FIREWORKS ON TAP

July 4th Events Set Here Tuesday

SPEAKING TO MEMBERS of the Texas Press Association in Amarillo last week, state comptroller Bob Bullock gave some reasons he doesn't believe that Texans will be (or should be) quick to jump in and demand passage of something resembling California's Proposition 13.

The California measure is the controversial measure which was passed by voters in that state instead on some type of tax relief.

Bullock pointed out that property taxes in Texas average about \$213 per capita. In California, they are \$415 for every man, woman and child. "Even with the \$7 billion in rollbacks, California's property taxes won't be lower than in Texas," the state official said.

And property taxes aren't the only taxes which have been eating Californians up. Bullock revealed that Californians have a personal state income tax which costs the average household around \$400 per year, and the rates are climbing.

The combined state and local sales tax in California is seven cents on the dollar, while ours in Texas is five per cent.

California also has a corporate income tax with rates high enough to drive many businesses out of the state. "Those businesses might just come here," Bullock said.

The state official pointed out that Texas is the only major state in the nation with neither a personal income tax, nor a corporate income tax.

Bullock compared the two states' gasoline tax, which is five cents per gallon in Texas, the lowest in the nation, compared to seven cents in California.

Employers in California pay 3.5 per cent of the amount of wages paid in unemployment taxes. This is four times the amount of employment taxes paid by Texas employers.

Texas has the second lowest state tax ratio of any of the 50 states. Our per capita tax burden, including all state taxes, is \$273. In Michigan, it's \$413; in California, it's \$590 and in New York, it's \$541.

"No wonder they were mad," Bullock says of the California voters.

BULLOCK ADDED that the residents of California were not only mad about their taxes, but about how they were being spent. In California, some \$213 million was being spent on administration—executive departments and commissions, etc.

In California, the state was spending around \$793 per person in services. In Texas, the figure is \$547 per person.

Yet, Bullock said he did not believe that Texas, whose state spending per person ranks only 48th among the 50 states, were getting less for their tax dollars than residents of other states.

He pointed out that just over half of the state's tax dollars in 1977, \$3.4 billion, went for education, for public schools and universities.

\$1.9 billion was spent on services such as welfare, mental health, corrections, health and law enforcement.

\$1 billion was spent on improvements, including highways, natural resources and parks.

WHILE TEXANS should have no quarrel with the sales tax, or inheritance tax, their property taxes bother them, Bullock says.

Inflation and taxes are threatening to make the right of owning property meaningless by pricing property out of the reach of all but the very rich, Bullock says.

"Our residents don't want to cut basic services, such as police, fire protection, schools, hospitals, etc. They want to cut the frills and the waste...the \$40,000 per year civil servants who don't show up for work...the tax-funded studies of why frisbees fly the way they do...the street crews with three guys watching the fourth do the shoveling," Bullock says.

The state official says the time is ripe for tax relief. But he believes we should do our changes with reason, before the taxpayers revolt openly, and perhaps do the job with a monkey wrench.

The Tenth Annual July 4 fireworks display will again highlight this year's celebrations. Other events are scheduled during the day at the Community Center.

The Noon Lions will sponsor the luncheon that will begin at 11:30. Barbequed chicken and German sausage are on the menu.

The Evening Lions will sponsor a turtle race, bicycle race, and baseball throw. The club is expecting a large turnout for these events.

A water polo match sponsored by the Volunteer Firemen will follow the dinner.

The Kiwanis Club will sponsor the sack race. Other events include a ping pong tournament, domino tournament and tennis tournament.

A concession stand will be operated by the Progressive Study Club at the tennis tournament finals.

The fireworks were again saved for the citizen's enjoyment by the fire department through the donations of local businesses and individuals. The display will begin at 9:30 p.m. at Reeve Lake.

The fireworks drew approximately 5,000 spectators last year and is expected to be just as successful this year.

The display will be under the care of the fire department.

The turtle race is the only race of its kind known in the area. Children are reminded to be finding their turtle entry and having him primed for the competition.

Prizes will be given for all kinds of entries, such as fastest, biggest and best decorated.

