## Chamber Okays New Dues Set-Up

**CONGRATULATIONS** to Dean Church, on exhibiting the Grand Champion Steer at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

It sounds simple enough, but it had been 13 years since a Friona youth had won the steer championship.

Back in 1966, young Gary Phipps had the champion steer, in fact the grand and reserve champions. That gave Friona five consecutive titles at the time, and 14 in 18 years. It looked as easy as falling off logs to win that portion of the livestock show.

But during the nine years that followed Phipps' winning the show, two Farwell families dominated the steer showing, with the Haseloffs, Mark, Robert and Carrie, winning four titles, and the Langfords, Jacquelyn, Annette and Mac, adding four more.

Add to that streak a pair of wins by Joan Carson of Bovina and two by Lazbuddie youngsters, and suddenly Friona had been out of the winners' circle for a dozen years.

Perhaps all of this is an indication of how competitive the county show has been over the years, and underscores the fact that these livestock honors are not taken lightly in our particular county.

**THIS YEAR WAS** at least the second year in a row for the all-weather county showbarn to have more than paid for itself. Last year, there were four to six inches of snow on the ground on showday, but the show went off without a hitch.

This year, our particular area missed out on most of the snow which blanketed parts of the region, but still had the cold weather, and thus, the showbarn again was a God-send.

We were telling a friend Monday that we'd bet that at least on 75 per cent of the years, the county show has been held in adverse weather of some sort. It has run the gamut from bitter cold to swirling dust storms.

**NEXT MONDAY WILL** feature one of those wonders of astronomy, an eclipse of the sun. It's the last eclipse of the sun that residents of North America will experience this century.

At the February meeting of the Friona Chamber of Commerce board of directors, a new dues structure was approved, to go into effect immediately for new members, and on January 1, 1980 for present Chamber members.

Individual dues will be \$48 per year. Dues for businesses were revised according to the number of employees the business has. Following is the breakdown as approved:

One to five employees, \$96 per year; 6-10 employees, \$120; 11-15 employees, \$180; 16-20 employees, \$240; 21-25 employees, \$300; 26-30 employees, \$360; 31-35 employees, \$420; and 36-40 employees, \$480.

It was suggested that an employee be defined as anyone working a 40-hour work week. A business with part-time employees would then total the hours worked to arrive at the number of 40-hour employees to report to the Chamber.

The board also agreed that since farming is a business, Chamber memberships for farmers would fall under the same rate schedule as a regular business.

It was reported that the Chamber's housing survey has been printed and is being distributed at MBPXL. Chamber President Jerry Poarch had visited MBPXL personnel director Jim Lovelady recently, and discussed housing needs in Friona.

Poarch reported that his findings indicated that out of approximately

## FIRST IN 13 YEARS

# Dean Church Wins County Steer Title

Dean Church, Friona High School junior, broke a 13-year "jinx" for Friona FFA members by exhibiting the Grand Champion steer at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend.

Although Friona leads the county in the number of steer titles with 15 in all, it had been 13 years since a local youngster had claimed the honors. Friona had won 14 steer championships in a 19-year span from 1948 through 1966, and then really ran into competition in getting back into the winner's circle.

Church did the trick with a 1,078-pound crossbreed (Hereford-Limousin) steer that first was named winner of the show's mediumweight class. The Friona FFA member also exhibited the champion of the heavyweight class, an 1126-pound Angus steer.

Although taking a "back seat" to showmen from other parts of the county in the barrow and sheep divisions of the show, Friona dominated the steer show, winning three of the show's five class championships.

In addition to Church's two

trophies, Mike Schueler had the class champ in the medium lightweight division with an 11-month old, 921-pound Semmental cross steer which the Schuelers had bred.

Otherwise, Friona had just one breed champion in the barrow show, by Denaee Reeve in the Chester White class, and one class champion in the sheep show, by John Ingram in the Southdown class.

