TAXPAYERS EVERYWHERE were given a shot in the arm by the passage last week in California of "Proposition 13," imposing a ceiling on property tax rates, and severely limiting the power of local governments to raise money by any other means.

The shock waves of the action by California voters already has hit Washington, and some governmental officials have pledged their efforts toward the proposition of curbing needless spending.

Whatever else the vote by the California residents signified, to us it was a clear signal that the bulk of middle class America is sick and tired of working right at half a year so that over half of the nation will not have to work, and then being able to "work for themselves" for the final half of the year.

They're sick and tired of seeing his hard-earned tax money poured down rat holes by the careless politicians and bureaucrats, who don't have to pay these taxes themselves, but merely find ways of spending your money, and of keeping it coming.

They're sick and tired of paying some \$100,000 executive to figure out a reason for a tax-financed program, and then not be able to terminate the program if and when it turns out to be a bummer for everyone except the bureaucrats.

They're sick and tired of having to dig deeper and deeper each and every year for taxes, while more and more people evade taxes completely, or refuse to work because they can get more money "on welfare."

Politicians all the way up and down the scale have been quick to point out the fallacies of the action by California voters, but we applaud the courage of the Californians.

"The buck has to stop somewhere," and apparently our neighbors to the west decided it was time to draw a line, and to trim the fat and waste out of public tax-financed programs.

The passage of the tax amendment in California has been called the biggest tax revolt since the Boston Tea Party. And come to think about it, it has been about that long since Americans have stood up to taxation and told it they have enjoyed about as much of it as they can stand.

If the action in California doesn't trigger a major tax revolt in our country, as we're hopeful that it will, then our nation is plunging headlong toward becoming a welfare state.

A Gallup poll following the California vote showed that 57 percent of the public favors a tax cut similar to the one authored in California by Jarvis-Gann. Americans also seem to think that taxes can be trimmed somewhat without appreciably sacrificing needed services. In other words, they feel that government can be made to operate more efficiently.

Already we had reached the point to where there were more Americans on the receiving end of taxes than there were on the paying end, and that was a dangerous situation.

Hopefully, California's "Proposition 13" will truly bring about a taxpayer's revolt in this country. We have felt for some time that we could get along without a number of the ridiculous and superfluous bureaucracies which have been established.

But the nation's taxpayers will have to follow through on the matter, and insist on less government spending. We might be amazed at the amount of taxes we could save. It's an exciting challenge, and we hope our government will respond.

THE FIREWORKS DISPLAY, which has apparently become a political football, was up for kicking around again this week, and the Chamber of Commerce's board of directors kicked the event plumb out of their jurisdiction, and dropped its sponsorship.

Luckily for Friona residents, the Friona Fire Department fielded the ball on the first bounce, and as a result, we'll be able to have a 10th annual display. The fireboys agreed to serve as sponsor for the event.

Engineer Hired To Study "Surge"

The City Council voted unanimously Monday to hire an independent engineer to study the water surge problem.

Amarillo engineer Bill McMorres will look at the situation and see what the problem is and how it can best be solved.

Alderman Jerry Brown said that before the city has a bond election, it should make sure of the solution.

The council also gave Baker Duggins, who serves as the county representative to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, permission to investigate the

possibility of getting federal funds for recreation in Friona.

Duggins said, "If we have a police department or city park in trouble and we can't afford it in the city, I'd like to get as much back as I can from Washington."

He said that there is no way the money can come back with no strings attached but he would go for money for recreation for the youth.

The federal government has such a tremendous amount of paperwork, Duggins said, because of the rip-offs in the urban areas and this has made it frustrating for smaller towns.

A bid by Cook Oil Company for 46 cents per gallon was approved for the annual bulk gasoline supply. The

city had also sought bids for a gasoline tank and pump, but did not find any satisfactory.

Swimming, wading and playing dangerously near Reeve Lake Park was prohibited by an ordinance passed unanimously by the council.

Also approved was a resolution for suspension of Southwestern Public Service Company's request for an 8.8 per cent rate increase 120 days for further study.

The city also received a variance from the State Health Department for the requirement of monitoring wells at the city landfill. The department will allow the city to take gallon samples from irrigation wells on land bordering the landfill.

The council also accepted a proposal from D.C. Herring. He will deed two acres of land south of Ridgeview Addition for a children's ball park.

