Hance, Hill Win Big In Local Box

THE PRIMARIES are over, and as usual they produced a few surprises for political observers.

One surprise was the fact that John Hill won the governor's nomination over Dolph Briscoe, without a runoff. Another was the relatively easy win scored by Kent Hance over Morris Sheats in the Congressional race, one that was picked to be close.

And then, in the Republican primary, it was surprising in this corner that not only didn't Jim Reese win the nomination without a runoff, but he didn't even lead the voting in the first round. Reese and George Bush will face off in a June 3 runoff.

Texas voters are a fickle lot. A few years ago, they ousted tobacco-chewing rebel Jerry Sadler from office, but turned right around and gave him a nomination for the railroad commission in this primary.

WE ALWAYS HAVE enjoyed election night. As long as we can remember, there has been something special about watching the vote returns come in. We can remember even as a small child staying in town until after dark, when the vote returns were posted, usually in chalk, upon a large blackboard placed in a prominent place.

This past election night, we had the opportunity of doing something we never had before. Happening to be in Austin, and housed next door to the campaign headquarters of most of the candidates for governor and other state offices, we discovered all of a sudden that we were right where it all "was happening."

So, we crashed the election night parties of John Hill and Bob Krueger. The party hosted at the Hill headquarters, at Austin's historic Driskill Hotel, was an experience to behold.

It must have compared to Dallas on the Texas vs Oklahoma football weekend.

Down through the years, the Driskill has served as campaign headquarters for some of the better known political figures of our state. As we watched the celebration unfolding for the Hill followers last Saturday, we could picture such politicians as Lyndon B. Johnson holding forth in bygone days.

Anyway, it was quite an experience for his old country boy editor. Election night returns may never be the same again, but we plan to continue to enjoy them.

Del Lewis Booked For Drama Event

Friona's Summer Drama Workshop will be held July 17-29, and will feature former Friona resident Del Lewis as the guest artist.

Plans are being made to conduct two segments of the workshop this summer. One will be a group for students ages nine through 12, which will meet in the mornings.

Another will be a group for those 13 years and over, which will meet in the afternoon and evenings.

Friona Democrats, turning out in better than average numbers for an "off-year" primary with no local races on the ballot, gave the majority of their votes to Bob Krueger, Kent Hance and John Hill in the top three races on the ballot May 6.

The Friona precinct gave Hance, the Democratic nominee for Congressman, a big win, 411 to 208 over Morris Sheats, a Dimmitt native. Hance received 66.4 per cent of the Friona vote, compared to an even 60 per cent countywide, where he won, 1059 to 706.

Hance won every voting box in the county except at Black, where Sheats held a 24-22 edge, and Lakeview, where the two candidates tied, 20-all. At Farwell, where Sheats' county chairman lived, Hance eked out a 149-145 win.

Hill, more or less a surprise victor over incumbent governor Dolph Briscoe for the Democratic nomination, won the Friona box with 352 votes, a 55.1 per cent margin. Hill also took Parmer County with 1,007 votes, winning every voting box.

Briscoe received 183 votes in Friona and 467 in the county. Former governor Preston Smith had 92 votes locally and 317 in the county.

In the race for the U.S. Senate nomination, Krueger won the Friona precinct, 351 to 231 over Joe Christie. He also won the county totals, 943-640.

City voters went along with the trend in the attorney general's race, giving Mark White a slight edge, but the county as a whole gave an 880 to 823 margin to challenger Price Daniel, Jr., the former governor's son.

Friona voters went along with the state trend by turning thumbs down to the pari-mutuel betting proposition. The vote here was 437 opposed (70.4) to 183 in favor (29.6 per cent).

The county vote on the pari-mutuel question was 1198 against (68.1) to 555 in favor (31.9).

Local voters also nixed the proposal for higher interest rates for loans under \$5,000 by a margin of 542 to 51.

In neighboring Precinct 2 (Bovina and Rhea), Jack Patterson and Glenden Sudderth led the five-man ticket in the race for nomination for county commissioner. Patterson was the leading vote-getter with 156 votes, to 89 for Sudderth. The two will face each other in a runoff on June 3.

Chieftain Band Wins At Festival

The Friona Chieftain Marching Band was a prize winner last weekend during the 40th Annual Music and Blossom Festival in Canon City, Colorado.

