Miss Ellis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Ellis, performed a classical ballet dance that she had choreographed herself, to Tchaikovsky's "Waltz of the Flowers." Her sponsor in the event was the Friona Star.

The new Maize Queen has brown hair and green eyes, and stands 5'5" tall.

First runnerup in the contest was Susi Noah, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merv Noah, who performed a puppet show, and sang the song "Friendship." Miss Noah designed the puppets, and also made her formal gown.

The four foot, eleven-inch blue-eyed blonde was sponsored in the contest by Horn-Clayton Insurance Company. She is also a senior at FHS.

Renaee Monroe was second runnerup in the 1978 contest. She

sang "I Enjoy Being A Girl" in the talent portion of the contest.

Last year's champion in the Friona Star's football contest is starting off like he means business once again.

Youth Struck By Auto

Greg O'Brian, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight O'Brian of the Friona community, was injured about noon Thursday while attempting to cross Highway 60 near the new Sonic Drive-In.

Young O'Brian was in the company of two other young friends, who said that Greg just apparently did not see the car approaching.

The youth was struck by the car, driven by Mrs. JoDean Harrelson, 22, of Bovina. He came up over the hood of the small car, (an AMC Pacer) and struck the windshield. He suffered a dislocated shoulder, and an apparent hairline fracture of a bone in the lower leg. He was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona Ambulance, and later transferred to Amarillo.

A report to the school by Greg's parents Friday morning indicated that he was in good condition. He suffered some scrapes and abrasions to the arm and head due to hitting the windshield, but no stitches were required. Mrs. O'Brian said it appeared that Greg's shoulder could be re-set without surgery.

A spokesman for the police

department said that it was felt the size of the car was much in the youth's favor, as it could have been much worse if he had been hit by a larger car, as he might have gone under the wheels.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said Friday that the matter had caused a meeting to be held for school staff members for discussion of the matter of students leaving the campus, and he expected that it would be a main item of discussion at the next school board meeting.

At the present time, students are allowed to leave the campus during the noon hour, but may not take their automobiles.

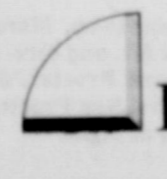

Around The House

I have notes from all over this week. Hope some of them are just what you've been needing to know.

Cleaning Indoor Plants

Since indoor plants don't have the cleaning effect of rainfall to keep their leaf surfaces free from dust, a careful cleaning once or twice a month is helpful.

For smooth-leaved plants, a wet sponge or soft cloth rinsed frequently in clean water is a dependable method.

Plants with hairy leaves require special attention. A camel hair brush used carefully to avoid bruising the leaves works well.

Open Code Dating

Open code dating assures the consumer that the refrigerated foods purchased are fresh.

The pull date commonly found on dairy products indicates the time for the retailer to remove the product from the shelf. The product still has a normal home storage life.

Processed meats may carry a package date indicating when the item was packaged.

Use dated foods before their expiration date to avoid spoilage and waste of food.

Reflective Tape On Children's Clothing

Returning to standard time means children may be coming home from school around dusk.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By Seth Ralston

Without a soil test, it is difficult to determine how profitable fertilization is. That's why soil samples should be collected now and tested so that a fertilization program can be planned for fall crops.

A profitable return from fertilization depends on the level of available nutrients in the soil before fertilization. Nutrients in the fertilizer must supplement those in the soil to insure an adequate supply of those nutrients needed. Since soils vary in nutrient levels, this means that each soil and each nutrient must be considered. Then fertilizer should be applied that contains those nutrients that are not available in the soil in quantities required by the crop.

Soil tests are used to determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil and needed in the fertilizer. No profit can be expected from a nutrient applied to a soil that contains a high enough level to support yields above that possible by the most limiting production factor.

Now is the time to collect soil samples for fall planted crops such as small grains and winter forages. Early sampling will insure time to obtain the fertilizer needed as well as to prepare to use the best application methods.