The council also approved expenditure of \$940 for repair of the gasoline engine to be used for water pump emergencies. The money will be raised through water and sewer revenues.

A proposal by the School Board for resurfacing the east tennis courts with the city paying half of the cost was approved. The city's part is estimated to be \$3,500.

Revenue sharing funds were mentioned by several council members as a way of paying for the city's share of the project.

City Manager Jake Outland said the proposed range for city property taxes for the 1979 Fiscal Year will be 65 cents to 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

Vehicles, Vandals Are Court Items

New vehicles for county employees, as well as a report on vandalism to highway signs highlighted the regular meeting of the Panhandle County Commissioner's Court Monday.

The court awarded a bid of \$5492.62 exchange, for a new vehicle for the sheriff's department, to Friona Ford Sales. The bid price had been accepted at a previous meeting.

A bid of \$6757.50 was accepted from Friona Ford Sales, to furnish a pickup for use by commissioner's precinct 2, equipped as provided by previously advertised bids.

In other business regarding

vehicles, it was voted to seek bids on a new pickup for the County Agent's use. A 1972 half-ton pickup will be offered in trade. Bids will be open on July 10.

Weldon Moody, of the highway department, met with the court, and pointed out "vandalism on main highways in the county was costing the department in the neighborhood of \$1,000 per month."

The damage has resulted mainly from highway signs being destroyed, usually bent over. In one instance, all of the highway signs between Farwell and Bovina on U.S. Highway 60 on one side of the road were completely ruined.

Judge Paul Fortenberry, upon hearing of the extent of highway vandalism, said "We ask that the public be conscious of this unwarranted costs from their tax money. He also pointed out that such crime would be a class A misdemeanor in most cases, and would be punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000 and a year in jail for conviction."

The court passed a resolution (see elsewhere, this issue), condemning such vandalism, and recommending punishment to the fullest extent of the law.

In other business, the commissioners set a date of June 20 for county employees to meet with a representative of Blue Cross-Blue Shield and discuss hospitalization insurance for county employees.

Mack Mauldin of the Soil & Water Conservation Service, reported to the court on the dam under construction near Lazbuddie. The work is expected to be completed by October 25. Mauldin also reported that the Bovina dam was in good condition.

Approval was granted for purchase of a new electric typewriter for the Extension offices.

A request by assistant treasurer Ellen Wurster to reduce her work time was granted. Mrs. Wurster's salary will be reduced from \$250 to \$200 per month.

Fireworks Drive Set

A fund drive will be kicked off here Monday, in an attempt to raise around \$1750 to pay for the fireworks display to be held the evening of July 4.

It is asked that individual families who would rather contribute to the fireworks than buy fireworks for their children, send \$5, \$10 or \$25 to the fund drive, in order to assure another colorful display locally.

The Friona Fire Department will sponsor the fireworks display this year, and will accept donations to the drive. All donations will be tax deductible.

Donations may be brought by, or mailed to the Friona Star, which will serve as a clearing house for the fund drive.

Friona Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said that the fireworks, along with the necessary security bond, have been ordered, and a display at least as large and colorful as those held in 1976 and 1977, will be staged.

Members of the Friona Fire Department have for a number of years provided the physical work and expertise in staging the display.

Dead Man Identified

The man's body found June 3 in a millwater pit near Bovina has been identified as James Videll Kaulay of Anadarko, Oklahoma, according to Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

The sheriff credits newspaper articles describing the victim for the identification and location of the man's family.

A Friona man, formerly a resident of the Anadarko area where the family lives, told the sheriff's department that he had known a family by that name.

Oklahoma officials were notified and they told Lovelace they knew of a man matching the name and description.

Kaulay, an Indian, reportedly boarded a bus in Amarillo May 27. He asked to be let off at a rest stop about two miles west of Bovina.

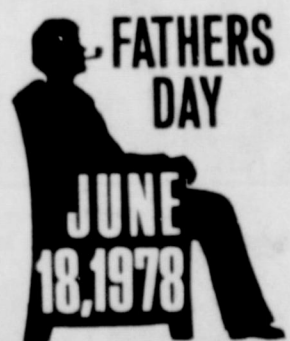
The man had reportedly also lived in Mesalero, N.M. and was the father of two children.

