SMOOTH START

School Term Begins; Enrollment Is Given

Friona schools opened their 1978-79 schedules with a smooth start this week, with enrollment standing at 1290 as of Thursday. This was 34 students shy of the same time a year earlier, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

With enrollment decreases still common in schools across the area, as schools are still seeking the leveling off stage from the "baby boom" of several years ago, Friona was striving to hold its own from

previous years, but came up somewhat short.

The decrease came in spite of the fact that kindergarten children enrolled for a full year, as opposed to only the "older" group of children a year ago. This week's kindergarten enrollment was 99, compared to 98 the first week in 1977.

The additional 43 kindergarten children gave the elementary school a gain of 14 over the first week of school in 1977, with 527 students, compared to 513 a year ago.

Enrollment by grades in the elementary school were kindergarten 99; first 111; second 118; third 102; fourth 91 and special education six.

The junior high showed a modest decline of 13 students from 1977. The first-week enrollment stood at an even 400 students. Class figures were: fifth 104; sixth 106; seventh 101; eighth 89.

High school, which lost its largest graduating class in history last spring when 90 diplomas were awarded, fell 37 students shy of 1977's opening week, with 363 students.

Totals were 99 freshmen; 98 sophomores; 90 juniors and 76 seniors.

"We feel that the number of new students enrolling will continue through the week after Labor Day. In fact, there may be more students starting for the first time the Tuesday after Labor Day than before," Jarboe said.

The decrease in enrollment, although only a 2.6 per cent drop, had been projected earlier by the Friona school system, which cut back in the number of teachers in the system for the first time in a number of years.

Parents of kindergarten students have been given additional time to have their children's inoculations, due to the last-minute addition of the younger students. All new students must have their shots by Tuesday, September 5, Jarboe says.

Grid Contest To Kick Off Here

The ever-popular football contest, sponsored by the Friona Star, is being announced in this week's issue of the Star, which will once again sponsor the 13-week series, along with 22 sports-minded area businesses.

Entries may be brought or mailed to the Friona Star, Box 789, by 5 p.m. each Friday. They may also be left at Bi-Wize Drug. If mailed, the entry must bear a postmark by Friday, "P.M." and should be marked "Football Contest."

Over 400 fans enter the contest each year, as individual rivalries usually develop among contestants.

Contestants must be 17 years of age or older to be eligible to enter the contest. In order that scores count for grand prizes, entries must be on an official entry blank, printed in the paper each week.

Readers are urged to turn to page 9 of this issue and familiarize themselves with the first week's slate of games, which contains games to be played the weekend of September 8-9-10.

A tie-breaker game, usually the Friona Chieftain game, will be used to break weekly ties as well as those that might result in the race for grand prizes.

The tie-breaker game is only used to separate ties, and has no bearing on the weekly score. Contestants are asked to pick the score of this game only.

Last year's grand prize winner

turned out to be co-champions, when Jerry Hinkle and R.L. Blakely tied, all the way. Jack Clark finished third.

Arrests Made In McKay Death

Two men have been arrested and are in custody in Lovington, N.M., in connection with the death on August 16 or 17 of Dannie Lynn McKay, 22.

David Allen Barcheers, 29, of Hobbs, N.M., has been charged with murder, and is presently in custody in the Lea County jail, Lovington, in lieu of \$50,000 bond.

Arrested early Tuesday was Ricky Allen Williams, 25, also of Hobbs, who has been charged with tampering with evidence.

Through investigation, it appeared that McKay had been shot with a shotgun prior to being burned in his vehicle, a pickup, on a country road between Seminole and Hobbs, N.M.

It also appeared that the alleged murder happened in Lea County, and McKay's body was transported across the state line into Texas, where the vehicle was burned.

McKay's body was found in the still-burning pickup by a Seminole area farmer early on the morning of August 17, near the Texas and New Mexico state line.

Law officials in both states launched an investigation immediately, as foul play was suspected from the start.

Rites Held For Dannie McKay

Funeral services were held in Bovina August 20 for Dannie Lynn McKay, 22, whose charred body was found in a burned pickup August 17 on a paved county road 20 miles west and ten north of Seminole.

McKay was last seen by members of his family about 12 hours before his body was found. He left his parent's home in Bovina Wednesday afternoon, August 16, and was to drive to Dallas to pick up a load of furniture there, return to Bovina, and then start his sophomore year at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

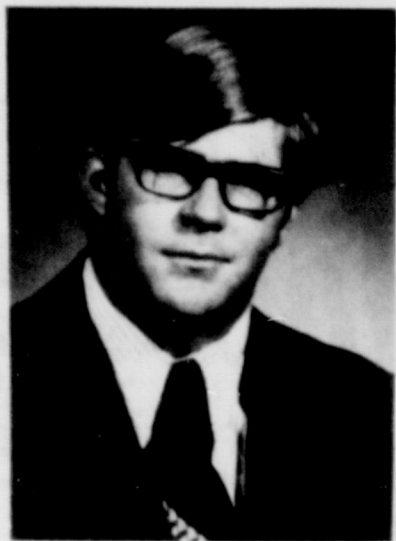
McKay had spent the summer working as a sheet metal worker in Dallas.

McKay's father, Elmer McKay, said his son had stayed out of college in order to make enough money to go back to school. He says he cannot guess why his son would have been on a road near Seminole, which would have put him around 200 miles out of the way in his trip to Dallas.

