Area Gets Rain; Damage Is Noted

The Friona area has received rain showers this week, but some parts of the area also suffered damage from the weather.

The rainstorm was kicked off by a cold front that hit the area at about 1:30 Thursday morning, accompanied by high winds, thunder and an electrical display.

Some farmers reported crops of corn blown down, or leaning, where they had irrigated the previous day.

In Friona, the official measurement was .89 inch from the Thursday morning shower. The area had another crack at it on Thursday evening, and an additional .39 inch was measured.

At the Star's press time Friday, it appeared that the area might get another soaker before it was through.

Damage was reported in the Rhea Community, which received up to four inches of rain in places, and some hail. The rain apparently fell in a relatively short time, and caused gullies to be cut in some fields.

The Tierra Blanca Creek north of Friona was running Thursday

morning following the rain. It was the first time this creek had been flowing in some time.

Other specific damage in the Rhea community included an air conditioner which was blown off the Norbert Schueler home, and damage to Norman Taylor's horse

barn, the second time it was damaged this year.

The rainfall in Friona brought the total for August (four days) to 1.28 inches, already more than was received in July, which came to just 1.14 inches, and that coming fairly late in the month.

United Fund Sets Budget, Details

Twelve agencies were approved for inclusion in the Friona Area United Way campaign for 1978 at the budget hearing Tuesday morning at Friona State Bank.

One new activity, the July 4th fireworks fund, was added to the 1978 drive. Another request for inclusion, from the Friona Fine Arts Council, was rejected, as were two requests from outside agencies with no apparent local connection.

Budgets approved by the United Fund board of directors included: Boy Scouts, \$2500; Girl Scouts, \$2300; Red Cross, \$1200; Salvation Army, \$900; United Cerebral Palsy, \$760.00; Local Emergency Fund, \$400; Friona 4-H Club, \$200; Texas Mental Health, \$90; Friona Little League, \$1200; U.S.O., \$125; July 4th Activity Fund, \$1500; and Texas Community Service, \$52.

Of the agencies formerly on the United Fund list, all amounts remained the same as for 1977 with

the exception of the Little League, which was increased \$200. A spokesman for the Little League cited expenses incurred by teams in the playoff as a reason for needing an increase.

With the 12 agency budgets approved, the 1978 goal now stands at \$11,227.00, which is \$500 above the 1977 goal.

"Any agency which questions their budget amount, or which would like to be considered should contact us immediately," says H.H. Horton, Jr., chairman of the UF board of directors.

Board member Charles Allen said he wished that two other agencies, the Cancer crusade and Heart Association, would join the United Fund, so that the goal, of making just one big drive, could be realized.

Bill Wilshire and Ron Smiley are co-chairmen of the 1978 drive. A kickoff date for the drive has been scheduled for Monday, November 6.

Budget Hearing Slated For City

The budget hearing for the City of Friona, fiscal year 1978-79 will be held Monday, August 7, at the Council Meeting Room, beginning at 8 p.m.

For the first time in a number of years, the proposed expenditures for the year is below that of the previous year. The proposed expenditures for the coming fiscal year comes to \$526,232, which is below the budgeted amount of \$534,955 for the year ending September 30 of 1978.

The proposed income is above that of the current fiscal year, although City Manager A.L. Outland says this income figure may be a bit on the nebulous side, as it depends on farm income, local sales taxes, etc.

Also, the receipts will depend upon the re-evaluation of property in the city limits, and Outland says it is hard to say exactly how this will differ from the old setup, until the city has been through the new system at least once.

At any rate, the new budget estimates the proposed revenue at \$804,697, compared to \$695,865 under the former year's budget.

Main reason for the decrease in expenditures is that capital expenditures will not be nearly as great for the coming year.

Major capital expenditure items

proposed are a new police patrol car and a new van for the fire department, which will exchange a pickup.

No big expansion is expected in the water and sewer department, due to the slow trend in new building starts. Outland points out that building permits are down considerably from the same period a year ago.

Only six new residence starts have been logged in 1978, and one new business building, compared to 11 permits the previous year.

Under the proposed city budget, salaries of city employees will show a considerable increase. Outland said that the "step and range" method was used in figuring the raises, which takes into consideration the longevity of the employees.

Outland says that the recent expansion at MBPXL, which is pegged to add 250 additional workers, the feedlot and beef activity, and the generally stable agriculture picture all should help make a favorable bearing on the local economy.

All residents who are interested are invited and encouraged to attend the budget hearing, which will be a part of the regular city council meeting.

will feature catering service, he says.