News And Views From American Agriculture

Farmers have repeatedly warned that parity is the only solution to not only their problems, but the national economic dilemma. They have said if 100 per cent honest parity is not achieved, the nation will continue to experience uncontrolled inflation, poverty, unlimited expansion of the debt, taxes and interest.

What is parity and why is this the only solution?

Parity is par exchange or a fair exchange value. The value of money cannot be regulated without par exchange for the raw materials of the earth. The exchange economy depends on this being true.

Division of labor is the first characteristic of an industrial economy. As the farmer becomes proficient enough to feed more people than his own family, a spinoff of labor is free to follow their pursuits.

Economists have said that since

division of labor sets up reciprocal markets and human wants could not be satisfied, there could be no such thing as underconsumption or over production, or unemployment.

If prices in exchange are at par, then production sets up the consumption of production. Without relative parity, it is impossible for the economy to consume its own production.

The chief shortfall in the equation over the past 30 years has been agricultural parity. Agriculture has not been paid enough to consume its share of the nation's production.

Without parity even a short crop is without a market because not enough income has been generated to consume the production.

The Constitution required a par economy, but during the 1940's this par economy hampered campaigns to create the crisis needed for government expansion. When the disaster of the present farm policy brings banking and industry to the brink of collapse, the government will take over.

Stability of agriculture is a constraint on government.

The public debt is approximately \$3.8 trillion. This means at a 6 per

cent interest, the nation is paying more in interest than it is paying the farmer to feed the nation.

Without parity for agriculture the market system cannot function, and without a functioning market system, political force will eliminate the public sector of the economy.

Our problem has not been one of overproduction, but of underconsumption resulting from loss of buying power in the market place.

For example the average wheat crop is two billion bushels. Last year the price per bushel averaged \$2. In the private sector the four billion dollars received for the wheat crop is multiplied seven times.

With \$5.6 billion taken for taxes, this leaves \$22.4 billion for the private sector. At parity of approximately \$5 per bushel, the taxes would total \$14 billion in the same wheat crop.

At parity, the private sector would receive \$56 billion or a difference of \$33.6 billion for the economy than is presently received.

Parity does not only benefit the farmers, but the entire economy.

In Friona

Do you have trouble feeding your children all the foods they need because your income is too low? Would you like some advice on what to eat when you're pregnant or what to feed your infant or young child? If so, then the local Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program may be able to help you.

The WIC Program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered in Texas by the Maternal and Child Health Division of Texas Department of Health. The WIC Program in Parmer and ten other counties in the South Plains area is run by South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc.

The purpose of the program is to improve the nutritional status of pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children by providing nutritional advice, education and specified foods to supplement their diets. The supplement foods offered through WIC are designed to fill the nutritional deficiencies most often found in the participants' diets, but are not designed to meet their total food needs.

Qualifying infants receive infant formula, infant juice and cereal. Qualifying women and children receive milk, cheese, eggs, iron-fortified cereals, and Vitamin C-enriched fruit juices.

Food vouchers are given at the clinic that may be redeemed by participants at local food stores or home delivery by local dairies.

The WIC Program is administered by Delma Scott, R.D., Director of Nutrition Services and an assistant, Jane Schwarz, nutritionist. They provide nutrition education and nutritional counseling to the staff and participants in the eleven following counties: Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Crosby, Floyd, Swisher, Gastro, Motley, Dickens, Deaf Smith and Parmer.

The classes cover many aspects of nutrition, but are especially concerned with the special needs of expectant mothers, infants and young children.

Some of the topics covered in past lessons include providing adequate diet at any income level using the basic four foods groups as a guide, proper infant feeding practices, how to make the most of WIC foods, and the importance of good nutrition during pregnancy.

Future lessons are planned on such things as providing nutritious snacks that children really like, breast-feeding your baby, and how to get the best buy when shopping for food. Individual counseling by the nutrition assistant is always available.

AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO SWIM, WADE OR PLAY DANGEROUSLY NEAR THE WATER IN REEVE LAKE PARK, WITHIN THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING ARREST WITHOUT WARRANT FOR VIOLATIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE, CREATING A PENALTY OF FINE FOR VIOLATIONS AND/OR THE PARENTS OF CHILDREN UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that swimming and wading in or playing dangerously near water in the Reeve Lake Park, specifically Lot 16, Block 1, of Lakeview Addition to the City of Friona, Texas, located at the intersection of 11th Street and State Highway No. 214, is a hazard to the health, welfare and safety to the citizens of Friona.

