out with a 37-32 lead.

A minute later, Rawls clicked on a jump shot for a 39-32 edge, and things looked bleak for the Chiefs.

They didn't quit, however. Fithen laid in a missed Whitesides shot, Koty Kothmann laid up another, thanks to a Whitesides pass, and then Koty made both ends of a 1-1 free shot effort.

The Chiefs had trimmed the score to 39-38, and there was 2:33 left in the game.

But Dimmitt continued to get the

right bounces. Mayberry missed the first of a 1-1 shot, but there was Summers again to get the rebound, and hooked it in, for a 41-38 Dimmitt edge with 2:08 to play.

Koty Kothmann went for a lay-up with 1:15 left, and was fouled. He scored on his first free shot, for a 41-39 deficit, but missed the second and Dimmitt rebounded.

Friona had its chances. Rawls was called for charging with 1:06 to play, and the Chiefs worked for the tying shot. Whiteside tried it from 'way out, but the ball bounced away.

With Dimmitt stalling the clock out, Friona managed to steal the ball with 21 seconds left, and had one last chance. Kevin Kothmann let fly with six seconds left from the corner, and it was one of his few missed shots of the game. Dimmitt rebounded, whipped the ball the length of the court and scored for the final margin of 43-39.

After suffering back to back heartbreaker losses to Morton and Dimmitt, the Chiefs needed a lift, to begin the second half of district play. They got it with a 62-52 win on the road against Muleshoe on a cold snowy night.

It was a hard-fought game. The lead changed hands nine times, and it was tied on eight other occasions. Only a fourth-quarter rally saved the Chiefs, who began the quarter seven points down.

The first quarter was evenly played. For the third straight game, Kevin Kothmann did all of Friona's first quarter scoring.

Kothmann's jump shots tied it for the Chiefs twice at two and four, then gave Friona an 8-4 lead. Then the tide turned, and Muleshoe took a 10-8 lead. Kothmann tied the game for the fourth time at 10-10, and then rang the bell with just one tick left on the clock for a 12-10 first quarter lead.

Kothmann made it 14-12 at the 7:35 mark, and finally got some help in the scoring column when Fithen converted a pair of free shots good for a 16-12 Friona lead.

After an 18-18 tie, Friona had a brief flurry to take a 26-22 lead. But Muleshoe again stole the momentum

and opened up a 34-26 lead, with 12 straight points. Only Kothmann's shot 19 seconds prior to halftime stemmed the tide, and made it 34-28 at the half.

Big center Koty Kothmann had hurt an ankle early in the second quarter, and the Chiefs lost his muscle and scoring threat the rest of the game. Kothmann, who averaged 13.4 points per game for the first half of district, did not score in Tuesday's game.

Kevin Kothmann, Whiteside, Fithen and Jon Jarecki sparked Friona's fourth-quarter rally that brought the team from behind and clinched its 21st win of the season.

Baskets by Kothmann, Jarecki and Whiteside brought the Chiefs within a point at 44-43. Fithen's pair of free shots sent Friona ahead at 47-46, but Muleshoe claimed one last lead at 48-47.

Fithen answered with a turn-around shot with 3:44 to play, giving Friona a 49-48 lead. Jarecki laid one in for a 51-48 score, Fithen's jumper made it 53-48, and after Whiteside sank a technical foul shot, Fithen clicked again and Friona had scored nine unanswered points for a 56-48 lead.

Muleshoe finally broke the ice with a basket with 1:17 left, but Friona scored six more points for the 62-52 win.

Kevin Kothmann, with 43 points in his last two games, was high point man for the Chiefs with 24 against the Mules. Fithen came up with his best scoring in a district game with 14, and Whiteside, after missing the first quarter, began to break his slump with 14 points.

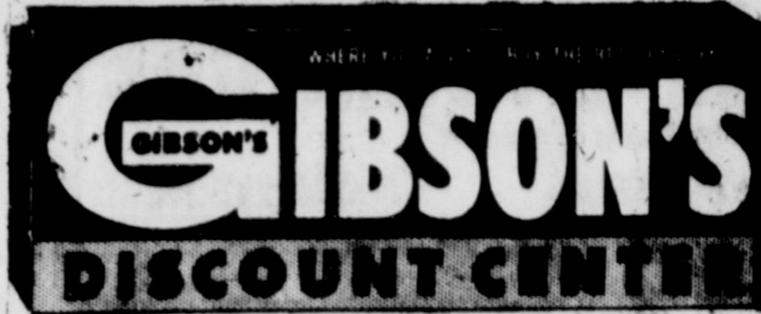

SCS Report

Establishing waterways is an important step in controlling erosion caused by rainfall.