The Friona High School Band won third place in the field show division on Saturday, May 6. A total of 31 bands took part in the festival, including 15 in Friona's classification. Second place was won by another Panhandle band, from Stratford, and first was won by a band from Spiro, Oklahoma.

Bands attended the festival from a six-state area, including Colorado,

Texas, Tennessee, Oklahoma, Kansas and California.

Bands entered in Friona's division included Olton, Vega, Stratford, Hull-Daisetta, Hart and Friona from Texas; Swink, Eaton, Estes Park, Karval and Ignacio, Colorado; Gerber, Spiro and Carnegie, Oklahoma; and Sublette, Kansas.

The band also took part in a parade on Saturday morning. It performed its field show routine on Saturday afternoon, and its final show on Sunday afternoon.

In the Lazbuddie precinct, Raymond McGeehee defeated Pete Jesko, 144 to 47 for the commissioner's nomination in Precinct 4.

In County totals, Hill won every voting box, rolling up a total of 1,007 votes to 467 for Briscoe and 317 for Smith.

Hance carried the county by a 60 per cent tally, getting 1,059 votes to 706 for Sheats.

Parmer County voters nixed legalized gambling, 1,198 against, (68.3) to 555 in favor (31.7 per cent).

Jay Beene was elected precinct chairman for the Friona precinct with 414 votes. Hollis Horton was re-elected as county chairman, with 1,054 votes.

A total of 1,832 residents voted in the Democratic primary, with another 200 voting in the Republican primary, for a total of 2,032. This was a turnout of approximately 43 per cent of the eligible voters.

The vote total compared to 2,566 voters in May of 1976, which was a presidential year, and 1,997 in 1974, the last gubernatorial year.

The total vote, by box, was Black, 47; Friona, 643; Bovina, 343; Farwell, 311; Lazbuddie, 209; Oklahoma Lane, 101; Rhea, 53; Lakeview, 41; and absentees, 116. Total vote was 1832.

The complete voting chart, showing each precinct voted in the primary, is presented elsewhere in this issue.

Reese, Clements Lead GOP Ballot

Friona Republican voters, with 88 voting in the local primary, went overwhelmingly for Jim Reese and Bill Clements, and went against pari-mutuel betting, in the May 6 primary.

Jim Reese led the Friona precinct in the race for U.S. Congress nomination with 68 votes. This was 81 per cent of the votes cast. In all four county precincts, Reese received 129 votes, which was 66.8 per cent of the votes cast in the race.

Reese still must meet George Bush, Jr. in a Republican runoff primary on June 3. Bush surprisingly led the voting in the district, but received only eight votes in Friona, and 33 in the county.

Bill Clements, oil industry official, led the three-man field in the governor's race, receiving 67 votes in Friona, which was 81.7 per cent of

the vote, and 136 in the county, 73.9 per cent.

The pari-mutuel betting proposition went down to defeat in the Friona precinct, 53 against (69.7 per cent) to 23 in favor (30.3).

Local voters favored establishing a permanent presidential primary such as was held in 1976, with 57 votes (78.1 per cent) to 16 votes (21.9 per cent). They also were in favor of limiting the amount of state and local taxes, 59 votes (75.6 per cent) to 19 (24.4 per cent).

In Precinct 2, where a commissioner was nominated, Vernon Estes won the race with 32 votes, to seven for Jim Dixon.

Special agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms of the U.S. Treasury confiscated three rifles and two pistols from their display cases at the NRA Museum in Headquarters.
Guns confiscated were two MB Associates Gyro Jet rocket pistols and three automatic rifles—a T44E4, a T48, and an AR-15.
All were deactivated and inoperable. Some had been in the museum as long as 21 years.
BATF alleges that the guns violate the National Firearms Act and are subject to forfeiture and, presumably, destruction.
The Gyro Jet pistols, BATF asserts, violate the National Firearms Act's prohibition against sawed-off shotguns because their bores are 13mm in

diameter, .3 mm over the legal limit of 12.7 mm (cal. 50).
The pistols were deactivated by the NRA on receipt, Museum curator Robert Lowe said. The rifles were deactivated by welding before delivery to NRA.
"All five guns are practically shells," Lowe said. "Most of the moving parts were and remain inoperable." He said it would take "considerable work, as well as the replacement of parts which are practically impossible to locate" to restore any of the guns to firing condition.