Church's grand champion was purchased by Friona Industries in the auction sale for the prize animals, on a bid of \$2,000 per pound. All of the animals brought very good prices, as a good crowd of buyers attended the sale.

After a two-year absence, Lazbuddie reclaimed the barrow title when Russell Windham took top honors with a 233-pound Hampshire. Vandi Tarter, also of Lazbuddie, had the reserve champion barrow, a crossbreed.

Lazbuddie also claimed barrow breed titles by Joe Dan Tarter, Duroc, Shane Mason, Berkshire, and Sherrie Seaton, Poland China.

Bovina showmen, who paced the county exhibitors by qualifying 72 of the 150 animals for the sale, especially dominated the sheep

show with 29 of the top 40 places, winning four out of the five class championships.

Showmanship plaques were won by Doug Roming of Bovina for steers, Denaee Reeve of Friona for barrows and Sean Mason of Lazbuddie for sheep.

Roming exhibited the show's reserve champion steer, an 1164-pound Angus which gave Church a run for the money in the judging for grand champion.

The junior livestock show was once again saved by the enclosed showbarn, as the show was conducted on a bitterly cold day, and Saturday's auction started off on a cold note with a cover of snow on the ground, although the mercury had risen to 56 degrees by the end of the sale.

The win by Windham in the barrow division gave the Hampshire breed a one-up lead over Duroc barrows in the number of titles won by an individual breed. Durocs had won the past two county titles, to tie Hampshire at seven apiece, but the latest title gives the Hamps eight championships.

The championship win by the crossbred steer was the fourth title for a cross, which has now won three of the past four shows.

## Tractors Help In Emergency Work

Tractors belonging to the American Agriculture Movement were pressed into service as emergency vehicles in Washington, D.C. on Monday, as the nation's capital was buried underneath 23 inches of new snow.

Ralph Roming, in a telephone report to the Star this week, said that the mayor of Washington released 40 of the impounded tractors, and the farmers worked from mid-morning Monday until past midnight, clearing parking lots, and giving rides to doctors and nurses to and from hospitals.

In one case, hospital workers were relieved after spending 36 hours on duty.

Roming said he had operated his tractor from about 10:30 a.m. until 1 a.m. Tuesday.

"This snowfall may turn out to have been a God-send. The farmers have been given an opportunity to show what kind of people they are, and we have received the thanks of

hospital officials and city residents," Roming said.

The county AAM official said that Washington was virtually shut down on Monday by the record snowfall. None of the modes of public transportation could move. Hospital officials were upset because more of the tractors were not released, since they could have been used.

A number of buses were stranded, and farmers on tractors were sent to help solve the problem.

Roming said he felt the farmers' input in the ag committee hearings had been good. The hearings were to have resumed on Tuesday, but due to the weather, congress could not reconvene.

The Bovina farmer says the people seem to be sympathetic with their problems, but that they can't seem to get to first base with Congress and the USDA.

They plan to continue to press their issue, however, as hundreds of members of the AAM remain.

**50 YEARS AGO—FEB. 22, 1929**

**25 YEARS AGO—FEB. 18, 1954**

An announcement for a competitive examination for the position of Postmaster at Friona has been made by the Civil Service Commission. Leo McLellan has served as temporary postmaster since the resignation of Sloan Osborn last October.