# "Uncrowned King" Has Massive Power

### BY WAY OF INTRODUCTION....

There always seem to be people determined to make us face the uncomfortable facts in life, which in itself is unsettling, but especially so when we have managed to delegate those facts to a dark corner of our minds and are striving to ignore them. And not only do they make us face these facts, they then leave us to wrestle with the responsibility incurred by simply knowing them. The responsibility incurred is that of making others face the unpleasant facts, too.

Last week a dear friend made me face a "truth" that I simply did not want to believe because it made me uncomfortable. I now assume my responsibility incurred for knowing the truth by sharing it with you.

FDR once said, "In politics, nothing happens by accident. If it happens you can bet it was planned that way." And James Forrestal once made this succinct statement, "If our leaders were just making mistakes, it seems to me that occasionally, they would make one in OUR favor."

FDR and Forrestal were right. What is happening in America today, the oil crisis, the devaluation of the dollar (it is now worth 26 cents) and the constant, ever spiraling inflation are not simply "accidents" in our history, and neither are they caused by the "mistakes" of our leaders.

But if we rule out accidents of history and mistakes by humans, what is left? "If it happens you can bet it was planned that way." But who has at their disposal the money and power required to create an oil crisis or an energy shortage?

In the CBS special entitled, "The Rockefeller," Walter Cronkite made this observation, "The Rockefellers have mastered to a frightening degree the art of using economic power to build political power which enhances economic power even further." Could the Rockefellers have amassed enough economic and political power to

actually plan and create crises in the United States?

We are constantly being told there simply isn't enough oil, that there is an oil crisis. The dollar is losing value, so there is a monetary crisis. Here is a partial listing of the Rockefeller Empire's corporate holdings. Look closely and ask yourself, "Do the Rockefellers control enough oil and money to create crises in these areas?"

The Rockefeller empire owns Exxon, Standard Oil of California, Mobil Oil, Phillips 66, Chevron Oil, Chase Manhattan Bank, First National City Bank of N.Y., Chemical Bank of N.Y., IBM, Eastman Kodak and General Electric.

Also, Texas Instruments, Three M Company, New York Life, Metropolitan Life, Equitable Life, International Harvester, Inland Steel, Marathon Oil, Quaker Oats, Pittsburgh Steel, Freeport Sulfur, Safeway Foods and Standard Oil of Indiana.

Exxon is the largest corporation in the nation, and has holdings in 127 countries.

The Rockefellers control through trusts such companies as Texaco Oil, I.T.T., Westinghouse, Boeing, International Paper, Sperry-Rand, Xerox, National Cash Register, Kaiser, Avon, Penn Central Railroad, National Airlines, TWA Airlines, Eastern Airlines and United Airlines.

The empire controls through stock holdings such companies as Motorola, Honeywell, General Foods, General Packers and Burlington Industries.

They control through interlocking directorates such names as Allied Chemicals, Anaconda Copper, DuPont, Monsanto, Olan-Mathison, Borden, National Distillers, Shell, Gulf and Union Oil, Dow Chemicals, City Service, Stauffer Chemicals, Continental Oil, Union Carbide, American Motors, Bendix, Chrysler Motors, CIT, Kress Stores and Macy's.

The Rockefellers own or control 37 of the top 100 industrials. They

control three of the four largest insurance companies.

The Carnegie and Ford foundations are each controlled by the Rockefeller empire.

The Rockefellers own or control 12 of the major oil companies and three of America's largest banks. The Chase Manhattan is the third largest bank in the U.S., but it is the most influential bank in the world because of its international connections. It has 50,000 affiliate banks located all over the world. The Rockefeller family also has controlling interest in the First National Bank of New York, which is the nation's second largest.

The Rockefellers do virtually control the world's oil industry and have used this power to create an imaginary oil crisis to further their aims...to control a one-world government with David Rockefeller as the head.

"Because so much of the Rockefellers massive wealth is outside the United States, David Rockefeller is fanatically interested in our Foreign policy. He is the world's number one internationalist and is pursuing a goal of a so-called 'New World Order'—which can only be interpreted as a one-world socialist government dictatorship for the good of the investments of the Rockefellers." 

## Krueger Attacks Tower's Record

Congressman Bob Krueger told a full-house at the Friona State Bank Friday that he will try to understand the value and principles of the people if he is elected Senator.

Krueger is running for U.S. Senate and the seat presently held by Republican John Tower.