NOT THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to swim in or to wade in or to play dangerously near the water located in Reeve Lake Park, located within the city limits of the City of Friona, Texas. Members of the City Police Department are hereby authorized to arrest without warrant all violators of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Any person, or the parents of children under 18 years of age, violating this Ordinance, upon conviction, shall be fined a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

Section 3. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon publication of notice hereof as required by law.

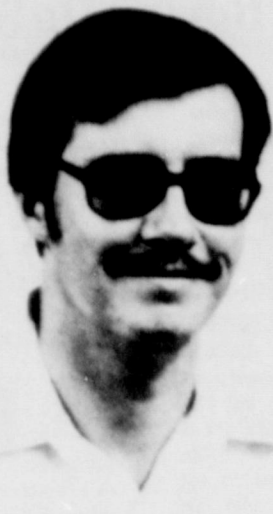
Pastor Jim Bond also stated that, "It is a privilege to be in Friona and the warm friendly feeling generated by the people here, make it feel like home already."

Today your life is influenced by the results of an 18th century card game! That is, if you eat hamburgers, hot dogs, cheese, bologna, tuna fish, and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. How could a card game of so long ago affect me, you ask? That's simple! It was during that game that the great "Sandwich Idea" was born. John Montagu, the Fourth Earl of Sandwich, England, became so involved in the game he couldn't take time out for dinner. He instructed his servant to bring him a piece of beef between two slices of bread so he could eat and continue the game.

Sandwiches are popular as a filling summer meal, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture. They complement salads or soups, and are just as good when eaten alone. Today, about the only constant in the sandwich is the bread, and even that often varies.

It has been said the sandwich is a busy mother's best friend because it provides a fast, filling meal with little fuss. Sandwiches are popular at home, on picnics, as in-between meal snacks, and the brown-baggers standard. Not only are sandwiches a favorite with mothers, but with all Americans. Did you know that over 300 million sandwiches are consumed daily in America?

Choose from a wide variety of processed sandwich spreads and luncheon meats in the grocery store. You'll find a good selection of cheese to help change the taste of sandwiches, too. Not only are

these commercially prepared items great sandwich fillers, but you can use leftover roasts, ham, chicken, hard-boiled eggs and turkey to make your own spreads. Try mixing two types of meat or meat and cheese together as the base for a different tasting spread. Add chopped celery, bell peppers, pickles, onions or relishes. Some cooks even use grated carrots, chopped nuts, apples and various herbs to dress up a favorite spread. Chopped, hard-boiled eggs can be used as the base for a spread, or mixed in with a meat spread to add color and protein.

The "binding force" of many spreads is salad dressing or mayonnaise. Don't be afraid to experiment. You might try thousand island or some other salad dressing, or mustard in your spreads.

After creating your sandwich spread, serve it on bread, topped with shredded lettuce, a slice of fresh tomato and another piece of bread. Garnish with an olive or pickle slice for an attractive look.

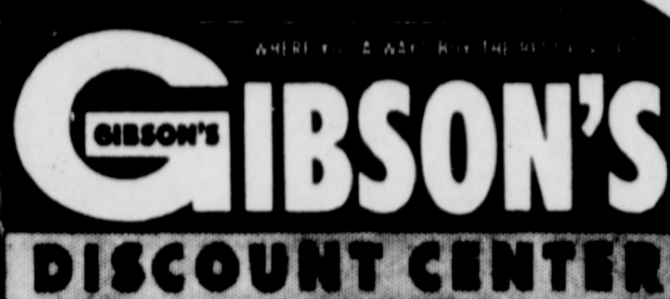

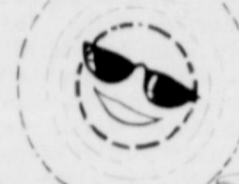

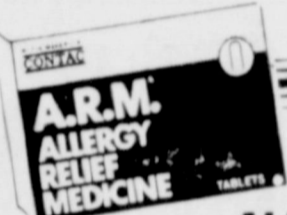

ROLLED BEEF RUMP ROAST

1 Rolled Rump Roast, 4-6 pounds
Salt and pepper to taste

Season meat with salt and pepper. Place roast, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer so bulb reaches the center of the thickest part, being sure bulb does not rest in fat. Do not add water, and do not cover. Roast in slow oven (300 degrees to 325 degrees) until thermometer reaches 150 degrees to 170 degrees, depending on desired doneness. Homemakers should allow 25 to 30 minutes per pound for roasting. Serve with Pear-Relish garnish, julienne potatoes, green beans, and cucumber, tomato and onion salad. A light red wine can be served, if desired.