Fund Drive Over Goal

As of noon Friday, the fund drive to pay for Friona's July 4th fireworks display had topped the "minimum" goal of \$1500, and assured area residents of a good display again this year.

The total deposited to the fireworks account by the Friona Fire Department was \$1540, with more donations expected.

Noon Lions Offer Sausage, Chicken

The Friona Noon Lions will host their fourth annual Fourth of July luncheon on Tuesday beginning at 11:30 a.m. at the Community Center.

This year, the club has changed the format somewhat, and will serve barbequed homemade German sausage and chicken. The meat will be cooked on the club's recently constructed barbeque grill, which was built for such community functions.

Tickets for the barbeque are on sale from members of the Noon Lions Club, or will be available at the door. Ticket prices are \$3.00 for adults and \$1.50 for children under 12.

Proceeds from the barbeque will go to benefit Gristown, U.S.A.

A spokesman for the club pointed out that during the club's 1977-78 fiscal year, a total of \$2,494.41 had been spent for charitable purposes.

The biggest single expense during the year was the portable barbeque trailer, constructed at a cost of \$867.08. The barbeque will be made available to civic groups and organizations needing to borrow it for a special occasion.

During the month of June, the club sponsored an outing for its members at Logan Lake in New Mexico, at which chicken and sausage were cooked on the new grill. "It worked real fine," said Jay Beene, spokesman for the club.

Other major contributions by the club this year were \$440.00 to the Friona Cub Scouts, \$310 to the Lions

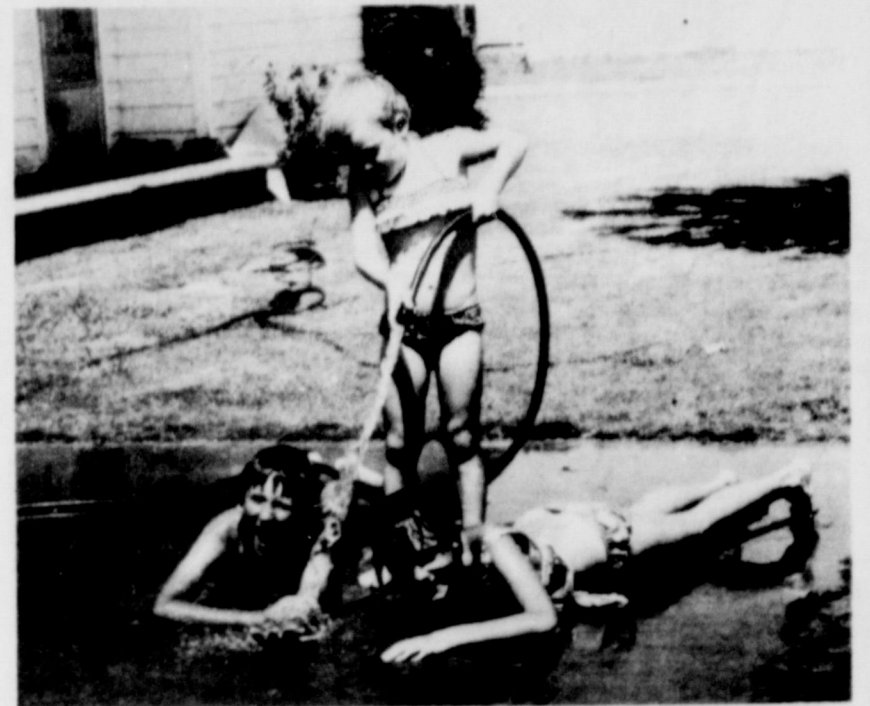
Anti-Fireworks Law Reminder

Area Swelters In 100-Degree Heat

The Friona area has been sweltering in the wake of the hottest month of June on record—or at least since records have been compiled by the City of Friona.

Beginning with Thursday, June 22, the mercury topped the 100-degree mark in Friona for five consecutive days, hitting a high mark of 105 degrees on Sunday, June 25.

