Honor Graduates Announced By FHS

JUST ABOUT THE time most of us were enjoying the spring season comes our annual day of reckoning.

It's time to take your medicine, bite the bullet, or whatever you do, and pay your income tax.

We didn't want to be out of step this week. Virtually every news magazine that we receive has as their lead articles stories concerning the ever-rising tax situation, and the ever-building resentment by the burdened taxpayers about "more taxation and less representation."

Most Americans apparently would not mind the steady increase in taxes if they could see more services or benefits for their money--even if they could feel confident they would be able to someday cash in on the Social Security tax they have been paying since 1937, and which is now rivaling the federal income tax in size and scope.

The worst thing about Social Security is the fact that government tends to be so wasteful with people's hard-earned money. When you hear statements like we did this week, it shakes you up a bit. It was said that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare wastes more money each year--somewhere around \$7 million--that just "falls through the cracks" or is otherwise unaccounted for, than it originally had in its entire budget.

In addition to the complaint that the increased taxes are not bringing them any additional government services, most people we talk to object to high taxes because they just go to "support people who aren't working." It seems that the working class is being burdened more and more to provide money for those who won't work, or perhaps food stamps for workers on strike--in effect encouraging them to stay on perpetual strike.

Adding to the frustration of taxpayers is the knowledge that

He was named "Outstanding Young Person" this year by the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

The valedictorian's future plans include college at WTSU as an accounting major.

Church, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Church, has attended Friona schools six years. He has been active in athletics, being named all-district in football. He played in the FHS



their representatives in congress get by scot-free on taxes-even refusing to pay Social Security taxes. You can see why it would be hard to get congress to pass any type of tax reform legislation. They aren't personally involved, so why bother. An article in a major magazine this week is entitled "What if Congress Had to Live by its Own Laws?" It makes you stop and think. Complaints have been issued by tax officials as to "a bureaucratic thicket of confusion, contradiction and tangled language," concerning

the tax laws. It has been pointed out that even tax specialists have read the provisions of the Tax Reform Act of 1976, and have been left confused. "You read the instructions and you think you have figured it out. Then you read a little more, and it contradicts itself," said one specialist.

Every year about this time you hear about a "taxpayer's revolt," hinting that the average American wage-earner is getting pretty fed up with being taken for a sucker while bureaucrats run and play with their tax money.

Unfortunately, the talk usually fades the farther you get from April 15th, only to be forgotten again until it's once again time to make your offering on the tax altar.

However, events currently in the public eye, such as the farm situation, the Panama Canal and other issues have caused more people to pay attention to what is going on in regard to national government. It's a shame that it virtually takes a tragedy to get folks interested in their government, but that's usually the way it works.

It appears to us that most folks in this area, and possibly nation-wide, are going to be paying more and more attention to their legislators. As bona-fide members of the United States Taxpayers Club, they have every right to expect to have a say as to how their business is being conducted in Washington.

And sadly, many have found in recent times that their voice is weaker and weaker all the time, while their omniscient, tax-exempt leaders make the major decisions for them.

This is the area in which Americans should revolt. The ballot box is sometimes a slow method to stage a revolt, especially where the senate is concerned, with elections only every six years. But it can be

School Announces Bad Weather Policy

Parents of children attending Friona schools were notified this week as to the school's policy regarding severe weather, and as to how the school copes with the problem. A letter to all parents on the subject was sent out on Friday by Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

'Once again, we are getting into the tornado season in West Texas. We want to inform the parents of the preparation and plans of the Friona Schools in the event of a tornado alert," Jarboe said.

The school is informed by radio, local fire department, Civil Defense Units and the police and highway patrol. Also, school personnel are on the constant alert for observing the weather in times of threatening looking clouds. If a tornado or bad clouds are spotted, the Friona school system is alerted and a tornado signal is sounded.

All students have been informed and are irilled in what to do in case of a tornado alert. We have assigned students certain places to go in order to get the best protection available in our school buildings. The safety of every child is our utmost concern. We will do our best to see that every child is well drilled on what to do in case of a tornado alert.

Here are some plans that the school would like for parents to read and help us with:

1. In times of severe weather, parents may come and get their child if you wish, but we strongly encourage you to do nothing or say anything that might alarm the children. Remember, we do not want panic.

2. Please be sure to see your child's teacher or principal before picking your child up, as the teacher is responsible to account for each child. Students are informed not to leave the building without their teacher or principal's permission.

3. All students will be using the safety and protection of the hallways, rather than their classrooms.

4. Classes outside the main building (P.E., athletic classes, etc.) will move to the main buildings if time permits. If not, they are instructed in the best possible safety precautions for their location.

"If during tornado season our area becomes under severe weather warnings, we may dismiss school early -- provided we feel the children will have enough time to get home before the storm begins. Therefore, it will be necessary for you to have a pre-arranged plan with your child as to where to go in case you are not at home," Jarboe said.

The superintendent asked parents to post this information in a handy place and go over it with their family members. "We appreciate your cooperation in assisting us in making plans and preparations should we face an emergency situation," he concluded.





Taylor's Meat Lands Sambo's Beef Supply

If you should visit a Sambo's Restaurant sometime in the future, whether in Clovis, N.M. or Omaha, Nebraska, you might want to try a beef dish

If you do, you would be supporting a Friona industry, which is now working full time to supply the fast-becoming nationwide Sambo's Restaurant chain with its beef.

Taylor's Meat Company of Friona began to kill beef for the restaurant chain back last December, and recently signed a contract to supply the major portion of the beef for the far-flung Sambo's operation.

In order to supply the beef demands for Sambo's, Taylor's is in the middle of an expansion program, which will enable it to slaughter and process up to 300 head of cattle in a day's time.