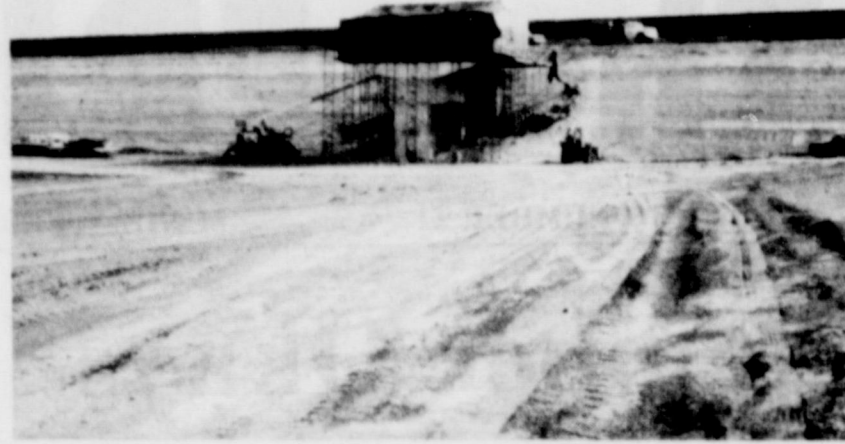

## Lazbuddie Dam Nears Completion

Several local officials and interested people were given a tour of the Lazbuddie Flood Prevention Dam during a final completion check.

All those attending were extremely impressed by the dam and felt this would be of great benefit to Parmer County.

Most people in the county do not realize the size, capacity, etc. of the dam.

Some figures of interest on the structure:

1. The dam contains 411,260 cubic yards of fill.
2. Height is 56 feet.
3. The main spillway contains 1396 cubic yards of concrete along with 260,000 pounds of reinforcing steel.
4. The water in the dam will cover 63 surface acres and contain 4427 acre feet at draw down stage.
5. There are four emergency spillways with each about 200 feet wide.

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Parmer County Commissioner's Court are the local sponsoring organizations.

The dam was designed and built by the Soil Conservation Service.

## PCA Loans Increase

Money loaned for agricultural production by Plainview Production Credit Association increased in 1978, according to James A. Rogers, the association's manager.

Rogers said his association loaned more than \$171.3 million to farmers and ranchers in 1978, an increase of 14.3 per cent over the \$149 million recorded by the association in 1977.

Plainview is one of 30 Texas PCAs which collectively provided more than \$1.5 billion in short and intermediate term credit to Texas

farmers and ranchers.

"Although all types of production costs continue to rise and are going to increase more and more," Rogers said, "we are confident that adequate credit for agricultural production will be available in 1979. However," he noted, "money costs and inflation may make the price higher."

Plainview PCA provides loan funds to Texas farmers and ranchers in Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Parmer and Swisher counties.