The consecutive 100-plus streak was finally broken on Tuesday when a "cool" front moved through the area, and held the day's high temperature to a more seasonal 91

degrees. The high on June 22 was 103, and it equaled that on Friday, June 23. Saturday, June 24 levelled out at 102, and then the mercury hit the topper on Sunday with 105. Monday, the temperature went up to 103 again, before it came down somewhat the next few days.

Adding to the discomfort of the weeklong heat wave was the fact that, contrary to normal, the weather did not cool off appreciably at night.

Worker Dies When Covered With Grain

An employee of Hub Grain Company suffocated in a corn elevator last Monday.

Jesus Juarez Villegas, who had worked at the company for three years, was in the grain bin walking on the corn to pack it down, according to Fire Chief Ralph Shirley.

Villegas was tied around the waist with a rope, but somehow the grain

pulled him under and the rope came untied, Shirley said.

The Fire Department worked for two hours to free the body, the chief said.

Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears of Bovina ruled the accidental death from suffocation.

Villegas was 28 and single. His body was returned to Leon, Guanajuato, Mexico.

Routine Business

Mostly routine business was on the agenda this past Monday at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court.

Paul Catoe met with the court and updated the commissioners on the Summer Youth Programs and other programs available to the county.

A report on jail standards was read to the court, and the group was informed of a meeting to be held in regard to jail standards. It is felt that Parmer County is in good condition in this respect, due to the relatively new Law Enforcement Center.

Letters were read from Congressman George Mahon and President Carter concerning county government, in regards to rules, regulations and laws pertaining to the federal government.

In regard to the July 4 holiday, the commissioners voted to make Monday, July 3 a holiday as well.

It was brought to the attention of the court that A.L. Glasscock, who has served as a member of the county's Veterans Land Board committee for a number of years, had asked to be relieved of this responsibility.

Upon a motion made by Archie Tarter, a resolution was passed expressing the appreciation of the court for Glasscock's years of service. In turn, Jack Kassahn of Bovina was appointed to the board to replace Glasscock.

A request by Mountain Bell Telephone Company of Clovis, to place some underground cables under public roads in Parmer County was approved unanimously, with a permit issued favoring the telephone company.

The court voted unanimously to purchase a \$60,000 certificate of deposit for a period of six months, using money from the county's right of way fund.

Judge Sam Morgan of Deaf Smith met with the court and as president of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC), discussed issues relative to the PRPC.

Seth Halbert and C.L. Abernathy, representatives from the Central Plains MH-MR Center, which operates an outreach station in Friona, explained how their office is operated and financed.

News And Views From American Agriculture

If there was ever a time for the cattlemen to join the American Agriculture Movement, it is now. We can't understand their apathy. They are afraid to make waves and sound off to the consumer.

The consumer needs to be educated. It is happening slowly and we don't know if it will be in time.

There is a big problem for the grain producers and the cattlemen. There must be something really wrong for 60-year-old men to protest on horseback to the President.

If the cattlemen don't do something, they aren't going to make it. Apathy will be the cattlemen's death just like it was almost the farmers' death.

The cattlemen have always been

quiet and the government has taken this for granted. Now the time is here for the cattlemen and the farmer to join together to get parity.

The farmer and rancher have been underpaid \$385 billion in the past 20 years. That means the private sector could have had \$2.695 trillion above what they earned.

Since Carter's action, the price for beef in the grocery has kept going up when at the same time the price for cattle has gone down approximately \$10 per hundred pounds.

President Carter's action was detrimental and inflationary.

The shortage of beef is yet to come. Cattlemen are not trying to rebuild their herds. Heifers that normally would have stayed in the

fields to replenish the herds are now being sent to slaughter. Replacement cattle aren't available.

By fall the market, which would have stabilized at 62 cents may be up to as much as 70 cents just because of Carter's action.

His action has also caused problems in some of the countries which export to us. In Australia for example, the dock workers went on strike last week.

Australia already has one meatless day per week and the dock workers are protesting the action to export their beef. By exporting their beef, the Australian government is starving their own people of beef and raising the price of their cheap beef.