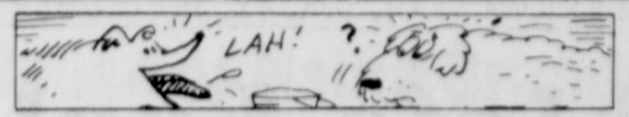

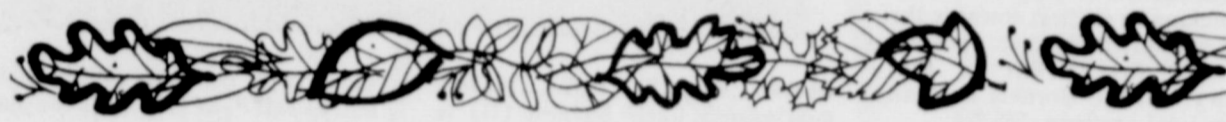

Chiefs Feel Sting; But Shine In Spots

The Friona Chieftains were disappointed in their season opening football game at Tullia last Friday, when the Hornets stung the Chiefs to the tune of 26-6.

The Hornets, making the most of every opportunity, scored three quick touchdowns in the second quarter, to stun the Chiefs, who finally put together a scoring drive in the final quarter.

Mistakes were costly to the rebuilding Chieftains, as they suffered 12 penalties for a total of 118 yards. One of the penalties was especially damaging, early in the game, erasing a 16-yard pass gain that would have given Friona the ball on the Tullia 23 for a first down, when the game was still scoreless.

Instead, the 15-yard stepoff shoved the ball back across midfield in Friona territory, and three plays later the Chieftains had to punt.

On Friona's first possession, Rod Owen had given the Chiefs a first down with a 22-yard run, and then Chris Barnett passed 34 yards to Kevin Kothmann for a first down at the Tullia 22. But on third down,

Barnett's pass was picked off by Tullia at their 20, and the Hornets had squelched that early Friona bid.

On Tullia's third possession, the Hornets were pushed back to their own nine-yard line following a Friona punt. But the team set out on a 91-yard scoring drive, that climaxed with a four-yard slash over right tackle. Tullia kicked the PAT, and the score was 7-0, with 1:07 gone in the second quarter.

Three plays gained only eight yards for the Chieftains, who had to again punt the ball.

This time the Hornets drove 57 yards, with the big play being a 30-yard pass play on a third and ten situation, gaining to the Friona 17.

Three plays later Tullia had another touchdown, with Kevin Lair going six yards for the score. The kick was wide, but the Hornets had a 13-6 lead with eight minutes to go in the half.

The next few minutes spelled disaster for the Chiefs. Three plays following the kickoff resulted in a net loss of a yard, and Tullia got the ball at their own 42.

Lair took the handoff, burst up the middle, and then outraced the defenders the rest of the way for a 58-yard scoring strike. After a penalty erased the first PAT kick, Friona blocked the second one, but Tullia had increased their lead to 19-0, and that was the halftime score.

The third quarter was a standoff, with neither team able to muster a scoring drive.

Then the Chiefs took over early in the fourth quarter, and had their moment of glory.

Leslie White, who was the team's offensive star, gained 11 yards on an end-around run, his third successful run of the night, to the Tullia 44.

It looked like the chance would once again fizzle, as the team faced fourth and ten from that spot after three straight incomplete passes.

But on fourth down, Barnett gave the ball to Kothmann coming around, and he hurled a pass that White snatched although covered by two Tullia defensive men at the Hornet nine-yard line. The play was a spectacular one for the Chiefs, and gave Friona fans something to buzz about.

Two downs later, Owen got around right end for seven yards and the touchdown, breaking the scoring ice for Friona. The team tried a pass for extra points, but it failed.

However, the score had become 19-6 with 9:46 left in the game, and the Chieftains had come alive.

Tullia soon dampened any hopes of a Friona comeback, by sacking quarterback Barnett on two out of three plays, and forcing a Friona punt.

Tullia punted a little later, pushing the Chiefs back to their seven yard line. On second down, Friona fumbled, and the Hornets had the ball at Friona's two yard line.

Although a holding penalty stalled them momentarily, the Hornets again capitalized, and pushed across a fourth score. Lair got it from two yards out, and the kick made the margin 26-6 with 2:40 to play.

The Chieftains were still game, however, moving the ball 47 yards and racking up three more first downs before having a pass intercepted at the Hornet 15 with just seconds left to play.

By picking up six first downs in the fourth quarter, the Chiefs equaled Tullia's 13 first downs in that category, but the Hornets held an edge in total yardage, 286-220.