He told the group that he is opposed to federal farm legislation and feels this is the place of local and state governments. He said he has not supported such legislation in the past and will not in the future.

The government should be working actively to open more overseas markets for the nation's agricultural products. Krueger said he objects to countries such as Japan being unwilling to import U.S. agricultural products.

"I don't believe in federal price controls on natural gas, because they don't work," he said.

With price controls the states would get federal allocation laws, Krueger said. This means the federal government could cut off Texas' supply to send to other states and he said this cannot happen.

"I don't think this would be in the interest of our state," he said.

The congressman also feels the single largest reason for the inflation is government spending.

"As long as the government is printing money faster than it is coming in, there will be inflation," he said.

He said the government can always print their own and not call it counterfeit.

The farmer has done a better job sustaining the value of the dollar through exports, Krueger said. Government must be the first unit to hold down spending and quit spending more than it takes in.

Krueger said he has always, does now and will continue to support right-to-work laws. He said he has never taken any other position.

The difference between himself and Tower on the right-to-work

issue, Krueger said, is that Tower is in favor of the federal government working to extend the right-to-work laws into states that do not now have them. Krueger said he is opposed to this because he believes with 28 closed shop states, the chances are greater that they would come back against the 22 right-to-work states.

When asked whether he would like Pres. Carter to campaign for him in Texas, Krueger said he is proud to be a Democrat because that party has done more to open up itself to people.

He calls himself an Independent Democrat because he says he wants to be independent of any wing of the party and listen to the issues.

The congressman from New Braunfels said he does not believe Tower is independent of the Republican party strings.

Krueger said while he voted with former President Ford 40 per cent of the time, Tower voted with Ford 83 per cent of the time.

The race comes down to a case of effectiveness, Krueger said. He accused Tower of never taking the initiative.

"In 17 1/2 years in the Senate, Tower has never introduced any major piece of legislation," he said.

He was asked about the local problems the hospital was having with HEW. Krueger said a local hospital is essential to the vitality of a small town.

To hold unselected people in government responsible, he said, there are several options. One is to cut off the money and another is to not establish any more agencies.

Another alternative he said is to pass sunset legislation setting a date for the agency to die. The last is to require Congressional okay to new regulations by an agency.

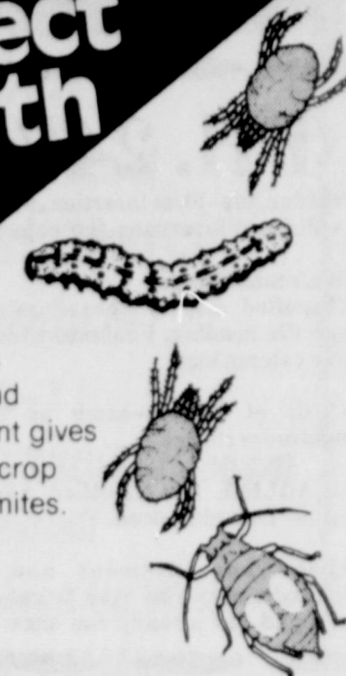

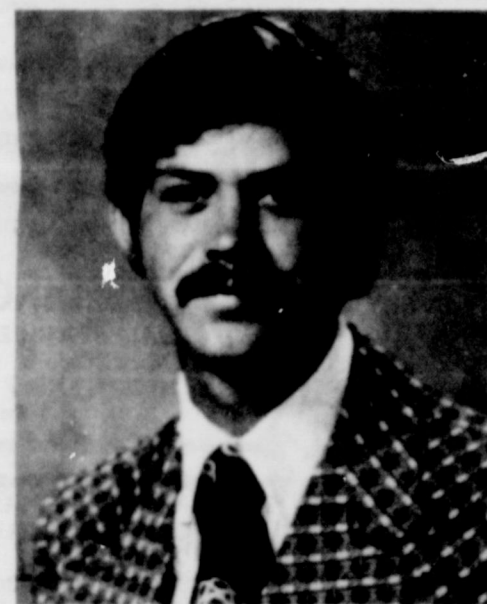

Travis Graves of Friona is a grandson.