"We expect to eventually be slaughtering between 1,000 and 1,500 cattle per week when we reach capacity." says Jerry Taylor, owner-manager of the slaughter plant, which is the successor to Crow's Meat Company, a pioneer Fridna business.

New refrigeration units were being installed at the slaughter plant

this week, which were to add considerably to the plant's capacity. Taylor's has completed two additional rooms for its plant, and another is under construction.

Taylor's will be shipping two or three truckloads of beef daily from its Friona plant to Sambo's national headquarters in Carpinteria, California. The beef is shipped in quarters, and is processed in California.

The Sambo's chain began feeding cattle in the Friona area during 1977, having fed a number at Hi-Plains Feed Yard. The completion of the deal with Taylor's will enable the company to finish its feeding and slaughter cycle in the local area.

The Sambo's arrangement has enabled Taylor's Meat Company to expand its staff from its former level of 12 or 15 employees to 33 at the present. Eventually, this number is expected to approach the 50 mark as the expansion is completed.

Taylor said the company was striving to hire local people during its expansion phase. "We are using local residents, and training them for their new work. We are planning to keep our operation as 'local' as

possible," he said.

The additional jobs created at the slaughter outlet will mean virtually an additional payroll for the city. In conjunction with their expan-

sion, Taylor announced this week that due to the new obligations, the company found it necessary to halt its custom slaughter operations.

"We hate to eliminate this part of our business, because we know it will be inconvenient to several who have been our customers. But we felt we had to zero in on the type of contract that will make our operation profitable," Taylor said.

Effective immediately, the local slaughter plant is killing beef strictly for Sambo's. It is presently supplying most of the beef for the restaurant chain, and hopes eventually to supply 100 per cent of the beef for the entire chain.

Sambo's is a familiar restaurant name in the Western half of the nation, but is now expanding into the North and East.

And now, that "Something good," that's "Always Cookin' at Sambo's," stands a good chance of having been fattened and slaughtered in Friona, Texas.

WHAT IS PARITY


There has been a lot of talk about Parity recently, but few people really understand the term. Parity is simply a measure of farm buying power. Here is an example of Parity that demonstrates what has happened to farm buying power in the last few years.

In 1973 a popular size and brand of diesel tractor was selling for \$14,189 and that same year cotton was selling for 65¢ per pound. It took 43 bales of cotton to buy the tractor.

Today, that same tractor costs \$27,487 - and that same grade and staple of cotton is selling for 45¢ per pound.

To buy that same tractor today it takes 122 bales of cotton. Simple mathmatics teils us it takes 79 MORE bales of cotton to buy the tractor today — than it did as recently as 1973.

New Councilmen Are Sworn At Meeting

Two new city councilmen were supermarket a bigger box, releasing sworn into office Monday evening at the city council business meeting, following the announcement of the results of the city's annual general election.

Mike Chaney and Clarence Monroe took their places at the council table on either side of newly-elected Mayor B.K. Buske. Patrick Pace was named as mayor pro-tem.

Main topic at the meeting was the opening of bids for a new service pickup for the city. City Manager Jake Outland explained to the council that a new pickup had not been purchased for the past two years, and the vehicle used by the animal warden was in bad need of repair, showing over 45,000 miles.

Although the city had only budgeted \$3,000 to purchase a new vehicle, the council voted to buy a half-ton, six cylinder pickup from Friona Ford Sales at a cost of \$4,191.91, with a special utility bed costing an additional \$1,483 bringing the total cost to the city to \$5,674.91. Outland also requested that the council approve a contract for the city to buy 20 additional trash containers because of the growing need, since two containers had been placed at each supermarket, and other adjustments needed to be made.

The city is presently using three-cubic yard boxes, Outland explained, and a larger box for industrial sections of the city would convenient. After considerable discussion of the subject the council voted to purchase 32 four-cubic yard boxes at a cost of approximately \$6,800. This would give each two three-cubic-yard boxes to be used elsewhere. Outland added that the boxes in the industrial sections of the city were emptied once daily, and twice weekly in residential sections

City Attorney Gale Warren told the council of the Friona Little League's plans to buy six lots adjacent to the present ball park on the south end of Prospect Avenue. The present Little League Park will be moved from its location on Columbia Avenue to the new location, centralizing the location of the summer baseball program. This, Warren explained, would be more convenient for parents who have more than one child playing ball at different parks.

The old Little League Park on Columbia will be converted to a softball field, Warren said, upon completion of the new facility.

Richard Wilson said today. In order to heighten public awareness of the problem, April 10-15 has been designated the third annual Postal Consumer Protection Week by Postmaster General William F. Bolger.

"The public must be constantly on guard against fantastic claims and get-rich-quick schemes" Postmaster Wilson said. "The nations' best defense against unscrupulous con artists using the mails is an informed public."

The Postal Service actively investigates mail fraud and false representation by mail, and assists with mail-order and service problems.

Postmaster Wilson stressed that the overwhelming majority of companies making up the \$60-billion mail-order industry are honest and dedicated to customer satisfaction. sumers to ask companies to back up But, as in many other industries, a their claims if an offer sounds too

"Schemes directed at consumers

are limited only by the imagination the con artist," Postmaster Wilson said. "They know many people are willing to invest their hard-earned money on offers which sound too good to be true.

Typical examples of mail frauds and false representations by mail include work-at-home schemes, phony franchises, miraculous "cures" for a variety of illnesses, weight reducing plans with no proven medical value, and a variety of investment offers such as buying land through the mail.

Businesses also become victims of mail frauds and false representations, Postmaster Wilson said. "Companies pay out millions of dollars each year for imaginary or useless business directories, phony invoices and contributions to

non-existent organizations." Postmaster Wilson urged con-