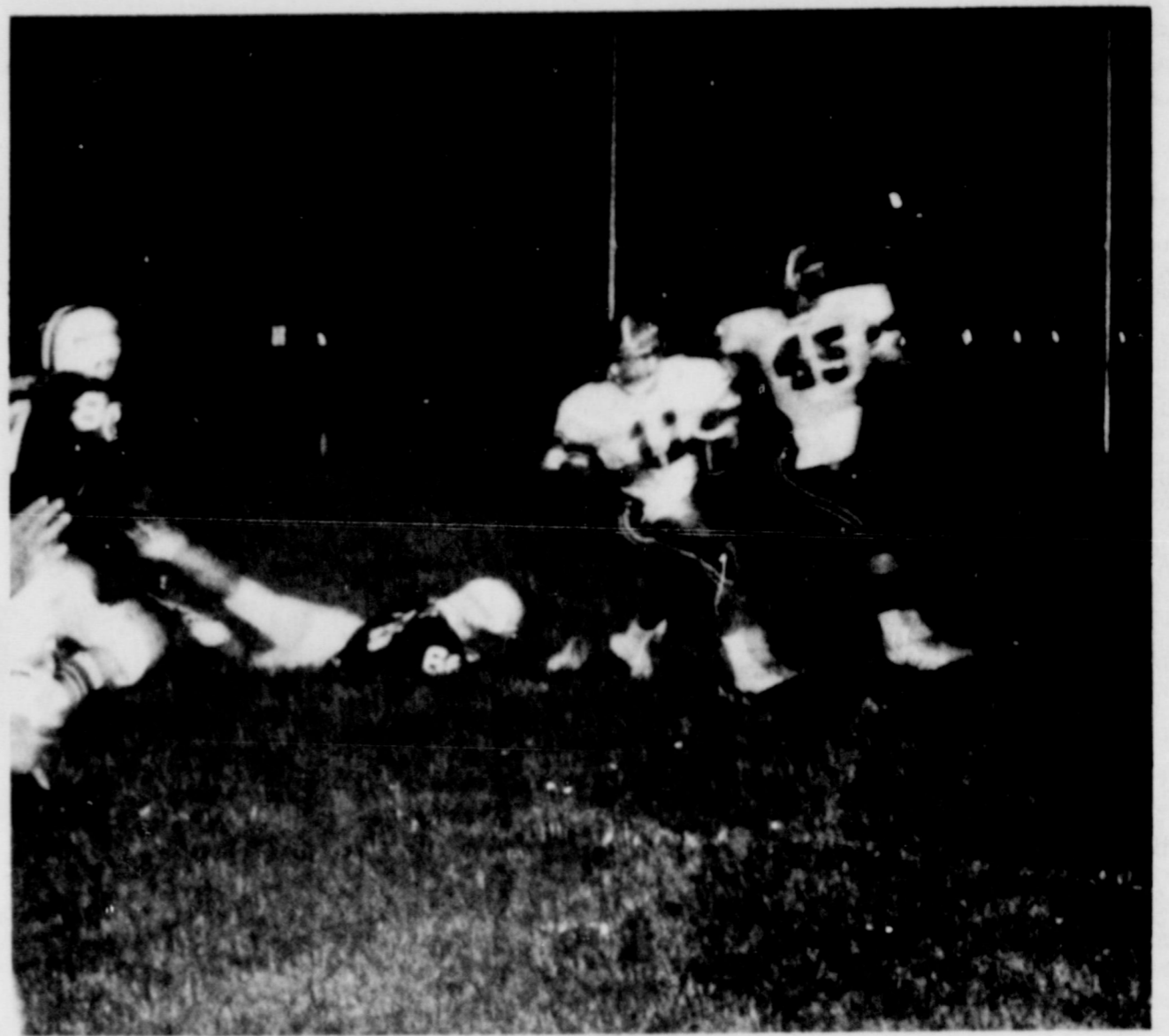
An unusual statistic found that an end, Leslie White, was the team's leading rusher with 80 yards in three plays, averaging 20 yards per carry. Next best was 43 yards by Chuck Nichols on five plays.

Officials got their exercise for the evening, stepping off 118 yards against the Chiefs and 130 yards against the Hornets. The yellow flag was thrown 24 times, 12 against each team.