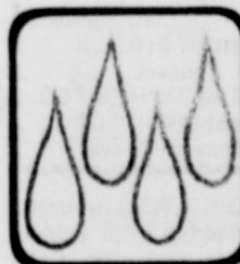

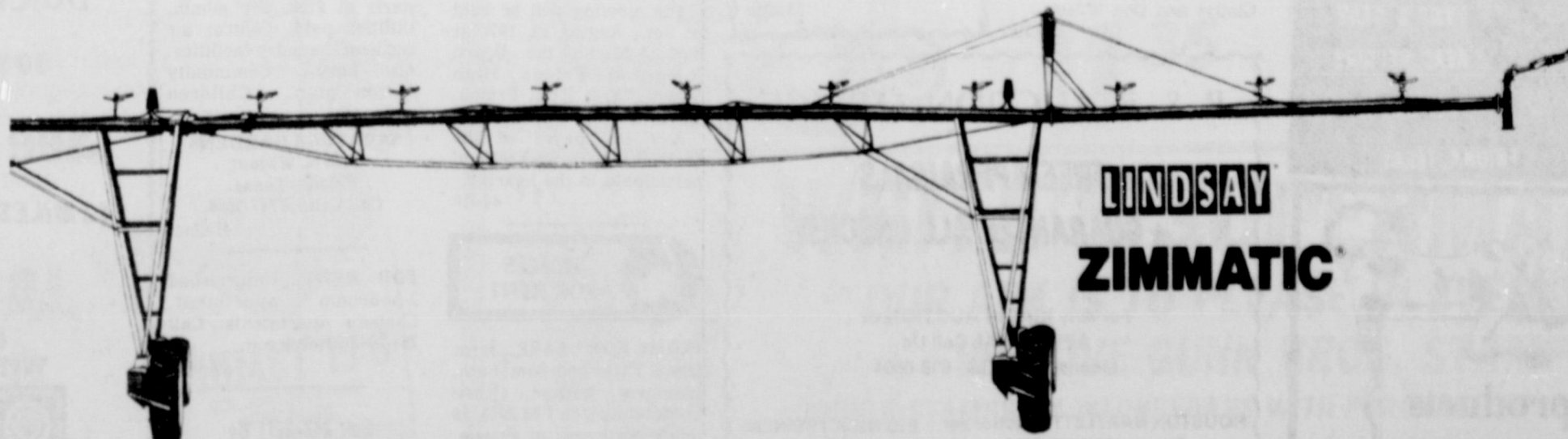



# On The Farm In Parmer County

By Seth Ralston, County Agent

Trees, shrubs and vines that were transplanted in recent months need a little extra care to make it through the long, hot summer.

The most critical problem for newly moved plants is providing adequate moisture. Wind damage and excess fertilization also take their toll on transplanted trees, shrubs and vines.

Mulches can help conserve soil moisture and are effective in controlling weeds. Apply the mulch several inches deep over the new plant's roots. Pine needles or bark, oak leaves, bagasse, gin trash or grass clippings can be used as mulch. Some organic mulches decompose rapidly, taking nitrogen from the soil in the process and cause plants to yellow. This may be corrected by adding small doses of nitrogen fertilizer.

Caution should be taken when adding fertilizer at planting time. Only small amounts, if any, should be applied during the first growing season. Over-fertilization is one of the major causes of plants dying the first season.

Homeowners should protect new plants against wind damage. This is especially true for trees or shrubs that are several feet tall. High winds can break limbs and damage newly forming roots as well as dehydrate the plant. So plants should be pruned or staked for support.

++++

Grasshoppers have been appearing in abundance in several areas of the state. Several recommended insecticides have been used that have provided good immediate control, but have short residual qualities.

#### Bait Preparation

To prepare a wet bait, mix the following ingredients in the correct proportions:

Bran (or up to 3/4 sawdust) 100 Lbs.  
Toxaphene 6E 1 and 1-3 pt.  
Water 7-8 gallons  
Molasses 2 gallons  
Mix until a crumbly mash. The finished bait should be uniformly moist.

#### Rate and Methods of Application

Spread the bait uniformly by hand or with a broadcasting machine at the rate of 10 to 20 pounds per acre. The most effective applications are made in the morning hours and when the bait is still moist.

#### Treatment Areas

Make application to roadsides, ditch banks, field margins, and idle

areas bordering fields or gardens.

#### Remember

Always read the label and follow directions carefully.

Toxaphene bait is intended as a barrier treatment to reduce migrations into fields. Gardens, crops, etc. already infested should be treated with recommended insecticide (Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon) in conjunction with bait applications.

++++

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Parmer County will need to treat the first two weeks in August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil. Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

The Parmer County Chapter of the American Heart Association urges anyone interested to come to the Parmer County Community Hospital lobby on Monday, August 7.

