THE READER'S DIGEST for November contained an article on the "True Spirit of Christmas." The article was advocating a movement toward a simpler, less consumer-oriented celebration of the annual gift-giving holiday. As an example of the type of activities they had in mind, the magazine listed the example of some 270 families in Montclair, N.J. who took out a full-page ad in the local newspaper.

This ad was in the form of a "community season's greeting card" and contained the explanation that they had donated \$2300 to the local Salvation Army instead of sending Christmas Cards. Does this sound familiar?

Congratulations to the citizens of Montclair, N.J., for getting the "idea," but you're only 22 years behind a similar group in Friona, Texas.

Friona's own "Project Christmas Card," which was started 22 years ago by the women of our Modern Study Club, has served through the contributions of Friona's generous citizens to keep our local hospital equipped with the most modern of medical facilities.

An average of 300 families contribute to this event each year, and over the years these people have given over \$40,000 to aid Parmer County Community Hospital.

The hospital was begun in Friona without the aid of government grants or assistance and has remained so throughout the years with the help of groups like Modern Study Club and the concerned citizens of our area. Project Christmas Card came into being about a year after the hospital was built.

Friona is only about one-tenth as large as the city of Montclair, New Jersey with its 41,000 population. So, with this in mind, we think Friona has them beat. Especially since we have averaged raising \$4,000 per year since 1970.

And while we're doing a little bragging on ourselves we might mention that the Friona Star contributes the full page in the Christmas edition each year for the printing of the names of participants in Project Christmas Card. Over the years this has amounted to around \$3,500 in advertising space contributed to this worthy cause.

Now, if one of you nice readers would cut this column out and send it in to the Reader's Digest, perhaps someday the ladies of Modern Study Club who work so hard each year on this project, will get some national recognition for their efforts. We would cut it out ourselves, but we've just about got a sore arm from so much back-patting.

IT IS NOW beginning to look as though the state of Texas may have two teams in the NFL playoffs, which would be a first.

That Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers is really something. Can you believe the season he's having, and he's only a rookie? He has brought the Oilers from the ranks of a threat to a contender, and has helped lure sellout crowds to the team's last 14 home games.

The Houston coach, Bill Yeoman, didn't seem to be shaken. He knows that all the Cougs have to do is whip crosstown rival Rice this week, to take the Southwest Conference crown.

It would be funny if the Owls would rip the Cougars, and Tech could edge Arkansas this week, since that would put the Red Raiders in the Cotton Bowl, and send Houston back to "Cougar High" without a bowl ticket. Of course, that's a lot of "ifs," but stranger things have happened this football season.

Born May 2, 1958 in Friona, young Schueler died Saturday, November 25 in Clovis High Plains Hospital following a car accident in dense fog near Farwell.