PEAR-RELISH GARNISH

1 can (16 ounce) pear halves
1/4 cup drained sweet pickle relish
1/4 cup chopped celery
1 tsp. drained, chopped pimiento

Combine sweet pickle relish, celery and pimiento. Chill. Serve in pear halves.

As the song says, a picture can paint a thousand words. Ruth Smith communicates in her paintings what she may have difficulty expressing orally.
Mrs. Smith finds that the biggest problem of being deaf is communicating with others, but look at one of her paintings and the message is very clear.
Finding very little to keep her occupied when she was young, Mrs. Smith took up painting. She paints every day and finds her hobby very relaxing.
Although she is almost totally self-taught, she did take lessons for a few months from Mrs. Joe Wilson, whose husband was formerly the pastor of the First Baptist Church.
Horses are her favorite subject, Mrs. Smith said through the help of her son, Roy. She does paint many other topics, including still life subjects.
Mrs. Smith recently completed an oil painting of herself. The painting was copied from a picture taken when she was three and one-half years old.
Each painting takes approximately one month to complete. Mrs.

Smith chooses the subject of her paintings or will take orders for privately commissioned paintings.
Her paintings have won awards at the Parmer County Fair, but she hasn't entered any contests lately. She finds it kind of a problem to get anything entered.
Lester Smith, who is also hearing impaired, makes frames for his wife's paintings, but usually just keeps out of her way so she can work. Roy says he acts as her agent.
The Smiths met in Amarillo and married there in 1956. Mrs. Smith was born in Johnson County, Texas, and then moved to Childress.

She went to school in Bovina and in Austin at the State School for the Deaf.
Many of the subjects for her pictures are drawn from the area around Parmer County. She also paints pictures of the area around Johnson County.
Although she also enjoys gardening and spends quite a bit of time keeping up with her son, Ruth Smith spends several hours each day with her dog Bobbie on her lap communicating in a way beyond the words she can't hear.

"Ready-Set-Go With Clothing" is the 4-H Clothing Workshop 7 Lazbuddie 4-H Club members are busy in this month under the leadership of Mrs. Pete Jesko and Mrs. John McGehee. Workshop is conducted in the Homemaking Room of the Lazbuddie School.

Before beginning to sew Wendy Jarman, Maureen Jesko, Lisa McGehee, Vandi Tarter, Lezlie Smith, Sue Collins and Frank Jesko scored themselves on appearance and clothing care habits, and how they could improve.

With samples of fabric Mrs. Jesko and Mrs. McGehee showed the group how to become familiar with fabrics that are solid, prints, plaids and stripes. They learned to distinguish between balanced and

unbalanced stripes, and even and uneven plaids and how these fabric designs effect the design of garments.

Colors make a difference how they affect or reflect our mood and our appearance. Warm colors are red, yellows, oranges, red-violets and yellow greens. Cool colors are blues, blue greens, greens and blue violets. Neutral colors make you feel cool or warm, depending on how they are used. Neutral colors are black, white, gray, navy blue, brown and beige.

Fabric grain and its effect on clothing was shown. In fabric, grain is the direction yarns are woven or placed to form the fabric. Grainlines must be placed straight on the body for better fit, for more comfortable wear, to be more attractive garment, and to be more serviceable and longer lasting.

A tour of Muleshoe fabric shops and department stores was made to study labels of fabrics and their care. Vandi, Lezlie, Wendy, Lisa, Maureen and Frank became aware of the importance of reading labels before buying clothing or fabrics. Labels should tell the consumer the fiber content of the fabric or garment and percentage of the fibers, the manufacturer's name or number, washing or dry cleaning care, and shrinkage to expect. Care labels are available from the store when purchasing fabric. Be sure to sew the label into the garment to help you remember when you are caring for your home sewn clothing. Most of the labels were coded by numbers as to the care of the fabric.