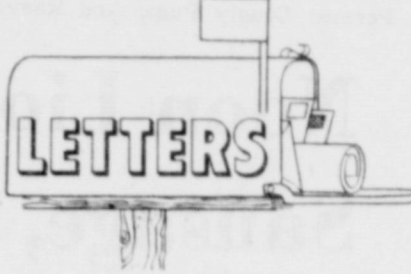

In last week's Lubbock Avalanche-Journal an article appeared titled "Abilene votes wet." This Associated Press article stated: "College boxes voted largely for the proposition, particularly at Abilene Christian University, where the vote was about 85 percent to 15 percent in favor of the measure."

Startled by such a statement, I decided to call the Associated Press in Dallas, Tx. In my conversation with Jim King of the A.P., he stated that the article was in error and that apologies had been made to A.C.U. and that a retraction had been made by A.P.

Tuesday morning we received the following letter from John C. Stevens, President of A.C.U.: "The Associated Press story datelined Saturday, June 17, 1978, from Abilene, Texas, stating that boxes

near Abilene Christian University voted 85 percent for unrestricted liquor sales in Abilene were completely in error. Our boxes were 85 percent against unrestricted sales and not 85 percent for, as AP reported.

"Inasmuch as the position of Abilene Christian's friends and supporters has always been against liquor sales, I would appreciate your personal attention to running this information in your church bulletin or as a letter to the Editor of your local newspaper."

To The Editor,
I do not agree that the majority of the people do not want passage of the Equal Rights Amendment. Without support from all kinds of people, the ERA would not have been ratified in the states that have passed it.

I believe many are taking the wrong attitude about the role of the federal government if, or as I hope when, the ERA is added to the Constitution. Instead of working against the amendment because they are afraid the government will adopt laws to benefit lesbians and gay rights proponents, those who believe that women should have equal rights must work to make sure the laws passed are just and reflect the wishes of the people.

The same scare tactics were used by those opposed to passage of the amendment guaranteeing equality of the law for all, no matter what color. There may be some changes socially, but maybe these changes are necessary.

Social changes were caused by the amendment extending equal rights to blacks and other minorities. Desegregation was a necessary social change.

The ERA may cause some changes such as extending Social Security benefits to men. Uni-sex bathrooms will only be in areas where the community standards will allow them, and that will never happen here.

Congress may pass a law tomorrow that requires me to fight in a war. It is very possible that in the next war, everyone will have to fight to preserve the American way of life.

Even though I would not want to go to war and fight, neither would I want my father, brother or, someday, my son to go.

Women deserve to be paid the same as a man for the same job. Women have had to work much harder to get to where they are now and they will have to work as hard in the future to prove themselves, even if the ERA is passed.

The ERA does not guarantee women the right to get any job they are not qualified for and it doesn't force them to work if they have no need or want to work.

Women have struggled to get the laws that now are helping them get a certain amount of equal treatment. Without the ERA there will be no way the legislatures, dominated by men, will be made to pass laws to guarantee equal treatment under the law to women.

Without the ERA, the federal government is not restricted by a Constitutional Amendment and can pass laws indiscriminately. All people need the ERA.

Never rub an eye with something in it. Instead, lift the upper eyelid outward and down over the lower lid and let tears wash out the dirt. If they don't, see a doctor.

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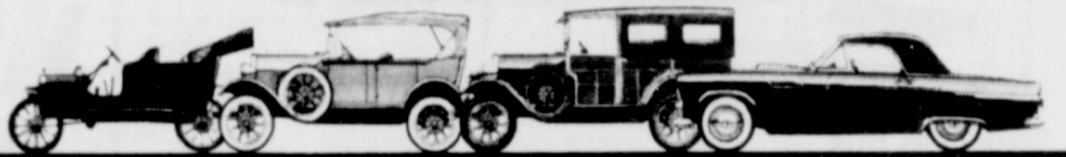
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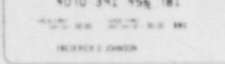
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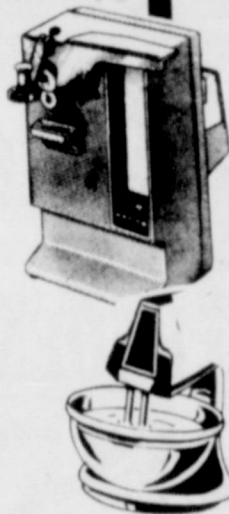
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Planter Business Blooming

Ex-Farmer Turns To Craft

By ROBIN HARRINGTON

Gaylord Maurer has gone to pot. Out of necessity, Maurer started looking around for another profession when he quit farming due to the depressed agriculture market. He found his next livelihood in the classified section of an Amarillo paper.