Despite the fact that deactivated and inoperable firearms have traditionally been exempt from registration and taxation, the BATF agents who seized the guns said the Gun Control Act of 1968 required NRA to register the arms with BATF and pay a \$200 tax on each.
"The NRA disputes BATF's interpretation of the National Firearms Act as applied to these museum pieces," Gary Anderson, NRA-GO Executive Director, declared. "We are giving notice that we plan to litigate the matter in U.S. District Court under the provisions of 27 CFR, Section 72.21 of the National Firearms Act."
The Gyro Jet pistol was never a commercial success and is primarily of collector interest. The T44E4 and T48 rifles are relics of the U.S. Army testing program which led to adoption of the M14 rifle in 1957. Lowe says both rifles possess special historical interest. "They are unquestionably of museum or collector value," he said, "because they were limited-production items, and very few survived testing."

ASCS Date Is Extended

The Parmer County ASCS Office announces that the signup period for the 1978 set-aside program has been extended to May 15.
ASCS also says this:
The 1977 crop wheat can be placed in the grain reserve program up to May 31.
At any time starting May 1 and until the final date is announced, 1977 crop grain sorghum or corn can be placed in the reserve program. These loans are interest free after the first year.
These crops must be appraised by the county office before any other use is made of the land, should you have a failed or low yield crop. Any farm with a crop is eligible for disaster protection, but the farmer must sign up to participate at the time the loss is reported and no later than May 15.

In other law enforcement activities Sheriff Lovelace reported that a Bovina juvenile was apprehended in connection with a theft. The juvenile was released to his parents.



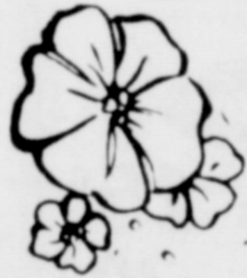

On most all house fires, it is the smoke that is the most dangerous. In case of a fire in our home, stay as close to the floor as possible and never hesitate to call the fire department.

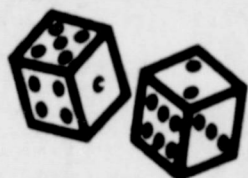
This past Sunday we had a call to the Stanley Bengel

In our regular meeting May 4 we practiced with the air packs, reviewing how to be prepared to enter a smoke-filled house as quickly as possible.

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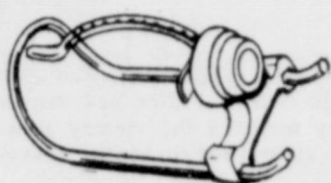

Tammie Smith Fifth In State Meet Event

Tammie Smith, Lazbuddie's defending state champion in the class B 880-yard run, could only finish fifth at this year's state meet, her second consecutive appearance at the giant Memorial Stadium event in Austin.

Tammie was clocked in 2:26.3 for the event, which actually was run as 800 meters this year. Her time for the 880 a year ago had been 2:22.2. Miss Smith was one of the pace-setters during the first lap of the event, but fell back during the latter stages of the race. Cindy Speir of Celeste won the event in 2:21.0.

"I probably was a little nervous, and I may have run the first lap a

little too fast, and didn't have the finish I should have had," Tammie said following the event.

She ran the first lap of the event in about 64.5 seconds, which was almost four seconds faster than she

normally runs the opening lap.

"My coach wanted me to try to go out and set the pace—I usually have to in meets I have run in, but this was a little different. I just didn't have it for the finish," she said.

Miss Smith's cousin, Charleson Steinbock, will be competing in the boys state meet this weekend in the pole vault event. Steinbock cleared 13 feet at the regional meet. It is also his second trip to Austin.

residence, where their fence had caught fire. Some damage resulted, but it was nothing major.

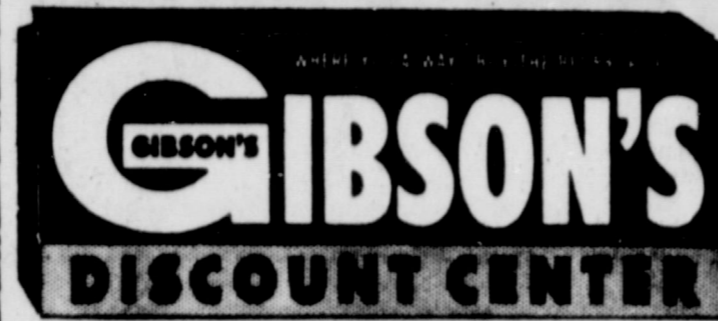
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Bovina Girls Are State Track Champions

The Bovina High School Fillies completed a fantastic track and field season by claiming the Class A state championship on a humid afternoon last Saturday at the Memorial Stadium in Austin.