Waterways are designed to carry runoff gently down slopes to prevent excessive erosion. The designed width of a waterway is determined by drainage area. If the drainage area is small, the smaller the flat bottom width of the waterway will be.

The bottom of the waterway will be planted to drilled crops or a permanent type grass, depending on the slope of the waterway.

Many times the establishing of waterways can reduce silt problems in tailwater pits, borrow ditches and turnrows.

Assistance can be obtained through the A.C.P. program or the Great Plains Conservation program on waterways.

If you are interested in waterways, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

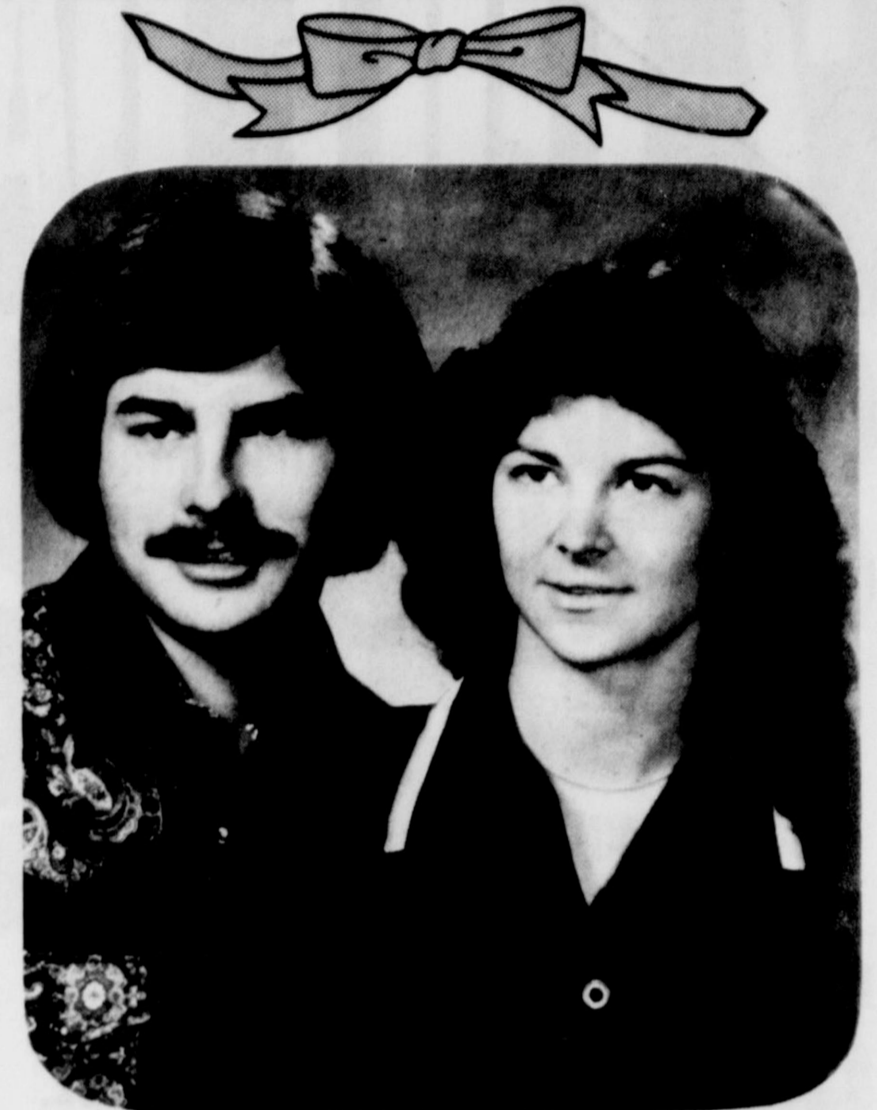
children, Eric, Jill and Beth had household belongings packed and ready for the movers when the weather became too disagreeable for anyone to be moving any where.
