residents of our semi-arid county to learn that the flood prevention dam, which was completed this week on Running Water Draw near the Lazbuddie community is one of the largest of its kind in the entire state.

The huge dam, built through the supervision of the Soil & Water Conservation Service, is quite an impressive structure, and would be worth your time to see sometime when you are in that area.

Hopefully, sometime in the future we can go back and inspect the site when it will be holding water. It is designed to accommodate a lake which would hold 4400 acre feet of

The dam itself is 56 feet high, from top to bottom, and is over 2200 feet

The structure required 410,000 cubic yards of dirt for the fill, plus an additional 10,000 cubic yards of soil cement.

An eight foot square conduit was constructed to carry the water through to the spillway, so SWCD engineers must have faith that someday there will be some water in the facility.

R.J. Sanderson, on whose land the dam is constructed, also must have faith that some water will be in the structure in the future. He had a boat dock constructed on his property. Now, all he needs is a big

Unlike the floodwater dam near Bovina, the spillway pipe in this structure is 27 feet from the bottom of the dam, which means that there would have to be that much water in the lake area before any water

entered the spillway.

Continuing the massive statistics, the contractor hauled in 210,000 tons of rock from near Canyon, Texas, to place in the spillway area on the east side of the dam, to prevent erosion from anticipated drainage from the dam sometime in the future.

You don't have to have too much of a memory to recall times when floods have sent the draw to flood

In previous years, before Highway 214 was rebuilt, we have seen Running Water Draw put the highway under water, and to a considerable degree at times.

The next time this happens, we should have a new lake in the county, and then perhaps we'll have to select a name.

Of course, it hasn't rained enough in recent years to even fill up the playa lakes in the county, but as everyone knows, our weather likes to deal in excesses, and one of these years we'll have another "gulley-washer," like the one in 1963, which caused millions of dollars of property damage in the city of Plainview, and made the Running Water Draw project possible.

There is some evidence that the average citizen is beginning to rebel against too much regulation. We pay for government regulations in two ways. First, we pay taxes to support the growing staff of persons required to write and enforce the regulations. Then we pay higher prices for the products and services we buy because of additional costs to comply with these regulations.

Even Senator Edward Kennedy spoke out recently against excessive government regulations. He said, "There is a government mentality that sees regulation as the natural order of the universe, that equates the Federal Register with the Holy Writ and that believes anything the marketplace can do, the government can do it better."

The Director of the President's Council on Wage and Price Stability figures that the cost of complying with federal regulations is already adding at least ten per cent to the inflation rate, and the bill is continuing to go up.

There are more than 100 federal agencies in the business of regulating the private sector in areas ranging from all matters affecting the consumer, anything



The first was a recent commentary in the Round Rock Leader concerning Rudolph Flesch's appearance before a U.S. Senate committee and the other is the current Public School Week.


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
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Poison Prevention Week Scheduled March 18-24

The week of March 18-24 has been designated as National Poison Prevention Week and is designed to help parents, grandparents, etc. in taking a look at the potential poisons in their homes, garages, gardens, and neighborhood

During 1978 the Texas State Poison Center assisted with nearly 13,000 poisoning cases. Over 72 per cent of these involved children under five years old. "Children in this age group, and most particularly those in the 6 months to 3 year age bracket, live in a 'hand-to-mouth' world," said Michael D. Ellis, M.S., Director of the Poison Center. "There are certain areas in the home that are particularly dangerous, for instances, under the kitchen sink, the bathroom sink, and the garage. These areas are where most people store cleaning products. The garage contains lots of petroleum distillate-containing (oilbased) products such as gasoline, paint thinner, enamel paints, etc. With these products, as little as one sip, if it gets into the lungs, can potentially be fatal.

The major substances ingested by young children included plants, colognes and perfumes, cosmetics. disinfectants, and household cleaners. Chewable multivitamins rank high on the list of frequently ingested medicines along with cough preparations, aspirin, and aspirin

"Over 77 per cent of the cases that the Poison Center has assisted with can be treated at home," Ellis noted, "thus eliminating the necessity of taking the child to either their physician or the emergency room. That's why we encourage the parents of children who have ingested a potentially toxic substance to call the Poison Center

Prevention of these numerous poisoning instances is the ultimate goal of the Poison Center. But prevention requires considerable effort on the part of the adults in the home. "This means that traditional storage areas for cleaning products, medicines, furniture polishes, etc. must be altered. Areas, like under the kitchen sink, must be cleaned out and the household products moved to higher locations." Ellis observed that "since most houses don't have an overabundance of storage places, we recommend that canned goods be put under the kitchen sink and the cleaning products be placed in high cabinets." Another way to help keep small children out of poisonous items is to use Mr. YUK stickers. "When these stickers are used as a teaching tool, they can be very effective in labeling the many substances that the child should not

If the parent will take the child with them and go over and over with the child that Mr. YUK is a NO-NO-and he will make you sick, the child can be taught to leave Mr.



YUK labeled products alone," Ellis

"Should all else fail," said Ellis, "and if the child should require medical attention, we can assist in referring the patient to either their physician, the nearest Member Hospital in the Poison Center Network or the closest emergency room. The Poison Center will call ahead and tell the medical facility what the problem is and also recommend the proper treatment. In that way the child will receive the best and quickest care possible."

'Accidental poisoning is a growing problem," observed Ellis, "and there are some 100,000 cases of poisoning each year in Texas. But we hope that we can help reduce this number by parent education and through the use of the Mr. YUK poison warning symbol." Should a poisoning emergency occur, the Poison Center can be reached by calling 713-765-1420. The Mr. YUK stickers can be obtained by sending a large self-addressed, stamped envelope to the Poison Center, University of Texas Medical Branch, 8th & Mechanic, Galveston, TX 77550.

'We urge parents, grandparents, and adults who have young children in their homes to survey their storage areas, and to help us prevent a poisoning from occurring," Ellis concluded.



Chieftains Shine As Meet Champions

The Friona Chieftains track team showed up well in their first track outing of the season last Saturday, winning the team title at Farwell's Twin-City Relays for the second straight year, setting a meet and school record in the process.

The Chiefs, defending District 3-AA track and field champions, won six events while rolling up 112 points to second-place Olton's 88.

Friona won both relays. The foursome of Leslie White, Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and Chitto Caballero won the mile relay event with a 3:38.3 timing.

The 440-yard relay team of Michael Gowens, Alexander, Owen and Mike Hubbart toured the lap in 45.7 for first place. They had run a 46.1 in the preliminaries.

Vaulter Chuck Nichols won his event with a height of 12 feet, seven inches. That broke the Farwell meet record, and also broke David Barnett's school record of 12-6 set during the 1976 season.

Other wins were turned in by Leslie White in the 880-yard dash at 2:09.5, by Caballero in the 440-yard dash in 52.3 and Mike Hutson in the high jump with a 6-1 leap.

The Chiefs practically swept the 440-yard dash event, with their three entrants (Caballero, Alexander and David Fleming) placing first, second and fourth, respectively, for 22 points.

"We were in much better shape physically than I thought we were," said Coach Robert Mears. "We wanted to win our first one, to set a pattern, and we did."

Mears said he thought that the Chieftain track team had set their goal at repeating as district champs. "In fact, we're out to win every meet we enter. We're gonna give it a try," he said.

The Chiefs matched themselves with three other district mates, Olton, Littlefield and Morton. They expect to see the other two, Dimmitt and Muleshoe, this week at Hereford, when the team enters the Deaf Smith County Relays.