The Fillies, twice before the bridesmaid in trips to the state meet, caught the bouquet and held on for dear life to claim the school's first state track championship in its history.

The girls class A event is accustomed to close finishes, and this one was no different. The final tally showed Bovina with 47 points, and Spring Hill of Longview with 46.

Bovina won the state title by virtue of its good team depth, and without the benefit of a single first place event, something of a rarity for the Fillies, who had won five events at the regional meet.

By winning the state meet, the Fillies capped off a unique season that saw them go undefeated for meet honors in nine consecutive outings.

The team accomplished their feat in spite of having one of their team members, Sandi Sides, suffering from mononucleosis, which left her in a weakened state.

Amazingly, Miss Sides placed third in the triple jump, without the benefit of any warmup jumps, and with just two recorded jumps out of the usual allotment of six.

The Fillies' 880-yard relay team, considered Bovina's best bet for a first place, was edged at the finish line by a Troup team that wasn't expected to challenge.

Bovina's 440-yard relay team finished third in spite of a near tragedy; and the mile relay team finished fifth, only to be disqualified for a lane violation.

Otherwise, the team got 12 big points from veteran thrower Pat Shepherd, who placed second in her specialty, the discus, and then managed a fourth place in a heated shot put event.

Miss Shepherd's best toss in the shot, on one of her final allotted throws, moved her up a notch in the standings, and the additional two points could have meant the state title.

Or perhaps it was the point garnered by sophomore Denise Read in the high jump? Actually, it was a team effort, with every member of the team combining and contributing to the final sum total that meant victory.

"We won the title, and that was the main thing," said a relieved Coach Joel Nelson, who had experienced two previous "close calls" at state meets in which the Fillies were edged out for the championship.

"We were under a lot of pressure. It's hard to imagine how the pressure builds up week after week,

especially when you're expected to win," Nelson said. He indicated that both he and the team had returned to Bovina in a state of mental and physical exhaustion.

Nelson said that the 1978 Fillies had suffered more injuries and illness than any team he had ever coached and yet, there had been no missed days of workouts. "This is an unusual group of kids," he said about the Fillies.

The Bovina Coach felt that under "normal" conditions, the Fillies would have won both the 880 and 440-yard relay events.

(Note: the events were actually run by meters at the 1978 state meet. We're continuing to use the term "yard" due to old habits which are hard to break.)

Bovina had the lead in the 880-yard relay when Miss Sides took the stick, but having already competed in two events for the day, Sandi just didn't have the strength to hold the lead. A symptom of "mono" is that it causes one to tire out more quickly than usual.

"There's not a girl in the state who could catch Sandi when she has a lead, if she's 100 per cent healthy," Nelson said.

The Fillies' coach pointed out that the sprint relay foursome achieved its lofty finish in spite of a less than perfect first handoff, which saw Belinda Shelby and Denise Read virtually collide. Miss Read had to keep her balance, as well as the baton, and finish the lap.

"I figure that probably cost us a full second in the race. If you took a second off our time, we'd have been first, and would have set a new state record in the event at 48.2," Nelson said.

In the 880-yard relay event, the Fillies were needing to push challenger Spring Hill as far down in the race as possible, and in the final analysis, they got a helping hand they didn't expect.

The Spring Hill anchor girl dropped the baton about ten yards before reaching the finish line, and by the time it could be retrieved, the first six teams had crossed the finish line, and the East Texas team thus got no points from an event in which they were expected to score fairly well.

Instead of going into the mile relay event with Bovina needing a certain place in order to win, the dropped baton by Spring Hill gave the Fillies a 21-point lead and clinched the title for the Parmer County contingent.

Due to what happened in the final relay race, it turned out that lady luck at least tipped the scales in favor of the Fillies.

Apparently finishing fifth in a record-smashing relay event, which would have added eight points to the team's total and made it a nine-point win for the title, Bovina's leadoff

runner, Laura Widner, was flagged for too many steps on the white line, and the relay team was disqualified.