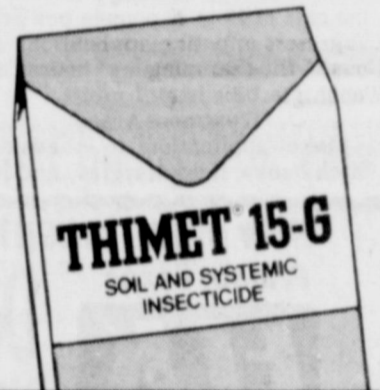

# SPS Withdraws Offer For Plant

Berl Springer, president of Southwestern Public Service Company, said today that the electric company is withdrawing its offer to provide \$100-million and a plant site for building the nation's first gas-cooled breeder reactor.

"This has been a hard decision for us to make. We have been hoping, for nearly four years, that the plant would be built in our service area. However, the program has met with unusual and continuing delays, and the time has come for us to make other plans to be sure that our customers will have plenty of electricity in the future," Springer said.

Southwestern announced in September of 1974 that it had entered into an agreement with General Atomic Company, developer of the gas-cooled nuclear reactor, to provide the plant site and \$100-million for a nuclear breeder reactor with an electric generating capability of 300,000 kilowatts.

"When we made our offer in 1974, we made a commitment for a demonstration plant ready to turn out electricity on a daily basis, just like any of our other plants. At that time, it looked like we would get that kind of plant in the early 1980's. It now appears that it will be after 1990 before a plant can be built, and it will be a research project subject to shutdown and testing and not one on which we can depend for day-to-day operation.

battle that continues over the Clinch River Breeder Reactor. The President is unalterably opposed to Clinch River at the same time that he is vague about what breeder technology he would support. The Congress seems just as insistent that Clinch River be built and pays little attention to gas-cooled or other breeder alternatives. As a result, all the breeder debate is on Clinch River, although many of us are convinced the gas-cooled breeder is better. This has delayed the building of a demonstration plant, and it is not to the best interests of our customers to keep waiting around for this problem to be solved," Springer pointed out.

General Atomic has been working on the gas-cooled breeder since 1961. In 1968, a group of utilities representing about one-third of the generating capability in the country was formed to join General Atomic in support of the program. It, also, has had limited financial support from the federal government and some foreign nations.

Southwestern joined the industry group in 1974 when it made the offer of the plant site and the \$100-million.

Helium Breeder Associates was formed in 1976 by some of the original members of the utility group. HBA was started to serve as the organization to contract with the federal government for research and development. When it was established, it was hoped that there would be a significant increase in the federal support of the gas-cooled technology which, in turn, would develop additional utility support.

Southwestern will continue to research nuclear fusion as a charter member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. In the fusion process, the atoms are joined, rather than split, and the hydrogen in seawater is the fuel for making electricity.

"We will continue on our plan to use coal as our base fuel. We will, also, look at other nuclear alternatives and continue our support of the fusion program. The decision we have reluctantly made about the gas-cooled breeder will not, in any way, interfere with our ability to serve our customers, either now or in the future," Springer concluded.

## TDA Asking Aid For Ant Problem

Commissioner Reagan V. Brown and the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) have filed a motion to intervene on behalf of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in an injunction against the EPA preventing the use of ferriamicide, a pesticide developed to control imported fire ants. The motion was filed Thursday in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

Plaintiff in the EPA injunction is the Environmental Defense Fund, Inc., which filed when the government agency granted an emergency exemption to Mississippi to use ferriamicide. The EDF claimed that no emergency existed and that fire ants did not create a problem in the South.

Brown said Texas and the other states infested with fire ants have made application to intervene or are in the process. The American Farm Bureau has also intervened on the side of the EPA and Mississippi. Meanwhile, the EPA and Mississippi have filed a motion asking for dismissal of the injunction on the grounds that the EDF does not have adequate grounds.

Texas is supporting the EPA motion. "We intend to take every step possible to obtain effective control for the imported ants," Brown said.

Mirex, the pesticide that has been used to control fire ants, will not be available after June 30.

Texas has also requested an emergency exemption to permit the use of ferriamicide. Brown said "the decision on the Mississippi request

will have a direct bearing on the Texas application."

Imported fire ants infest 93 counties in the state. Their sting is harmful to people and animals and can cause injury and economic loss. The ants have been known to damage crops, gardens, machinery and such earthen structures as levees and roadbeds.

The Texas State Legislature has appropriated \$2 million for use by TDA between fiscal years 1976 and 1979 to combat the fire ant. Of this, \$800,000 has been committed for research to find a more effective and environmentally acceptable control method.