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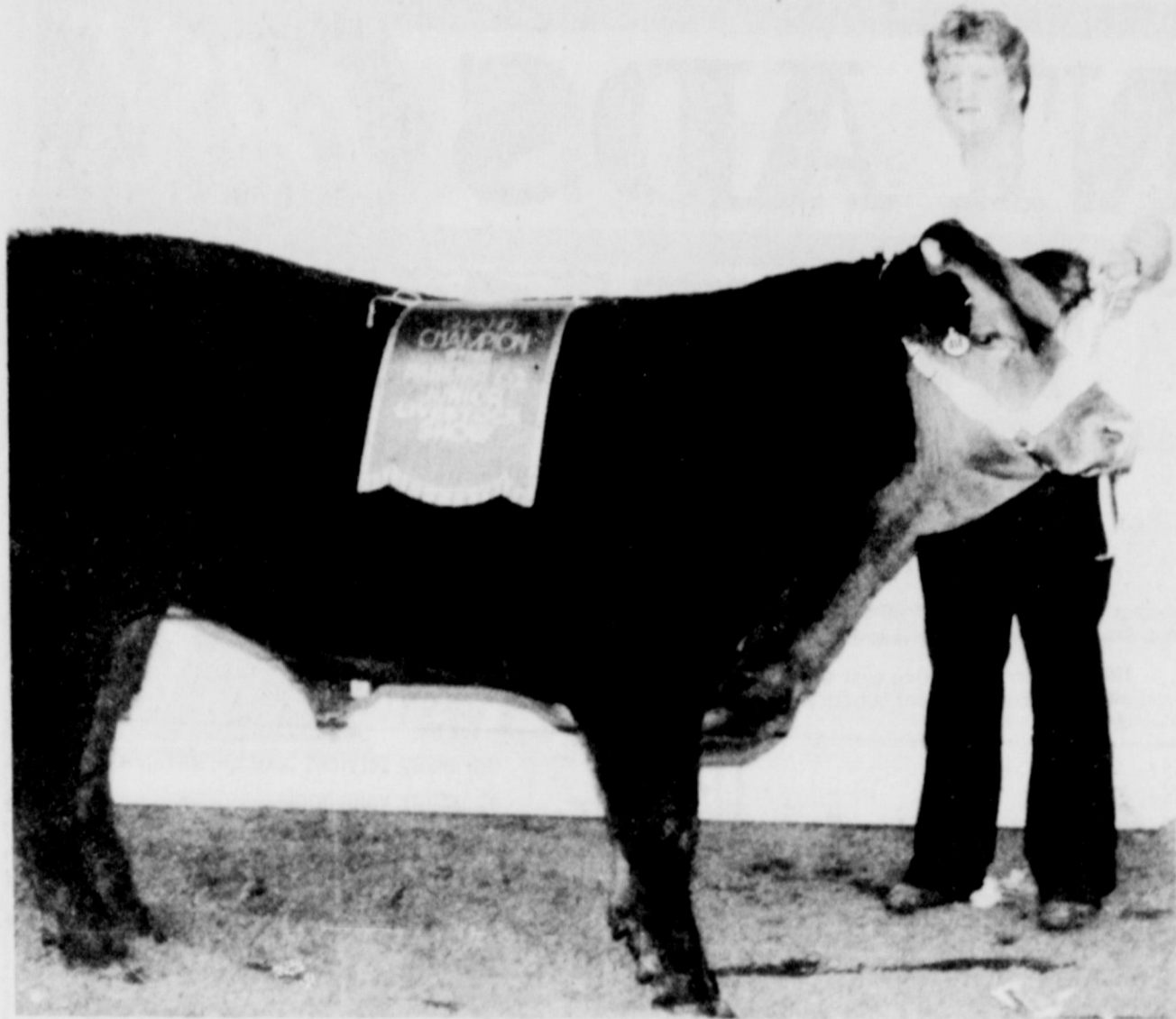