But the team's depth had prevailed, and the fact that they had swapped faux-pas acts with the East Texas team only served to hold down the total scores for both teams.

On Friday afternoon, Miss Shepherd, appearing in her fourth state meet, had gotten things off to a great start for the Fillies with an impressive series of discus throws that netted her second place in the event with a heave of 129-3.

The event was dominated by Mart's giantess, Early Douglas, who broke her own state record with a near-orbit toss of 138-10. Prior to the meet, Nelson figured the rest of the discus field was shooting for second place behind the big Mart athlete. So, Miss Shepherd's eight points were a great start for the Bovina team.

Then on Saturday morning, three athletes were involved in their specialty event, all at the same time. Miss Shepherd began her shot put event, and the ailing Miss Sides her triple jump, at the south end of the mammoth stadium on the University of Texas campus.

Denise Read meanwhile began the high jump competition at the opposite end of the stadium.

After the first round of throws, Miss Shepherd was only sixth, as the talented field of shot putters were hitting the 40-foot mark like it was child's play. By the time she threw again, Pat was in seventh place.

Meanwhile, Miss Sides was shunning her warm-up jumps in the triple jump event, in order to preserve her strength for the actual competition.

"I had told Sandi she would just have to use her official jumps for practice. We couldn't afford to have her go too far downhill," Nelson said.

The result was that on her first run, Sandi scratched, going past the jump mark by about six inches. However, her jump in the second round was near perfect, and the 35-5 effort put her in second place at the time.

On her third and final jump in the preliminaries, Miss Sides scratched again, but with one good jump she was standing second in the competition.

After one more jump in the finals, Sandi felt she could not top the 35-5 effort, so she purposely passed up her final two jumps. Another contestant, on her next-to-last jump, bumped Sandi down to third place.

But the six points were big ones, and earned Sandi a medal. All of the top six placers in the event topped the 35-foot mark.

level on her third and final jump each time. Although she had cleared 5-4 the previous week in the rarified air of her native Bovina, went out at 5-3, and had to settle for sixth place. It was a disappointment for Miss Read, who cleared the same height that second through fifth places cleared. She had the misfortune of

having more missed jumps than the others. But the point she earned loomed big before the day ended.

It was the first state team championship in the history of Bovina High School. It's the second time in 16 years a county school won the state title. Lazbuddie's boys turned the trick back in 1962.

Friona Will Host County Democratic Convention

A standing-room only crowd attended the Friona Democratic precinct convention last Saturday, during which 18 delegates and seven alternates were elected to attend the county convention this Saturday (May 13) at the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

The county convention will begin at 2 p.m.

The precinct group passed three resolutions to forward to the county convention, two on behalf of the American Agriculture Movement, including one five-point petition.

The main resolution called for the Democratic party to work to get the original A.A.M. five-point policy statement into the Democratic party platform.

The program includes (1) 100 per cent parity for all domestic and foreign used and-or consumed agricultural products; (2) All agricultural products produced for national or international food reserves shall be contracted at 100 per cent of parity; (3) Creation of an entity or structure composed of agricultural producers to devise an approved policy that affects agriculture; (4) Imports of all

agricultural products which are domestically produced must be stopped until 100 per cent parity is reached. Thereafter, imports must be limited to the amount the American producer cannot supply; and (5) All announcements pertaining to any agricultural producing cycle shall be made far enough in advance that the producer will have adequate time to make needed adjustments in his operation.

The second resolution urged the Democratic party to work to get state laws passed that will prohibit purchasing of farm land by foreign citizens or interests that would be exempt from any local, state or federal taxes.

The third resolution was for Democrats to give their full support to Texas' right to work law.

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Trilateral Threat Given By Speaker

Speaking to a gathering of over six hundred farmers, businessmen, and interested citizens at the High School Auditorium in Muleshoe, last Friday evening, J.C. Lewis, a retired lieutenant colonel of the U.S. Air Force, outlined the recent actions and goals of the Trilateral Commission in its threefold thrust to control finances, fuel and food.

Lewis maintained that the first two goals of controlling finances and fuel have already been achieved, and the only factor standing in the way of the Trilateral Commission controlling the food was the Agricultural Strike movement.

