School Official Explains Changes In Tax Rules

ACCORDING TO NEWS REPORTS, the gas shortage is definitely having an affect on the driving habits across the nation, although in our local area, we have yet to feel the pinch of a gas shortage.

Our family made a trip to Tennessee the first two weeks in June, and at that time, the gas situation had not affected folks' travel pattern.

While we were at Opryland, and the other attractions around Nashville, the crowds were so thick you couldn't "stir them with a stick," so at that point in time the tourist industry was not suffering.

We attended a performance of the Grand Ole Opry, and it had been sold out for weeks.

In fact, enroute home on Interstate 40, we played the game of "How many different state license plates can you spot," and we saw 38 of the 50 states—virtually all except the New England states, Hawaii and a few scattered states.

We felt that this figure would have been higher, except that on the interstate, we could see just the automobiles going our same direction, so we were limited to just those we passed, or which passed us. If we could have seen the tags on the cars we were meeting, we figured we would have had 45 of the 50 in the same span of time and distance.

We did not have trouble getting gas on our trip, but we did encounter some closed stations, and some without gas. We carry a Texaco credit card, and found many of the major stations in Tennessee to be short of gas, or forced into much shorter hours than usual.

One station operator just off I-40 in Little Rock, Arkansas, told us he had been forced to abandon a 24-hour schedule to 10 or 12 hours a day, plus closing on weekends. The highest price we paid for gas was 90 cents per gallon for unleaded.

Many of the station operators feel that the shortage is mainly concocted by the major oil companies, in order to get the price up again, and then the supplies will return to normal.

In fact, there have been charges recently that gas supplies are being shifted by the major companies to company-owned stations in preference to privately-owned locations, so that the companies can reap more profits, and have more gas supplies.

MEANWHILE, THE TRUCKERS' strike has erupted on the scene, and this may add to the gas shortage, as well as creating deficiencies in other areas as well.

Already, some industries, such as packing plants, have had to close for a time due to their inability to secure trucks to move their products. And we hear that the South Texas vegetable growers, with melons and other produce ready to hit the market, are frantically trying to line up ways to move their produce to market.

And the president caused some consternation in agriculture circles last week by reversing his guarantee of diesel supplies to farmers, shifting it instead to the truckers. The truckers responded that the supply was not necessarily the problem at hand.

It will be interesting to see how the strike goes, and how all of this affects the nation's economy.

Friona School officials are fielding many questions concerning HB 1060, more commonly known as the "Tax Relief" legislation that has recently been signed into law. Very basically, HB 1060 does three things that have immediate effect on the Friona I.S.D., according to Tom Jarboe, superintendent.

These three things and their effect on the district and taxpayers of the district are as follows:

(1.) LAW: Allows the Board of Trustees to make decisions whether or not automobiles not used for business purposes will be taxed. The law exempts such vehicles unless the Board of Trustees passes a resolution to tax them.

Friona I.S.D.'s Plans: The Board of Trustees of Friona Independent School District has passed a resolution to continue taxing automobiles. Automobiles will not be exempted in this district.

(2.) LAW: Allows an additional homestead exemption from assessed valuation for persons 65 years or over as of January 1, 1979. (This gives persons 65 or over the \$5,000 homestead exemption plus an added \$10,000.) The law also freezes their taxes on their home at the current dollar of tax level for future years unless improvements to their property is made.

New Look Slated For City Bills

Water consumers in the city of Friona will notice a change in the billing cards this month for the first time in a number of years.

The cards measure six by three and one-half inches, a more standard size than formerly used.

The cards are produced on the city's new posting-billing machine, which was installed recently. A mini-computer, the new machine is expected to reduce the billing time by more than 50 per cent.

Highway 60 Widening Discussed By Court

The possibility of securing a divided four-lane highway on U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County was discussed at the Monday meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court.

County Judge Paul Fortenberry told the court about a telephone conversation he had had with George Wall of Lubbock, the district highway chief, who indicated that Highway 60 has been approved as a connecting link from Amarillo to Las Cruces as a divided four-lane road.

The district highway official says the project is a firm one, but would not commit a date, due to the time expected to be involved in paper work and funding.