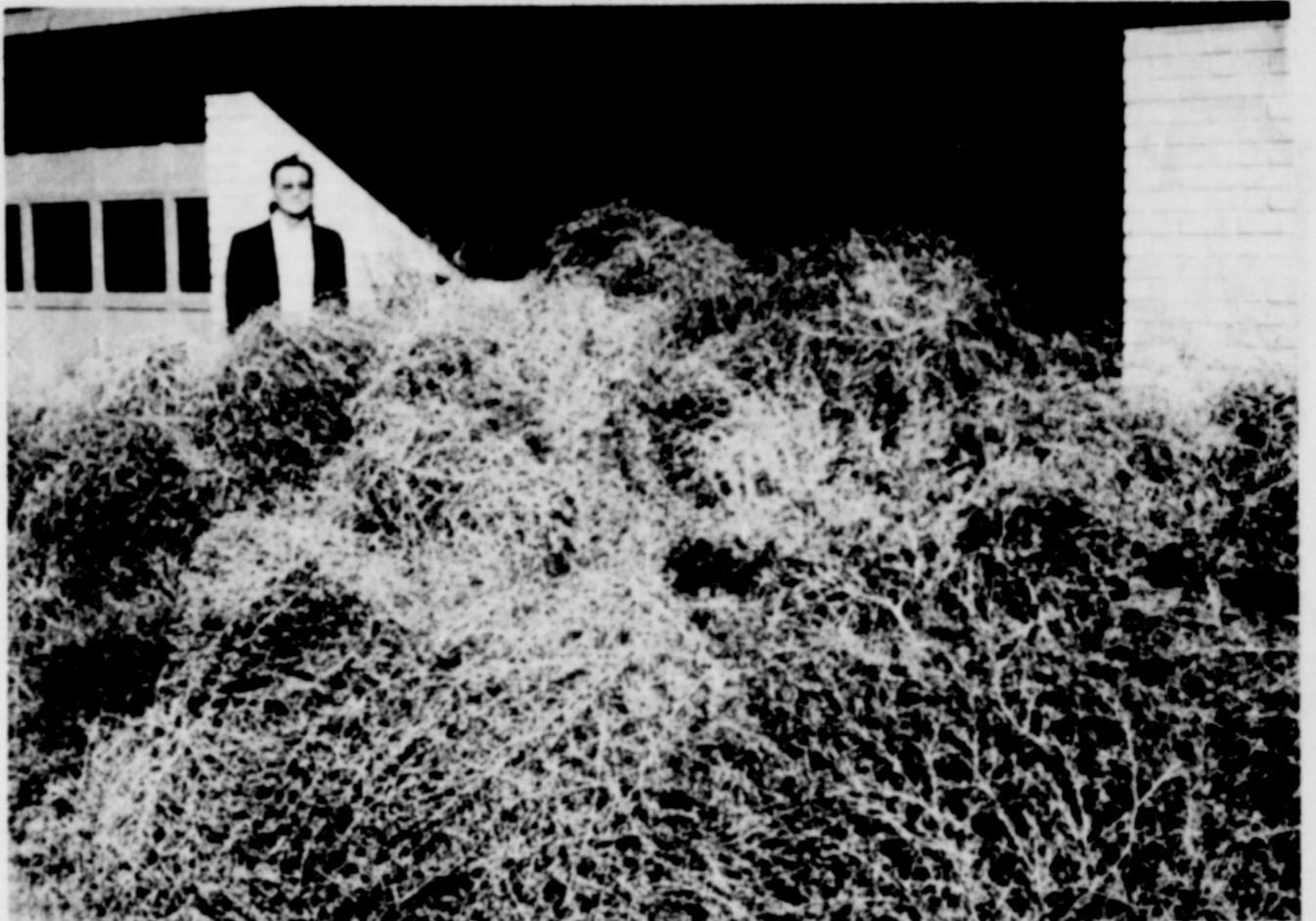
Schueler was a 1976 graduate of Friona High School. While in school he participated in FFA and received his Lone Star Farmer Degree in 1975. He also played basketball and football. He was engaged in construction work at the time of his death.

Schueler's eastbound automobile collided with a westbound vehicle driven by Lewis B. Plummer, III, of Hereford during the early morning hours Saturday some 285 feet outside of the city limits of Farwell on the Texas side, on U.S. Highway 60.

Hospitalized in critical condition were Plummer, and Mike Southward, 20, who was a passenger in Schueler's car.

Survivors include his parents Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Schueler, two sisters, Mrs. Beverly Duke of Amarillo and Stephanie Schueler of Friona. Grandmothers Mrs. Fedora Meeks of Texarkana, Texas and Mrs. Anna Schueler of Friona also survive.

Chamber Sponsors Christmas Events

The Friona Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a number of activities in conjunction with the Christmas season this year, including a special "Santa Arrival" program on Monday, December 18.

On that date, Santa will arrive in Friona to begin his yearly visit with the younger set.

The Chamber will sponsor lighting of Friona's "Community Christmas Tree," a new evergreen tree which has been planted this week at City Park.

The Community Choir will also sing a number of Christmas songs. Linda Murphree announces that the choir will hold a rehearsal on

Sunday, December 10, beginning at 3 p.m. at First Baptist Church's Fellowship Hall. Those coming to this rehearsal may enter at the church's north door.