"During and after the game, I felt gloomy, and we did make our share of the mistakes, but studying the film has convinced me that we had more bright spots than I was aware of at first," said Coach Lonnie Phillips.

"In defense of our team, we need to be reminded that we are a young, inexperienced team in many spots. We've made some drastic moves at some positions, and these moves don't pan out overnight."

Even though the statistics were not good on the passing game,

Phillips said he still thought the 1978 Chieftains had potentially the best passing attack of any team he had coached.

"We have the boys who can catch the football, and we can throw it, so we'll improve in that department," the Friona coach promised.

Phillips said that Leslie White had to be Friona's outstanding player in the opening game, thanks to his super play, both on offense and on defense, where he plays free safety.

Phillips said the team's attitude has remained good, and he felt that they still have the makings of a good football team, if things begin to fall right.

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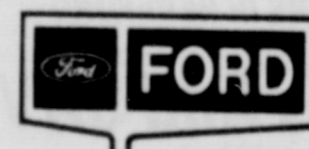

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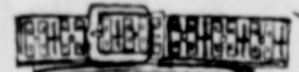

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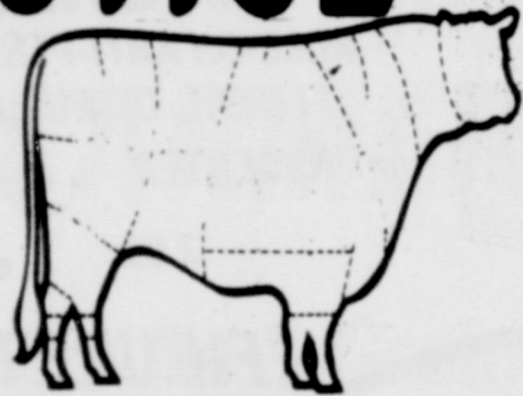

Briggs Helps Steer Ag Policy Through

Jimmy Briggs of the Lazbuddie community was a recent delegate to the State Republican Party Convention last weekend in Dallas, along with Ron Awtry of Friona and Mrs. Ellen Estes of Bovina.

Briggs was appointed to the party's resolutions committee and was instrumental in getting the platform for agriculture, including virtually all of the points that American Agriculture sponsored in the county conventions, adopted by the state organization.

The resolution pledges support of Senator John Tower, urges the restriction of meat imports, sup-

ports parity farm prices, urges reasonable prices for governmental commodities and suggests a board of farmers and ranchers to serve as part of the U.S.D.A.

"We owe Jimmy a big debt of gratitude for his hard work in getting this through," said local delegate Ron Awtry.

Other planks in the state GOP platform include striving for local control of public schools, with proficiency testing of teachers; a crackdown on criminals, including legislation to require felons to serve at least one third of their sentence; fixed-length sentences for specific

crimes; the right to keep and bear arms as guaranteed by the constitution; a strong national defense with a call for increased spending on military strength, and a comprehensive energy policy based on free market prices on oil and natural gas.

The keynote speaker of the party convention was Jack Kemp, U.S.

Representative from Buffalo, known for his tax-cutting bill, the Kemp-Roth Bill. This bill would reduce all individual income tax rates by 33 per cent over a three-year period. Kemp said "No government in history has ever been able to do for the people what they have been able to do for themselves."

"Master's Touch" will conduct a program at First Baptist Church, Friona, Sunday morning, September 17 at 9:45 a.m. for a special youth assembly.

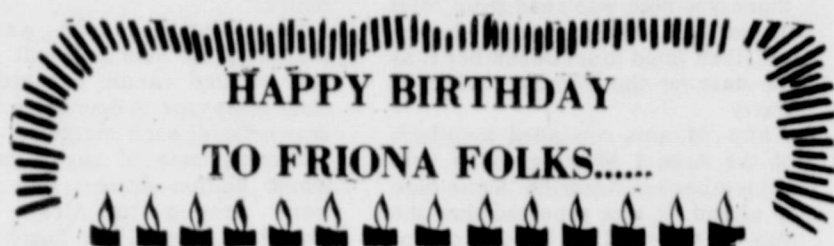

AVISO PUBLICO UN RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL 7 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1978