Wall indicated, according to Judge Fortenberry, that the proposed additional lanes would not affect the scheduled rebuilding of the present two-lane highway through Castro and Parmer Counties. A contract for this work is expected to be awarded this fall, with work to begin the following spring if all goes well.

The highway official said it was not expected that the proposed divided road would bypass either Friona or Bovina. Work is to begin later this year to re-work the highway through these towns, eliminating the medians and re-constructing "soft spots" in the road.

There is a possibility that construction on the additional lanes can

Friona I.S.D.'s Plans: Applications must be filed by persons 65 or over by July 16, 1979. This is in addition to the application for the \$5,000 homestead exemption. All homeowners should be sure that they have filed for the \$5,000 homestead exemption, regardless of age.

(3.) LAW: Allows the assessed valuation of agricultural land (more than five acre tracts) to be based on productivity values rather than market values. The law allows the Board of Trustees to postpone implementation of this until the 1980 tax year if they so choose.

Friona I.S.D.'s Plans: The Board of Trustees have chosen to implement the productivity values for the 1979 tax year as it definitely will provide benefits to the landowner. All owners of agricultural land should have already received the application forms for this exemption. All owners should file the application immediately. It will be to their advantage to do so in most cases. In no instance will the filing of an application increase any values.

The last page of the application calls for estimated yields for the past five-year average. These figures are to be estimates only. This data is being collected for use in the establishment of productivity value for future years.

Production values will not be figured on each individual farm, but average figures for each grade and class of land will be used district-wide.

"None of these exemptions will be automatic," Jarboe points out. Applications must be filed by July 16, 1979 for the exemptions to be allowed

begin right after completion of the repair work on the present lanes. Right-of-way for the project would be on a 90-10 per cent basis, with the state paying 90 per cent and the county ten per cent.

The court approved a bid from Reeve Chevrolet of Friona in the amount of \$6,712.77 for a new automobile to replace one in the sheriff's department which was recently wrecked.

A representative of Monsanto, Paul Redman of Canyon, met with the court concerning the use of the herbicide Roundup to kill Johnson grass in barrow ditches in Parmer County. The court approved the project.

Mack Mauldin of the Soil Conservation District reported on the condition of the new dam site on Runningwater Draw near Lazbuddie.

The court will accept bids on a panel or van on July 23 at 11 a.m. at the county courtroom. The vehicle was confiscated by county law officials, and has not been claimed.

A number of certificate of deposit transactions were made, including \$100,000 from the Right-of-Way Fund for 90 days; \$35,000 from the Farm-to-Market Fund for 30 days; \$18,250 from revenue sharing funds for Precinct One for 30 days; and \$25,000 from the Farm-to-Market Fund for Precinct Three for 30 days.

Rainfall Tops 1978 Pace

Rainfall totals at the mid-year point at Friona's official weather recording station were standing at an above-average pace, it was revealed this week.

Figures released by A.L. (Jake) Outland, official weather recorder, indicated that through June 29, a total of 8.88 inches of rain had been logged in the city of Friona during the calendar year 1979.

Of this total, some 3.68 inches had been received during the month of June, which has been the "wettest" so far during 1979.

The mid-year rainfall total is 1.40 inches ahead of the same time a year earlier, and the 1978 total rang in at 19.30 inches, for an above-average year in the moisture department. Usually, the big end of the moisture comes during the last half of the year.

Following are the monthly totals for rainfall in Friona during 1979: January, .60 inches; February, .12 inches; March, 1.28 inches; April, 1.85 inches; May, 1.35 inches; and June, 3.68 inches. Six-month total: 8.88 inches.