The Friona Noon Lions Club is sponsoring the appearance of Santa Claus, who will be in his house at the City Park every night the week of December 18, between the hours of 6 and 9 p.m. Youngsters may also have their pictures made with Santa Claus.

Members of the Friona Thespian Troupe plan to serve in the capacity of Santa's elves during the week. Santa will have candy favors for those coming for a visit.

Marlene Drake Clings To Lead

Pheasant Season Slated To Begin

The 1978 pheasant season in Parmer County will get underway Saturday, December 9, and continue through Sunday, December 24, spanning three weekends this year as it has in the past four years.

A good pheasant crop is forecast for the 1978 hunt. According to Jack Patterson, who has been close to the pheasant program since its inception, the pheasant population seems to rise and fall with the area's winter wheat crop, which was good this past year.

It will mark the 15th annual pheasant season for hunters in Parmer County.

More than 2000 pheasants were released in Parmer County by the game association in 1962 and '63 with

the population growing steadily since that time.

The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters with the hens being protected by

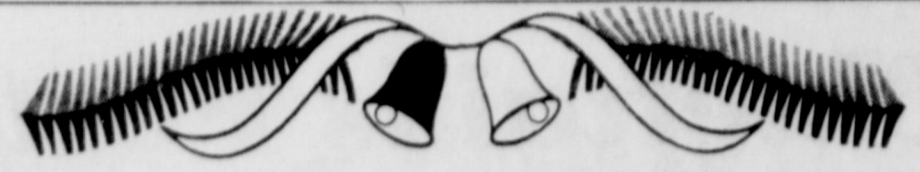

Chieftains Post Good Seasonal Statistics

Although falling below the 50-50 won-loss mark for the 1978 season (with a 4-6 record), the Friona Chieftains still dominated the season statistics compiled against ten season opponents.

Statistics compiled this week by the Friona Star revealed that the Chieftains dominated every offensive category when tabulated against the season totals.

Friona led in first downs, 135-102. Friona had an edge in rushing yardage, 1596 to 1400, and had a big edge in passing yardage, 1111 to 643. This gave Friona a lead in the total offense department, 2707 to 2019.

The passing yardage for the 1978 team is a school record, at least since season statistics were tabulated by the Friona Star, starting in 1962.

The Chieftains also outscored their season opponents, 172 to 167, in spite of going scoreless to Dimmitt in their final game of the season, 20-0.

In individual statistics, Chuck Nichols was the leading ground-gainer with 512 yards rushing. Rod Owen was the runnerup with 425 yards. The leading total is the least for a team leader since Dee King's total of 498 in 1974.

Leslie White led the team in two offensive departments. He was the top ground-gainer in pass receiving,

with 14 catches good for 454 yards, a sparkling average of 32.4 yards per catch.

White also was the leading scorer, becoming the first flanker to lead the team in scoring since season statistics have been kept. He scored four touchdowns on pass receptions, and returned an opening kickoff 90 yards for another TD. He also booted four extra points, giving him 34 points for the year.

The scoring was well divided, with eight players scoring at least ten points. Six players scored at least three touchdowns, further attesting to the balance on the team.

This balance in dividing up the scoring also made the leader's total at 34 the lowest since Glen London led the 1976 team with 30 points.

Quarterback Chris Barnett completed 40 passes of 111 attempts for 643 yards. Mike Hutson connected on 13 of 26 attempts for 304 yards.

On defense, senior Kevin Kothmann was the leader in two categories, with 46 unassisted and 98 assisted tackles. Kothmann also was credited with three quarterback sacks, one fumble recovery, one caused fumble and one blocked punt. That gave Kothmann a total of 150 defensive points for the season, and the nearest to him, Chuck Nichols, had 82 points.

Nichols had 20 unassisted tackles,

50 assists, one pass interception and two caused fumbles.

Leslie White had 30 unassisted tackles, 45 assists, four intercepted passes and two caused fumbles, for 81 points.