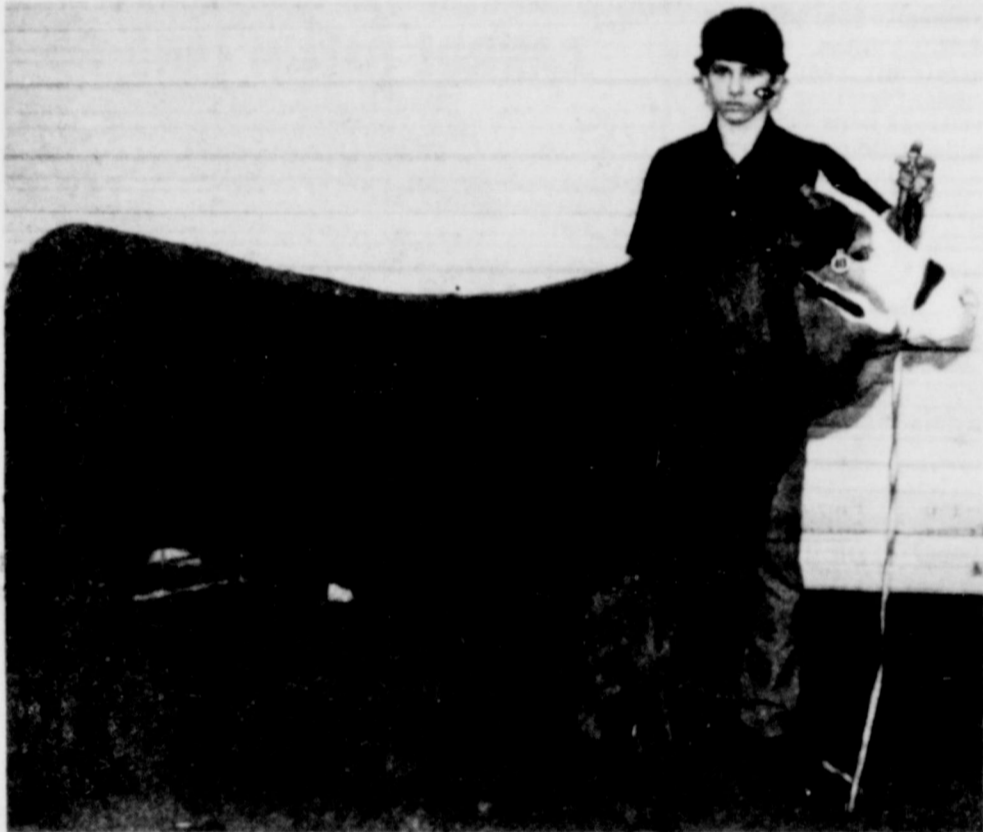

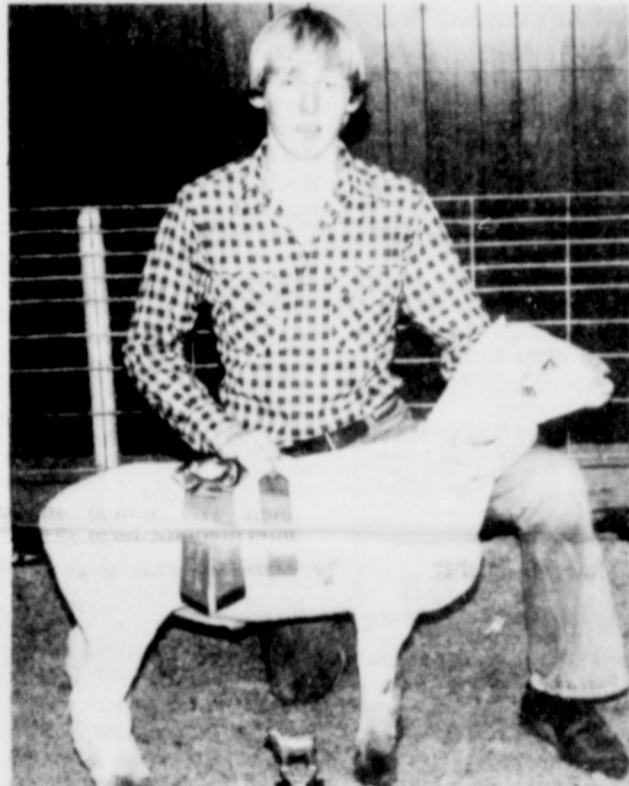
**BREED WINNER**...Denaee Reeve, Friona 4-H Club member, had the breed champion in the Chester White division at the Parmer County

Jr. Livestock Show last Friday. Miss Reeve's barrow was purchased at the auction by Friona State Bank.