Popover skirts are being made by the girls and jogging pants by the boys to apply their sewing skills being taught in the clothing workshop.

Following the completion of the workshop these 4-H'ers will model their garments for judging in the Parmer County 4-H Dress Revue, Thursday, June 29 at 1:30 p.m. in the United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall in Farwell. A public viewing of the Dress Revue will be at 3 p.m. following the judging.

Best judged garments in the Junior I, Junior II, and Senior Divisions will be judged and modeled in the District 2, 4-H Dress Revue in Lubbock, July 7.

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HD Position One Of Varied Tasks

Laura Jacobs, Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent, says the hardest thing about her job is finding enough time to get everything done.

"There's so many areas and I want to do something in every area," she said.

Ms. Jacobs is responsible for all the home economics programs in the county and shares responsibility with the agriculture agent for 4-H and Community Resource Development.

There are five areas in home economics: family clothing, housing and home furnishings, family health and safety, family resource management and family life education.

She presents programs in these areas to home demonstration clubs or any group who invites her. Ms. Jacobs also helps by person-to-person help.

The part of her job she enjoys the most is helping with the 4-Hers.

"Helping the 4-H seems the most worthwhile. I really like to prepare the programs because I learn so much," she said.

During the spring season, 4-H students participate in stock shows. Clothing is the next project.

The county clubs are having a dress review June 29 in Farwell. The winners will go on to district competition.

In the fall, the project is Food and Nutrition. The groups study six different aspects of food and family nutrition.

At the end of the food project, the county has a food show. The winners of that competition also go on to district and then to state competition.

The project for the summer is the method demonstration segment. Ms. Jacobs describes this as an illustrated talk. The members get to choose from a long list of topics.

Each speech is illustrated with visual aids, she said.

Yesterday three Parmer County 4-Hers left for Levelland where they will take part in a Teen Leader Lab. Robbie Moody is attending from Bovina.

Ms. Moody will learn to lead workshops, activities and games.

The 4-H County Horse Show will be held June 24 in Bovina.

Ms. Jacobs hosts programs for the Rhea Community and Oklahoma Lane Home Demonstration Clubs. She presents programs on some aspect of home economics such as talks on the slow cooker.

Another topic the clubs discussed was that of Families and the Law. Ms. Jacobs said most people don't think about the law until something happens and they are in a bind.

Members of the clubs and guests may also give programs. The clubs are now working to support a scholarship that is given by the Texas Home Demonstration Association.

Any youth over the age of nine who is interested in joining the 4-H can tell the Home Demonstration Office in the County Courthouse in Farwell, according to Ms. Jacobs.