Other leaders in tackles were (unassisted) Mike Hutson, 20; Milton Dixon, 17; Kirk Frye, 18; Joe Malouf, 19; Jeff Peak, 16; Ben Landrum, 13; Bobby Thompson, 13; Joel Hight, 14; and Brett Moore, 12.

In assists, Nichols had 50; Peak 45; Frye 47; Park Weatherly 40; Thompson 43; Hight 47; Hutson 24; White 45; Malouf 24; Landrum 26; Chitto Caballero 22; Moore 30; Dixon 30; Rondee Clark 16; Rod Owen 16; Scott Fangman 15 and David Merrell 12.

Hutson had the most fumble recoveries, three; and White led in interceptions with his four.

state laws. The limit this year will be two cocks per day with four in

possession, the same as the past several years. The season and rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and Farwell again this year with three cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

November ended with 2.15 inches of moisture, considerably more than average.

The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize with second place awarded \$10 and third place \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Farmer County Game Management Association.

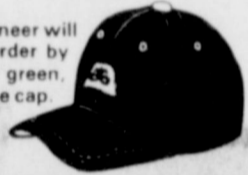

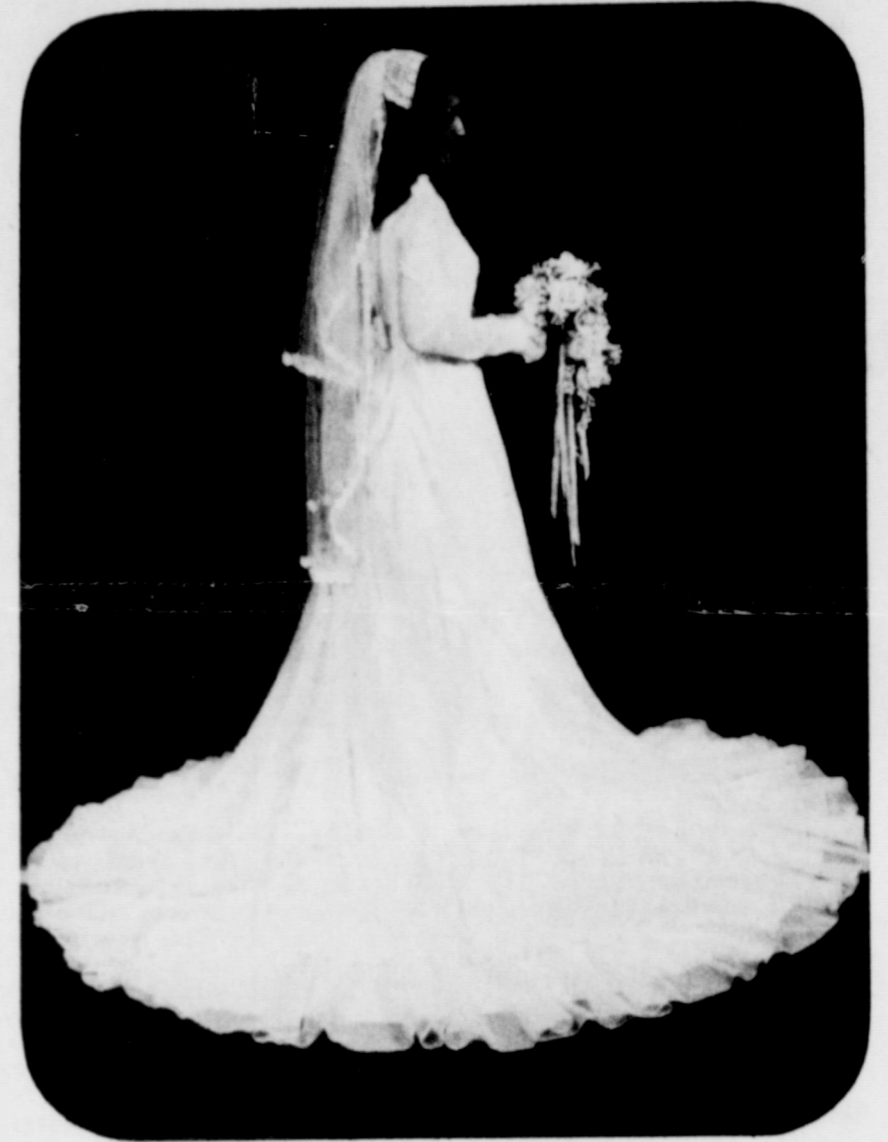

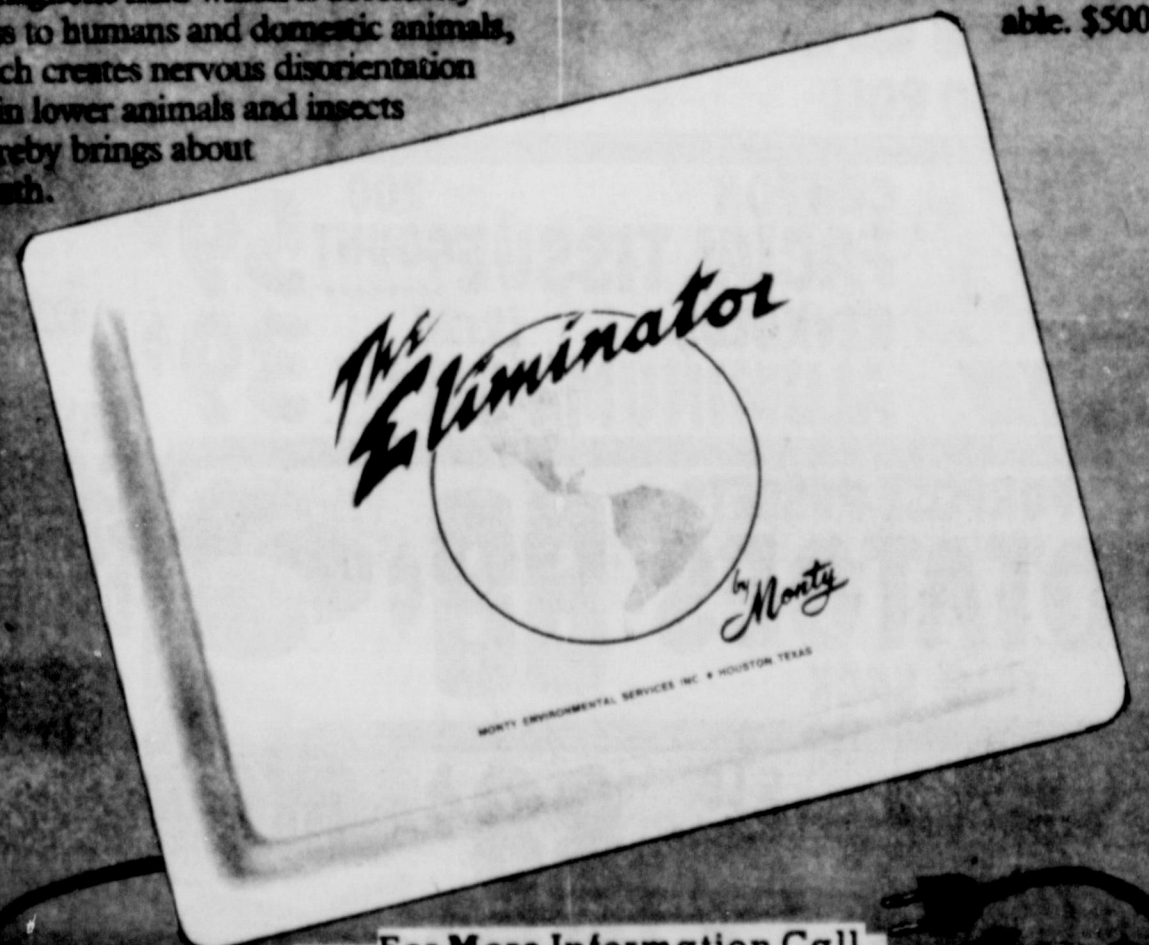