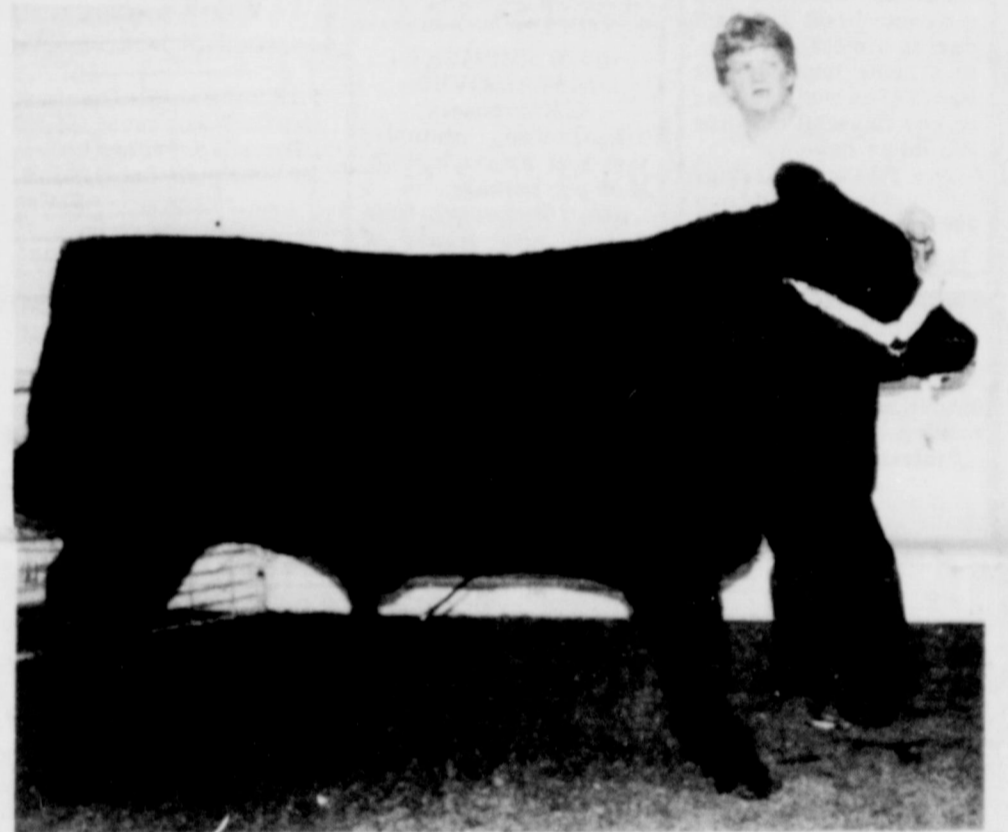


**MIKE SCHUELER'S** crossbred steer was the class champion of the middle light-heavyweight. The

TEXAS BEEF AND VEGETABLE MARINADE

- 1 1/2 pounds Texas Beef Chuck, cut in 1 inch cubes.
- 3 cups red wine, or enough to cover meat
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tsp. thyme
- 1 tsp. celery flakes
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 carrots, thinly sliced
- 1 can onion soup
- 2 zucchini squash, sliced
- 2 yellow squash, sliced
- 1 green pepper, cut in strips
- 1 1/4 cups mushrooms, sliced

In skillet, brown beef cubes lightly in oil. Place beef in 3-quart oven dish with cover.

Pour wine over meat. Add bay leaf, thyme, celery flakes and garlic. Marinate four to six hours in refrigerator.

Add carrots, onion soup to meat and wine.

Bake at 325 degrees, covered, for 45 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and bake 45 minutes longer or until tender.

If desired, thicken juices with four Tbsp. flour, stirring in over low heat. Serve Beef and Vegetables over bed of Texas rice.

Christy Bengé, Rhnea White and Amber Smith qualified for the semi-final round in poetry interpretation; Kipi Fleming competed in the semi-finals in prose reading, and Shae Dodson made that level in persuasive speaking.

Two debate teams from FHS battled to the quarter-final round. They were composed of Mark Blankenship-Mark Zachary, and David Merrill-Mark Bavousett.