LA ENMIENDA PARA ALIVIO DE IMPUESTOS (H.J.R. 1)
H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible; requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos articulos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo a parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposicion de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad.
La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos sobre tierras agricolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.
La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exencion actual de no menos de \$1,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.
La enmienda concede una exencion de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos sobre escuelas publicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exencion adicional de los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exencion la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse.
La enmienda previene que gobiernos locales incrementen los impuestos sobre propiedad a menos que el cuerpo administrativo provea aviso publico y lleve a cabo una auditoria pública. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluacion de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.
La enmienda limita los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia. La enmienda prohíbe la valuacion de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecucion de

tan bonos para la reconstruccion o adquisicion de facilidades (terrenos, equipos y mejoras) con la intencion de desarrollar oportunidades de empleo. Estos bonos se pagarian solamente de los ingresos de la venta o arriendo de estas facilidades. Gobierno local debe determinar que la construccion o adquisicion de tales facilidades es necesaria para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo.
La terminologia de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:
"La enmienda constitucional para disponer que la legislatura puede permitir que las subdivisiones politicas emitan bonos de ingresos, para desarrollar oportunidades de empleo para sus ciudadanos."
NO. 3 (S.J.R. 44)
S.J.R. 44 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas que permitira que la legislatura autorize a ciudades y pueblos la emision de bonos de impuestos incrementados para financiar el desarrollo de areas deterioradas. Solamente se pagaran los bonos de los ingresos de los incrementos en impuestos municipales. No pagos se pueden hacer de los ingresos de impuestos municipales, servicios publicos u otros servicios.
La terminologia de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:
"La enmienda constitucional que da a la legislatura el poder de autorizar las ciudades y pueblos para expedir bonos para financiar el desarrollo de areas deterioradas y prohibir cualquier ciudad o pueblo de conceder su dinero o prestar su credito para tales fines."
NO. 4 (S.J.R. 53)
S.J.R. 53 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura exente de la imposicion de impuestos, aparatos para energia o de viento.
La terminologia de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:
"La enmienda constitucional autorizando a la legislatura para exentar de impuestos aparatos de energia solar o de viento."
NO. 5 (H.J.R. 37)
H.J.R. 37 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para conceder competencia exclusiva a jueces de paz en causas civiles cuando la cantidad en controversia no excede \$200, a menos que la legislatura conceda competencia exclusiva a otra corte. La enmienda concede a jueces de paz competencia concurrente con cortes de condado cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$200 y \$500, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado competencia exclusiva.
La enmienda también concede a jueces de paz

competencia concurrente con ambas cortes, cortes de condado, y cortes de distrito, cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$500 y \$1,000, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado o distrito competencia exclusiva.
La terminologia de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:
"La enmienda constitucional para extender la competencia de los jueces de paz en causas civiles."
NO. 6 (S.J.R. 45)
S.J.R. 45 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura aumente el número de jueces en cualquier corte de apelaciones civiles. Al presente, cortes de apelaciones civiles están limitadas a un juez asociado. La enmienda también permitiría a las cortes que sesionen por secciones, y requiriendo la concurrencia de una mayoría de jueces para decidir una causa."
NO. 7 (S.J.R. 48)
S.J.R. 48 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas eliminando la Comisión de Edificios del Estado y el Fondo de Edificios del Estado. La autoridad de la Comisión de Edificios del Estado ha sido trasladada por ley a la Junta de Control del Estado.
La terminologia de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:
"La enmienda constitucional para abrogar la autoridad constitucional de la Comisión de Edificios del Estado y el Fondo de Edificios del Estado."
NO. 8 (H.J.R. 42)
H.J.R. 42 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas permitiendo que ciertas subdivisiones politicas o distritos del estado que al presente pueden emitir bonos u otras deudas o de otra manera prestar su credito participen en actividades contra incendios y que emitan bonos o de otra manera prestar su credito para tales propósitos."
"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)
H.J.R. 1 propone un amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.
The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.
The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.
The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.
The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.
The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.
The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."
NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)
S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."
NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)
S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."
NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)
S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."
NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)
S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."
NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)
H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.
The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.
The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."
NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)
S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."
NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)
S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."
NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)
H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit to support such activities.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

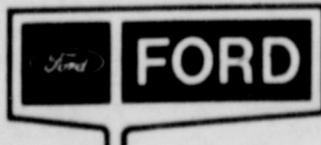