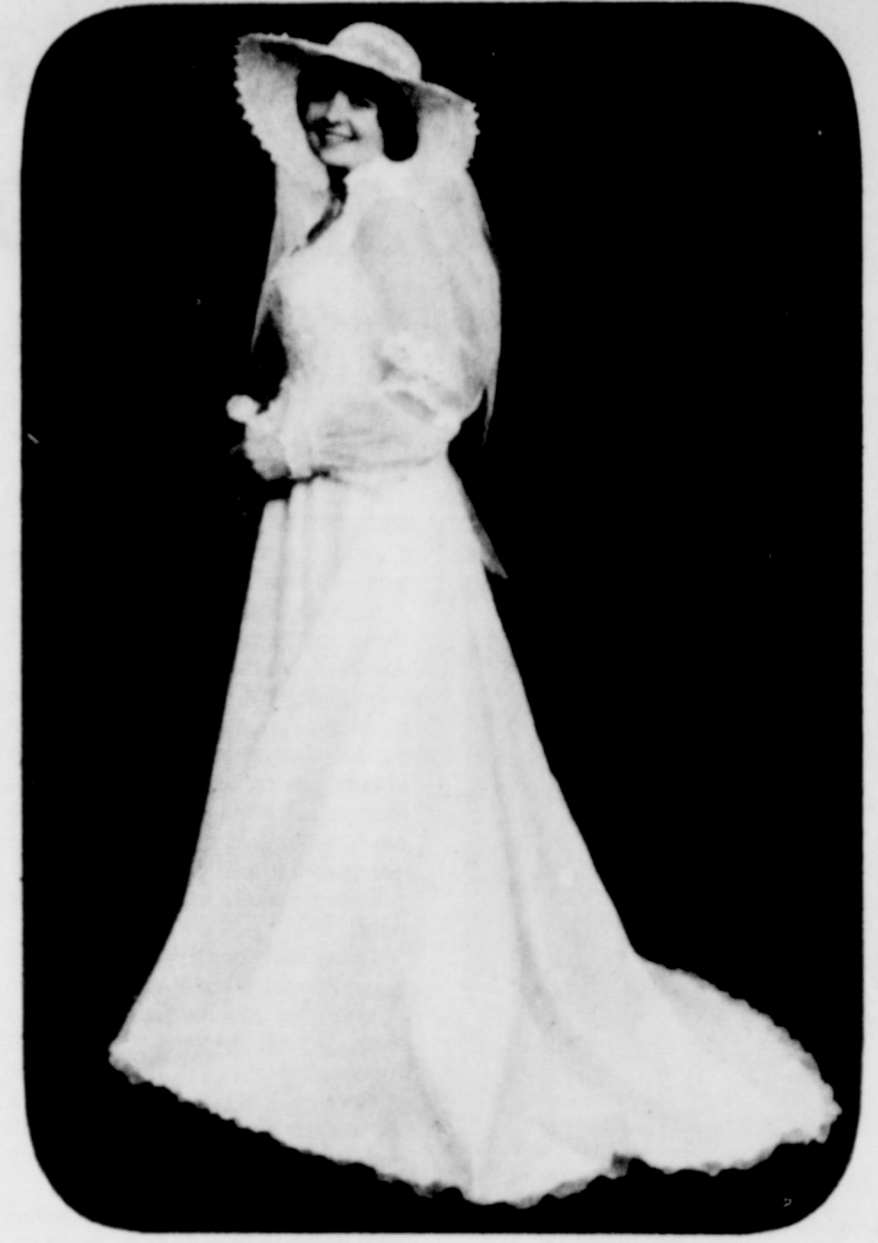

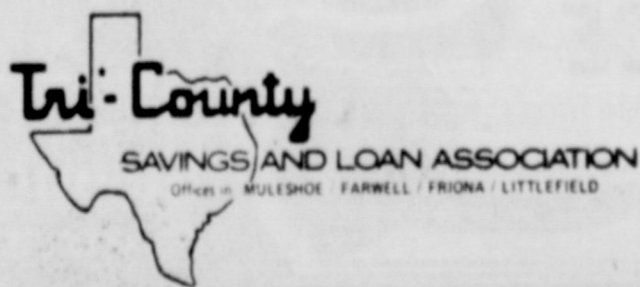

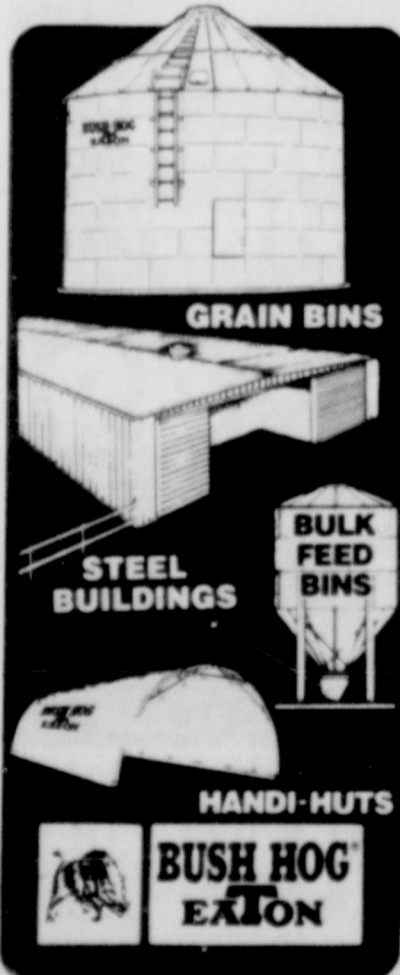

under law. There are three applications:

(1.) Homestead exemption application \$5,000 for ALL homeowners.

(2.) Over 65 Exemption application allows an additional \$10,000 exemption for 65 and over homeowners.

(3.) Productivity value on agricultural land application.

At the present tax rate, this means a \$30.75 savings for the \$5,000 exemption, an additional \$61.50 for persons over 65, and varying degrees of savings for owners of agricultural land.

Many reports have indicated that school districts will be reimbursed dollar for dollar in the losses this will produce in the tax base. What the law does state is that the decrease in the district's share of the Minimum Foundation Program must first be subtracted from the dollar lost. Then the balance will be reimbursed at 100 per cent if there is enough state money.

Two hundred and twenty million dollars has been set aside for the biennium for this purpose. About one hundred and seven million is set aside for the first year. When all losses to districts are calculated statewide, if the money set aside will reimburse 100 per cent, then 100 per cent will be reimbursed. However, if the money set aside will reimburse at only 70 per cent, then districts will receive only 70 per cent of their losses.