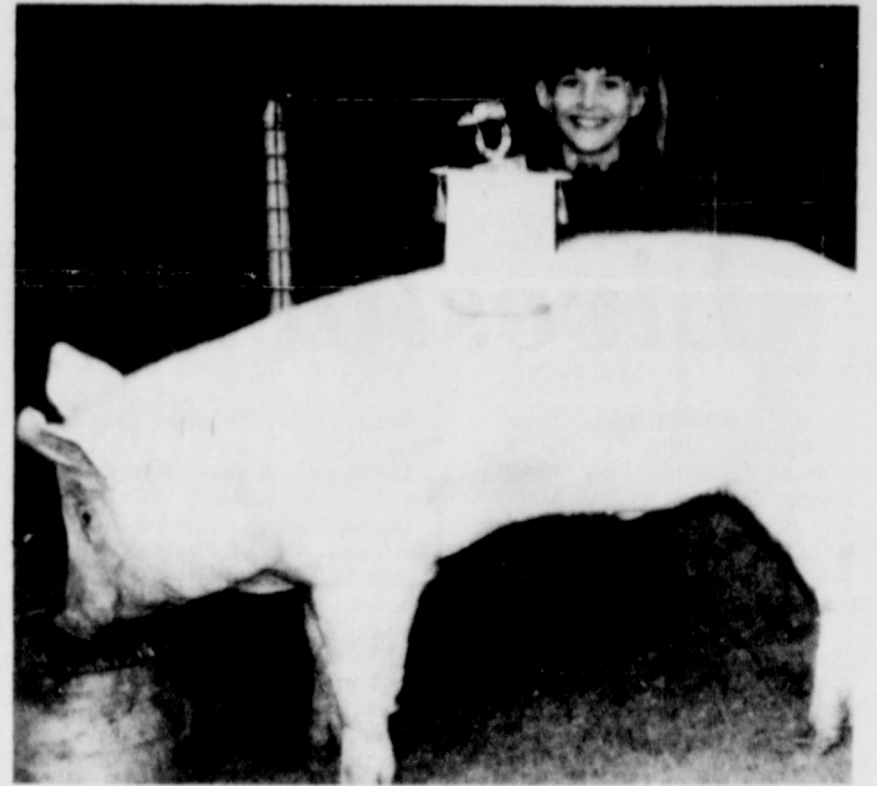

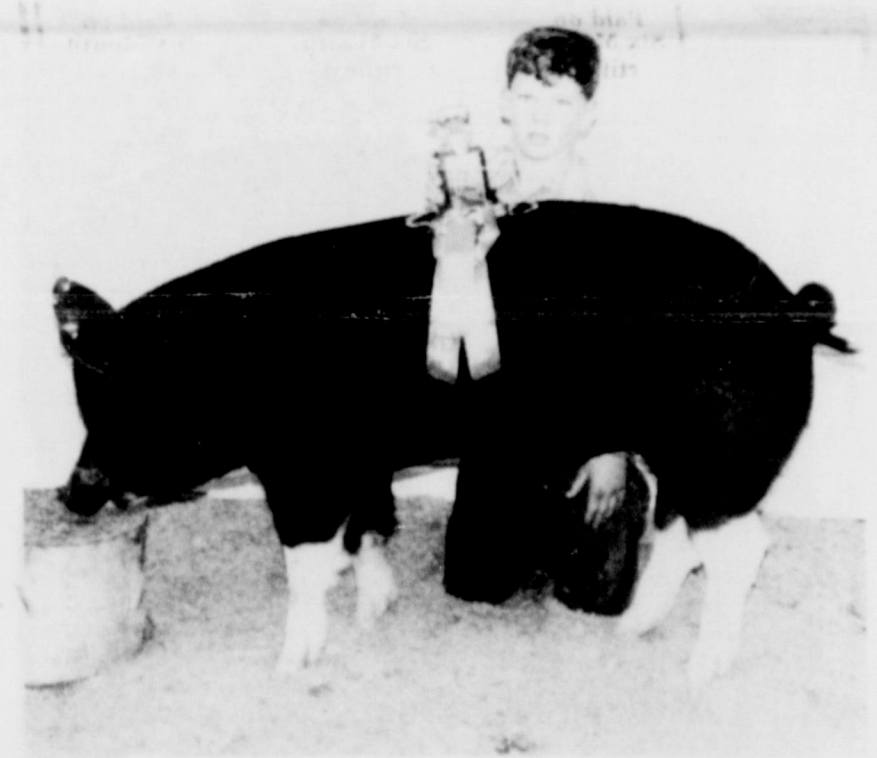

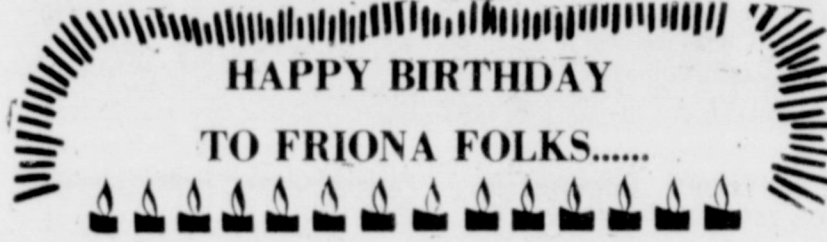

# Buske Family Attends H-SU Religious Center Dedication

A prominent Baptist family from the Texas Panhandle and a committed Methodist family from New Mexico joined with the Baptist General Convention of Texas and Hardin-Simmons University February 11 to dedicate H-SU's Religious Activities Center.

The center was made possible through gifts from the family of G.B. "Pete" Buske of Friona while the prayer room was constructed and furnished by memorial gifts in memory of Raulee Ribble, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Ribble, Jr. of Albuquerque. All immediate members of both the Buske and Ribble families were present in Abilene for the dedication.

Plans for the center were already underway in late November when Raulee died after a Thanksgiving auto accident. A student-led effort resulted in a memorial fund to make the prayer room a memorial to the popular freshman.

"This is the first, permanent Religious Activities Center to be opened on any of the campuses of the universities and colleges connected with the BGCT," Jack Greever told the crowd of 275 that attended the Sunday afternoon dedication.

Greever is with the division of Student Work of the BGCT.

The completed facility is inside the student center complex and includes five offices (including one for the campus evangelism coordinator and one for the missionary-in-residence), a conference room, a work room and a lounge.

The remodeling and furnishing of

the 2,500-square-foot center cost approximately \$35,000, H-SU officials said. The Division of Student Work of the BGCT provided furnishings for the center.

Buske, a pioneer in the development of the multi-million dollar cattle feeding industry on the High Plains of Texas, died in 1976. He came to Friona in 1929 as a 21-year-old.