McKay's body was found by a Gaines County farmer at about 6:55 a.m. Thursday on the road, which is near the Texas-New Mexico line between Hobbs, N.M. and Seminole.

"The body was burned so bad we were unable to determine if there were wounds," said a spokesman for the Gaines County Sheriff's Department. "We don't have anything saying what kind of fire it was, other than it was a hot fire," the deputy continued.

McKay had lived in Bovina for 12 years. He is a 1974 graduate of Bovina High School, where he played football and basketball. The elder McKay said his youngest son "got along with everybody, never

had any troubles with anybody that I know of, in school or out."

McKay and Mary Lou, his wife of two years, had been visiting with his parents in Bovina for a week as he prepared to move to the Portales campus.

Graveside services for McKay were conducted Sunday afternoon at Bovina Cemetery, with Rev. Jerry Rockwell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Survivors include his wife, Mary Lou, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer McKay of Bovina, his sister, Wanda Headlee of Lubbock, three brothers, Jerry and Bennie, both of Dimmitt, and Larry of New Boston.

Pace Attends Bank Seminar In Colorado

Patrick H. Pace, assistant vice president of Friona State Bank was one of the more than 450 students who attended the 28th session of the Colorado School of Banking held at the University of Colorado at Boulder. Classes were filled in February for the August 6-18, 1978 session co-sponsored by the University of Colorado and the Colorado Bankers Association. This session is the largest school ever held, according to Professor Joseph L. Frasca of the CU business faculty. Starting in the late 1960's, the size of the school has tripled. Now 165 first-year students are admitted annually. The primary goal of the Banking School, one of five graduate schools of banking in the United States, is to prepare banking personnel for more rapid advancement to senior management positions of extra responsibility. Frasca said this is accomplished by three years of two-week summer sessions, followed up by written assignments during the year. Upon completion of all classes and interim assignments, students receive the Colorado School of Banking Diploma. The Banking School has been designed as a regional institution, and is open to students of all races, color, sex, and national and ethnic origin from all over the nation.

Chiefs Will Visit Tulla For Opener

Two teams with a lot in common will square off next Friday at Tulla when the 1978 football season gets underway.

The Friona Chieftains and Tulla Hornets meet at Tulla in the season opener for both teams, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

For one thing, the teams' season records were similar in 1977. The Hornets were coasting along toward the district title, when a tough loss to Idalou knocked them out of it.

The Chieftains, meanwhile, lost a hard-fought game to Littlefield, and it turned out to be their only blemish in district play, forcing a three-way tie for the 3-AA championship, and Friona lost out on a three-way coin toss for playoff rights.

Muleshoe and Littlefield were the other teams involved in the title tie, and Littlefield won the toss.

Friona and Tulla could be similar again in 1978. The Hornets have good size, with 255-pound two-way tackle Albert Bernal, 240-pound guard-tackle James Avent and 250-pound tackle Dale Phillips, only a sophomore.

Tulla likewise has size in its backfield, with 185-pound Kevin Lair at fullback. Like Friona, the Hornets have their quarterback returning, and also like the Chiefs, their big weakness is expected to be a shortage of speed.

But, Friona can also throw some size into its lineup, with such players as Park Weatherly (190), Jeff Peak (225), Joel Hight (196) and David Merrill (230).

Peak has been moved to fullback on offense, where he has shown promise during the pre-season, and still plays tackle on defense, expected to be one of the team's strong points.

A rash of knee injuries has stripped the Chieftains of some of their speed, with junior letterman David Fleming having to miss the season, as well as junior center prospect Milton Dixon. Both had operations last year, and their injuries did not heal sufficiently to risk them during contact this season.

However, two of the "knee corps," Chuck Nichols and Jay Taylor, have

bounced back and are expected to be ready.

Friona will be attempting to break a three-game losing streak to the Hornets, who lead the all-time series between the two schools, fourteen wins to four.

The first game ever played between the two schools was back in 1933, but there were long gaps in the series from 1947 to 1958, and 1961 to 1974.

Friona's only wins have been in 1941, a forfeit, 1943, 6-0; 1944, 19-7 and 1974, 6-0.

For a main course, sandwiches are a hit with both the chef and the family. Instead of the regular cold-cuts, why not make a sandwich spread of tuna, chicken, egg, ham or roast beef salad? It can be made the day before and stored in the refrigerator.

Green salads are a light, filling dish that are popular with most families. Some homemakers provide the salad ingredients and let everyone make their own. Provide a variety of dressings and you'll be sure to please everyone.

For dessert, tempt your group

with cold wedges of watermelon or fresh fruit.

You can keep them cool with ice cream topped with sliced fruit, which has been prepared ahead of time. Be sure to dip sliced apples, peaches and bananas in lemon juice to prevent them from turning brown.

Use caution in storing all make-ahead dishes. If they are meant to be kept cold, keep them cold. Refrigerate in tightly closed containers. This will keep them safe, as well as helping preserve flavors.

Be especially careful with dishes containing meat, milk and eggs. Keep them in refrigerator or ice chest. By keeping food safe, your family will enjoy the Labor Day holiday more.

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
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

The following morning drain and rinse twice in cold water. Add 2½ cups vinegar, 4 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon dry mustard, 1½ teaspoons celery seed, ½ teaspoon black pepper and ¼ teaspoon each of corn starch, nutmeg and turmeric.

Boil 30 minutes then seal in hot jars.