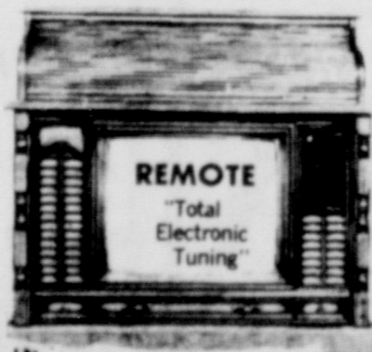

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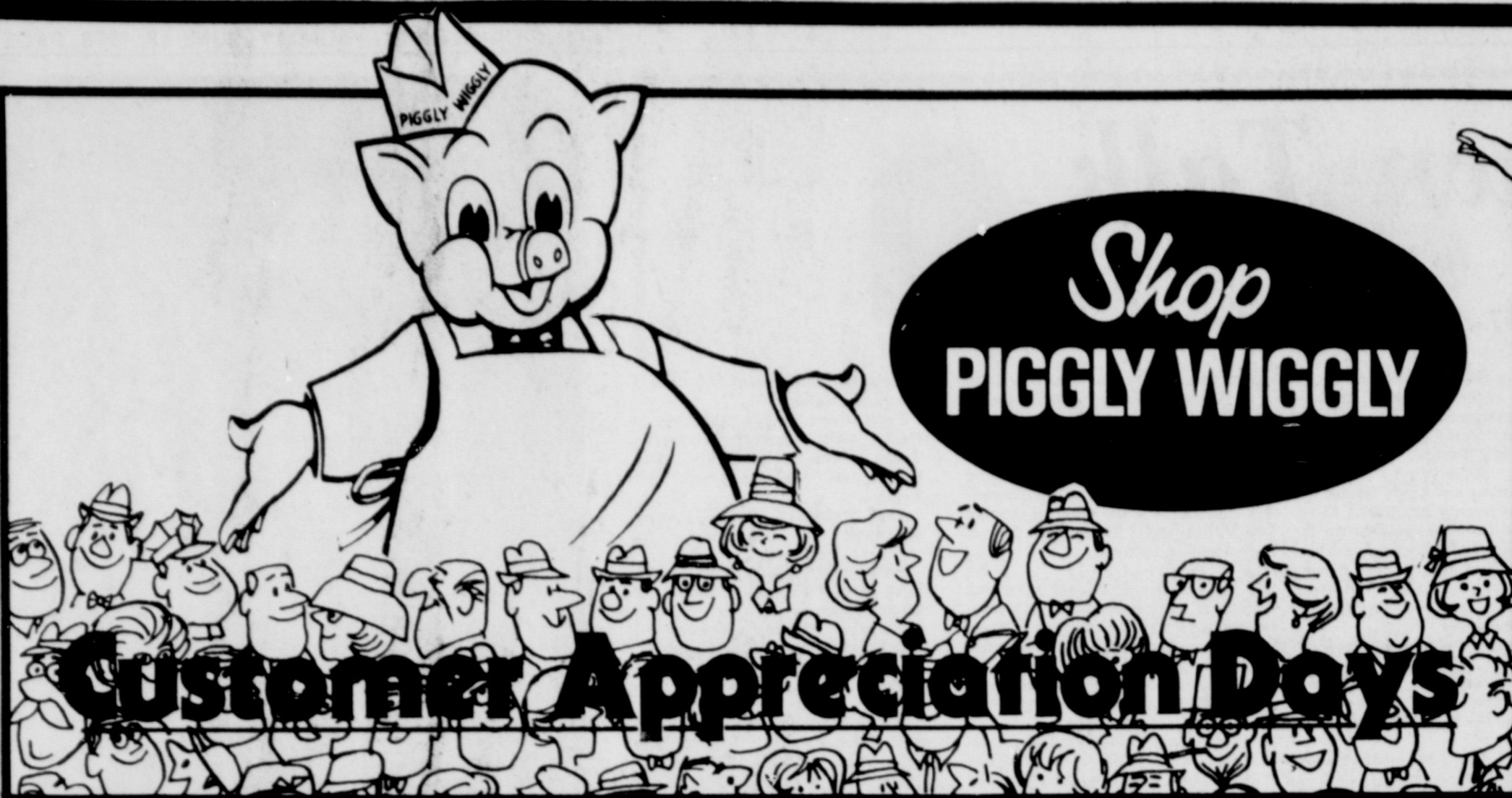
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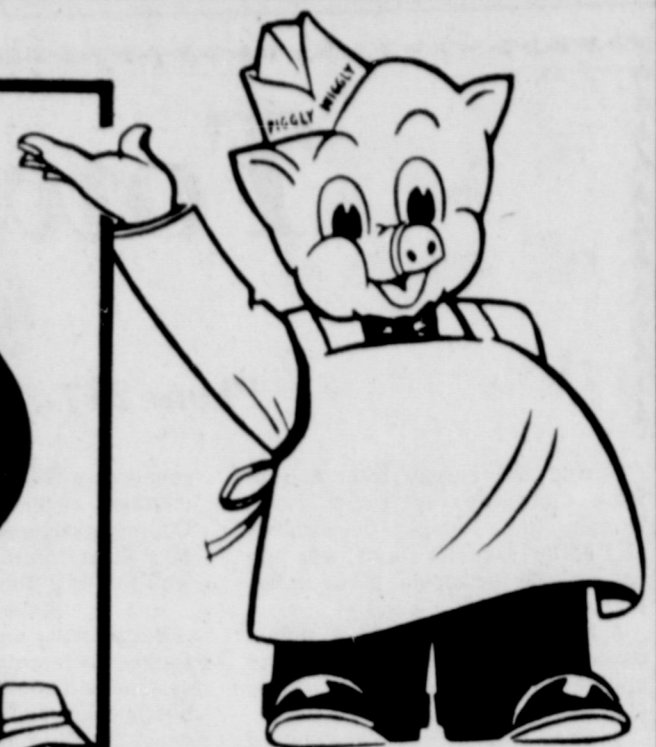