"Some say this will be an ample amount for full reimbursement, while there are others who say it will not be nearly enough. This question will not be answered until the School Tax Assessment and Practice Board certifies the total amount to the Comptroller by January 1 of each year," Jarboe says.

The reimbursement money is only in place for the next two years. It ends at the end of the biennium. It will then be up to the 67th Legislature to determine whether or not it will continue and if so how it will be done and where the money will be derived.

"School officials will be happy to assist with any problems patrons might encounter in completing applications. Please be reminded that these exemptions apply only to Friona Independent School District and do not apply to the City of Friona," the superintendent concluded.

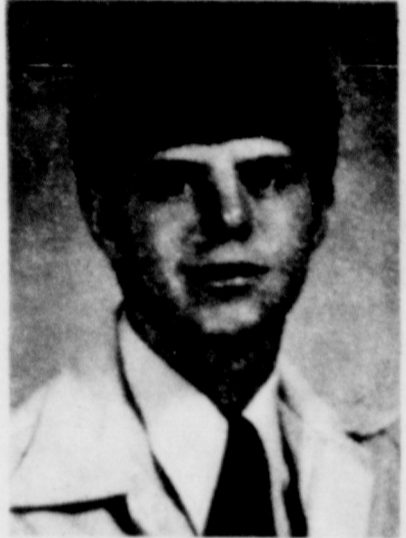

The award, given for the eighth semester, cites those undergraduate students who achieve a 4.0 (straight A) grade-point average for a minimum of 12 semester hours.

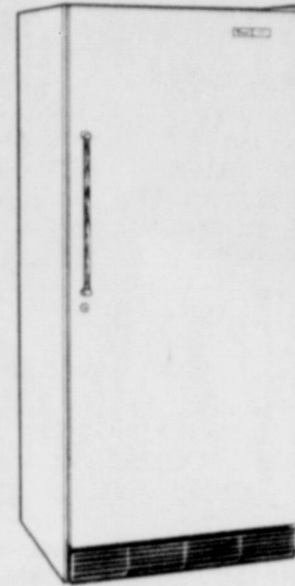