Pots and Stuff of California was advertising for someone to buy a distributorship from their company for this area. Their business is river rock and epoxy plant pots, and Maurer made it his business, too.

He recognized the selling potential of the natural-looking pots.

"The selling point of the pots are that they are breathing, porous planters," Maurer said. "The water can drain out and this makes the plants grow better."

Maurer travels almost all week while his co-worker, Cordelia Eddins, works in the workshop filling the pot orders. His territory includes the Texas Panhandle, Eastern New Mexico and as far south as Midland.

River rock for the pots comes from the Canadian River and the marble comes from Marble Falls near Austin.

The pot-making process begins with the washing of the rock and marble so the epoxy will stick. The desired amount of rock is then weighed out into the mixing bin and epoxy is mixed with the rock.

Now the work really begins. The epoxy dries rather quickly, Maurer said, and they have to fill the molds before the mixture begins to harden.

"The epoxy brings out the natural color of the rocks and marble," he said.

Cordelia designs with the different colors of the marble and rock. She said they can do any kind of design work.

The best sellers are the green-and-white marble and the gold-and-white marble planters. They said these are the hardest to keep in stock.

The mixture stays in the mold for about eight hours during the hot weather. Maurer said during the winter the planter will harden after about two days.

The company supplied several pot sizes, but Maurer has developed several more sizes including the 28" round special order outdoor planter.

The business has also expanded to include rock-epoxy sidewalks and patios. They made a sidewalk at the workshop and Cordelia designed the pattern.

Business is fluctuating during the summer months, Maurer said, after a very busy time in the spring. He expects the business to pick back up in the fall.

"If I can make it through the hard times, in another year, we'll have enough business to make a go," he said.

His planters are available at the Flower Box and Garden Shop in Friona. Most of the places he sells to are nurseries and greenhouses.

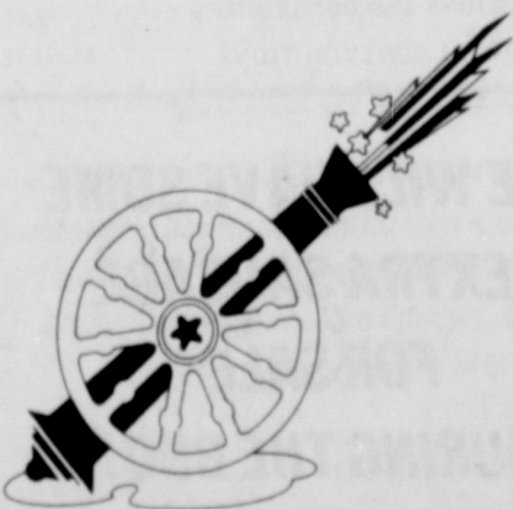

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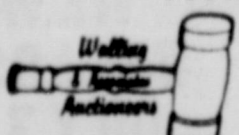

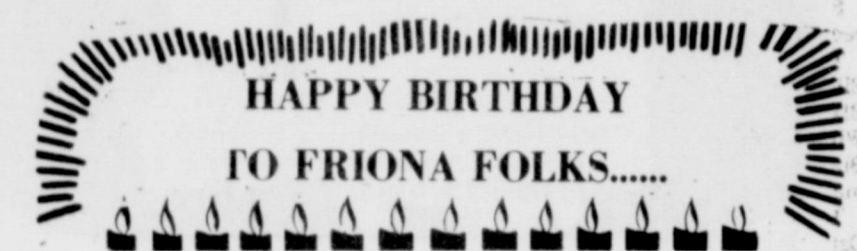