In 1970 he was elected as "Man of the Year" in his hometown. He served on the boards of development for Hardin-Simmons and Southwestern Seminary and was director of High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo and the Parmer County Hospital in Friona.

He was one of the original stockholders in Friona Industries and was involved in farming, ranching, financial institutions, and other investments.

Family members attending the dedication included: Mrs. Buske and daughter Phila May (Mrs. Phillip Weatherly) and son B.K. and their spouses Deann (Mrs. Richard Styles) of Abilene and Lila Gay (Mrs. Don Max Vars) of Canyon and their spouses. Eight Buske grandchildren were also present.

"That's a lot of family," H-SU President Jesse C. Fletcher said in introducing the family to the crowd. "But that is appropriate because Pete Buske was a lot of man."

From Albuquerque came Mr. and Mrs. Ribble, daughter Renee and son Carson, great uncle and aunt, Dr. and Mrs. W.C. Ribble, former

H-SU faculty member, and a cousin. Another daughter, Robin, was already on the Abilene campus where she is a sophomore.

"I thank you (the Ribble family and friends) for providing an answer to a question I have faced continually since I've been at Hardin-Simmons, 'why don't we have a prayer room'," Dr. Fletcher told the Ribbles.

"And I think it is appropriate that the room is in memory of Raulee—a person who lived her Christianity. Her memory will have a continuing influence on coming generations of students here," he concluded.

Marshall Walker, now working with the Southern Baptist Convention Sunday School Board after 14 years as director of religious activities at H-SU, came back for the opening and recalled the days of cramped and/or inadequate facilities and hoped that, "this center will help bring about the finest religious activities program anywhere."

Since Walkers' departure last August, Mrs. Deann Styles, one of the Buske daughters, has been serving as interim director of Religious Activities. She will continue in this role through the current school year.