If he were asked to state how late and how serious the situation was, he would describe it as being "11:55 before 12:00." As he spoke, he urged the listener to find these facts out for himself as there was a multiplicity of material available in the form of

books and pamphlets.

The Trilateral Commission was described by Lewis as the latest movement created to speed up the goal of one world government. It is aimed at spearheading the same goals as the Council of Foreign Relations, (created in 1922) whose membership is around sixteen hundred people, all of whom are influential in politics, business, education, communications and science.

David Rockefeller was named as the creator of the Trilateral Commission, founding it in 1973 with 70 people from the United States and Canada together with leaders from Germany and Japan.

Together these leaders formulate policy which demands control of the finances, the fuel, and the food of a country. When these are controlled, government by this group is assured and one world government will result, Lewis says. The membership

of the Trilateral Commission is about 165.

The goal in the food industry is to reduce the number of American farmers by 500,000 per year until 1982. Naturally, the Trilateral Commission opposes parity for the farmer for several reasons, because (1) Parity would allow farmers to remain in the farming business; (2) Less interest would accrue; (3) Parity would force other countries to desire parity also, as Brazil has done and balanced its payments picture; (4) One world government would be hampered without the inner group in control as there would be a weapon that could be used against the rising price of fuel.

Although the Democratic platform of 1976 indicated that the party was for parity, this position has now been changed to non-support, as indicated in recent voting and a recent USDA release indicating that deficit spending is to be preferred over parity of prices for the farmer.

If parity is not achieved now, the speaker related, more and more farmers will be forced to quit. Large corporations will assume the operations as well as out of country investors. Fifty billion dollars is presently available over a five year period to buy up farm land. Already at present, one out of three acres is owned by foreigners.

The thrust to capture the farms and the food market is but one part of the total picture involved, Lewis insisted, but it is also the last one standing in the way of total monopoly by the Trilateral Commission.

In the other areas, loans, ownership of stocks, and interlocking directorates comprise their power. Only the independent farmer and those interested in stopping this monopoly can put the brakes to this rush to one world government and turn it around so that it will revert to our concept of freedom and free enterprise, he averred.

His suggestions were (1) Get involved in the political field starting at the grass roots in precinct meetings, voting, etc.; (2) Work hard; (3) Become informed—learn more; (4) Reinvestigate the Foundations, which he maintained were being used to re-educate the American public through grants to schools and other areas; (5) Keep abreast and speak and write concerning current developments to your elected and appointed officials; (6) Insist and work for parity; and (7) Pray.

Good Turnout Sparks Republican Meeting

guarantee of private property holdings.

Other resolutions were passed opposing HEW and supreme court rulings requiring bussing of school children; calling for the abolishment of Daylight Savings Time; stipulating that all elected Republicans uphold the party platform.

It was also resolved that there be a change in the welfare program to eliminate fraud and abuse, and another asking for rescinding of the ERA amendment by the state legislature.

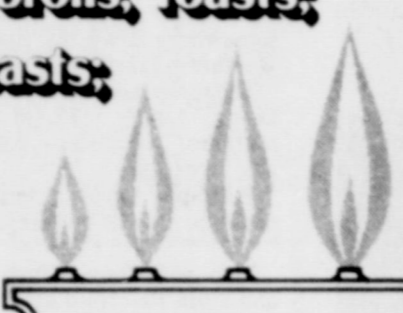

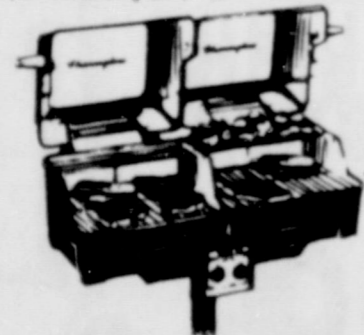

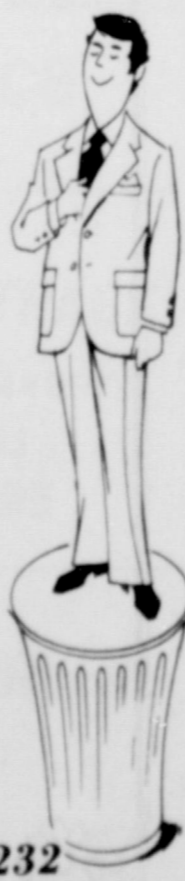
